DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, December 29, 1899, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present-The full Board.

The resolutions of the Board of December 22, 1899, accepting the surrender of the lease of Pier, new 34, North river, and adjoining bulkheads, held by the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, and denying the application of the Cromwell Steamship Company for a lease of said pier and bulkheads, were reconsidered, and said resolutions rescinded.

The minutes of the meeting held December 22, 1899, were approved as amended above.

The application of the Cromwell Steamship Company for a lease of Pier, new 34, North river, and adjoining bulkheads, was taken from the table, placed on file, and the Secretary directed to notify said Company that the pier and bulkheads are at present leased to the Pacific May Steamship Company.

Mail Steamship Company.

Representatives of the Penniman Estate and of the Central Vermont Railroad Company appeared in relation to the proposed improvement of the water front in the vicinity of Pier 36, East river, and the removal of the extension of said pier.

On motion, the matter was tabled until January 26, 1900. George V. N. Baldwin appeared in relation to the offer of the Board of Docks to purchase the property of Amelia Stuyvesant at the foot of Clinton street, East river, and stated that the premises were leased for a term of fifteen years. He was informed that the title would not be accepted by the City subject to the lease; and the further consideration of the matter was tabled for two weeks to enable Mr. Baldwin to confer with his client's lessee with the view of giving to the City

title to the property free from all incumbrances.

The following reports on Secretary's orders were referred to the Treasurer for collection:

No. 17940. Submitting cost of removing the ferry structures in the vicinity of One Hundredth street, East river, amounting to \$1,312.96, for collection from the New York and College Point

Ferry Company.

No. 19555. Submitting cost of cutting sluiceway on the northerly side of Pier, new 32, East river, amounting to \$31.20, for collection from the North and East River Steamboat Company.

No. 19564. Submitting cost of relaying pavement, taken up to facilitate repairs to the waterpipe south of Pier 6, North river, amounting to \$1.68, for collection from Michael Clifford.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-sin-Chief:

Engineer-in-Chiet Consolidated Gas Company, to repair gas service-pipe in front of Pier, new 36, North river; pavement to be taken up and relaid by the force of this Department at the cost and expense

of said company.

Hoboken Ferry Company, to erect an awning in front of its ferry premises at the foot of Christopher street, North river, the work to be done in accordance with plans to be hereafter submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief, said awning to remain only during the

pleasure of the Board. Joy Steamship Com pavement to be taken up and relaid by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of said

Pennsylvania Railroad Company, to erect two triangular platforms on piles, and to construct a second story office over the main building, at Pier 2, Wallabout basin, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be done in accordance with plans to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

The following communications were ordered on file: From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving form of Contract No. 672, for dredging on the North river, between the Battery and West Thirty-fourth street.

2d. Transmitting form of agreement for the purchase of the water-front property, owned by William Muhlenberg, westerly of Clinton street, East river. Commissioners authorized to execute same and the Secretary directed to transmit the agreement to the Commissioners of the Sinking

Fund for approval when executed. 3d. Transmitting copy of notice of application to be made to the Commissioners of the Land Office by Louis Quien and Charles H. Moore, for grant of land under water at Newark bay, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Richmond.

4th. Advising that no application can be made to the Commissioners of the Land Office for a

grant to The City of New York, of the land under water and below high-water mark, now under the jurisdiction of the Board of Docks and owned by the State of New York, until such time as the Board shall have projected a plan for the permanent improvement of such water front and such plan shall have been approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

5th. Advising that he has compromised the claim against the New York Brick and Paving Company for rent of the pier on the easterly side of City Island at the foot of Fordham avenue,

for the sum of \$40.

On motion, said compromise was accepted by the Board, the lease of the pier to said company canceled to take effect immediately, and the Dock Master directed to collect wharfage thereat.

From the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies—In relation to the dumping of debris on land in the rear of the bulkhead at the southerly end of the Wallabout basin, Borough of Brooklyn. Secretary directed to request that all such deposits of material from the market, if they must be made at all, be made on the newly filled in land south of Lemon street.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—Advising that the dumping board on Pier new 32, East river, will be removed upon the completion of the dump now being constructed at the foot of Clinton street.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

The Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, assembled at temporary Borough Hall, on January 5, 1900, at which was present Councilman David L. Van Nostrand, Aldermen Joseph Geiser and Luke Otten, as the successor to William T. James, whose term expired, and Frederick Bowley, as President of this Borough.

Minutes of the previous meeting approved.
On motion of Councilman Van Nostrand, the following was adopted:
Whereas, Prior to consolidation of the Town of Flushing, in the County of Queens, into the Third Ward of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, there existed therein that which comprised a portion of the territory of the said town called the "Village of Flushing," which was also termed the "incorporated" portion of said town, whilst the other part was referred to as the "unincorporated" portion of said town;

That said village owned and maintained a village water source and plant, for the original cost of which it was bonded;

That upon the application of the "unincorporated" portion of said town, the Trustees of the

cost of which it was bonded;

That upon the application of the "unincorporated" portion of said town, the Trustees of the Village of Flushing extended its water-mains beyond its limits and supplied the inhabitants of the unincorporated section of the Town of Flushing with water; and

Whereas, It was understood and agreed that inasmuch as the district lying outside of the Village of Flushing, whilst it was thus being supplied with water by the latter, and as it was in no ways responsible for the payment of said water bonds nor could it be taxed for any portion of the interest on said bonds as same became due during a series of years, that a charge of fifty per cent. additional water rates to that of the established village water rates would in a manner compensate said village therefor; and

pensate said village therefor; and
Whereas, The consolidation into the Greater New York of the incorporated and the unincorporated part of the late Town of Flushing has made the bonded water indebtedness and the
interest thereon the common debt of The City of New York and assessable equally upon all the

interest thereon the common debt of The City of New York and assessable equally upon all the territory within the boundaries thereof; and

Whereas, Notwithstanding the fact that by consolidation all discrimination as to bonded obligations were obliterated, the Greater New York has during the last two years and still continues to discriminate against what was formerly the "unincorporated" portion of the Town of Flushing by persistently charging for water supplied by it to the inhabitants thereof at rates that are fifty per cent. higher than the rates charged to those in adjoining portion of said Third Ward of the Borough of Queens, and against which the persons who are thus overburdened have repeatedly, in most emphatic terms, publicly declared its protest; and which this Board has repeatedly recognized and called the attention of the authorities thereto, without avail;

Now in view of the foregoing, and in keeping with our knowledge that such discrimination is unjust, unwarranted and an outrage; it is hereby

Now in view of the foregoing, and in keeping with our knowledge that such discrimination is unjust, unwarranted and an outrage; it is hereby
Resolved, That urgent request be and is hereby made to the Municipal Assembly of The
City of New York that it require the Board of Public Improvements to forthwith exercise its
power and discharge the duties conferred and imposed by section 473 of the Greater New York
Charter in formulating and recommending to it a uniform scale of water rents for the Municipal Assembly by the power vested in it under same section of the City Charter as aforestated to
fix and establish such a uniform scale of rents and charges for supplying water by The City of New York throughout the whole territory embraced therein.

The following was also adopted: Resolved, That the petition of property-owners in North Washington place, in First Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, to have an electric light erected and maintained on the south side of said place at about one hundred feet east of Van Alst avenue, be and the same is hereby approved and such recommendation made to the Commissioner of Public Buildings,

Lighting and Supplies. Adjourned.

"Gentlemen-I am directed by the Mayor to send you the inclosed communication from Edward Dart, which was received this day, complaining of the delay in the matter of the claim for damages to the property on the northeast corner of Railroad avenue and One Hundred and

Forty-fourth street.

'I am further directed by the Mayor to say that it seems to him that there has been undue delay in this matter, and he requests that a report be made to him at your earliest convenience, as to the probable date of a decision in this case, copy of which you will please send to the

The Commissioners thereupon proceeded to sign a letter, of which the following is a copy, and instructed the Clerk to forward the same to the Mayor: " NOVEMBER 15, 1899

" Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor ;

"SIR—We have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a communication from your private secretary, under date of November 4, 1899, relative to the claim of Edward Dart, pending before this Commission, together with a communication from said Edward Dart, addressed to your Honor, and inclosed therewith.

"In answer thereto we beg leave to state the following facts, which appear from the records of the Commission and from information furnished us by the Clerk to the Commission, who has occupied that position since its inception:

"There were two claims filed for damages affecting the Dart property, at the northeast corner of One Hundred and Forty-fourth street and Railroad avenue, East. One was filed by Thomas S. Bassford, Esq., attorney, the claim being known as Claim No. 965. The name of the claimant, as specified in the claim, was Hettie W. Dart (wife of said Edward Dart), and the amount claimed as damages \$45,000.

"The other claim was filed for damages to the same property by John Henry Hull, as attorney for Edward Dart, the number of the claim being \$26, and the amount claimed as damages \$20,000.

ages \$30,000.

"In reference to Claim No. 826, the attorney for the claimant, Mr. Hull, neglected to comply with the rules of the Commission, which required that, before a claim could be placed on the calendar of the Commission for trial, a copy of the notice of claim, showing that the original claim had been filed with the Corporation Counsel and the Comptroller, as required by law, together with a notice of hearing, to be served upon the Corporation Counsel, with proof of service indorsed thereon, should be filed with the Commission.

"Mr. Hull was repeatedly requested to comply with the rules, and copies of the rules were repeatedly sent to him; but, for reasons unknown to us, the rules were never complied with by him.

"On June 7, 1897, Messrs. McCarty & Baldwin were substituted as attorneys for the claimant, Edward Dart, in Claim No. 826; and immediately thereafter they complied with the rules by filing with the Commission a copy of the notice of claim, and of the notice of hearing, which had been served upon the Corporation Counsel, with proof of service indorsed thereon, which entitled the claim to be placed upon the calendar of the Commission for trial when reached.

"In reference to Claim No. 965, which had been filed by Thomas S. Bassford, attorney, for damages to the same property, Mr. Bassford promptly complied with the rules of the Commission, and on December 9, 1893, Claim No. 965 was entitled to be placed upon the calendar of the Commission for trial when reached.

"As Mr. and Mrs. Dart disputed Mr. Bassford's authority to appear before the Commission, the trial of Claim No. 965 was never urged, and the same did not come to trial until Claim No. 826 was reached, in January, 1898.

"In view of the conflicting claims of the attorneys who appeared for the Dart property, on the suggestion of the Corporation Counsel, the Commission bad appear before them both Mr. Bassford and Messrs. McCarty & Baldwin, the attorneys representing the said claimants, and upon Mr. Bassford's representation that he was prepared to proceed, but that the Darts would not appear, Claim No. 965 was, upon the application of the Corporation Counsel, dismissed, and an order dismissing the same was entered by the Commission on February 7, 1898.

"It will thus be seen that the claim of the Darts, which could have been tried at an earlier date, was not tried, and was, as has been stated, dismissed.

"Claim No. 826, which was finally tried, is the largest claim for damages which has been filed under the statute creating the Commission. The claimant on the trial moved to increase the amount claimed as damages to the sum of about \$102,000, claimed to have been proven by him, the claim for loss of rents included therein amounting to about \$60,000.

"There has been no delay whatever upon the part of the Commission in the trial of this claim. The delays have been caused by the disputes which have existed between Mr. Dart and the various attorneys representing him, and the failure of John Henry Hull, the attorney who filed

filed the claim known as Claim No. 826, to comply with the rules of the Commission for a period of nearly four years.

"A communication was received from Mr. Dart in the month of September last, and a copy of the answer forwarded to him by the Clerk to the Commission is inclosed herewith.

"For some time prior to the second Monday of July last this Commission was prevented from filing any certificates of award in favor of claimants, because, as was claimed, the City had exceeded its constitutional limit of indebtedness. The Corporation Counsel advised the Commission not to file any certificates until last July. Since that time the Commission has been diligently examining the cases submitted for decision, and has been taking them up as fast as possible, in the order of their submission, and is handing down decisions from time to time as rapidly as a proper examination of the claims will permit. There is no reason, so far as we know, why this claim should be taken out of its order, or should receive a preference over the many other claims which are pending before the Commission. If decided in its regular order, it should be one of the very last claims to be decided by the Commission, because of the tardy compliance by claimant or his attorneys with the rules of the Commission.

"Mr. Dart, in his communication to you, under date of November 3, 1899, states that his claim was duly filed with the Comptroller and Corporation Counsel, as required by law, in 1893; but we have shown that his failure to notice his claim for hearing, and to comply with the rules, prevented an early trial of the same.

"Mr. Dart also states that since the trial of his claim there have been 'some changes of
membership of the commission, but none in my claim.' What he means by 'none in my claim'
we are at a loss to understand; but certain it is that Mr. Daniel Lord, one of the Commissioners who tried the claim, is dead, and Mr. Varnum, another of the Commissioners at the time
of the trial of the Dart claim, is at present the Surrogate of the County of New York, and is no
longer connected with the Commission. It therefore follows that there is but one Commissioner
at present on the Commission who heard the claim tried.

"Owing to the changes in the personnel of the Commission, it has been found necessary to
reargue and resubmit the various claims; and, prior to the receipt of your communication, it had
been partially determined that this claim, owing to the large amount of damages claimed, should
be retried before the full Commission as at present constituted.

"Mr. Dart also states that 'the Commissioners have been ten years or more on this work.'
In this he is in error. The original law creating the Commission was not passed until April, 1893.

"A copy of this letter has been forwarded to Mr. Dart, as requested by your Honor.
