SUBJECT—Deficiencies or arrearages, CITY RECORD, for the year 1904, with accompanying official records submitted to us by your Honor.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor:

SIR—Your Honor referred to this office for our attention the following papers which separately accompany this report, all relating to the office of the CITY RECORD, viz:

Letter of Supervisor Hervey—Pages 1 to 6.

A letter from Supervisor Hervey, dated October 7, 1903, addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to which are attached explanatory statements, showing why the required increases asked for the year 1904 should be allowed.

Statements from Supervisor Tracy—Page 6.

A statement (unsigned) received in your office February 19, 1904, showing the amount appropriated for 1904 for "Printing, Stationery and Blank Books, City

Departments," and the liabilities incurred as of February 15, 1904, chargeable against this appropriation and finally showing that the available balance for the remainder of the year is only \$4,359.43.

County Offices—Pages 7 and 8.

Also two statements similarly showing the amounts appropriated and the available balance on February 15, 1904, for "Printing, Stationery and Blank Books, County Offices."

Deficiencies—Page 9.

A statement showing that there was asked for the year 1904, for "Printing, Stationery and Blank Books for City Departments and Offices," the sum of \$550,580, that the amount allowed was only \$366,580 and that the deficiency is \$184,000.

That the amount asked for 1904 for "Publication of the CITY RECORD" was the sum of \$230,000, the amount allowed \$131,400, and that the deficiency is \$98,600.

That there was also no provision made in the Budget for 1904 to publish in the CITY RECORD the "Assessment Rolls," to comply with chapter 454, Laws of 1903, which is estimated to cost about \$46,000.

Also a statement from Supervisor Tracy showing that the estimated deficiency for the year 1904 will be as follows, viz:

We beg to report that we have verified each and every item noted in the Statements on page 6, submitted by Supervisor Tracy of the City Record, and find that they agree with the records in his office.

Analysis of Comparative Table.

From the foregoing table it will be seen that for Items 5, 6, 8 and 9 there was appropriated for 1903, more than was expended and as in fact a trifle more was appropriated for 1904, we will eliminate these items from our consideration.

Item No. 7 shows that there was a deficiency of \$391.09 for 1903, and as this appropriation was increased \$1,000 for 1904, this will probably be ample for 1904.

Item No. 4, being for Salaries, and a fixed amount, we will also eliminate this item from our consideration.

We are thus confined to the consideration of Items 1, 2, 3 and 10 in the Comparative Table.

SIR—In accordance with your instructions I have examined the following papers concerning the appropriations for the Board of City Record for 1904:

Statement, prepared by Supervisor Patrick J. Tracy, of "Liabilities incurred for printing, stationery and blank books for the year 1904 to February 15th, also appropriations made for the year, and available balance as of this date."

Report of the Commissioners of Accounts, under date of March 1, 1904, concerning "Deficiencies or arrearages, CITY RECORD, for the year 1904," said report of the Commissioners of Accounts being accompanied by a copy of a communication from Charles S. Hervey, Supervisor, addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of October 7, 1903, and the statement of liabilities, etc., prepared by the present Supervisor, as of date February 15, previously referred to.

In addition, the following summary of estimated deficiency for 1904 has been furnished to me by Supervisor Tracy:

Deficiency in the Appropriation for Printing, Stationery and Blank Books, City Departments and Offices, 1904.

In connection with these statements I beg to report as follows:

It appears from Supervisor Tracy's statement, dated February 15, 1904, that at that time there was an unpledged balance in the appropriation for "Printing, Stationery and Blank Books, City Departments and Offices, 1904," of \$4,359.43. The amount of this appropriation pledged, while it does provide for a considerable amount of the so-called "per page" work for the year 1904, does not provide for the cost of the legal printing for this year.

My experience in the office of the Supervisor indicated that the special orders in excess of the supplies called for in the annual requisitions, and not provided for on contract, amounted to about \$15,000 per month. For the remaining ten months of the year, therefore, a conservative estimate would require \$150,000 to meet the expense of these day to day orders. The cost of the legal printing in 1902 approximated \$30,000; the cost in 1903 was, I believe, about \$25,000, unless some part of the cost of legal printing for 1903 is included in the \$7,683.47 noted, it having been paid for that purpose since January 1, 1904. A conservative estimate of the cost of legal printing for the remainder of the year would, in my judgment, be not less than \$25,000. At least \$10,000 should be allowed above these figures to meet contingencies likely to arise. These estimates bring the amount up to \$185,000 in excess of the amount allowed for in the budget for 1904, and to an amount \$20,000 less than that now asked for by Supervisor Tracy.

Although the actual cost of the administration of the office of the Supervisor of the CITY RECORD for 1903 was somewhat in excess of the estimated cost in my communication to the Board of Estimate on October 7, 1903, I am of the opinion that the increased cost for 1904, chargeable to this appropriation, will not exceed my estimate of that date, owing to the fact that the cost for blank books for 1904 will be considerably less than that item for 1903, and that a larger quantity of stationery will be provided for in 1904 for the same outlay than was purchasable under the stationery contract provisions of 1903.

At any rate, the replenishment of the appropriation for printing, stationery and blank books for City Departments and Offices for 1904 at this time by the amount of \$185,000 will put the office of the Supervisor on a paying basis, so far as this appropriation is concerned, up to very late in the present year—to so late a date, in fact, that no hardship would ensue if a small deficiency should be carried over and included in an arrearage appropriation for the office in the budget for 1905.

Deficiency in the Appropriation for "Publication of the CITY RECORD, 1904.

In my communication to the Board of Estimate, under date of October 7, 1903, I stated as follows:

"The estimate of \$230,000 for the publication of the CITY RECORD is conservative, and I believe the cost of the publication for the year 1904 will be in excess of \$250,000, but in making the estimate I have confined myself absolutely to the experience of 1903 and figured on the 1903 contract prices, which may be materially higher for 1904."

As a matter of fact the 1904 contract prices are materially lower than the contract prices for 1903. On the other hand, it is reasonable to expect in a Presidential year that the volume of the registry and enrollment lists will be materially greater than in 1903, which might in itself counterbalance the decreased contract cost. Supervisor Tracy states to me that it is his judgment that this will be the case. The Supervisor estimates that his deficiency in this appropriation for 1904 will be \$123,292. The Commissioners of Accounts, in their analysis, hold approximately to my figures submitted to the Board of Estimate on October 7, 1903, and estimate the total cost of the publication of the CITY RECORD for 1904 at \$235,720.83.

I am of the opinion that the replenishment of the appropriation for the publication of the CITY RECORD can safely be left to a later date, as the appropriation, in all likelihood, will not be exhausted before September 1st.

Supplies and Contingencies.

The request of the Supervisor for addition to his appropriation for Supplies and Contingencies in the amount of \$1,214 is, in my judgment, conservative. The offices of the Supervisor are lacking in the necessary office furniture and provision should be made for their purchase; moreover, the incidental expenses of the office are heavy and constantly increasing.

Deficiency in 1903 Appropriations Not Provided For.

This deficiency, as stated by the Supervisor, is \$25,189.24. The deficiency is made up of the following items, the statement being furnished by Supervisor Tracy:

The amount indicated above, of \$18,214.60, due to claims of the Mail and Express Company, was not furnished me at the time I prepared my deficiency statement for the year for the Board of Estimate, and did not develop, as I understand, until after the first of the present year. The claims of the Kingsland Paper Company, also noted in the above statement, grew out of the orders alleged to have been given this concern by former Supervisor Cowen, for which there does not appear to have been any authority granted by the Board of City Record, and which do not seem to be represented by requisitions from the Departments.

Whether the Board of City Record should provide for the payment of these claims in advance of the determination of what may be justly due to the claimants is a question on which I can give no advice. The deficiency in the arrearage for publication of the CITY RECORD, amounting to \$3,823.74, also noted above, is one which could not be estimated at the time that the deficiency account was made for the budget and should properly be taken care of at this time. In conclusion, therefore, I would respectfully recommend as follows:

First—That the appropriation for printing, stationery and blank books for City Departments and Offices, 1904, should be replenished by the amount of \$185,000.

Second—That the appropriation for supplies and contingencies should be replenished by the amount of \$1,214.

Third—That deficiency in the 1903 appropriation, printing, stationery and blank books for City Departments and Offices, 1903, should be replenished by the amount of \$18,214.60.

Fourth—That the appropriation for publication of the CITY RECORD, 1903, should be replenished by the amount of \$3,823.74.
