#### REASONS FOR THE PROVISIONAL ESTIMATE, 1893.

Resolved, That the Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 31st day of October, 1892, of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business in the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof and the Board of Education, for the ensuing financial year, to wit: For the year eighteen hundred and ninety-three (1893), be submitted to the Board of Aldermen, with the reasons for it in detail, as required by section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as follows:

#### THE LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The amount appropriated for the Common Council in the Provisional Estimate for 1893 is \$86,800, being an increase of \$10,000 over the Final Estimate for 1892; and as to the amounts and the objects and the purposes specified in the Departmental Estimate for 1893, all of which are allowed as reasonable and necessary, including \$60,000 for salaries of Aldermen at \$2,000 each per annum, the number of Aldermen having been increased by five, pursuant to chapters 397 and 408 of the Laws of 1892, and \$3,000 for the President of the Board, as provided and fixed by law.

#### THE MAYORALTY.

The amount appropriated is \$28,000, being the same amount as asked for in the Departmental Estimate for 1893, and as allowed in the Final Estimate for 1892, for the expenses of the Mayor's Office in 1893, which includes the salary of the Mayor as fixed by law at \$10,000 per annum. For the Mayor's Marshal's Office the sum of \$13,850 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate for 1893, and the sum of \$13,350 allowed as necessary and reasonable in the Provisional Estimate, being an increase of \$350 over the Final Estimate of 1892, which is deemed necessary for the temporary employment of additional Inspectors whenever the present force is inadequate in consequence of recent new laws, especially the law known as "The Street Cleaning Act."

#### THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$300,200 was asked for in the Departmental Estimate, as required for the several objects and purposes therein, and is allowed as reasonable and necessary, including the salary of the Comptroller fixed by law at \$10,000 per annum, and the compensation of the Chamberlain, also provided for by law at \$25,000 per annum, and including the sum of \$40,000 for cleaning markets.

#### INTEREST ON THE CITY DEBT.

In accordance with the statements submitted by the Comptroller with the Departmental Estimates, the amount appropriated for interest becoming due and payable in 1893 on bonds and stocks of the City of New York, exclusive of interest on bonds and stocks in the Sinking Fund made payable therefrom, by chapter 178 of the Laws of 1889, and including interest on bonds of the Towns of Morrisania and West Farms issued prior to their annexation to the City, and also interest on the estimated amount of Revenue Bonds to be issued in 1893, amounting in all to \$4,948,159.78, and included in the Provisional Estimate to be raised by tax in 1893.

#### THE REDEMPTION OF THE CITY DEBT.

The sum of \$80,480.70 is included in the Provisional Estimate; and also the sum of \$18,000 for the redemption of the debt of the Towns of Morrisania and West Farms, which become due in 1893, and also the sum of \$1,204,287.43, pursuant to article 8, section 11 of the State Constitution as amended in 1884, requiring installments to be raised by tax, annually, for the redemption at maturity of bonds issued after December 31 of that year, for the supply of water.

Stocks amounting to the sum of \$14,500 become due in 1893, for which no appropriation is included in the Provisional Estimate, as the amount has been provided for by installments and will be paid from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, pursuant to the provisions of section 192 of the Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by section 178 of the Laws of 1889.

#### THE STATE TAXES.

The State Taxes to be raised in 1893 amount to \$3,541,956.10, which is more by \$1,155,966.76 than the amount allowed for 1892, to which is added \$12,502.23 for compensation and expenses of the Shore Inspector as provided by law.

The sum of \$127,050 is appropriated for rents of premises leased to the City for various departments, public offices, court-rooms, etc., other than armories and drill-rooms.

For rents of armories and drill-rooms for the National Guard not provided with quarters belonging to the City the sum of \$39,050 is allowed, and the amount appropriated for wages of Armorers, Janitors, Engineers and Laborers, required for military organizations, is \$49,640.

For the payment of judgments against the City that have been or may be obtained, and not otherwise provided for, the sum of \$125,000 is included in the Provisional Estimate of 1893, and is deemed to be required and necessary for this purpose.

As provided by chapter 57, Laws of 1879, the sum of \$15,000 is appropriated for the Seventh Regiment New Armory Fund, and \$6,000 for the necessary expenses of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and of real estate belonging to the City.

#### LAW DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$202,000 is appropriated for the necessary expenses of the Law Department and offices connected therewith as bureaus, including the amount of salaries fixed by law of the Counsel to the Corporation, the Corporation Attorney, the Public Administrator, and the Attorney for the Collection of Arears of Personal Taxes, a reduction of \$1,200 being made from the amount of the Departmental Estimate.

#### THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

The sum of \$3,013,670 is appropriated for all objects and purposes, being \$102,875 less than the Departmental Estimate, and \$135,100 less than the Final Estimate for 1892, reductions being made of various items not deemed necessary.

#### THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

The sum of \$1,028,500 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes, which is less than the Departmental Estimate by \$303,018.75, and \$25,350 more than the Final Estimate for 1892.

THE DEPARTMENT OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS, TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS.

The sum of \$349,972 is appropriated for all the purposes and objects of this Department, being \$207,900 less the Departmental Estimate for 1893, and \$39,772 more than the Final Estimate for 1892.

#### THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES AND CORRECTION.

The sum of \$2,196,525 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all purposes and objects, being \$453,015 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1893, and \$26,400 more than the Final Estimate for 1892.

#### THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$432,036 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all the purposes and objects of this Department, reductions amounting to \$7,800 being made in the various items of the Departmental Estimate, and also less than the Final Estimate for 1892 by \$3,102.

#### THE POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$5,234,886.04 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all purposes and objects, being \$131,646.01 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1893, and \$189,417.73 more than the Final Estimate for 1892, owing to an increase in the number of Patrolmen for the year 1893.

#### THE DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

The sum of \$2,190,089.49 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for the purposes and objects, being \$379,163.51 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1893, and \$211,549.49 more than the Final Estimate of 1892. By chapter 269 of the Laws of 1892, the sum of \$187,815.35 was appropriated from Revenue Bonds and applied to the appropriation for 1892 for six months of the year, the amount being \$1,978,540 in the Final Estimate for 1892, making a total for 1892 of \$2,166,355.35.

#### THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The sum of \$2,154,913.50 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes, leaving \$413.562.50 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1893, and \$146,368.50 less than the appropriation for 1892, on account of the establishment of the Department of Buildings under the Laws of 1892, being one of the bureaus of the Fire Department previously.

#### THE DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

The sum of \$192,690 is appropriated for the uses and purposes, being \$59,680 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1893, for this new department.

#### THE DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

The sum of \$119,820 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for the expenses of this Department, being the same amount as asked for in the Departmental Estimate for 1893, and \$700 less than was appropriated in the Final Estimate for 1892.

#### THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The sum of \$4,448,355.64 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all objects and purposes, excepting the purchase of school sites and the erection of school buildings which are provided for by the issue of bonds, the amount of the appropriation being \$445,009.98 less than the Departmental Estimate, and the same as allowed in the Final Estimate of 1892.

#### THE COLLEGE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The sum of \$148,000 is appropriated for the expenses of this institution, being \$2,000 less than the Departmental Estimate, and the same as the Final Estimate of 1892.

#### THE NORMAL COLLEGE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The sum of \$125,000 is appropriated for the expenses of this institution, being the amount of the Departmental Estimate for 1893 and the Final Estimate for 1892.

#### PRINTING, STATIONERY AND BLANK BOOKS.

The sum of \$268,000 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for these objects and purposes, including the publication of the CITY RECORD, etc., a special appropriation being made for advertising miscellaneous items, and which amount is the same asked for in the Departmental Estimate for 1893 and \$11,800 more than the Final Estimate of 1892.

#### MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINING BOARD.

The sum of \$25,000 is appropriated for all the expenses of this Board, being the amount of the Departmental Estimate and the same as the appropriation for 1892.

The sum of \$54,700 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all the purposes and objects of the Coroners, being the amount of the Departmental Estimate and the same as the appropriation for 1892.

THE COMMISSIONERS OF ACCOUNTS. The sum of \$32,500 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient, being \$2,500 less than the Departmental Estimate and the same as the amount appropriated for 1892.

## THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE.

The sum of \$120,378.66 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all purposes and objects, being \$1,833.34 less than the Departmental Estimate and \$146.66 more than the appropriation of 1892. THE REGISTER'S OFFICE.

The sum of \$130,000 is appropriated as necessary and sufficient for all purposes and objects, being the same as the Departmental Estimate and \$250 less than the appropriation for 1892.



The 631 deaths represent a death-rate of 17.81, against 18.78 for the previous week and 22.65 for the corresponding week of 1891.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria; measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 82, 32, 55, 29 and 19, against 46, 40, 64, 51 and 3 for the previous week, a total of 217 against 204. Diphtheria increased in the First, Sixth, Eighth, Tenth, Eleventh, Thirteenth, Fifteenth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Nineteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-second, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, the increase being especially marked in the Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards. Measles increased in the Sixth, Seventh, Thirteenth, Fifteenth, Seventeenth and Twenty-third Wards, the decrease being especially noticeable in the Nineteenth Ward. There was an increase of scarlet fever in the Seventh, Thirteenth, Fifteenth, Sixteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first and Twenty-third Wards, with a marked decrease in the Seventeenth and Twenty-second Wards. Of the 29 cases of typhoid fever 15 were below Fourteenth street and 8 were above Fortieth street; 11 of the 19 cases of small-pox were below Fourteenth street, and 6 were in the northern part of the annexed district.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: A TTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are torever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereatter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repayed or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repayed or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the payement, repayement or repairs. pavement, repavement or repairs.
