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## BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's office on Friday, June 15, 1900, at 11.15 o'clock A. M.

Present—Edgar J. Levey, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; John Whalen, Corporation Counsel; Maurice F. Holahan, President of the Board of Public Improvements.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, H. J. Storrs was appointed temporary Secretary, all the members voting in the affirmative.

On motion of the Corporation Counsel, the minutes of the meeting of December 22, 1899, were approved as printed in the CITY RECORD.

### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for constructing sewer and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, from Intervale avenue to Boston road, with branches as follows:

In Boston road, between East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street and summit north of East One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street; in East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street (south side), between Boston road and summit east of Franklin avenue; in Home street, between East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street and Siebbins avenue; and the objections of Bernard C. Murray, Maria Simpson, filed by C. S. Simpson, attorney; R. Duke Barnum, and of T. J. Henry, together with reply of the Department of Sewers to the objections of Mr. Barnum, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of December 26, 1899.

Mr. Murray, Mr. Barnum and Mr. Simpson were heard in regard to the expenses connected with the work and to the apportionment of the assessment.

On motion, the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors for further consideration and report, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks, building approaches and placing fences in One Hundred and Ninety-eighth (Travers) street, from Webster avenue to Jerome avenue, together with a list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade, and objections of A. M. Murray, owner, No. 49 Wall street; S. Cordelia Miller, filed by John J. Brady, attorney, and petitions for awards for damages of James Ryan, filed by Laurens McLoughlin, attorney; Teresa Toussaint, filed by Clarence G. Ferris, attorney; William Mahoney, filed by Joseph L. Berry, attorney, and also withdrawal thereof, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of January 3, 1900.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks and placing fences in Union avenue, from One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street to Boston road, together with a list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade; and objections of William Simpson and others, executors, filed by McCarty & Baldwin, attorneys; Conrad Deis and others, executors, filed by T. S. Bassford, attorney; United States Trust Company of New York, and Edward H. Van Ingen, filed by T. H. Baldwin, attorney; E. R. Fellows and others, filed by Gumbleton & Hottenroth, attorneys, and petitions for awards for damages by Mary A. Collins and others, filed by Gumbleton & Hottenroth, attorneys; Samuel Love and others, filed by C. C. Ferris, attorney; Jesse Barton and others, filed by T. S. Bassford, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, under date of January 9, 1900.

Mr. Bassford and Mr. Gumbleton, attorneys, objected to the inadequacy of the awards made by the Board of Assessors for damages to the property of their clients.

Mr. Ferris, attorney, stated that, in his opinion, no further delay was necessary, as sufficient time had been given for the consideration of the subject.

On motion, no others appearing in opposition after notice, the several objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks and placing fences in Franklin avenue, from Third avenue to Crotona Park, together with a list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade, and objections of Isabella Ritchie and others, filed by T. S. Bassford, attorney; Conrad G. Strubel, filed by T. H. Baldwin, attorney; Addie H. Angel, filed by J. R. Angel, attorney, and petitions for awards for damages by Charlotte M. Hayden and others, filed by T. S. Bassford, attorney; Imogene C. Lynch and others, filed by Gumbleton & Hottenroth, attorneys; Emil Peter and others, filed by S. S. Randall, attorney; Addie B. Angel, filed by J. R. Angel, attorney; George Stolz, filed by T. H. Baldwin, attorney; and application of the United States Trust Company, as executor and trustee of Josephine L. Horton, deceased, for an award for damages filed with the Board of Revision of Assessments by Edward W. Sheldon, attorney, on March 3, 1900, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors on January 10, 1900. Mr. Sheldon was heard in regard to the matter of said application.

No others appearing after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging and laying crosswalks in Tremont avenue, from New York and Harlem Railroad to Boston road, together with a list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade, and the objections of William H. Schott and others, filed by C. V. Gabriel, attorney; New York and Harlem Railroad Company, filed by R. L. Luce, of counsel; John J. Brady, as owner and attorney; Harrison D. Kerr and others, filed by T. H. Baldwin, attorney; C. P. Hallock, owner and attorney; Isabella M. Blood and others, filed by T. S. Bassford, attorney; Fred J. Middlebrook, filed by Bowers & Sands, attorneys; Peter Coughlin and others, filed by C. C. Ferris, attorney; also petitions for awards for damages of Martin Walter and others, filed by C. V. Gabriel, attorney, and Mary Schneider and others, filed by T. S. Bassford, attorney, and of Barbara Schmidt, filed by Charles P. Hallock, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors on January 10, 1900.

Mr. Luce objected to any amount being charged against the property of the railroad company, on the ground that the same is not liable for any assessment whatsoever, as it derives no benefit from the improvement. Mr. Brady objected to the excessive cost of the work and to the sums included in the assessment for surveyors' and inspectors' fees and the charge for interest.

Mr. Baldwin was heard in opposition to the expense for interest and for damages to buildings caused by the change of grade, and also claimed that as the work was for the benefit of the general public, a portion of the expense should be assumed by the City.

Mr. Ferris, attorney, objected to the excessive cost of the work, which, he stated, exceeded the benefits derived by the property of his clients from the improvement, and urged that a portion of the cost of the work be borne by the City by reason of the benefit derived therefrom by the public at large.

Mr. Gabriel, attorney, objected to the assessment on the ground that no awards had been made for the damages to the property of some of his clients, and also to the apportionment of the assessment.

No others appearing after notice, on motion, the objections received were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for flagging west side of Sedgwick avenue, from Commerce avenue to One Hundred and Eighty-first street, and from a

point about 350 feet south of One Hundred and Eighty-third street to a point about 200 feet south of Fordham road, and from a point about 300 feet north of Fordham road to Kingsbridge road, and laying crosswalks at intersecting streets, and objections of Alfred J. Taylor and William D. Peck, owners, together with the reply of the Commissioner of Highways to the said objections, dated December 20, 1899, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors on January 10, 1900. Mr. Peck was heard and stated that the flagging had not been laid upon the established grade, nor is it continuous.

On motion, the objections were overruled, and the assessment was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

### BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for paving One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street, from Eleventh to Amsterdam avenue, with asphalt-block pavement, and objections of Peter Alexander and others, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, together with a report in regard thereto of the Commissioner of Highways, dated March 18, 1899, and also an additional report of said officer, giving result of the examinations made of the work, dated December 1, 1899, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of January 9, 1900.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

### BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The assessment list for grading and paving Orient avenue, from Metropolitan avenue to Ohio street, and objections of Susan A. Luyser, A. A. Gasling, M. A. Conklin, S. E. Gedell, T. K. Trenchard, as executor, etc.; John G. Metzger, Charles F. Townner, for estate of Robert Beale, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors on January 16, 1900.

Mr. W. A. Luyser, in behalf of property-owners, was heard in opposition to the additional assessment on the ground that the City owning a park on the line of the improvement should be charged with its share of the cost of the work.

The assessors stated to the Board that the list was originally confirmed by the Board of Assessors of the former City of Brooklyn upon an estimated cost of \$5,800, and that the actual cost was \$6,401.12, a difference of \$601.12, representing the amount of the present assessment; also, that they had no right or power to charge the so-called park at the junction of Metropolitan and Orient avenues with any portion of the expense, as the plot or plaza was not laid down as a park on the city map, nor had it a property number, and that no objection was made in the assessment when originally confirmed.

On motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for constructing sewer and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Sixty-third street, from the existing sewer in Sherman avenue to Morris avenue, and in Morris avenue, between East One Hundred and Sixty-first street and a point 215 feet north of East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street; and in East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, between Grant avenue and summit east of Morris avenue; and objections of William Waldorf Astor, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors on February 28, 1900. Mr. Shaw appeared.

On motion, the objections were overruled and the assessment was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

### BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for sewer in University place, between Waverley place and Eighth street, and objections of Samuel Hirsch filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 13, 1900.

Mr. Shaw was heard in opposition to the assessment on the ground that the same is grossly and unfairly distributed, the easterly side of the street being charged with the greater part of the cost of the work. The assessors were also heard in the matter.

On motion, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors for further consideration, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewers in University place, between Twelfth and Fourteenth streets, and objections of Daniel Buckley, filed by Richard O'Guinn, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors on March 20, 1900.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks, building approaches and placing fences in One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street (Welch street), from Webster avenue to Fordham road; and objections of Estate of John Dunn, filed by John P. Dunn, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 27, 1900.

Mr. Charles V. Gabriel, attorney, was heard in behalf of Mr. Dunn, opposing the assessment on the ground that the improvement has not been a benefit to the property in question, but rather a burden, as the change in grade has left the land some 25 or 30 feet above the street.

After hearing the Board of Assessors in the matter, on motion the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

### BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for paving One Hundred and Eighty-third street, from Kingsbridge road to Amsterdam avenue, with asphalt-block pavement, and objections of Elizabeth A. Westendorf and others, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, together with report of the Department of Highways thereon of April 3, 1900, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of April 10, 1900.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for paving with granite-block pavement the carriageway of, and laying crosswalks in Third avenue, from Twenty-third Ward line to One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street or Tremont avenue, and objections of Ida P. Clark and others, filed by T. H. Baldwin, attorney; Farmers' Loan and Trust Company, as executor, etc., filed by Turner, McClure & Rolston, attorneys; Ernst Marx-Nathan Company, filed by T. S. Bassford, attorney; together with report of the Department of Highways of February 16, 1899, upon the objections filed by T. H. Baldwin, attorney, and opinion of the Corporation Counsel of March 30, 1900, in regard thereto, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of April 17, 1900.

Mr. Baldwin was heard objecting to the sums included in the assessment for interest upon the amounts advanced to the contractor and to the excessive charge for surveyors' fees.

Mr. Bassford objected to the proposed assessment on the ground that no amount had been placed upon the Union Railway Company and the Suburban Rapid Transit Company for a part of the cost of the paving, and also to the charge for interest on advances made by the City under the contract.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for paving Webster avenue, from the northerly crosswalk at the Kingsbridge road to the southerly crosswalk of the Southern Boulevard, with vitrified brick pavement on concrete foundation, and objections of New York and Harlem Railroad Company, as owner, filed by R. L. Luce, of counsel; Estate of John Dunn by John P. Dunn, attorney; Henry D. Purroy and others, filed by Joseph L. Berry, attorney; Frank J. Sheridan, owner; Church E. Gates & Co., filed by T. S. Bassford, attorney, and reply of Commissioner of Highways to the objections filed by Mr. Berry, and opinion of the Corporation Counsel of March 30, 1900, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of April 18, 1900.

Mr. Berry, attorney, and Hon. Charles L. Guy, of counsel, were heard in opposition to the assessment on the ground that it is excessive and inequitable, the cost being about \$200 per 25 feet front, and also that the railroad company occupying part of the street along the line of the avenue has not been assessed for its share of the expense.



On motion of the Corporation Counsel, the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors with direction to reduce the amounts charged against the property twenty-five per cent., and to reappoint the assessors in accordance with such reduction, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for constructing sewer and appurtenances in Moshola parkway, South, from the existing sewer in Webster avenue to Jerome avenue, and objections of W. J. Winghart, owner, No. 3 West Fourth street, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors on April 24, 1900.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

#### BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for curbing and reflagging Thirty-fourth street, from East river to North river, and objections of Henry Hughes, owner; George G. Mason, owner; J. J. Astor and others, filed by J. C. Shaw, attorney, together with the report of the Department of Highways of April 9, 1900, replying to the said objections; testimony submitted by John C. Shaw and opinion of the Corporation Counsel in the matter of May 7, 1900, having been received from the Board of Assessors on May 10, 1900.

Mr. Shaw was heard in opposition to the assessment on the ground that the work was not petitioned for and consequently there was no power to levy an assessment under such circumstances for the reflagging of any street.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

#### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Westchester avenue, from Rogers place to summit east of Barretto street, and objections of the Real Estate Corporation of New York City, filed by Hawke & Flannery, attorneys, received from the Board of Assessors on May 10, 1900.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion, the objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, and laying crosswalks in Orchard street (One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street), from Ogden avenue to Marcher avenue; and objections of Ogden Estate, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors on May 10, 1900.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

#### BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for sewer in Hancock street, between Brecker and Houston streets, and objections of Estate of N. Low, filed by Townsend & McIlwaine, attorneys, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of May 10, 1900.

Mr. McIlwaine was heard in opposition to the assessment upon the property of his clients, on the ground that the same is excessive and unjust, and for the reason that their property is not unimproved with the sewer in question, but by a private drain with the sewers in Houston or Brecker street.

The assessors stated that there is no public sewer but the present one in the street.

On motion the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

#### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks and placing fences in One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, from Third avenue to Webster avenue, and objections of Isaac S. Savage, John Brand and others, filed by William T. Mathison, attorney, having been received from the Board of Assessors on May 10, 1900.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

#### BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for paving One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, from Eighth avenue to Broadway, with asphalt-block pavement, and objections of The Webster Realty Company, and of Martin & Wal, attorneys, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors on May 10, 1900.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewers in One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, between Lenox and Eighth avenues, and objections of Washington Wilson and others, filed by Munsey & Shipman, attorneys; George Elmer and others, filed by J. L. Shaw, attorney; Estate of Hannah McGowan and others, filed by Charles L. Guy, attorney; having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of May 10, 1900.

Mr. Seligman and Mr. Guy, attorneys, were heard in support of the objections filed by them in behalf of their clients.

On motion, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors to obtain the advice of the Corporation Counsel with reference to assessing the railway company the expense of the work, it being claimed by the objectors that the construction of the sewers was solely to meet the necessities of the street railway company in the said street incident to its change of motive power—all the members voting in the affirmative.

#### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks and placing fences in Nelson avenue, from Kemp place to Boswell avenue, and objections of William H. Ogden Estate, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney; Richard Coffey, filed by John P. Everett, attorney; Andrew Anderson, filed by T. S. Baehrd, attorney; also application for an award for damages of Mary J. Brooks, filed by Hawke & Flannery, attorneys, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors on May 10, 1900.

The following objections, filed with the Chief Clerk of the Board of Revision of Assessments pursuant to the resolution of the assessment list to the Board of Revision, etc., by the Board of Assessors on May 10, 1900, were also presented, viz.: of Thomas V. McGowan, owner, No. 1264 Nelson avenue; Patrick Mearns, owner, No. 1266 Nelson avenue; Andrew F. Kuhn, owner, No. 1268 Nelson avenue; W. J. and Annie C. Walter and others, filed by Adams & Hahn, attorneys.

Adams & Hahn, attorneys, opposed the assessment upon the property of their clients on the ground that the same charged were excessive and greater than the fair value of the improvement made and of the benefit derived from it, and also objected to the principle adopted in making the apportionment.

Mr. McGowan objected to the apportionment of the assessment with reference to his property.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for paving Third avenue, from One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street (Tremont avenue) to the north crosswalk of One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, with granite-block pavement and laying crosswalks, and objections of Alex. C. Campbell, filed by Gumbleton & Hottenroth, attorneys; Mary S. Pamfry and others, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney; Sarah Jackson and others, filed by John J. Brady, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of May 10, 1900.

Mr. Shaw objected to the assessment on the ground that the work is a repaving and therefore not assessable under the law, the original paving having been done prior to consolidation of the upper district with New York City, and for the reason also that the railway company had not been assessed for its share of the expense.

On motion, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors to obtain the advice of the Corporation Counsel in regard to assessing a portion of the cost of the paving against the Union Railway Company, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for paving with granite-block pavement the carriageway and laying crosswalks, also setting curbstones and flagging the southeasterly sidewalk, of Boerco road, from Jefferson street to Tremont avenue, and objections of Joseph Dickard and others, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, having been received from the Board of Assessors, under date of May 10, 1900, Mr. Shaw was heard in opposition to the assessment, on the ground that it is a repaving and consequently not assessable, the original paving having been done prior to the consolidation of the upper district with The City of New York, and also for the reason that the railway company had not been assessed.

On motion, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with request to obtain the advice of the Corporation Counsel in regard to charging against the Union Railway Company that portion of the expense of paving the street between and one foot outside of the railroad tracks of the said company, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging and laying crosswalks in One Hundred and Sixty-first street, from Gerard avenue to the easterly curb line of Jerome avenue, and building a culvert at Cromwell's creek, and objections of W. W. Astor, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, having been received from the Board of Assessors on May 10, 1900.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating and paving with granite-block pavement the carriageway of and laying crosswalks in Intervale avenue, from the Southern Boulevard to Wilkins place, and objections of the Twenty-third Ward Improvement Company and E. S. Levi, filed by C. V. Gabriel, attorney; E. G. Faile Estate, filed by C. H. Brush, attorney; Jacob Reing and others, filed by Gumbleton & Hottenroth, attorneys; Frank R. Houghton and others, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors on May 10, 1900.

Mr. Shaw was heard, objecting to the charges for interest and for surveying and inspecting, and also to assessing the entire cost of the improvement upon the property, as the avenue was made one hundred feet in width, for the purpose of connecting other main thoroughfares in that portion of the Twenty-third Ward, thereby greatly increasing the cost of the work.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curbstones, flagging the sidewalks, laying crosswalks and placing fences in Intervale avenue, from the Southern Boulevard to Wilkins place, and objections of the E. G. Faile Estate, filed by C. H. Brush, attorney; Frank R. Houghton and others, filed by J. C. Shaw, attorney; The Twenty-third Ward Improvement Company and others, filed by C. V. Gabriel, attorney; Jacob Reing and others, filed by Gumbleton & Hottenroth, attorneys; the Real Estate Corporation of New York City and George F. Johnson, filed by Hawke & Flannery, attorneys, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors on May 10, 1900.

H. Sherman, attorney; August Belmont and Walther Lutigen, filed by Charles S. Dawson, attorney, and applications for damages of Margaret McCoy, filed by J. Wilson Bryant, attorney; Herman H. Hedderman, filed by Hawke & Flannery, attorneys; Elizabeth A. Shewell, filed by Clarence C. Ferris, attorney, having been received from the Board of Assessors on May 10, 1900.

Mr. Sherman, attorney, was heard in opposition to the assessment, and stated that inasmuch as the street had heretofore been regulated and graded at the expense of the property-owners, the present expense, which is due to the widening of the street, should be assumed by the City as the benefit is not local.

No others appearing after notice, on motion the objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, between Webster avenue and Park avenue, and in Park avenue, between East One Hundred and Seventy-third and East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth streets, and objections of Henry J. Behrens, filed by C. V. Gabriel, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors on June 6, 1900.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion, the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

#### BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for paving Dyckman street, from Kingsbridge road to the Speedway, with macadam pavement and laying crosswalks; and objections of William Starnberg and others, filed by John C. Mr. Luce, of counsel, objected to the assessment against the railroad company, as it is devoted to a public use, and also to the apportionment of the expense of the work, claiming that the portion thereof which is borne by the City is an insufficient reduction of the assessment.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

Mr. Levey, Deputy and Acting Comptroller, here retired from the meeting (12 o'clock, P. M.).

#### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Mr. Scurry, Temporary Secretary, presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks and placing fences in Jerome avenue, from Wolf place to One Hundred and Ninetieth street (St. James street), together with a list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade, and objections of F. On motion, the said claims were referred to the Corporation Counsel for investigation and report.

At 1.25 o'clock P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.
