## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Special Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Monday, January 26, 1914, at 4.30 o'clock P. M.

Present: Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President, and Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Darwin R. James, Jr.

The President presided.

A preliminary report dated January 26 was presented from Commissioner James relative to the matter of Administration in the offices of the Commission, with particular reference to the four departments of the Chief Clerk, viz.: the Application Bureau, the Certification Bureau, the Record Room and the Payroll Bureau. After careful consideration of the report, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary, the Assistant Secretary and the Chief Clerk of the Commission be and they hereby are appointed a committee to take up the question of the physical arrangement of the bureaus under the Chief Clerk, viz.: the Application Bureau, the Certification Bureau, the Record Room and the Payroll Bureau, to see that proper furniture is provided therefor and that the doors between the offices be kept unlocked so that proper communication may be had between the bureaus.

Resolved, That the Certification Clerk be and he hereby is instructed to file each month with the Chief Clerk a report showing the number of names remaining on all eligible lists and the dates of expiration of such lists.

Resolved, That the Chief Clerk be and he hereby is instructed to notify the Commission each month of the status of all eligible lists when he shall have been informed of the same by the Certification Clerk.

Resolved, That the matter of a filing system for the Commission be and the same hereby is referred to the Secretary for suggestions.

Resolved, That the President, the Chief Examiner, the First Assistant Chief Examiner and the Assistant Chief Examiner of the Commission be and they hereby are appointed a committee to make a report in two weeks in the matter of the employment of per diem examiners.

Resolved, That the President, the Chief Examiner and the Secretary of the Commission be and they hereby are appointed a subcommittee to report on the matter of the assignment of monitors in the office of the Commission.

Resolved, That the Chief Examiner be instructed to embody in all notices of examinations on and after March 1, 1914, a statement that applicants will be required to furnish the Commission with self-addressed envelopes with proper postage affixed where request is made that application blanks be forwarded by mail.

Resolved, That the Application Clerk be and he hereby is authorized to carefully question prospective applicants as to their knowledge of the duties of the position for which they desire to file application in order that applicants may be discouraged from filing applications for positions for which they are not fitted by experience.

Resolved, That the Chief Examiner be and he hereby is instructed to set forth in the advertisements of examinations in the daily newspapers a description of the duties of the position, notice of the dates set for the receipt of applications and a short statement of the essential features of the examination and to refer the public to the CITY RECORD or the offices of the Commission for fuller and more detailed information.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to instruct the Chief Examiner to request the Board of Examiners to furnish the Chief Clerk, the Application Clerk and the Clerk in Charge of the Sample Question Room when an examination is ordered with a statement giving as completely as possible a description of the duties of the position to be filled.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of Commissioner James dated January 26, 1914, be forwarded to the Secretary and the Chief Clerk and that the matter of rearranging the Commission's plan of addressing communications and copying letters be referred to the Secretary for the purpose of carrying out the suggestions contained in the said report.

The Commission then adjourned, to meet Wednesday, January 28, 1914, at 10.30 o'clock a. m.

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relative to stands within the stoop line and under elevated railroad stations.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 363, chapter 7, article 4 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 363. Stands within stoop lines may be permitted and licensed, with the consent of the owner of the premises, for the sale of newspapers, periodicals, fruits and soda water and the blacking of boots, and no bootblack stand shall be provided with more than three chairs. All such stands shall be classified, and the annual license fee therefor shall be fixed and collected as specified in the schedule following: Stands for the sale of newspapers, periodicals or both, \$5; stands for the sale of fruits or soda water or both, \$10; stands for the sale of newspapers, periodicals or both, and in addition also fruits or soda water or both, \$15; bootblack stands, each chair, \$5.

But no license fee shall be required for stands within stoop lines for the sale of newspapers, periodicals or both, in cases where such stands are conducted by dealers in said articles who are the owners or occupants of the premises or stores in front of which the same are situated.

Sec. 2. Section 364, chapter 7, article 4 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 364. Every such stand must be strictly within the stoop line, and shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the sidewalk by the public, and shall not exceed the space of 10 feet long by 4 feet wide, except that in the case of bootblack stands a space not more than 3 feet wide and 4 feet long may be occupied by each chair of such stand. The construction and erection of all stands permitted by this ordinance shall be at the expense of the applicant and under the direction of the President of the Borough in which said stand is located. No person shall be permitted to sleep in any portion of the structure or hold more than one license. The Mayor, or Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, shall have the power to transfer a permit or license to another location for the period of its unexpired term; provided, however, that the application for such transfer shall be accompanied by the consent of the owner of the premises to which the proposed transfer is to be made.

Sec. 3. Section 365, chapter 7, article 4 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 365. Any person desiring to erect a stand or booth underneath the stairs of any of the elevated railroad stations in the City of New York for the sale of newspapers and periodicals shall file in the Bureau of Licenses an application in which the applicant shall specify the location for such stand, and no such stand or booth or any projection therefrom shall be erected which is wider than the width of the stairs under which it is placed or which extends along the sidewalk a greater distance than to a point where the under surface of the stairs is not over seven feet from the level of the sidewalk; and said stand shall be constructed, erected and maintained at the expense of the applicant and under the direction of the President of the Borough in which such stand is located, upon plans to be approved by the Chief Engineer of the elevated railroad company affected, so as to permit of a ready removal of so much thereof as may be necessary to enable the said company, its agents or employees, to get convenient access to any part of the said stairways for the inspection, painting or repairing thereof, and shall be painted the same color as the stairs of the elevated railroad, and no advertisement shall be painted or displayed thereon.

Sec. 4. Section 369, chapter 7, article 4 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby repealed:

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE relative to employees of the Fire and Police Departments.

Be It Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Employees of the Fire and Police Departments, not entitled to a trial before dismissal, and who were given an opportunity to explain charges before they were removed, may apply to the Mayor, within one year from the date of the order separating them from the City service, for a further opportunity to explain, setting forth the reasons for such action. The Mayor may in his discretion grant the application. The Fire or Police Commissioner shall thereupon afford a further opportunity to the dismissed employee, to explain the charges filed against him and on which the removal was based. Thereafter the said Fire or Police Commissioner may in his discretion reinstate the dismissed employee or reaffirm the previous removal. Prior to any reinstatement under this ordinance the said employee shall file a written statement waiving all claim or claims for back salary and damages of all kinds whatsoever.

### DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING FEBRUARY 28, 1914.

#### ABSURD CHARGES REFUTED.

During the last few months sensational charges have been aired in the press that children treated at some of the City hospitals, particularly children suffering from contagious diseases and treated in the hospitals of the Department of Health, were inoculated at these hospitals with "loathsome diseases." In some instances the charge was directly made that the children had been experimented on, and that the alleged infections were the result of such experimentation. The charges were also sent to Dr. William H. Maxwell, City Superintendent of Schools, with the information that many of the children attending the public schools in The Bronx were suffering from venereal diseases. The following reply to a communication from Dr. Maxwell transmitting these charges to the Commissioner of Health, will give the reader some idea as to how much credence may be placed in these sensational stories:

February 27, 1914.  
"Dr. WILLIAM H. MAXWELL, City Superintendent of Schools, Department of Education, 500 Park Ave., City:  
"Dear Sir—I return herewith the documents which accompanied your communication of February 19th, as follows:  
"(1) Letter from the Hon. F. B. Bellamy;  
"(2) Letter from B. S. Deutsch;  
"(3) A list of children alleged to be suffering from syphilis.

"In Mr. Deutsch's letter, which was addressed to the District Attorney of Bronx County on February 18th, the statement is made that forty-eight children, residing in Bronx County, many of whom are now attending the public schools, are suffering from conditions similar to those which exist in two cases specially named; these two cases, according to Mr. Deutsch, were admitted to hospitals under control of the Department of Health for the treatment of minor contagious diseases, and were discharged from these hospitals suffering from syphilis. Mr. Deutsch further declares that on investigation he found that the alleged syphilitic infection of these children was the result of 'inoculation which occurred without the consent of either the children or their parents, or else as a result of gross negligence and carelessness within the hospitals.' I assume that the accompanying list of children was furnished by Mr. Deutsch in support of his allegation; immediately upon the receipt of your communication of February 19th, an investigation was begun and has since been vigorously prosecuted. The present may be regarded as a preliminary report which I hasten to place in your hands at the earliest possible moment.

"Two physicians, representing this Department, visited forty families named in the Deutsch list. Of this number, fifteen were not found at the given addresses. Interviews were obtained with twenty-five families in which there were thirty-four children. Among these, not a single case of syphilis or of suspected syphilis was found. There was no evidence of the inoculation of any of these children with serum or vaccine.

"Of the thirty-four children who were found by our investigators, only six had been treated at any time in the hospitals of this Department; four had been treated in other hospitals, and twenty-four had never been inmates of any hospital. Among the six children who were treated in the hospitals of this Department, three were found to be suffering from vaginitis on their return home; of the four children treated in our hospitals, two developed vaginitis.

"I have already begun a careful inquiry into the clinical history of the children who were treated in hospitals under the jurisdiction of the Board of Health. Inasmuch as the records of these hospitals (and presumably the records of other hospitals) show that an appreciable percentage of the female children admitted for ordinary contagious diseases have vaginitis at the time of their admission (frequently without the knowledge of the child or of its parents), it is obvious that no conclusion can be drawn in regard to the cases now under consideration until their full history is known. That a form of vaginitis, which is bacteriologically indistinguishable from gonorrheal vaginitis, is a common condition among children in this City and elsewhere is well known to clinicians. It is held by many clinicians that this form of vaginitis which occurs in children is clinically distinct from the gonorrhea of adults, and yet, as a matter of precaution, the treatment of the vaginitis of children as carried on in carefully conducted institutions, is surrounded by all the precautions which are prescribed for the handling of infectious disease.

"If a serious attempt were made to exclude from school all children who suffer from vaginitis, it would be necessary (a) to establish the machinery by which a complete physical examination of all female school children could be made; (b) to convince the public of the necessity of the proposed measures; (c) to establish the legal and moral right of the City authorities to require such an examination. Furthermore, inasmuch as the condition in question is one which, notwithstanding the most intensive treatment, often persists for months and even for years, it would be necessary to inaugurate a method whereby the education of excluded children could be continued. The only logical method would be to send private teachers into the homes of infected children.

"The questions here involved are among the most difficult and puzzling with which public health administrators have to deal. I am not aware that the problem has been solved anywhere and I can only promise, on behalf of this Department, unremitting attention to it, in the hope that a working program may ultimately be formulated. I should be glad to go into the matter in greater detail with a delegated representative of the Department of Education.

#### A WELCOME PUBLICATION.

We have just received the first number of a new publication "Clinic Notes," which is to be issued monthly for the information of clinic physicians and nurses, by the Association of Tuberculosis Clinics of this City. The first number in addition to the Foreword, which describes the origin of the new publication, gives in very striking form a tabulated statement of the tuberculosis problem in this City and shows how the clinics are solving it. In addition to this, there are interesting news items, health department announcements, and items of general interest. We believe that the new publication meets a distinct need and we wish it every success in its work.

#### DIPHTHERIA—FOURTH QUARTER, YEAR 1913.

In the following table are given statistics concerning diphtheria in New York City in the fourth quarter of 1913. Comparing this with the corresponding quarter of 1912 we find a reduction of 475 cases. It is possible that this is due to more prompt and efficient quarantine methods introduced during the year and to more frequent visits to the home. It will be noted that of the primary cultures sent to the laboratory 2,557 were positive. Inasmuch as most physicians do not report cases of diphtheria, excepting through cultures sent to the laboratory, these figures demonstrate the enormous value of a diagnosis laboratory in securing reports of cases. The table here given is one of the standard quarterly tables which will be reproduced in exactly this form for the first quarter of 1914, some time in April.

#### SCARLET FEVER, FOURTH QUARTER, YEAR 1913.

In the following table are summarized the data concerning scarlet fever in The City of New York for the last quarter of 1913. Comparing this with the corresponding quarter of 1912 we find a reduction of 481 cases. Possibly this is due to the more frequent visits made to these cases in 1913. It is to be noted that during this quarter of 1913 much of the supervision of these cases has been performed by trained nurses working full time instead of half-time medical inspectors, as was formerly the case.

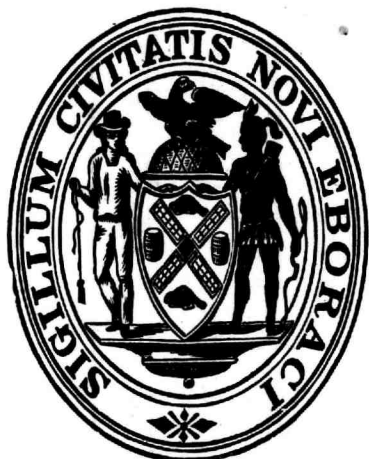

#### FRANCHISE MATTERS.

**PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT** at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held this day the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Manhattan Fire Alarm Company has, under date of November 29, 1911, made application to this Board for the grant of the right, privilege and franchise to lay, erect, construct, lease and maintain wires and other connections, with necessary poles, pipes, conduits and appliances in, over and under the streets, avenues, highways, parks and public places throughout the territory of The City of New York, to be used in the electrical or other operation of electrical or other call boxes in connection with telephone, telegraph and any system for transmitting calls and signals for electric or other protection service; and

Whereas, Sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on January 18, 1912, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as February 15, 1912, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least two (2) days in the "New York Press" and "The Sun," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to the Manhattan Fire Alarm Company, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Manhattan Fire Alarm Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Manhattan Fire Alarm Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

This Contract, made and executed in duplicate this day of 1914, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Manhattan Fire Alarm Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors under the streets and avenues within the Borough of Manhattan and the portion of the Borough of The Bronx lying west of the Bronx River, and to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors and the necessary conduits for the same under the streets and avenues within that portion of the Borough of The Bronx lying east of the Bronx River, the Borough of Brooklyn, the Borough of Queens and the Borough of Richmond for the purpose of electrically connecting detecting and signalling apparatus to be located upon the premises of subscribers with signal recording apparatus located or to be located at some suitable point or points where such signals are to be received and thereby maintaining and operating a fire protection signalling service system for the protection of the premises of subscribers and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits for the purpose aforesaid shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor to and until December 31, 1928, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for a further period of ten (10) years upon a fair revaluation of said right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders, selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board, one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

1. The sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

2. The further sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500) in cash, for use and occupation of the streets of the City since October 4, 1911, to be paid within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor.

3. During the first period of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

4. During the second period of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$5,000).

5. During the remaining period of this original contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than eighty-five hundred dollars (\$8,500), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of eighty-five hundred dollars (\$8,500).

The annual charges shall commence from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the moneys due when this contract is signed by the Mayor shall be paid into the Treasury of the City within thirty (30) days immediately following such date, and provided further that the first annual payment thereafter shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the wires and equipment of the Company constructed, pursuant to this contract, within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract, as above, the Board shall so order, by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its wires and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Sixth—The Company shall construct, maintain and operate its electric system subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City, and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances or departmental rules and regulations now in force or which may be adopted affecting companies operating electrical conductors in the City. No construction or repair of said electric system shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials. In any permit so issued such officials may impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues and the proper restoration of the surface of such streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

Upon the completion of any work of construction the Company shall furnish to the President of the Borough a plan of such character as he may direct, showing accurately and distinctly the location, size and type of construction and complete dimensions of the structures erected, installed or constructed under this contract and the location and dimensions of all substructures encountered during the progress of the work. The depth below the street surface of the new structure and of the substructures encountered must be shown; also their location with reference to the nearest curb line and the nearest curbside intersection.

The electrical and other equipment to be installed by the Company, whether the same be under streets and avenues, in any Department of the City or in private property, shall be constructed and maintained subject to the approval and under the supervision and control of the Fire Commissioner.

Seventh—The plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and all appurtenances thereto shall be constructed, maintained and operated in the latest approved manner and with the most modern and improved appliances, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to its plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and appurtenances from time to time, as such additions or improvements are necessary in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

All equipment installed and used by the Company shall be under continual test and be systematically inspected in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Fire Department. The Company shall keep accurate records of these tests and inspections and furnish verified statements of the same to the Fire Commissioner upon ten (10) days' request therefor.

Eighth—All cables and wires of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). In the Borough of Manhattan and that portion of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City, should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. In the other territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by virtue of this contract it may construct sufficient subways for the accommodation of its cables and wires and no more. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors of the character or tension of those used by the Company or similar companies in any or all of the Boroughs, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and conductors in such subways and the City agrees to lease to the Company such space as may be necessary and available for the operation of the alarm system hereby authorized. No cables or wires shall in the future be strung above the surface of the streets and avenues by the Company, and those at present in existence shall be removed and placed underground when and where required by the Board or the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Ninth—The Company shall not in the future connect any of its auxiliary boxes or apparatus



of any kind with the street boxes or City box circuits of the Fire Department, and the connections now in existence shall be discontinued within one year from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, provided, however, that before the expiration of the said year the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Fire Commissioner, discontinue such connections as he shall so order.

Tenth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant. Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets required on account of the construction or operation of the underground conduits herein authorized to be placed in the streets shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eleventh—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to lay and maintain conduits shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets or avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move its conduits and their appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twelfth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate be changed at any time during the term of this contract or any renewal thereof, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its conduits and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets or avenues the Company shall take care of and protect its conduits and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Thirteenth—The Company shall, upon request from any individual or corporation occupying or owning premises in the territory in which the Company is operating, not in arrears to it for service already rendered, extend its wires to such premises and furnish protection service to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half mile from any other premises in which the Company has its apparatus installed at the time such request is made.

Fourteenth—The Company shall file with the Board on the 1st day of November in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly and separately indicated the number of wires which are in use by the Company on September 30 preceding, and the streets in which the same are located, and also those which were put in use during the year preceding that date. It shall also file with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and the Fire Commissioner on or before the 10th day of each month a map or plan of the locations in which wires have been placed by it during the preceding month.

Fifteenth—The rates to be charged by the Company shall not be in excess of the following, without the consent of the Board, and it is agreed that the same may be altered or changed by the Board, as hereinafter provided:

(a) For ordinary fire alarm service by means of manual boxes installed in buildings or premises of any description a yearly rental of fifty dollars (\$50) for the first box installed and an additional yearly rental of ten dollars (\$10) for each additional box installed in the same building or premises.

(b) For Combination Fire Drill and Fire Alarm Service, with boxes and gongs arranged to give employees or other occupants of buildings or premises designated signals, a yearly rental of fifty dollars (\$50) for the first box and gong installed and an additional yearly rental of twenty-five dollars (\$25) for each additional box and gong so installed in the same building or premises, provided, however, that these rates shall be effective only where the subscriber contracts for a minimum installation of five such boxes and gongs.

(c) For Combination Fire Alarm and Watchman Supervisory service a yearly rental of sixty dollars (\$60) for the first box installed and an additional yearly rental of eighteen dollars (\$18) for each additional box installed in the same building or premises.

(d) For any other service furnished or to be furnished by the Company the rates charged shall be reasonable and fair, and before being put into effect shall be submitted to the Board for its approval.

The Company shall file with the Board on February 1 of each year a verified schedule of the rates charged by it for each class of service which it furnishes, and certified forms of the contracts used by it with subscribers for its various classes of service.

The Company agrees, upon request of any Board, Department or Bureau of the City Government, to furnish service to any and all buildings under the control of such Board, Department or Bureau at one-half the rates above authorized to be charged by it for whatever class or classes of service may be required.

Sixteenth—During the term of this contract or any renewal thereof the Board shall have the power to regulate and fix the maximum and minimum rates to be charged by the Company in the City, provided such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Seventeenth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills, unless due from its owner, shall never be charged against property, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

Eighteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purpose than those expressly set forth herein and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places. Except with the express consent of the Fire Commissioner no circuit installed or maintained by the Company over which alarms of fire are to be transmitted shall be used for the transmission of other than fire alarm signals.

Nineteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Twentieth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions in the territory covered by this contract, or any part thereof.

Twenty-first—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy

such default within a reasonable time the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-second—If for a period of twelve consecutive months the fire alarm system of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of eighteen months out of any consecutive twenty-four months, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings at law or in equity.

Twenty-third—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account and shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts received from the operation of the system hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company within The City of New York, together with such other information and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.

9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.

10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.

11. The total amount expended for same.

12. The names of the directors and officers elected at the last meeting of the corporation, held for such purpose.

13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company, as by last report.

14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.

15. Number and location of premises served by the Company.

16. Total receipts of the Company for each class of business.

17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.

18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-fifth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company within ninety (90) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privileges hereby granted, in default of which payment of the annual charges the City shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund, after ten (10) days' notice to the Company.

In case of failure of the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual statements, furnishing of service to applicants as herein provided, the installation or maintenance of its structures and equipment, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws, ordinances or departmental regulations now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events, the Company, except as herein otherwise provided, shall pay to the City a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) for each violation.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized, in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-sixth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board, by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the system constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-seventh—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such cases such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

Fourth—That the abstracts of said estimate of damage and of said assessment for benefit, together with the damage and benefit maps and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by the Commissioners of Estimate and by the Commissioner of Assessment in making the same, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings in the Law Department of The City of New York, No. 166 Montague street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in said City, there to remain until the 28th day of March, 1914.

Fifth—That, provided there be no objections filed to either of said abstracts, the reports as to awards and as to assessments for benefit herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof, to be held in the County Court House, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 22d day of April, 1914, at the opening of the Court on that day.

Sixth—In case, however, objections are filed to the foregoing abstracts of estimate and assessment, or to either of them, the motion to confirm the reports as to awards and as to assessments shall stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified in the notice provided in such cases to be given in relation to filing the final reports, pursuant to sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

#### NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

**TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.**

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing thereon or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant, free for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York serves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

#### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally, upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
