

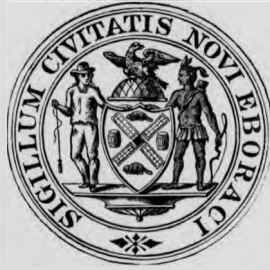

On motion, laid on the table.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Hon. Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller—In relation to approval of assignments made by Duncan A. Gillies.

On motion, said assignments were approved.

From Department of Public Works:

1st. Enclosing communication from U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey Office requesting plan of the city. The Secretary directed to forward copy of the Engineer-in-Chief's report in relation thereto.

2d. Reporting that repairs have been made to pavement foot of West Thirty-seventh street, North river.

3d. In reference to bulkhead at Thirty-first street, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Counsel to the Corporation—Requesting information respecting depth of water, etc., at bulkhead between Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From C. E. Murtagh, lessee—Stating that repairs have been made to the bulkhead east of Pier 56, East river.

From James McClenahan, lessee—Stating that he will make the necessary repairs to Pier, new 60, North river.

From Kane & Wright—Requesting permission to connect dumping-board with Pier at Forty-sixth street, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Brown & Fleming—Requesting permission to bid for the privilege of filling in at Franklin street, North river. The Secretary directed to advise that arrangements have been made for filling in thereat.

From Pennsylvania Railroad Company—Requesting permission to repair Pier, old 1, North river. The action of the President in issuing a permit under the usual conditions was approved.

From David Whipple, agent—Requesting permit to sheathe Pier 13, East river. The action of the President in issuing a permit under the usual conditions was approved.

From John Jeroloman—Requesting the application of Ellen Hughes for use of dumping-board at Pier foot of West Thirty-seventh street, North river. Referred to the President, with power.

From New York Balance Dock Company—Requesting injury done to their property in consequence of the dredging done by order of the Department in the slip foot of Pike street, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From D. W. Bogert, Dock Master—Reporting repairs required to Pier, old 27, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Charles H. Pendergast, Dock Master—Reporting that sheathing on deck of Pier 51½, East river, requires repairing. The Secretary directed to notify the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company, lessees, to repair.

From P. Curley, Dock Master—Reporting that two spring-piles are loose at outer southerly corner of Pier, new 43, North river. The Secretary directed to notify the International Navigation Company, lessee, to refasten said piles.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty.

2d. Reporting amount of work done during the week ending July 14, 1888.

3d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8059 in relation to the application of Kane & Wright for permission to renew approach from new dumping pier to their manure dumps on the bulkhead north of East Forty-sixth street, and also in reference to their application to have backing log of the outer overhang lowered.

On motion, permit was granted to renew approach, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, and their application to have the backing log lowered was denied.

4th. Reports on Secretary's Orders Nos. 8046, 8051, 8052 and 8055, that he had examined the applications of Robert J. Gray, Robert Hall and David Hall for permission to build a pile-platform bulkhead of about one hundred feet—twenty-five feet and seventy-five feet, respectively—in length on the east side of Mott Haven Canal, and the application of W. G. Lathrop, Jr., for permission to build a pile-platform bulkhead on the west side of Mott Haven Canal, about seventy-five feet in length, upon water-front claimed by them upon plans and specifications submitted, and can see no objections to the applications being granted, provided the work is done in accordance with the amended plans and specifications, and not with the plans and specifications originally submitted.

On motion, permits were granted, provided the said parties shall, within ten days after receipt of permits, agree in writing to accept the amended plans and specifications as submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department and agree to do the work in accordance therewith, and under his direction and supervision.

5th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 7414 and 8026, that he had repaired west one-half of Pier 19, East river.

6th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 7974 and 7998, that he had repaired sheathing on deck of Pier foot of Twenty-eighth street, East river.

7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8030, that he had directed and superintended the resetting and refastening of a cluster of piles on east side of Pier 2, East river.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8023, that he had repaired surface of bulkhead at Eighteenth street, North river.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8036, that he had directed and superintended driving piles at Pier foot of Ninth street, East river.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8058, that repairs have been made to the bulkhead east of Pier 56, East river.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8001, that he had repaired deck of Pier at Forty-sixth street, North river.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8056, that he had fenced off Pier at West Forty-eighth street, North river.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 7922, stating that in accordance with the resolution of the Board passed June 7, 1888, he had prepared a map and plan for an exterior street of one hundred and fifteen feet in width, extending along the westerly shore of the East river, in the City of New York, from East Sixty-fourth street to East Eighty-first street, as provided by chapter 697 of the Laws of 1887, as amended by chapter 272 of the Laws of 1888, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution adopted: That the said plan be and hereby is approved by the Board, and that it be and hereby is determined upon as the plan for an exterior street, as required by chapter 697 of the Laws of 1887, as amended by chapter 272 of the Laws of 1888.

On motion, the President was authorized to transmit to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a copy of the report of the Engineer-in-Chief in relation thereto.

Upon reading and filing the communication from the Counsel to the Corporation in the matter of erecting ferry structures at the foot of Whitehall street, East river, dated July 17, 1888, enclosing copy of a resolution passed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, July 12, 1888, and recommending that this Department concur therein,

And upon reading and filing the resolution so adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of which the following is a copy:

"Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company to alter, repair and extend the ferry structures at the foot of Whitehall street, East river, at their own cost and expense, upon the following terms and conditions, and not otherwise: "the said work to be done in accordance with the plans which have been approved by the Department of Docks and under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of said Department."

"That before said work is commenced an agreement shall be made and executed by and between the said railroad company and the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York; that in consideration of the said company advancing the money necessary to make such alterations, repairs and extensions of the ferry structures, the said City of New York, shall, upon any sale which may be made of the Staten Island Ferry franchises, or either of them, along with the wharf property used and required therefor, at the expiration of the present ferry leases now held by said company, make, or cause to be made, payment to said company for the structures and improvements to be made and erected under this permission at their appraised value at the time of such sale, and that a clause providing for such payment shall be inserted in the terms of sale upon which such sale shall be made; and that, if upon such sale the said railroad company shall become the purchaser or lessee of the said franchises and wharf property, or either of them, under a lease for another term, or if by any act said company or its successors or assigns the present leases of the Staten Island ferries, or either of them, shall be forfeited pursuant to the provisions of said leases or either of them, all such structures and improvements erected or made under this permission shall, at the expiration of such other lease or at the time of such forfeiture,

"become and be the absolute property of the City of New York without any payment therefor to said company; and that the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York shall have the right, at any time, to purchase said structures and improvements by the payment to said company of the appraised value thereof at the time of such purchase, and in that event shall be under no obligation to make any reference thereto in any terms of sale; and that, if the parties to said agreement cannot agree as to the value of said structures and improvements, they shall be appraised by three appraisers, one to be named by the Comptroller for the time being of said city, one by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company, and the other to be appointed by one of the justices of the Supreme Court of the State of New York for the First Department, upon application to be made therefor by either party, upon two days' notice to the other; and that the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York shall have a lien upon such structures and improvements to secure payment to them of any moneys which may now be due, or which may hereafter become due to them from the said railroad company. And the said company shall, in and by said agreement, promise and agree to pay, as compensation for the use of the land under water to be covered by such structures and improvements in addition to the land under water now covered by existing structures, the sum of twenty-five cents per square foot per annum, to be paid quarterly at the same time provided for the payment of rent under the existing leases held by said company, and to be in addition to all sums reserved or agreed to be paid as rent in and by said leases; and it is further

"Resolved, That this permission is given upon the express condition that within ten days after the adoption thereof, the said railroad company shall file with the Comptroller of the City of New York its consent in writing to the terms of this resolution, and shall also at the same time file the agreement above provided for, and shall complete the said structures and improvements in accordance with said approved plans on or before the first day of November, 1888: it is further

"Resolved, That if, in the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, it is necessary that there should be concurrent action of the Department of Docks to render this resolution effectual, said Department is hereby requested to take such action, to the end that the said improvement may be made with as little delay as possible."

Therefore, Resolved, That this Department concurs in the action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund as declared in the foregoing resolution. All of the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

The following resolution was,

On motion, adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for building a new wooden Pier at the foot of West Fifth street, North river, about (60) sixty feet wide and (500) five hundred feet long, with a temporary approach thereto.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, January 27, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 15 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 18. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said building, or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow any building, or any part of the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the top of every part of the sidewalk and curbside of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid, and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.
