The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

I move to expunge so much of the letter of the Comptroller which appears on page 269 in the Minutes of the Board of Estimate of February 28, 1902, as follows:

I did not give the Comptroller any such assurances; he must have understood my remark, that I would be satisfied if the work could be paid for to the extent of one-third thereof each year. It would not be economical, nor to the interest of the City, if the work were divided into three parts, because in one section there is much cutting, or excavating, and in another section there is considerable filling, and when the contract is let, as it is provided for in resolution of the Board of Public Improvements as one contract, it would cost the City much less than if subdivided into three parts, as suggested by the Comptroller.

Hon. JACOB A. CANTOR, President, Borough of Manhattan, City Hall, New York:

MY DEAR SIR—As I understand that you contemplate advertising for bids for asphalt paving in this borough, I beg to call your attention to a provision of the specifications recently approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which renders it impossible for companies using rock asphalt to compete on equal terms with those using sheet asphalt.

These specifications, or rather the contract attached thereto, provide (section 22, page 42, paragraph 1) that rock asphalt shall be laid with a thickness of two and one-half inches, while the same contract provides (section 21, page 41, paragraph H) that sheet asphalt shall be laid with a thickness of two inches. You will readily see that the one-half inch required of rock asphalt makes a serious difference in the cost of laying the pavement, and places the rock asphalt companies at a disadvantage.

It is not customary in other cities to require a greater thickness in the case of rock asphalt than in the case of sheet asphalt, and I am prepared to show that there is no reason why there should be any greater thickness required, as experience has demonstrated that rock asphalt pavement laid with a thickness of two inches only and without binder is more durable than sheet asphalt of the same thickness laid with binder, and, further, that rock asphalt is entirely free from cracks and defects, is not slippery, and is not affected by the heat of the sun.

I represent a rock asphalt company which desires to bid on contracts for city paving, and I beg to inquire whether the specifications cannot be amended before such bids are offered, so as to require a uniform thickness of two inches for both rock asphalt and sheet asphalt.

MY DEAR SIR—On behalf of the trustees of the institute, I beg leave to call your attention to the importance of making provision during the year 1902, by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, for certain necessary additions to the building and equipment of the Brooklyn Institute Museum, Eastern Parkway and Washington avenue.

The amount of money to the credit of the Museum of Art and Science Fund on June 1, 1902, was, according to the statement of the Deputy Comptroller, J. W. Stevenson, \$334,195.42. This amount will, we understand, cover the following items: Liability on account of the contract of P. J. Carlin & Co... \$13,386 22 Cost of completing the interior of the second section of the

Museum (as per lowest bid received by Department of Parks, May 29).....	297,900 00
Architects' fees on \$297,900.....	14,805 00

If any portion of this work were to be delayed, we would recommend the omission of the front steps, substructure and central approach—\$46,100—and the construction of a temporary approach costing \$3,000. It would therefore appear to be necessary to provide for the issue of Corporate Stock of the City during the current year for an amount not less than \$150,000 in order that we may be able to use this central section.

*Mr. JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:*

SIR—In conversation with President Haffen last week it was suggested by him that his attention be called to the necessity for the issue of bonds required for certain purposes hereinafter mentioned relative to work to be done in the Bureau of Sewers.

I therefore call your attention to the necessity of bond issues as follows:

1. Reconstructing sewers and appurtenances at Williamsbridge..... \$20,000 00  
2. Alteration of Williamsbridge outlet sewer..... 6,000 00  
3. Cleaning Brook avenue sewer..... 6,000 00

Total of bond issues required..... \$32,000 00

The reasons for the request for issuance of bonds are as follows:

1. The reasons for asking for this issue of bonds (\$20,000) are as follows:

This issue is asked for to provide for the reconstruction of outlet lines of sewers in the following named streets in Williamsbridge:

Flower street, from Pleasant avenue to Second avenue, and in Second avenue, from Flower street to Fifteenth street.

There are at present sewers in the streets named which were constructed some years ago to complete work initiated by the authorities of the former Village of Williamsbridge, and which provided for sewerage up to Fifteenth street. Since the building of sewers, however, it has been found necessary to extend the sewerage system northerly to drain Wakefield section; contracts for such extensions now being prosecuted.

It is therefore absolutely essential to provide larger sewers for an outlet line to meet the added duty imposed by the extensions referred to.

Therefore the request for issuance for bonds as above is made, the necessity therefor being urgent.

2. The reasons for asking for this issue of bonds (\$6,000) are as follows:

The outlet sewer in Williamsbridge and Wakefield passes through Bronx Park and is carried under the Bronx river by an inverted siphon. It has been found that this siphon requires frequent cleaning at a cost of much time and expense, and it is proposed to construct a settling basin in the main line of the sewer, thereby providing against the trouble arising from the frequent obstruction thereof.

This is a matter of urgent necessity and the issue of bonds for this work should be at once authorized.

3. The reasons for asking for this issue of bonds (\$6,000) are as follows:

Brook avenue sewer is the main outlet line for the sewerage and drainage of an area of about four square miles and a considerable mileage of the streets within this territory is unpaved, the surface wash carries quantities of earth and sand into the sewers and a portion of this silt deposits in the Brook avenue sewer, which is subject to tidal action; an examination made a few months ago developed the fact that in its length of 10,000 feet there is a deposit of about 4,800 cubic yards of silt, which should be recovered and for which purpose the issue of bonds hereinbefore referred to is asked and should be at once authorized, as the work in question is one of great importance and should be at once taken in hand.

The Secretary presented the following from the Corporation Counsel in relation to an appropriation for main relief sewers in the Borough of Brooklyn:

*Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:*

SIR—I have received a letter from the Deputy Comptroller, dated May 22, 1902, in regard to the request made by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$250,000, to pay for the construction of main relief sewers in the Borough of Brooklyn. The letter concludes as follows:

This work was formerly carried out under the authority of chapter 379 of the Laws of 1894, which provided for the issue of bonds not to exceed in the aggregate the sum of \$2,000,000. This amount has been issued, or will be issued, to meet pending claims. I have been unable to find any authority in the Charter for issuing Corporate Stock to meet the expense of building main relief sewers.

"Will you kindly advise me whether there is such authority, and if not, whether the City has authority to provide funds in any other way to pay for this class of improvements."

In my letter to you, dated May 7, 1902, in regard to certain proposed resolutions of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment affecting the construction of relief sewers in the Borough of Brooklyn, I dealt with this subject to some extent, and with the "Main Sewer Relief and Extension Fund" of the City of Brooklyn authorized by the Laws of 1889, chapter 354, and Laws of 1894, chapter 379.

So far as the statutes just referred to provide for the construction of relief sewers, their terms have been complied with; the sewers have been built; and all the bonds authorized have been or will be issued.

I am aware of no provision of the Charter or of any other statute, under which it could be claimed that there is authority to construct relief sewers at the public expense.

I see no reason, however, why such sewers could not be built, and the cost thereof assessed upon the property benefited in the same manner and through the same procedure in the case of any other sewer. In general the sewers of this city of all kinds have been paid for through local assessment.

As to this resolution permit me to say that several of the court rooms in this Division are at this time in a very poor condition and requisitions made upon the Department of Buildings for repairs to same have been returned. Mr. Helmle, the Superintendent in this Borough has stated that no furniture, etc., can be had from his Department, and requests for repairs to typewriter, etc., are returned with statement that same must be paid out of contingent fund of this Board. The contingent fund at this time amounts to only \$500 from which postal supplies are purchased for thirteen courts as also certain books, such as Almanac, Penal Codes, etc. The request for transfer from salary account is made, as I believe the sum of \$12,000 now in such account for two Magistrates is not needed under recent decision of Court of Appeals in the Magistrates case in this borough.

Report of Special Committee of the Art Commission of New York City in Relation to the Proposed Alterations to the New York County Court House.

Your committee, appointed to consider the plans for the additions to the New York County Court House, on City Hall Park, beg to report as follows:

The plans before us show that it is proposed to remove practically all of the existing building except the court rooms and offices on its extreme east and west sides.

It is proposed to construct an addition to the existing building, which would add about fifty per cent, to its present ground area and increase the height of the main structure to a point 125 feet above the sidewalk, i. e., 53 feet higher than the present building. It is proposed also to construct a dome 56 feet still higher over the central portion of the building, making a total height of 181 feet.

The new structure would extend 75 feet to the south beyond the main lines of the existing building, bringing its south wall within about 60 feet of the north wall of the City Hall building. All of this extension would be upon the ground of City Hall Park, and would greatly narrow what is now one of the main approaches to the Brooklyn Bridge Terminal. In order to compensate in part for this loss of space to the public it is proposed to leave a covered passage way, the entrances to which are 15 feet wide, through the basement of the new extension.

The Art Commission is required to act in the above matter, with reference to the design of the proposed building, and its location; and is especially directed by the law to approve or disapprove of buildings of such magnitude as the one proposed which shall extend over or upon any street, avenue, highway, park or public place belonging to the city.

As to the design of the proposed building, your committee feel that the new parts would be architecturally out of harmony with the portion of the old building allowed to remain. While the design of the old structure is inferior in character and could not with advantage be closely followed in the proposed addition, nevertheless it seems clear that the new parts would not sufficiently dominate the whole to give a distinct character to the finished structure, which (quite apart from any excellence of design the new parts might have) would prevent the completed building from having such dignity and sympathy as should belong to the most prominent courthouse in Greater New York. They feel further that the relations of the parts and the proportions of the proposed building when completed would be exceedingly unsatisfactory.

Your committee agree that this Commission is bound to take into consideration the public needs, and at times, where utilitarian demands are pressing, to waive unimportant objections in matters of taste; but it seems clear to them that in this case the weaknesses of the design are too radical to be corrected, or overcome, by any excellency of its detail; and they feel that if the building must be arranged in ground plan essentially as shown, it would not be difficult to obtain designs for the exterior much more artistic and satisfactory than those under consideration.

In the opinion of your committee, it is the intention of the law that in the case of the proposed erection of a Public Building involving an expenditure of over \$1,000,000, the Art Commission shall not approve any design for such building, unless the same, apart from the fitness of the structure for its practical purposes, shall also insure for it a measure of architectural excellence commensurate with its prominence and the expenditure involved.

In this case your committee cannot lose sight of the fact that it is proposed to expend a very large sum of money, and they do not feel that the aesthetic effect or practical value of the building as proposed would justify the cost involved.

Finally, your committee are of the opinion that the proposed encroachment upon the Park area, and especially upon the thoroughfare leading directly from the Bridge to Broadway, constitutes in itself a serious objection to the proposed plan. It seems evident that, notwithstanding the device of a passage through the basement of the building, no little inconvenience would be occasioned to the public. Beyond this, the encroachment in the direction of the City Hall would be objectionable from the mere fact that it would reduce the Park space, which is now none too ample for public uses.

Apart from the practical objection that the new building would cut off much light from the City Hall, your committee feel that the new structure, rising so much higher than the City Hall and within about sixty feet thereof, would materially lessen the importance and dignity of that ancient and beautiful building. At the same time the architectural effect of any facade of such dimensions as those proposed for the south front of the Courthouse would be necessarily lost because of its close proximity to the City Hall.

For the foregoing reasons your committee recommend that the plans for the enlargement of the New York County Courthouse be disapproved by the Art Commission.

Which was laid over, for an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, in pursuance of a request made June 6, 1902.

The matter of telephone exchanges for the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn was laid over.

The Secretary presented the following, in relation to the salaries of James F. Moore and Edward P. Cringle, Deputy Tax Commissioners.

DEAR SIR—Your communication of even date to President Wells, with inclosure relating to the increasing of the salaries of Deputies Moore and Cringle, which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment referred back to this Department for a statement of the reasons for such increase, is received.

In the absence of President Wells, I would state that in preparing the schedule of salaries in this Department, in accordance with the provisions of section 10, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, as amended by chapter 436, Laws of 1902, the salary of Deputy Moore was reduced from \$3,000 to \$2,700 per annum, and that of Deputy Cringle was increased from \$2,100 to \$2,550 per annum.

But by reason of a clerical error both deputies were entered in the \$2,100 per annum grade, and such error now necessitates the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to enable said Deputies to obtain the salary intended.

With this correction made, the Department of Taxes and Assessments is well within the appropriation granted.

In reply I would report that I have had the sites examined, in compliance with your instructions, and submit my opinion of the respective asking prices.

No. 1. Navy Yard Section, No. 200 Nassau street, 74 feet 9 inches west of Gold street, lot 25 feet 1 inch by 87 feet 3 inches, with two story and attic frame dwelling, with brick basement, 21 feet by 30 feet. This is Ward No. 5, Section 1, Volume 1, Block 109, Lot No. 9, assessed at \$2,100 in name of Israel Meyers. Price \$1,250.

This price, while full value, is not excessive. The lot alone is worth about \$2,500, and figuring the building at 8 cents a cubic foot, brings the total up to about the price asked.

No. 2. South Brooklyn Station, vacant lot 25 feet 8 inches by 97 feet 6 inches by 27 feet 4 inches by 99 feet 8 inches (about) on the west side of Hicks street, 214 feet 3 inches north of Degraw street. Price \$2,500.

Through a typographical error, however, in the proposed salaries for 1902, Mr. Southwick's salary was fixed at \$1,500 per annum.

Mr. Southwick renders valuable services to the city and it was not my intention to reduce his salary. I believe that \$1,800 is in no degree excessive.

In order that Mr. Southwick may not suffer through the clerical error, made in the hurried preparation of the Revised Budget, I respectfully request that the necessary action be taken fixing the salary of E. B. This report was forwarded to the Deputy Commissioner, for his consideration, and under date of December 28, 1901, he recommended, as he had found it impossible to arrive at a satisfactory arrangement in the matter of price with the owners of these respective parcels of land, that the property be acquired by condemnation proceedings.

Section 255 of the Greater New York Charter, as it now exists, provides that the Corporation Counsel "shall not institute any proceeding for acquiring title to real estate by condemnation proceedings, except for opening streets, unless the same shall have been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment upon a statement to be furnished said Board of the valuation of such real estate as assessed for purposes of taxation."

The Department of Taxes and Assessments, to whom application was made, date of December 30, 1901, for the purpose, under date of the 15th instant, reported the assessed valuation for the year 1902, of the several plots mentioned, for the purposes of taxation, as follows:

of Jackson avenue and the southeasterly line of Kouwenhoven street; running thence northerly at right angles to Jackson avenue 80 feet  $7\frac{1}{2}$  inches; thence northerly 15 feet  $5\frac{1}{2}$  inches to the southeasterly line of Kouwenhoven street; thence northeasterly along Kouwenhoven street 25 feet; thence southeasterly and at right angles with Kouwenhoven street 25 feet and  $\frac{1}{4}$  of an inch; thence southerly and at right angles with Jackson avenue 90 feet  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches to the northerly line of Jackson avenue, and thence westerly along the northerly line of Jackson avenue 25 feet to the point or place of beginning.

The Engineer of your Department reported originally when the property was sought to be acquired at private sale that it was worth but \$1,400. As the owner declined to accept this sum for parting with the same, and as it was necessary to acquire the site, application was made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of February 3, 1902, to adopt a resolution authorizing its acquisition by condemnation proceedings.

The matter was again referred to you and your Engineer reported that as condemnation proceedings would be expensive, it might be well to pay \$1,600 for the property, and which price the owner, Ludwig Sikora, was willing to accept.

The funds necessary for the acquirement of this site have been provided in the bond issue of \$241,000 for the purchase of sites and the erection of buildings thereon for the purposes of this Department, in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, approved April 10, 1901, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of what was then section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, the required ordinance to give effect thereto having been adopted by both branches of the Municipal Assembly, and approved by the Mayor June 5 of the same year.

The Deputy Commissioner, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, having recommended the purchase at \$1,600, which I approve, I have the honor to request that to conform with the requirements of section 149 of the revised Greater New York Charter, you kindly indorse upon each of the four copies of the contract herewith inclosed, your approval in writing to its acquirement at the price named, and then cause the same to be returned to this Department.

SIR—Hon. Thomas Sturgis, Commissioner, Fire Department, in communication under date of February 3, 1902, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requests the Board to adopt a resolution authorizing the Corporation Counsel to institute the necessary legal proceedings for the acquisition of the following parcels of property, as sites upon which to erect apparatus houses for the Fire Department:

Borough of Queens.

Parcel No. 1—On the northerly side of Jackson avenue, 112 feet  $9\frac{1}{2}$  inches easterly from Kouwenhoven street, and extending irregularly south to the latter street, to a point distant 137 feet  $9\frac{1}{2}$  inches from its junction with Jackson avenue, 25 feet front on each street; assessed for the year 1902, at an apportioned value of \$550.

Borough of Brooklyn.

Parcel No. 5—25 feet by 100 feet on the northerly side of Cook street, 407 feet 4 inches eastward from Bushwick avenue, known as Lot No. 17, Block 164, Ward No. 18; assessed for \$700.

Parcel No. 9—Known as No. 417 Manhattan avenue, located on the westerly side of Manhattan avenue, 75 feet north of Meeker avenue, 25 feet by 100 feet, known as Lot No. 22, Block 242, Ward No. 17; assessed at \$500.

Parcel No. 10—Plot 40 feet by 100 feet, on the northwesterly side of East Thirteenth street, about 70 feet south of Avenue C, known as Lots. Nos. 63 and 64, Block 253, Ward No. 29; assessed valuation \$500; owner Fred Goetz, No. 731 Coney Island avenue.

Parcel No. 11—Plot 40 feet by 99 feet  $2\frac{1}{4}$  inches by 98 feet  $8\frac{1}{4}$  inches on south side of Forty-fifth street, beginning about 240 feet east of Fourteenth avenue, owner Mr. Paulson, authorized agent T. P. Leslie, designated on the tax maps of the Borough of Brooklyn as Lot No. 5, Block 4, Ward No. 30; assessed valuation \$200.

In reply, I would report that since the cost of each site is so small, the highest asking price being only \$2,400, I have been negotiating with the owners, and in all cases have received better offers, as follows:

Parcel No. 1, Jackson Avenue Site—This plot was originally offered to the City for \$1,800, and in my previous report of October 14, 1901, I appraised it at \$1,500. The authorized agent, George J. Ryan, No. 44 Jackson avenue, Long Island City, for the owner, Ludwig Sikora, now consents to sell this property for \$1,600, which is probably as low as the cost would be under condemnation proceedings, if not lower, and I recommend that it be purchased at private sale for \$1,600.

Parcel No. 5, No. 185 Cook Street—The original asking price for this site was \$2,400, and I have estimated it to be worth \$2,100. The authorized agent, Mrs. Gertrude Bonner, has given a partial consent that the property can be purchased by the City for \$2,200. Taking everything into consideration, I consider this a good proposition, and would recommend that it be accepted.

Parcel No. 9, No. 417 Manhattan Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn—The owner of this lot has become demented, and therefore no agreement can be entered into to purchase the property at private sale. However, an equally available lot of the same size, 25 feet by 100 feet, just around the corner, on the north side of Richardson street, and 150 feet west of Manhattan avenue, being lot 14 in block 2723, is offered to the City by the authorized agents, Sammis & Clark, 416 Graham avenue, for \$1,500. There is little, if any, difference in the value of the two sites. I would therefore recommend that this suggestion to purchase the lot on Richardson street, instead of the plot on Manhattan avenue, be referred to the Commissioner of the Fire Department for his approval.

Parcel No. 10, East Thirteenth Street Site—The original asking price for this parcel was \$1,500, and I estimated that it was worth \$1,200. The owner, Fred Goetz, has since offered the property for \$1,400; this, I still consider excessive, but I have been unable to obtain another plot in the vicinity for \$1,200; therefore, perhaps it would be advisable to accept Mr. Goetz's proposal, in view of the expense attached to condemnation proceedings. I would add that Mr. Goetz is Chief Clerk in the office of the Kings County Register.

Parcel No. 11, Forty-fifth Street Site—Plot 40 feet by 90 feet  $3\frac{1}{4}$  inches by 40 feet 98 feet  $8\frac{1}{4}$  inches on the south side of Forty-fifth street, about 240 feet east of Fourteenth avenue. This plot was originally offered to the City for \$1,000, and I appraised it at \$650. The owner, Mr. Paulson, through his authorized agent, T. P. Leslie, Forty-fifth street and Fort Hamilton avenue, now agrees to sell this plot for \$750. Although this price is full, I consider it more economical to accept this offer than to acquire the property by condemnation proceedings.

SUMMARY.

Parcels recommended to be acquired by private purchase, and the price to be allowed for each.

Borough of Queens.

Parcel No. 1, Jackson avenue site..... \$1,600 00

Borough of Brooklyn.

Parcel No. 5, No. 185 Cook street..... 2,200 00

Parcel No. 9, Richardson street, north side, 150 feet west of Manhattan avenue..... 1,500 00

Parcel No. 10, East Thirteenth street site..... 1,400 00

Parcel No. 11, Forty-fifth street site..... 750 00

In conclusion, if my recommendations meet with your approval, I would suggest that they be referred to Hon. Thomas Sturgis, Commissioner, Fire Department, for his consideration and approval.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—By section 455 of the revised Greater New York Charter, it is provided, among other things, that "the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity may at any time employ, when thereto authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, a Consulting Hydraulic Engineer to his Department of at least fifteen years' experience as a Civil Engineer; and a Consulting Engineer of Lighting and Electricity to his Department, who shall be an expert in all matters relating to lighting and electricity and whose training shall also have included instruction in the capacity of Civil Engineer."

In accordance with the said section, I beg to request that the Commissioner be authorized to employ a Consulting Hydraulic Engineer to the Department of at least fifteen years' experience as a Civil Engineer; that the employment be for such period as the Commissioner may deem necessary, not to exceed three months; and that the fee and compensation to be paid to such Consulting Engineer shall not exceed the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars.

It is, in my judgment, of the utmost importance that the Department shall at this time have the benefit of the service of a Consulting Hydraulic Engineer; and the reasons why I urge the immediate appointment of such a Consulting Engineer are, briefly, as follows:

With the approach of summer and the possibility of a shortage in some parts of the city in the water supply, it is eminently desirable that the wisest measures shall be concerted to avoid any water famine. The Department is confronted with grave and difficult problems in connection with the development of existing water systems and the possibility of their extension into new territory. New filter plants have been installed at Springfield, L. I., and at the Jameco Pumping Station, L. I., tests of which should be made as complete as possible, not only to establish the sufficiency of these plants, but, also, because of the necessity for constructing a filter plant at the mouth of the Hempstead Reservoir, under appropriation recently granted by your Board. The extension of the driven well system, for which appropriation has recently been made, should be most wisely and economically undertaken; the problem of water waste investigated; and a variety of other matters, all tending to the improvement of existing water systems, should be examined. In order that the work of the Department may be conducted most profitably and advantageously to the people for the ensuing year, the opinion and advice of a Consulting Engineer, to be obtained before the estimate of the Department for the coming year shall be prepared, would be of great service.

It is my purpose to retain, and, in fact, I have retained, subject to the authorization required by the Charter, as such Consulting Hydraulic Engineer, Mr. John R. Freeman, of Providence, R. I., a Civil Engineer of more than fifteen years' experience and a recognized authority in the field of hydraulic engineering, well known to the people of this City, because of his report upon the water systems of the metropolis to the late Comptroller of the City, Mr. Coler, in the spring of 1900.

I submit herewith a form of resolution, and trust that it will be considered and adopted by your Board at its next meeting.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, and sections 169 and 170 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of one million six hundred and ten thousand dollars (\$1,610,000), being the balance unissued of bonds required by the Aqueduct Commissioners, pursuant to resolution adopted by said Commissioners November 19, 1901, the proceeds whereof to be applied for the purposes of carrying out the provisions of said chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the establishment, equipment and maintenance by the Fire Commissioners of The City of New York of a fire alarm telegraph system for the Borough of Richmond.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen May 27, 1902, three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, June 10, 1902, without his approval or disapproval thereof; therefore, as provided in section 10 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it.

Which was referred to the Comptroller for examination and report.

The Mayor presented the following in relation to an appropriation for ice water fountains:

To the Hon. SETH LOW, President, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

HONORABLE AND DEAR SIR—Our Society awaits anxiously for your kind aid and promise for a contribution from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the ensuing year.

As we mentioned before, for twenty-two years we have carried on this great charity with contributions only, and at the same time over fifty cities and towns have adopted and paid the full amount for free ice water fountains; but New York City does nothing.

The summer is near and the prospects for a hot, sultry one. Will you not get us an appropriation from your Board of at least \$1,000 for the various fountains and free ice water and free ice for the laborers and poor?

The Mayor presented a communication from James L. Wells and others requesting that compensation be given to Rev. John Boyle, rector of St. Luke's Church, for spiritual administrations to the patients in the smallpox hospitals on North Brother Island.

Which was referred to the Department of Health for consideration and report.

The Mayor presented a communication from the Board of Elections, dated June 5, 1902, transmitting an estimate of the cost of voting machines.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to furnish a copy of the said communication to each member of this Board, and place the matter upon the calendar for the next meeting of this Board.

The Mayor presented a communication from the Ozone Park Carnegie Library Association, dated June 12, 1902, requesting the selection of the plot of ground at Broadway and McCormick avenue, Ozone Park, Borough of Queens, as a site for a Carnegie Library.

Which was referred to the Committee on Carnegie Library Sites for the Borough of Queens.

The matter of the compensation for the West Tenth Street Connecting Railroad Franchise was taken up for consideration.

After discussion, the matter was referred to the Mayor and Comptroller.

The Mayor presented the following in relation to placing electric wires underground:

CITY OF NEW YORK,  
DEPARTMENT OF WATER SUPPLY, GAS AND ELECTRICITY,  
13 TO 21 PARK ROW,  
NEW YORK, June 9, 1902.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—Section 526 of the revised Greater New York Charter, provides, among other things, as follows:

"Whenever the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall deem it desirable and practicable, after hearing all parties interested, that the electrical conductors in any street, avenue, highway or public place of The City of New York, lying within the boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, be placed underground, the said Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity shall notify the owners or operators of the electrical conductors above ground in any such street, avenue, highway or public place, that said electrical conductors shall be placed underground within a certain time to be fixed by the said Commissioner, which said time shall be sufficient for the proper construction of underground conduits or other channels in said street, avenue, highway or public place."

It being the clearly defined policy of the Charter and the law that aerial electrical wires and conductors of every description shall, as speedily as practicable, be removed and electrical conductors in subways substituted in their place. I felt it to be my duty some weeks ago to notify the various corporations, whether transportation companies, illuminating companies or telephone or telegraph companies, operating in the Borough of Brooklyn, that such is the policy of the Charter, and to invite them to a conference with me upon the general question of relieving the streets of the Borough of Brooklyn at an early date from the present load of overhead electrical constructions. In my letter I called attention to the fact that the owners and operators of electrical wires in Manhattan, although reluctant at the outset to make any change in their overhead system, were now unanimously of the opinion that the burial of their wires had operated beneficially to themselves as well as to the public. My letter to the various Brooklyn companies contained this statement: "In Fulton street, from the Borough Hall to Flatbush avenue, trolley feeder wires are strung under the elevated structure, while troughs for telephone wires have been built along the structure, and at various points where the wires leave the structure to enter buildings abutting along the street the telephone and trolley feeder wires are in such close proximity as to make contact possible. It is not at all uncommon to find pole lines on both sides of the street, the pole line on one side carrying from ten to twenty or more electric light wires, while the pole line on the other side of the street sustains fully as many telephone wires, and in many streets trolley feeder wires and overhead trolley wires are added. In fact, the streets contain a network of wires, unsightly in appearance and dangerous to property and to life, as has been too often demonstrated. These conditions are not exceptional, and they create a state of affairs which, it seems to me, is intolerable and demands redress."

The corporations which I invited to confer with me accepted the invitation, and we have discussed existing conditions and prospective relief. The companies with which I have had conference are the following: The Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, which is a securities and business corporation owning the stock of the Brooklyn

Heights Railroad Company, which in turn is the lessee operating all the trolley railroads in Brooklyn, with the exception of the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company; The Edison Electric Illuminating Company, which, as owner or lessee, is operating all the electrical illuminating plants in the Borough of Brooklyn, outside of the Twenty-ninth Ward of the borough; The New York and New Jersey Telephone Company; The Western Union Telegraph Company; The Postal Telegraph-Cable Company and the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company, which operates the DeKalb Avenue, Franklin Avenue and Smith and Jay Street lines.

All of the above named corporations professed a readiness to co-operate with the head of this Department in the earliest practicable removal of overhead wires from the Borough of Brooklyn. They realized that my intention was not to advocate or enforce a plan which would be financially injurious to the companies, and that it was not my expectation that all the overhead wires within the Borough of Brooklyn should be removed during the course of the next year. But it was made plain to them that the Department was thoroughly in earnest in its resolution to make a beginning and steadily to compel action on the part of the companies until the unsightly and dangerous network of overhead electrical constructions shall be permanently banished from the borough. No denial was made by any company of the allegations in my letter which I have quoted above regarding the condition of overhead wires in the borough; on the contrary, every participant in the conference admitted the fact. It is also significant and worthy of comment that although the people of the borough are, in their own streets, subjected to the presence of wires carrying a high tension current in close proximity to wires conveying a current of low potential, the companies operating wires of low potential express the greatest disinclination to have their wires in ducts in the same subways with wires of high potential. The desirability of union on the part of the companies employing high or low potential systems in the construction of subways appears to be self-evident, because of the extent of space which the subways occupy and of the disadvantage to the public of disturbance of the streets for various subway constructions. Obviously, a single subway of sufficient accommodations for the high tension wires and a separate subway for the low tension wires would be economical from every point of view; but the protest of the telephone and telegraph companies against entering subways carrying trolley feeder wires and electric illuminating wires was as decided as it was just; in fact, the rules of this Department would not permit high and low tension wires in the same subway.

The New York and New Jersey Telephone Company has been constructing subways for a number of years, and claims to have commenced underground construction before the adoption of the first legislation looking to the removal of overhead wires. The representative of that company at the conference said: "We do not want them (the trolley wires and electric wires), if we can help ourselves, anywhere near us."

The Commissioner—"Why?"

A.—"There is such a tremendous high current, and even with the best insulation their current escapes and it plays havoc with us. Our current is a very light current, the same as with telegraph companies, but the moment our wires cross one of their wires and becomes 'grounded'—there is danger. The Board of Subway Commissioners of Brooklyn insisted that signal wires should be on one side of a street and the light bearing and power wires on the other to avoid the possibility of contact."

In answer to the Commissioner's question, the operators of these high tension wires acknowledged the danger of high and low tension wires on the same side of a street. Mr. Leslie, representing the Brooklyn Edison Electric Illuminating Company, stated that he should dislike to operate a conduit containing the company's high tension wires and the trolley feeder wires to any great extent. He says: "Our waterside station generates a current of 6,600 volts, and we have had very few interruptions to these cables carrying that pressure, and I ascribe it to a very considerable extent to the fact that no one could get into these conduits except our own people, who were always careful and who always knew the character of the service being carried on in the conduits." I have alluded at length to this subject because the rules of the Department forbid high and low tension wires in one subway, and the different companies would not agree to occupy such a subway. Yet the confused intermingling of overhead wires of all descriptions, both high and low tension, presents even worse conditions in the public highways.

\* The system prevails, wherever there are elevated railroad structures, of stringing wires indiscriminately under such structures, whether they be trolley feeder wires, electric light wires, telephone or telegraph wires, despite the dangers which the operators of the various companies say exist where the wires are brought into close proximity in subways. The peril to passersby along the street is obvious under this method of procedure. Furthermore, it is a fact admitted by the companies that numerous wires diverge from the elevated structure to pass into properties along the streets; and it frequently happens that electric light wires and telegraph or telephone wires run from the elevated structure to a neighboring house within a very few inches of each other. The danger is less in the case of wires strung upon poles, because the distance between the high tension and low tension wires where they leave the poles is usually greater than that which prevails where the wires leave the elevated structure. The elevated railroad companies obtain a rental from the various companies which use the elevated structure as a support for their wires. A serious question arises as to the right of the elevated companies to farm out such privileges; the right, however, has been sustained by the courts in so far as to authorize these companies to permit telegraph companies to string their wires under the structure.

Inspection of the maps which some of the companies have submitted to me, upon which are delineated the streets in which they now have trolley and trolley feeder wires suspended, or electric light wires or telephone or telegraph wires, as the case may be, shows that an enormous mass of overhead wires of all descriptions is to be found all over the borough. The Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, on November 1, 1901, had 655.8 miles of aerial electrical trolley feeder wires alone, and this number has not been diminished since. It maintains 382.02 miles of trolley railroad within the Borough of Brooklyn and 433.9 miles of railroad in all. The Coney Island and Railroad Company has 19.50 miles of aerial electrical trolley feeder wires and operates 23.6 miles of railroad. The Edison Electric Illuminating Company has declined to state how many miles of aerial electrical conductors it operates within the borough; but, as it claims the right to maintain overhead conductors, under franchises, which it alleges cover the entire borough (a subject which will be discussed later), it is to be presumed that it maintains a large mileage of overhead wires. The New York and New Jersey Telephone Company has 8,974 miles of aerial electrical conductors; the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, 69 miles of such conductors; the Western Union Telegraph Company has 500 miles of wires on poles in streets.

The reason why the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company has a greater mileage of aerial conductors than any other of the electrical companies operating in Brooklyn is that its system requires two wires for each telephone installed, to run from the house to the telephone exchange; thus, one telephone a mile and a half from the central office requires three miles of wire. The wires do not carry any perceptible current of electricity and are not dangerous per se; and it is the policy of the company, wherever possible, to cable its conductors in place of running separate wires, which greatly reduces the objection to the unsightly conditions arising where large numbers of separate wires are placed on a pole. Were all the company's wires cabled to conform to the size of the trolley feeder cables, it would have only a few more miles of cable than the trolley railroads now operate. It may be said, also, in this connection, that the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company has, according to its statement, already placed 42,211 miles of its conductors in subways within the borough, and it mentions a number of streets from which it could shortly remove the present aerial system.

The telephone and telegraph companies contend that it is inadvisable for them to combine so as to substitute a single subway for the accommodation of their overhead wires, yet it would seem that such a combination is eminently desirable in the public interest. The only substantial objection raised by any of the low tension companies to combining in subways is the objection to combine their wires with the high tension wires. There is a general concurrence of sentiment among the companies that the policy of building subways and substituting underground conductors in lieu of aerial ones is proper, the only difference, if any, between them and the Department being with respect to the rapidity with which this policy can be carried into execution. In answer to questions respecting the time which it would take, if the companies were to proceed with reasonable expedition, to remove overhead wires, the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company asserted, with respect to its feeder wires, that they could be replaced underground in the most populous parts of the entire Borough of Brooklyn in three years. The Coney Island Railroad fixes the same time, and the New York and New Jersey

Telephone Company a like period. Neither the Western Union nor the Edison Electric Illuminating Company give any answer to the question, and the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company state that it is "unable to say."

An impression seems to have arisen that the Department was proposing to require the removal from the streets of trolley wires in such a manner as to interfere with the unity of the existing transportation system. Obviously, such a project would be unwise and would meet with popular disapproval, but no such plan has been in mind. The Department proposes merely that the heavy trolley feeder wires, which simple inspection will show any observer, line the sides of numerous streets or run under the elevated structures, shall be removed from their present locations and that trolley feeder electrical conductors shall be placed underground. If an area with a radius of two miles from the Bridge be adopted, subways could be built within it before July 1, 1903, and the work already done, although not consecutive in character, but disjointed and finished in spots, is sufficient to indicate that if the plan be steadily pursued, the streets within a radius of two miles from the Brooklyn Bridge can within the course of a year be relieved of this overhead danger.

There is no reason why the electric illuminating wires should not also be removed from a similar area within a like period. Serious questions arise as to the legal right of the Edison Electric Illuminating Company to maintain any overhead wires at all within the Borough of Brooklyn. In answer to inquiries of the Department, the company bases its claim to install and maintain aerial electrical conductors upon a franchise issued to Messrs. Pope, Sewell & Co. and Messrs. Charles Cooper & Co., May 19, 1884, by the Common Council of the former City of Brooklyn. The company states in a letter to me of April 30, 1902: "Franchise of 1884 to Charles Cooper & Co. and to Pope, Sewell & Co. authorizes overhead wires, so that the Edison Company now owns two franchises for the entire Borough of Brooklyn; one its original franchise of 1884 for an underground system, and the other, the franchise of 1884, originally granted to Cooper & Co. and to Pope, Sewell & Co., divided by assignment between the Citizens' Company and the Municipal Company, and again united under the ownership of the Edison Company by the merger of the Citizens' and Municipal Companies into the Edison Company." And later in the same letter, in describing its methods of operation, it says that under the Citizens' and Municipal franchises, the Edison Company has the *absolute* right "to construct and operate its aerial or overhead electrical conductors," and that under the Kings County and Amsterdam franchises (which it controls) it has the right to construct and operate aerial or overhead electrical conductors only by permission of the Subway Commission or its successors in office. Its absolute claim, which is founded upon the franchise granted by the Common Council of Brooklyn, May 19, 1884, seems to me to be in conflict with the statute passed June 14, 1884, chapter 534 of the Laws of 1884, the first paragraph of which is as follows: "All telegraph, telephonic and electric light wires and cables used in any incorporated city of this State, having a population of 500,000 or over, shall hereafter be placed under the surface of the streets, lanes and avenues of said city." Inasmuch as the law has been sustained as constitutional (and I do not find that the first section of it has been repealed), it would seem to me that the Edison Electric Illuminating Company had no authority after the date of the passage of the act to erect poles and string aerial electric light wires, despite said franchise. On May 26 I addressed a letter to the Brooklyn Edison Electric Illuminating Company, calling attention to this enactment, and that it applied to Brooklyn, as Brooklyn then had a population of over 500,000. I have just received reply that the act of 1884 has been superseded or repealed, and that, if it is still law, the company's franchise is protected as a contract by the provision of the Federal Constitution, prohibiting legislation impairing the obligation of contracts. I do not think the reply valid. I have already stated that I understand the first section of the act of 1884 to be in force. If the company's franchises are protected against the act of 1884, the provisions of the Revised Charter are nugatory to prevent the continuance of the company's overhead wires. Its franchises were granted *conditionally*, and if the company have violated the conditions, the franchise would be revocable. But whether the constructions now maintained by said company are illegal or not there can be no question that the company should, as rapidly as practicable, relieve the congested streets of the borough, within the above-described area, from the presence of its aerial constructions. These are a great source of danger in a variety of ways. Strung, as its wires repeatedly are, over or under telegraph and telephone wires on poles of great height, they are in constant danger of being thrown either to the street or in contact with the low tension wires, and the moment such contact occurs and the insulation of the wire is sufficiently abraded, the low tension wire becomes a conductor of the high-tension current. Nor is the danger obvious, because the current may be carried miles, and either a pedestrian upon the street or a lineman attempting to repair at a distance from the point of contact of the wires, receives a shock sufficient to kill or permanently injure, or a current might be carried over low potential conductors into a building, which, not having been safeguarded against the destructive current of a high potential system, would probably be set on fire, as happened in Brooklyn in February last, at No. 504 Hamilton avenue, office of Nelson Bros., according to a report of the New York Board of Fire Underwriters to me.

Under its franchise the Brooklyn Edison Electric Illuminating Company is bound to give the City certain free lamps proportioned in number to its service to private consumers, but if the records at my command are accurate, it fails to fulfill this agreement. It fails, also, to repair the streets of the borough that it opens for the purpose of erecting its poles, and these derelictions should, it seems to me, be considered when it asks to continue to maintain an overhead system that imperils life and property. During the storms of last February it is a well-known fact that poles gave way or wires were unfastened and thrown in a confused and dangerous network upon the streets, that horses were killed, and, in many instances, human life was endangered. Similar, if not worse, accidents have occurred in the other boroughs of the City where wires of varying potential are suspended overhead.

Repeated complaints have been received from the Fire Department as to the interference with the humane and beneficial work of that Department caused by the presence of these wires in the streets. The firemen are often prevented from raising their ladders, they receive shocks of more or less severity due to the contact of high and low tension wires occasioned in the manner heretofore indicated, and when they find it necessary to cut wires, the entire neighborhood upon that circuit may be left in darkness.

I have recently received a letter from the President of the South Brooklyn Board of Trade, which, in speaking of the injury to wires wrought by the heavy storm last winter, says: "Taking Tenth street, for instance, the storm mentioned made such havoc there that the wires are in disorder still." No uniform policy seems to prevail with regard to the extension of the overhead wire system. In some streets regulations of the Subway Commission have been ignored, which prohibited high and low tension wires indiscriminately upon the same side of the street, for poles carrying high and low tension wires exist on the same side of the street to-day, and poles carry an enormous burden of wires, unduly freighting them and rendering the poles themselves dangerous by reason of the enormous weight attached to them. In some cases the high tension electric light wires run over, and in others, under telephone or telegraph wires upon the same poles, or in such a manner that the linemen who have to repair these low tension wires must, in climbing, pass the dangerous high tension wire. Recently, in the Borough of Richmond, the death of one of the repair gang was occasioned by reason of the fact that in the discharge of his duty he had to climb above this dangerous wire, and the complaints in that borough are numerous regarding this kind of construction, which obtains also in the Borough of Brooklyn. The telephone, telegraph and electric light companies are, by the terms of the franchise under which they have a right to construct subways, obligated to furnish ducts for the wires of public departments of the City government.

To what extent aerial telegraph wires can be subjected to State control may constitute somewhat of a question. There is no doubt that regulative legislation, judiciously enforced, which does not interrupt or seriously inconvenience a telegraph company, does not infringe upon the power of Congress to regulate commerce. Assuming the elevated railway to be an independent post-road of the United States, and that it has the authority to permit the telegraph companies, which are also arms of Federal commerce, to string their wires under its structure, there still remains certain regulative control in the State over telegraph wires; and the State may require them to be removed from poles and replaced by subway constructions.

The policy which I should advocate is briefly as follows:

That the following classes of overhead wires be removed within an area of two miles from the Brooklyn Bridge:

1. The trolley feeder wires of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Railroad Company and the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company. The Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company has not yet constructed any subways, but there is no reason why

it should not at once commence such work. The Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company has already built a number of subways within this area, and within the next year it might easily complete the construction to such an extent as to relieve this portion of the borough from overhead trolley feed wires without incurring a financial burden of too serious a nature.

2. The Edison Electric Illuminating Company should remove its overhead wires from the same area, because it is doubtful whether it has the right to maintain them there at all, and because these wires carry a dangerously high electric current and are one of the most serious menaces to life and property in the borough.

The New York and New Jersey Telephone Company should also remove its overhead conductors from the same area, because it has already constructed a large amount of subways, and the work which it is proposing to do, if properly carried on, will enable it to achieve this much desired result within the same time, and the telegraph and signal companies should also remove their wires.

The system of subway construction employed by the Brooklyn Edison Company is a solid tube system, consisting of bare copper conductors placed inside of an iron pipe and filled solid with a resinous composition which keeps the conductors rigidly separated and which acts also as an insulator. The rules of this Department forbid the construction of subways of this kind in the future, the greatest objection to such construction being that conductors rigidly installed in a conduit cannot be withdrawn when a short-circuit or breakdown in the conductors occurs, and the only way in which either can be located is by opening the street. This may require the opening of three or four blocks before the point is reached. As the company does not repair the pavements, the system is even more objectionable. A subway of this character could not be used by the City for its own wires, and this constitutes another objection to this form of construction.

In view of the examination and investigation which I have made of this subject, it is apparent to me that the aforesaid companies might readily, within a period of one year, relieve the aforesaid area from these unnecessary overhead wires. I have therefore notified them to commence and prosecute this work in such a manner as to accomplish that end within the said time, assuming that you will concur in the view that such removal is both desirable and practicable.

I make this report to your Honorable Board, and beg that you will at an early date, to be determined by you, give a public hearing to all parties interested, including not only the companies but the inhabitants of the Borough of Brooklyn, in the end that the sanction of your Board may be added to the notice which I have given, and that these unsightly and highly dangerous incumbrances may be removed from the highways of the borough within the aforesaid time, or as early as practicable thereafter.

The Mayor presented a communication from R. Ross Appleton, secretary of Carnegie Committee of the Brooklyn Public Library, dated June 11, 1902, requesting the selection by this Board of the site located at the corner of Bushwick and DeKalb avenues, at a valuation of \$30,000.

Which was referred to the Committee on Carnegie Library Sites, Borough of Brooklyn.

The Mayor presented the following in relation to the salary of Owen Keefe, Harnessmaker, Department of Parks:

GENTLEMEN—On April 30, 1902, your Honorable Board, among the other employees of this Department, boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, fixed the pay of two Harnessmakers at \$3.50 per day. Through a clerical error, however, the pay of Owen Keefe, Harnessmaker, was fixed at \$3 per day. As the work of these men is uniform, it is desired that their pay shall be uniform, and I therefore request that you will pass the necessary resolution to fix the pay of Owen Keefe, Harnessmaker, Department of Parks, boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, at \$3.50 per day.

After the above action is taken, please forward the document for the necessary concurrence of the Board of Aldermen.

#### BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

New York, July 14, 1902.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 11 o'clock a. m., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The minutes of the meeting held June 26, 1902, were presented to the members by the Secretary, and they were adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Two communications were received from the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of June 28 and July 8, transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted by that body, as follows:

(1) Approving of the bid of Cappiello & Hazell for materials and labor required in the erection and completion of the proposed bulkhead for the Second Naval Battalion.

(2) Authorizing the issue of Corporate Stock to pay awards and interest in the matter of acquiring title to certain lands in Lexington avenue for the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory.

(3) Amending resolution authorizing a lease of premises in the Borough of The Bronx for the use of the Second Battery.

(4) Authorizing the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$850, for clearing up Thirty-fourth street front of the site of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory.

Ordered filed.

A communication was received from Perez M. Stewart, Superintendent of Buildings, under date of June 27, and also one of June 30, in relation to the ruins of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory.

A report from J. Hollis Wells, Engineer, on the same subject, under date of July 8, was also received.

A communication from Contractor Murphy, giving estimates for removing the debris on the site of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory.

An Inspector from the Department of Buildings made a statement in regard to the dangerous condition of the ruins.

After a discussion relative to the present condition of the walls and the construction of a new Armory, Brigadier General George Moore Smith offered the following:

Resolved, That Messrs. Clinton & Russell, architects, be appointed to prepare plans and specifications for a new Armory for the Seventy-first Regiment, to be located on the site of the present ruins, and that they be directed to confer with the Superintendent of Buildings as to the destruction of the present walls and the disposition of the debris necessary for making everything in connection therewith safe to the public.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Chairman directed the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments to arrange with the Architects as to their charges, the preparation and execution of a contract for services, and also as to the care of the ruins.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Superintendent of the Department of Buildings be requested to continue his work of the removal of the walls and debris under the direction of the Architects, Messrs. Clinton & Russell.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Colonel Kipp, representing the Seventh Regiment, appeared before the Board and renewed his request for the prompt action of the Board in relation to the alterations and repairs to the steam heating plant in the Armory of that organization.

Colonel Wells, representing the Architects, stated that the plans for this work had been prepared by their firm and that the estimated cost was \$11,500. The Secretary stated that after making a suitable allowance for cost of inspection and deducting the amount which was available from the appropriation for repairs and supplies to that Armory, \$4,000 would be needed.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That four thousand dollars be appropriated for alterations and repairs to the steam heating plant in the Seventh Regiment Armory, in accordance with the plans and specifications already drawn by Messrs. Clinton & Russell, Architects, and when the Corporation Counsel has approved said specifications, the Secretary be directed to advertise for bids and estimates for the same, and that the Sinking Fund Commissioners be requested to concur in said action, and authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds for the payment thereof.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented an application from Luke A. Burke on account of his contract for the erection and completion of the First Battery, N. G. N. Y., on the southerly side of Sixty-sixth street, 150 feet south of Columbus avenue. Certificates by the Architects and the Assistant Clerk of the Works accompanied the application.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Luke A. Burke, Contractor, the sum of eight thousand seven hundred and seventy-one dollars (\$8,771), as per accompanying voucher, on account of his contract for materials and work required in the erection and completion of the armory building for the First Battery, N. G. N. Y., on the southerly side of Sixty-sixth street, 150 feet east of Columbus avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Board of Health of the Department of Health, the following additional section of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 202. It shall be the duty of every manufacturer, importer or other person who manufactures or imports, in the City of New York, any artificial or natural mineral, spring or other water for drinking purposes, to file, under oath, with the Department of Health, the name of such water and the exact location from which it is obtained, together with the chemical and bacteriological analysis thereof, and, when manufactured, the exact formula used in its production, giving qualitatively and quantitatively each and every item entering into its composition. No person shall manufacture or bottle mineral, carbonated or tonic waters, in the City of New York, without a permit from the Department of Health.
