

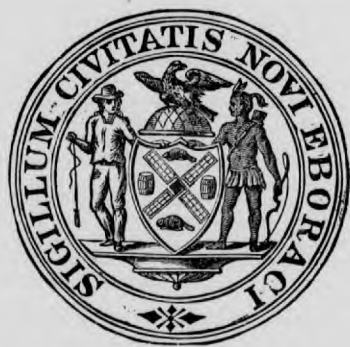

APPROVED PAPERS.

Approved Papers for the week ending March 2, 1889.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected and street-lamps lighted in Creston avenue, from One Hundred and Eighty-first to One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 12, 1889.

Approved by the Mayor, February 25, 1889.

Resolved, That water-mains be laid and fire-hydrants erected in Creston avenue, from One Hundred and Eighty-third street, pursuant to section 356 of the New York City Consolidation Act.

Resolved, That Croton-mains be laid in Edgecombe avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-first to One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, pursuant to section 356 of the New York City Consolidation Act.

Approved by the Mayor, February 25, 1889.

Resolved, That Sixty-seventh street, from Ninth avenue to the Boulevard, be paved with granite-block pavement, and that crosswalks be laid at the terminating avenues, where not already laid, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Approved by the Mayor, February 25, 1889.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to A. J. Dam & Co., proprietors of the Union Square Hotel, to place a lamp-post and lamp in front of their premises on the easterly side of Fourth avenue, about eighty feet south of Fifteenth street, the said lamp-post not to exceed the dimensions prescribed by law; provided that the work be done and light furnished at their own expense, and that the lamp be kept lighted every night during the hours and for the full time the public lamps maintained by the city are kept lighted.

Resolved, That the Clerk of the Common Council, when placed in possession of the "Report of Chief Engineer J. G. Swift, on the fortifications erected around New York City in 1814," heretofore loaned to Benson J. Lossing, Esq., be and is hereby permitted to deposit the volume with the New York Historical Society, for safe keeping, if said society will consent to receive it; there to remain until otherwise ordered by the Common Council.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, February 20, 1889, at 3 o'clock P. M.

All present, viz.: The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott, and Howe.

The minutes of the stated meeting of February 13, 1889, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of Vouchers Nos. 4420 and 4421, being estimates for work done by contractors during the month of January, 1889, and amounting to \$80,270.28.

On motion of Commissioner Howe, the same were approved, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee also reported their examination and audit of Vouchers Nos. 4422 to 4436, inclusive, being estimates for work done by contractors during the month of January, 1889, and amounting to \$48,032.67.

On motion of Commissioner Howe, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee also reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 4437 to 4454, inclusive, amounting to \$1,693.08.

Objection being made to the same, on motion of Commissioner Howe, the report was laid on the table.

The Construction or Executive Committee presented a communication received from Consulting Engineer B. S. Church, tendering his resignation as one of the examiners for the Aqueduct Commissioners on the Civil Service Examining Board, and recommended that the same be accepted. On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the resignation was accepted.

The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, Frederick W. Frost, Assistant Engineer, is hereby designated to fill the vacancy on the Civil Service Examining Board caused by the resignation of Consulting Engineer B. S. Church.

Objection being made to the resolution by the Mayor, on motion of Commissioner Scott, the same was laid on the table.

The Committee also transmitted a communication received from the Civil Service Commissioners transmitting a list of persons eligible to be appointed to the position of Typewriter in the office of the Aqueduct Commissioners.

And in connection therewith reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That Miss M. A. E. McSorley is hereby appointed to the position of Typewriter in the office of the Aqueduct Commissioners, at a salary of \$60 per month, she having been certified by the Civil Service Commission as eligible for such position, and standing first on the list of names so certified.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the communication was ordered filed and the resolution adopted.

The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That authority be and the same is hereby given to the Chief Engineer to remove the cabin buildings now used for office accommodation at Shafts 13 and 15 to Shaft 14 of the New Aqueduct; and an appropriation of \$60 is hereby made to cover the expense of removing said cabins.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the resolution was adopted by the following vote: Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works and Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Howe—7.

The Committee also presented the following: The Construction or Executive Committee present herewith the resignation of Andrew Peddie, as an Inspector of Masonry, dated February 1, 1889, which was presented to the Construction Committee and accepted by them on February 6, 1889; and we ask your approval of our action. On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the action of the Committee was approved.

The Committee also presented the following report: The Construction or Executive Committee report—That they have had under consideration a communication received from the Deputy Chief Engineer recommending that John Byrne, who was injured while employed as an Inspector of Masonry on the New Aqueduct, be allowed pay for the month of October, and for sixteen days in the month of November, as it appeared that this period includes the actual time he was unable to work owing to the injuries so received, as said Byrne reported for duty at the office of the Chief Engineer on the 13th of November, and was suspended by Division Engineer Gowen on November 16th following; and recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby directed to prepare and submit a supplementary pay-roll containing the name of John Byrne for full pay during the month of October and for sixteen days during the month of November, 1888, as it appears from a report received from the Deputy Chief Engineer that said Byrne was unable to work during said period of time, owing to injuries received while employed as an Inspector on the Aqueduct; and the Chief Engineer is hereby directed to place his name on the eligible list of Inspectors suspended for lack of work.

On motion of the Comptroller, the report was approved and the resolution adopted.

The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That the modified plan or diagram presented to the Commissioners on February 6, 1889, and referred to in the resolution then adopted, determining to acquire the fee instead of an easement in perpetuity in a certain piece or parcel of land situate at or near Shaft No. 24, on Section A of the New Aqueduct, in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York, is hereby approved and adopted by us; and it is hereby directed that said plan be certified and filed in the office of the Aqueduct Commission, and designated "Final Plan Sheet No. 1 of 1889"; and that a copy thereof, with a certificate of such adoption thereon, be transmitted to the Commissioner of Public Works, with the request that he prepare and submit the six similar property maps describing the piece or parcel of land referred to on said Final Plan Sheet, as required by section 4 of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the resolution was adopted. The Committee also presented forms of contract, specifications and bond submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works on the 19th day of February, 1889, for clearing and removing all timber, brush, grass and other vegetable growth from the lands that are required for the purpose of locating thereon the East Branch Reservoir, on the East Branch of the Croton river, and on Bog brook, Putnam County, New York, and recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the forms of contract, specifications and bond submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works on the 19th day of February, 1889, for clearing and removing all timber, brush, grass and other vegetable growth from the lands that are required for the purpose of locating thereon the East Branch Reservoir, on the East Branch of the Croton river, and on Bog brook, Putnam County, New York, be and the same are hereby approved and adopted, and the Secretary is hereby directed to have triplicate copies thereof prepared for certification by the Aqueduct Commissioners, and by the Counsel to the Corporation "as to form," and filed in accordance with section 25 of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the resolution was adopted. The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That the President and Secretary be and they are hereby directed to advertise in the CITY RECORD, New York "World" and New York "Tribune," and in the Putnam County "Courier," the notice and advertisement inviting sealed bids or proposals for clearing and removing all timber, brush, grass, and other vegetable growth from the lands that are required for the purpose of locating thereon the East Branch Reservoir, on the East Branch of the Croton river, and on Bog brook, Putnam County, New York, as provided for in the contract and specifications this day approved and adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners.

On motion of the Commissioner of Public Works, the resolution was adopted: The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That so much of the resolution adopted on the 6th instant as applies to the dismissal of F. P. Lary, recently employed as an Inspector of Masonry, be and the same is hereby reconsidered, and his name is hereby ordered placed on the list of Inspectors suspended without pay owing to the lack of work.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the resolution was adopted.

The Committee also presented the following report: The Construction or Executive Committee report—

That they have examined the claim made by James H. Clinch to be allowed pay for the time during which he was under suspension while employed as an Inspector of Masonry on the New Aqueduct, from May 1 to May 17, 1887, and it appearing to your Committee that the claim made is a just and proper one, we would recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer be and he is hereby directed to prepare a supplementary pay-roll, containing the name of James H. Clinch for sixteen days' pay, being for the amount deducted from his salary while employed as an Inspector of Masonry during the month of May, 1887.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the report was approved and the resolution adopted.

The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, O. H. Rood, now employed as an Inspector of Masonry on the New Aqueduct, be certified to the Civil Service Commission for examination for promotion to the position of Transitman.

On motion of Commissioner Howe, the resolution was laid on the table, and the Chief Engineer was requested to prepare and present at the next meeting a list containing the names of all employees in the Engineer Corps who are eligible to be examined for promotion.

The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, Neil Stewart, Jr., now employed as a Rodman on the New Aqueduct, be certified to the Civil Service Commission for examination for promotion to the position of Transitman.

On motion of Commissioner Howe, the resolution was laid on the table, pending a report to be received from the Chief Engineer giving the names of all persons who are eligible for promotion.

The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That authority be and the same is hereby given to the Chief Engineer to purchase fifteen tons of twenty-inch pipe to be used at Shaft 24 of the New Aqueduct, and an appropriation of \$500 is hereby made to cover the expense of such purchase.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the resolution was adopted by the following vote: Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Howe—7.

The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, an appropriation of \$500 is hereby made for the purpose of lithographing copies of contract drawings required for the blow-offs at Pocantico and Ardsley; for the gate-houses at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Central Park; and ironwork required for the Croton Gate-house.

The resolution was adopted by the following vote: Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Howe—7.

The Committee also presented a communication received from the Civil Service Commission transmitting a list of persons eligible to be appointed to the position of "Computer."

And in connection therewith, reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That the following-named persons be and they are hereby appointed Computers in the office of the Chief Engineer of the Aqueduct Commission; they having passed the required Civil Service examination, as well as an oral examination conducted under the direction of the Chief Engineer; and said parties being those standing highest on the list so certified:

On motion of the Commissioner of Public Works, the report was approved and the resolution adopted.

The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following preambles and resolutions:

Whereas, The Chief Engineer has certified, under date of February 15, 1889, that the repairs of defective work on Section 5 of the New Aqueduct have so far progressed that it will not be necessary to continue to retain the whole amount heretofore certified as necessary to be retained for such purpose, but that the amount so retained may safely be reduced by the sum of \$1,000, leaving the sum of \$5,000 still to be retained to cover the cost of repairs yet to be made; and

Whereas, The Chief Engineer has likewise certified, under date of February 15, 1889, that the repairs of defective work on Section 8 of the New Aqueduct have so far progressed that it will not be necessary to continue to retain the whole amount heretofore certified as necessary to be retained for such purpose, but that the amount so remaining may safely be reduced by the sum of \$3,000, leaving the sum of \$12,000 still to be retained to cover the cost of repairs yet to be made; and

Whereas, The Chief Engineer has also certified, under the above date, that the repairs of defective work on Section 10B of the New Aqueduct have so far progressed that it will not be necessary to continue to retain the whole amount heretofore certified as necessary to be retained for such purpose, but that the amount so certified may safely be reduced by the sum of \$3,000, leaving the sum of \$12,000 still to be retained to cover the cost of repairs yet to be made on said section; and

Whereas, The Chief Engineer has also certified, under the above date, that the work of repairs on Section 14 of the New Aqueduct have so far progressed that it will not be necessary to continue to retain the sum of \$500, withheld to make good the repairs of defective work on said section; as all the repairs required on said section have been completed; and

Whereas, The Chief Engineer, under date of February 15, 1889, has also certified that the sum of \$13,000 now withheld to cover the cost of repairing defective work on Section 7 of the New Aqueduct, should be increased by the sum of \$5,000, making in all \$18,000 yet to be retained on account of such repairs; therefore,

Resolved, That in the opinion of the Aqueduct Commissioners, it will be safe and proper for the Comptroller to release and pay to the contractors for Sections 5, 8 and 10B of the New Aqueduct, the following sums out of the amounts now retained to cover the cost of repairs of defective work on said sections, namely:

As to Section 5, the sum of \$1,000, leaving \$5,000 yet to be retained to cover the cost of repairs of defective work yet to be made on said section.

As to Section 8, the sum of \$3,000, leaving \$12,000 yet to be retained to cover the cost of repairs yet to be made on said section.

As to Section 10B, the sum of \$3,000, leaving \$12,000 yet to be retained to cover the cost of repairs yet to be made on said section.

Resolved, That, in the opinion of the Aqueduct Commissioners, it will be necessary and proper for the Comptroller to withhold, in addition to the sum of \$13,000 now withheld to make good the repairs of defective work on Section 7 of the New Aqueduct, the further sum of \$5,000, making \$18,000 in all yet to be retained to cover the cost of repairs of defective work yet to be made on said section.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby requested to release the sum of \$500 now withheld for repairs of defective work on Section 14 of the New Aqueduct, as all of the repairs required on said section have been completed.

On motion of Commissioner Howe, the preambles and resolutions were adopted.

The Comptroller, under date of February 16, 1889, gave notice of the issue of warrants for the payment of vouchers not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners:

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, August 2, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 219. In every public hospital and dispensary in the City of New York there shall be provided and maintained a suitable room or rooms and place for the temporary isolation of persons infected with contagious disease, who shall immediately be separated from the other persons and other patients at such dispensary or hospital. It shall be the duty of the physician or physicians, of the officers, managers and of every one in charge of a hospital or dispensary, and of every one who has any duty or office in respect to patients in the course of treatment, or persons who apply for treatment or care at a dispensary or hospital, to see that a report is immediately made to the Health Department of the City of New York of every person infected with a contagious disease who comes to their knowledge, and that such person or persons so infected are properly isolated and kept separate from other persons and other patients.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, January 27, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 18 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 18. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said building or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as, or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.

Each estimate must contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact. That it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same work, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud. That no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation is directly or indirectly interested in the estimate, or in the work to which it relates or in the profits thereof.

Each estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the same, that the several matters therein stated are true, and must be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, to the effect that if the contract is awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall refuse or neglect to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract shall be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.

The consent last above mentioned must be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, or otherwise, and that he has offered himself as surety in good faith, with the intention to execute the bond required by law.

No estimate will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the State or National Banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money, to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Department who has charge of the Estimate-box, and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited and retained by the City of New York as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 AND 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

"The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters. * * * * *

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

BAKERIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath-tub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows: HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water. Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 352 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.

GRANTS OF LANDS UNDER WATER.

THE OWNERS OF LANDS IN THE CITY OF New York, which were formerly under water, and which were granted by the City of New York, are notified that nearly all of the grants of such lands contain covenants, on the part of the grantees, and their successors and assigns, to maintain and keep in repair the adjacent streets. The condition of many of these streets is such as to make it necessary that they should be repaired and repaved, and that the obligation resting upon the present owners of adjacent lots to do this work should now be enforced. Many of such owners have requested that such covenants be commuted, and wholly released, upon the payment by them of a certain sum per lot.

The matter will shortly be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their consideration, and the adjustment of the basis of commutation, and application for releases should therefore be made at once.
