By a concurrent vote of the three officers, the Supervisor was instructed to procure by direct order, that is, without contract let after advertisement, the articles called for by the requisitions allowed, that course being deemed to be for the best interests of the City.

The Supervisor of the CITY RECORD recommended that a request made by the Commissioner of Street Improvements on October 27, for authority to advertise twice a week for three successive weeks in two daily newspapers, a notice of a hearing respecting a contemplated change of plan, etc., of Decatur avenue, etc., should be granted. On motion of the Mayor, and by a concurrent vote of the three officers, the authority was granted, and the "Daily America" and "The Sun" were designated as the newspapers in which the publication should be made.

GENTLEMEN -My contract for printing and publishing the CITY RECORD expires at the close of the year, and I hereby propose to continue its printing and publication for the year 1894 upon the same terms and conditions as my contract for the year 1893.

On motion of the Mayor the communication was referred to the Supervisor of the City Record, with instructions to report at the next meeting.

The Supervisor of the City Record reported that he had received requisitions for books for 1894 from all the departments, and had almost finished the preparation of specifications for contracting. He said he had sent out his call in August for the requisitions to be in by October 1, hoping to be able to prepare the specifications and let the contracts by November 1, so that the contractors would have two months in which to make the books needed on January 2. Most of the departments failed to respond in time, and one of them sent in a requisition so much out of proportion to requisitions in past years that it was returned for amendment, which further delayed work in the City Record office. The Supervisor added that there were certain books needed by January 2 which ought to season for at least three weeks before being put into use, and that it was impossible to make and press them properly between the time at which they could be contracted for and the time they would be needed.

The Mayor said his experience had taught him that books should not be made hurriedly. He moved that the Supervisor be instructed to present at the next meeting a list of the most important books needed by the departments on January 2. The motion was adopted by a concurrent

A TTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT A TTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, requirthe same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and che expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage, on the line of the propade improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns.

shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are torever released from all obligation under the grant in caspect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in ront of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairing, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
