determination thereof; Ordered by the Commission that, for the next twenty-five cases coming on for trial, the attorneys for the claimants submit their testimony upon the three blank forms prepared by the Commission, and indorsed "Form A—Testimony of Claimants," "Form B—Testimony of Buld-ing Expert," and "Form C—Testimony of Real Estate Expert"; and that such Forms B and C be also used for submitting direct testimony of experts on behalf of the City. It is further ordered, that all such forms may be filled up out of court, but must be sworn to personally by the witnesses before the Commission. Any additional questions may be added by the counsel, where deemed necessary, but the form when filled up and sworn to shall be considered as concluding the direct examination of that witness. No testimony so taken shall be admitted in evidence, or, if so admitted, shall be permitted to remain upon the record, unless the opposing counsel shall have an opportunity for cross-examination, if desired. No prescribed form or limitation is made for cross, re-direct or re-cross examination. All such blanks to be filled up in triplicate; but, before the original shall be sworn to by the witnesses, and filed with the Commission, a copy thereof shall have been served on the counsel for the other side, at least eight days prior thereto, and due proof of said service furnished to the Clerk of the Com-mission.


