

Notable Fires.

April 16.-11.24 P.M. Nos. 583, 585 and 587 Hudson street, running through to Greenwich street. A six-story brick building, 75 by 200 feet, occupied for manufacturing purposes. The fire originated on the second floor and extended by light shaft and elevator openings throughout the entire building, which was destroyed. It also extended to No. 591 Hudson street, a five-story brick building, 25 by 200 feet, occupied as a storage warehouse, which was destroyed, to No. 593 Hudson street, a five-story brick building, 25 by 200 feet, occupied as a storage warehouse, which was considerably damaged, and to Nos. 584 and 586 Hudson street, a five-story brick building, 50 by 100 feet, occupied as a printing establishment, to No. 90 Bank street, a five-story brick building, 25 by 80 feet, occupied as a butcher shop and dwelling, to No. 92 Bank street, a three-story brick building, 20 by 40 feet, occupied as a dwelling, to No. 94 Bank street, a three-story brick building, 20 by 40 feet, occupied as a dwelling, to No. 778 Greenwich street, a five-story brick building, 25 by 60 feet, occupied as a dwelling, and to No. 781 Greenwich street, a three-story brick building, 20 by 40 feet, occupied as a dwelling, which were slightly damaged, the last named by falling walls. The services of twenty-six engine, seven hook and ladder companies and one water-tower were required, and the fire was under control in about four hours. The engines connected to hydrants on the 6-inch mains could not obtain a proper supply of water. Owing to the inflammable nature of the contents of the buildings the fire extended very rapidly and several members of the Department received injuries in

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various ways, but none seriously. Many lengths of hose were destroyed by falling walls, several ladders were damaged, and a number of pipes, nozzles, axes, hooks, roof-ropes and other implements were destroyed or damaged. The cause was not ascertained, and the estimated loss was \$374,925.

May 10.-3.45 P. M. Nos. 126 to 130 Franklin street, Nos. 108 to 114 West Broadway and Nos. 2 to 8 Varick street. A nine-story brick building, 70 feet on West Broadway, 90 feet on Franklin street, 85 feet on Varick street, about 100 feet deep and 115 feet in height, occupied as a wholesale grocery house. The fire originated on the ninth floor and was confined to that floor, slightly damaging the building. It required the services of twenty-five engine, six hook and ladder companies, two water-towers, and was under control in about four hours. During the progress of the fire a portion of the east wall of the upper story fell outward, striking the west track of the Elevated Railroad, doing considerable damage to that structure. The cause was not ascertained, and the estimated loss was \$206,000.

May 11.—9.29 P. M. Foot of Forty-fifth street, East river. A five-story brick building, 50 by 100 feet, occupied as a fertilizer manufactory in connection with a wholesale butchering establishment. The fire originated on the third floor and extended throughout the building, considerably damaging it. On the arrival of the force the fire had complete control of the entire building, there evidently having been great delay in sending the alarm. The fire required the services of twelve engine and four hook and ladder companies, two fire-boats, and was under control in about two and one-half hours. It was caused by heat from drying machine setting fire to dust of fertilizer. The estimated loss was \$57,750.

June 27.—2.06 A. M. Nos. 1514 to 1528 Broadway, extending from Forty-fourth to Forty-fifth street. A four-story brick building, 100 by 200 feet, occupied by the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G., S. N. Y., as an armory. The fire originated on the second floor and extended by stairway and furred recesses to the roof, considerably damaging the building. It required the services of seventeen engine and five hook and ladder companies, and was under control in about two and one-half hours. Engines connected to 6-inch mains failed to obtain a proper supply of water. It was caused by rats gnawing matches, and the loss was estimated at \$51,800.


