## DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE.

Where the word "final" is shown after the name of the payee, payment will not be made until thirty days after the completion and acceptance of the work, but all of the other warrants mentioned will be forwarded through the mail unless some reason exists why payment is to be made in person, in which event written notice will be promptly given to the claimant.

## Minutes of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, July 18, 1917, at 10.30 A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President, Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. The President presided.

On motion, the minutes of the meeting held June 13 were approved.

P. J. Coffey, Chief Clerk, Board of Coroners, Brooklyn, appeared in connection with the request of that department for authority to employ David Slackman as Interpreter (Polish and Lithuanian) during the balance of the year 1917 under the provisions of clause 6-a of Rule XII. On motion, it was

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of clause 6-a of Rule XII of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, David Slackman be and he hereby is excepted from examination to be employed as Interpreter (Polish and Lithuanian) in the office of the Board of Coroners, Borough of Brooklyn, during the period from July 1 to Dec. 31, 1917, provided, however, that his total compensation shall not exceed \$200.

Lewis A. Wilson, Director of the Industrial Education Survey, appeared in connection with the request of the Industrial Education Survey Committee for authority to employ Lewis A. Wilson as Director for the period from July 11 to Aug. 1, 1917, under the provisions of clause 4 of Rule XII, and for authority to employ William H. The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water tanks and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days

from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all material or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.
