

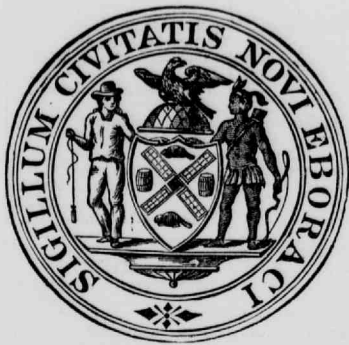

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's office, in the New Court-house, on Saturday, December 4, 1880, at 11.40 o'clock A. M.

Present—Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; Hon. William C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation; Hon. Frederick Smyth, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held November 27, 1880, were read and approved.

The assessment list for constructing sewer in Lexington avenue, between One Hundred and Twenty-fifth and One Hundred and Twenty-sixth streets, with objections of John H. C. Thompson, was presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors with communication dated November 9, 1880.

After hearing Truman H. Baldwin, attorney for Mr. Thompson, on motion, the said objections were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for constructing a sewer in Front street, between Dover and Roosevelt streets, with objections of John Lange, was presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with a communication dated November 9, 1880.

After consideration of the objections, on motion, they were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for building a basin on the northwest corner of One Hundred and Fifteenth street and Avenue A, and objections of T. B. Wakeman for self and others, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with communication dated November 9, 1880.

The Secretary of the Board of Assessors stated that the objections complained of had been rectified.

On motion, the said assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for constructing a sewer in Forty-third street, between First avenue and East river, and objections of A. Ashbach.

After hearing Truman H. Baldwin, attorney, in behalf of Mr. Ashbach, on motion, the objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging in Twelfth avenue, between One Hundred and Thirtieth and One Hundred and Thirty-third streets, and record of awards made by the Board of Assessors for damages to buildings by reason of change of grade on the line, also petitions for awards, and objections of Theo. F. Tone and Nancy Parker to the amount allowed, and affidavits, etc., in support of their claim, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors with a communication dated November 9, 1880.

After consideration of the said objections, on motion, they were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for constructing a sewer in Fifty-second street, between Third and Lexington avenues, from end of present sewer to near Lexington avenue, with objections of Mary J. Burchell, was presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors with communication dated November 9, 1880.

After hearing the objections the Secretary of the Board of Assessors explained the facts, and, on motion, the objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for fencing vacant lots on Seventy-seventh street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues, and objections of E. Mulvany, with a communication from the Commissioner of Public Works of May 10, 1880, in relation thereto, were presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors with communication dated November 9, 1880.

After hearing Mr. Mulvany, and the said communication from the Commissioner of Public Works having been read, on motion, the objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list and awards for damages in the matter of closing the Bloomingdale road, with maps, also petitions, objections, affidavits, briefs, etc., filed in said matter, which were referred back to the Board of Assessors by this Board on December 20, 1878, for "re-examination and reconsideration after consultation with the Counsel to the Corporation as to the legal principles applicable to the determination of the area of assessment, the principles upon which the damage and benefit should be determined, awarded and assessed in each case, etc.," were presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors with a communication dated August 6, 1880, stating the action taken by them in said matter under the resolution of December 20, 1878, referring the subject back to that Board. The Board of Assessors also transmitted additional papers filed with them since December 20, 1878.

Due notice having been given by circulars addressed to the parties who had filed objections, petitions, etc., the following persons appeared and were heard thereon:

J. B. Aitken, attorney, in behalf of J. L. Mott, executor, for the purpose of protecting his right in case it should be held that the lands on a closed street do not go back to the abutting owner.

Mr. W. S. Palmer, as representative of Morse, of Morse & McMahon, attorneys for the Female Academy of the Sacred Heart, and referred the Board to the objections already filed.

Mr. Charles E. Miller, attorney, in behalf of Edward C. Donnelly, Rev. John McCloskey, George A. Hearn, and others, and stated that he makes no objection to the assessment.

Mr. Isaac L. Miller, attorney, for the estate of the late Wm. V. Brady, claiming that an award made to John F. Trow should be made to the mortgagees who have a mortgage covering the property in question which he had foreclosed on a judgment for a deficiency, against Mr. Trow, on November 1, 1878, for \$4,457.51.

He made, he said, no objection to the assessment.

Mr. John C. Shaw, attorney for the estate of Cortlandt Palmer, and stated that he made no objection to the assessment.

Mr. Charles H. Kitchell, attorney for the New York Hospital, and others, and stated that the only objections he had to make were to the insufficiency of the amount of awards made to his clients.

Mr. James A. Deering, attorney for Colgate Gilbert and others, and made no objections.

After consideration of the matter, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

At 12.45 o'clock P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.

The Chairman moved that the rule adopted at meeting of June 24, 1879, relating to calls of meetings, be suspended, and the notice of forty-eight hours be waived.

The Comptroller presented the following report:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Estimates in favor of Messrs. Decker and Quintard, contractors, for work done in improving and constructing Riverside avenue, under the provisions of chapter 447, Laws of 1876, were received at this Department on November 23, 1880, as follows:

1. Estimate of amount due and payable for work done to February 1, 1880.....	\$11,800 47
2. Estimate of amount due and payable for work done to June 15, 1880.....	35,318 17
3. Final estimate of amount due and payable on final completion of the work.....	183,577 08
Total.....	\$230,695 72

To provide means to pay the amount due the contractors, I recommend the adoption of a resolution, herewith submitted, authorizing the further issue of "Assessment Bonds" to an amount not exceeding two hundred and thirty-one thousand dollars, under the provisions of the act referred to.

The Comptroller presented the following report:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, December 4, 1880.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

As provided by chapter 556 of the Laws of 1880, I have inquired into the facts and circumstances under which the contract for paving Madison avenue, from Forty-second to Eighty-sixth street, was made and entered into by the City, and being satisfied that the said contract comes within the provisions of the said act, I have ascertained, and am of the opinion, that the work under the said contract was delayed by the acts of the City, its officers and agents; that the continuance of such period of delay was from the 28th day of August, 1870, to December 6, 1870; and that the date upon which the said contract would have been completed but for the delay caused, for which the contractor was not responsible, was August 28, 1870; and that the amount of the difference for interest charged on advances made by the City on said contract, between the time of said advances and the date of the completion of the work and the time of said advances to the date of confirmation of the assessment therefor, together with interest thereon from that date, November 22, 1871, to December 4, 1880, has been ascertained to be the sum of twenty-six thousand five hundred and eighty dollars and thirteen cents (\$26,580.13), which amount is due the contractor under the provisions of said act.

To provide for the payment of this amount, I recommend the adoption of a resolution herewith submitted, authorizing the issue, under the act referred to, of Revenue Bonds of the City of New York to an amount not exceeding twenty-seven thousand dollars.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

As provided by chapter 117, of the Laws of 1880, I have examined the claim presented to the Finance Department, of Whitfield Van Cott, who claimed to have acted as Assistant Clerk of the Third Judicial District Court in the City of New York, from January 1, 1876, to and including December 25, 1876, and upon the evidence and proof presented to me, according to the provisions

and requirements of said act, I have audited and certified the amount due the said Van Cott for services rendered and duties performed as Assistant Clerk of the said Third Judicial District Court during the time stated, at \$2,951.61, being, as provided by said act, at the rate of \$3,000 per annum, the amount established by law as the compensation to be paid to Clerks and Assistant Clerks of the District Courts at the time when the services were rendered.

To provide the means to pay the claim so audited and certified I present herewith for adoption a resolution authorizing the issue of "Revenue Bonds of the City of New York," as provided by the second section of the act.

NEW YORK, November 30, 1880.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—In 1877 the undersigned began his labors upon the revision of the ordinances, which continued without interruption until the submission of the same to the Board of Aldermen, on the 5th day of October, 1880.

On or about the first day of February, 1879, the Committee on Law of the Common Council employed the undersigned as an expert, to examine and unite, if possible, the two codifications of the ordinances, which had been submitted by the respective Commissioners, and produce from them one symmetrical and harmonious code.

Your petitioner was engaged upon such work between four and five months, night as well as day, and completed the united revision to the entire satisfaction of the said Committee, and was accepted by it.

It was agreed between the said Committee and petitioner, that the petitioner should accept such compensation for his services as the city might think proper to give him.

The Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Common Council instructs me that the proper method of obtaining such compensation is to apply to your Honorable Board, and your petitioner, therefore, respectfully asks your Honorable Board to award him the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), as suggested by the Committee on Law of the Common Council, for the aforesaid services.

I herewith beg leave to submit a copy of the letter of the Committee on Law respecting the foregoing subject, the original being in the possession of the Finance Committee of the Common Council.

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned was Chairman of the Standing Committee on Law of the Common Council for the year 1879.

Early in that year two revisions of the ordinances of the Corporation of the City of New York, one by each of the Commissioners appointed for the purpose of making such revision, were referred to them.

Such Committee were further instructed by the Common Council of that year to bring about an agreement between the Commissioners, if possible, as to the revision of the ordinances.

The said Committee found that hopeless; but that the City should not be deprived of any revision, the said Committee called to their assistance and employed Mr. Edwin E. Van Auker, Esq., as an expert, to unite and consolidate the two revisions into one harmonious code. The Law Committee of 1879, therefore respectfully and earnestly ask, as a matter of justice that your Honorable Board award Mr. Van Auker such a sum as may seem just and proper, and the said Committee knowing the amount and nature of the work performed, beg leave to suggest that he be allowed the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) as a fair compensation for his labors.

DEAR SIR—We respectfully report to your Board that, owing to an oversight in preparing estimates for our Department as to unexpended balance of appropriation for 1879, we have overrun the amount for Supply Account by about twenty thousand dollars. There was, however, sufficient funds unexpended for each individual requisition when granted by the Board. There was on hand, January 1, 1880, about twenty-six thousand dollars' worth of supplies bought in the month of December (as we are always obliged to keep a stock of supplies on hand, and not wait until everything is exhausted before making other purchases). We have but one excuse to offer, which is, that the greatly increased cost of supplies for the three last months of the year was such as to run far beyond the usual monthly amount of requisitions. All that has been purchased in excess, however, was on hand for January use.

We therefore most respectfully request your Board to make the enclosed transfers from the unexpended balances of the various accounts in our Department to the credit of the Supply Account for 1879, so that the parties we have purchased from may receive the amounts now due them.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.
The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
