REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING JULY 21, 1888.

Col. EMMONS CLARK, Secretary Board of Health:

SIR-963 deaths were registered in this office during the week ending at noon of Saturday, July 21, 1888, representing an annual death-rate of 32.76 per 1,000 on an estimated population of 1,528,572.

The see of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, rallway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All

licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures. No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left rumning when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strity prohibited.
