No. 165.

Ordinance Amending the Code in Relation to Fees Payable by Peddlers.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:
 Subdivision 1 of Section 130, Section 131 and Section 132 of Article 10, Chapter 14, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1, Section 130, Subdivision 1. Definitions. Any person hawking, peddling, vending or selling merchandise in the streets of the city shall be deemed to be a peddler, and shall be classified as follows: A peddler using a motor-driven vehicle, a peddler using a horse and wagon, a peddler using a push cart and a peddler personally carrying merchandise.

Section 2. Section 131. License fees; term. The annual license fees payable by peddlers shall be, for each peddler:

Using a motor-driven vehicle.....	\$8 00
Using a horse and wagon.....	8 00
Using a push cart.....	4 00
Personally carrying his merchandise.....	2 00

All peddler licenses shall be issued as of May 1 and shall expire on the 30th day of April next succeeding the date of issuance thereof.

All peddler licenses now in force, which shall not sooner expire, shall expire on the 30th day of April, 1916, but all such licenses for peddlers may be renewed by the licensees, if presented on or before July 31st, 1916, and for each full calendar month of the unexpired term of the old license a pro rata amount of the fee paid therefor shall be applied toward the payment of the new fee.

All peddlers using motor-driven vehicles and operating as such at the time this ordinance takes effect under licenses issued to them as peddlers using a horse and wagon, may continue to operate under such license until April 30, 1916, unless sooner expiring, and upon such expiration may be renewed as peddlers using a motor-driven vehicle, as hereinbefore provided.

Section 3. Section 132. Designation of vehicles. Any vehicle used in peddling shall show on each outside thereof the words "Licensed Peddler," together with the figures of its official number, and any peddler duly licensed to use a horse and wagon or a motor-driven vehicle may employ two persons, and no more, to assist in selling and delivering the wares, but such person shall so act only when accompanying a licensed peddler.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolution to Change the Name of Jackson Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, to Jackson Street.

Resolved, That the name of Jackson Avenue, between Kingsland Avenue and Newtown Creek, in the Borough of Brooklyn, be and the same is hereby changed to and shall hereafter be known and designated as "Jackson Street," and the President of the borough be and he is hereby authorized and requested to number or renumber the buildings on said thoroughfare in such manner and to such extent as may be necessary and to note the changes on the maps and records of The City of New York.

An Ordinance Providing for an Issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an Amount Not Exceeding One Hundred and Forty-four Thousand Dollars (\$144,000), to Provide Means for the Reconstruction of the Present Wood Block Pavement on the Roadway of the Queensboro Bridge, and Work Incidental Thereto, Under the Jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 17, 1916, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding one hundred and forty-four thousand dollars (\$144,000), to provide means for the reconstruction of the present wood block pavement on the roadway of the Queensboro Bridge and work incidental thereto, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue said corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, the proceeds thereof to the amount of the par value of the stock to be applied to the purposes aforesaid; provided, however, that no encumbrance or expenditure by contract shall be made against the proceeds of corporate stock herein authorized, nor shall bids upon such contracts be advertised for until after approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the plans, specifications, estimates of cost and forms of such contracts which shall be submitted to said Board by the Commissioner of Bridges, nor shall any architect, engineer, expert or departmental employee be engaged or employed as a charge against such proceeds, except after approval by said Board of such employment and of the fee or wage to be paid by preliminary and final contract, voucher or budget schedule, which are to be similarly submitted, unless in the case of departmental employees, such employment is in accordance with schedules approved by said Board.

Resolution to Fix the Compensation of Certain Janitors in the Department of Education.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the following resolution at a stated meeting held March 17, 1916:

Whereas, By the opinion of the Corporation Counsel as of June 28 and July 30, 1910, the Comptroller was advised that the payment of salaries of Janitors in the Department of Education was illegal unless such salary shall have been established under the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter; and

Whereas, The special Committee on Janitorial Compensation and the Committee on School Inquiry, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, submitted a joint report on March 27, 1913, which contained detailed suggestions and recommendations for the reorganization of the Janitorial force of the Board of Education; therefore, be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen pending action by the Board of Education on the aforesaid report, that the compensation of Janitors in the Department of Education be fixed temporarily and until further modified, in accordance with the following list:

An Ordinance to Amend an Ordinance to Designate a National Republican Newspaper to Publish Election Notices and the Official Canvass in the Borough and County of Queens.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, pursuant to the power vested in it by section 22 of the County Law and section 1586 of the Greater New York Charter, as follows:

Section 1. "An Ordinance to designate a National Republican newspaper to publish election notices and the official canvass in the borough and county of Queens," which was adopted December 21, 1915, and became effective January 3, 1916, is hereby amended to read as follows:

AN ORDINANCE to designate a National Republican newspaper to publish election notices and the official canvass in the Borough and County of Queens.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, pursuant to the power vested in it by section 22 of the County Law and section 1586 of the Greater New York Charter, as follows:

Section 1. The Flushing Daily Times, published at Flushing, in the borough and county of Queens, representing the National Republican Party, is hereby designated as the newspaper in which shall be published the election notices hereafter issued by the Secretary of State, and in which shall be published the official canvass of votes cast at any general or special election held in said borough or county.

Sec. 2. The compensation for the publication of the election notices and the official canvass of votes cast at any general or special election held in said borough or county is hereby fixed at twenty cents per line.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

An Ordinance to Amend Article 2, Chapter 12, Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, authorizing the Fire Commissioner to Waive the Provisions of Section 24 and Section 25 of the Said Article in Certain Cases.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Article 2 of chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended by inserting between section 25 and section 26 of the said article a new section to be known as section 25-a, to read as follows:

§25-a. Modifications. When the circumstances, conditions, limitations or surroundings of any business, occupation, trade, industry or premises, referred to in sections 24 and 25 of this article, are unusual, or such as to render impracticable or unduly burdensome the enforcement of the provisions of the said sections applicable thereto, the fire commissioner may waive or modify such provisions to such extent as he may deem necessary in the premises consistent with public safety.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolution to Authorize the Chief Clerk of the Children's Court to Draw on Account of Contingent Expenses.

Resolved, That, for the purpose of defraying minor incidental expenses contingent to the Children's Court, the Chief Clerk of said Court may, by requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not to exceed one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150), and may, in like manner, renew the draft as often as he may deem necessary to the extent of the amount set apart in the Budget for 1916, Code No. 2897; but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall have been accounted for to the Comptroller by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers, certified by the said Chief Clerk, covering the expenditure of the money paid therein.

Resolution to Authorize the District Attorney of New York County to Draw on Account of Contingent Expenses.

Resolved, That, for the purpose of defraying any minor or incidental expenses contingent to the District Attorney's Office, New York County, the District Attorney may, by requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding two thousand dollars. The District Attorney may, in like manner, renew the draft as often as may be deemed necessary, to the extent of the appropriation set apart for contingencies of the District Attorney's Office, New York County, but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers certified by the District Attorney covering the expenditure of money paid thereon.

Provided, however, that upon the receipt of vouchers showing the payment of moneys upon the said draft, to the extent of one thousand dollars, the Comptroller may draw his warrant to the order of the District Attorney, New York County, for the sum of one thousand dollars in part disbursement of the advance of two thousand dollars.

Resolved, That, for the purpose of defraying incidental expenses for postage stamps and other incidental expenses applicable to the office of the Committee on Buildings, Board of Aldermen, the Chairman of said Committee may by requisition draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding \$25.00, and may in like manner renew the draft as often as may be necessary, to the extent of the appropriation set apart to cover such expenses; but no such renewal shall be made until the money received on the pending draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller by the transmittal of voucher or vouchers, certified by the Chairman, covering the expenditure of the money paid thereon.

Section 1. Subdivision 4 of section 220 of Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

"4. Supervision. No refrigerating machine of over three tons of refrigerating capacity shall be operated unless under the charge of a person holding a certificate of fitness from the Fire Commissioner, or who has been duly certified as competent to operate a refrigerating plant by any department of the City of New York having jurisdiction to certify thereto."

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

"Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Board of Education for the purpose of providing official City flags for use atop of the public school houses."

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to storekeepers, hucksters and peddlers to stand on the sidewalk and in the carriageway near the curb, on the streets and thoroughfares of the City of New York, excepting on such streets and thoroughfares on which all encroachments have been removed by direction of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the sale of flowers on account of the Easter holidays, with the consent of the property owners and the Commissioner of Licenses, provided a free passageway be kept on the sidewalk for all pedestrians and on the carriageway for all vehicles; such permission to continue only on April 21 and 22, 1916, and the ordinance or ordinances conflicting with the foregoing provisions are hereby suspended for the period of time above mentioned; the exercise of any privilege granted hereunder to be subject to supervision by the Police Department; furthermore, it is to be understood that this resolution shall not be in effect in any street where in the judgment of the Police Commissioner the privileges therein granted are apt to interfere with the religious repose of the residents or worshippers in the immediate neighborhood thereof.

from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
