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### APPROVED PAPERS.

FOR WEEK ENDING OCTOBER 22, 1904.

No. 587.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Robert Walton Goelet to erect, maintain, construct and extend a vault as shown upon the accompanying diagram, beyond the curb line and under the carriageway in front of his premises Nos. 114, 116 and 118 West Thirty-ninth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, provided that said Robert Walton Goelet shall stipulate with the President of the Borough of Manhattan to save The City of New York free and harmless from any loss or damage that may be occasioned during the progress or subsequent to the completion of the work of constructing said vault. The work of constructing the said vault to be done at the expense of said Robert Walton Goelet in a manner approved by and under the direction and to the satisfaction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, and the permission hereby granted shall continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen.

And provided further that the said Robert Walton Goelet shall pay to The City of New York, as compensation for the privilege hereby granted, such amount as may be deemed an equivalent therefor by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the payment or payments on said amount to be by the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment determined. And in case of any default being made at any time in making any payment fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the license herein provided for shall cease and determine, without any action on the part of the Board of Aldermen, at the expiration of ninety days after such default.

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment July 15, 1904:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the selection by the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York as an additional site for college purposes, bounded and described as follows:

"Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the southerly line of One Hundred and Fortieth street with the easterly line of Amsterdam avenue, running thence easterly along the southerly line of One Hundred and Fortieth street 100 feet to land now owned by The City of New York; thence southerly and parallel with Amsterdam avenue 199.83 feet to the northerly line of One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street; thence westerly along the northerly line of One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street 100 feet to the easterly line of Amsterdam avenue and thence northerly along the easterly line of Amsterdam avenue 199.83 feet to the point or place of beginning.

"Assessed valuation of the above-described premises as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments is \$165,000.

—and the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is authorized to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of all of the parcels of land within the area of the above described premises.

"Nothing in this resolution contained shall be construed as preventing the Comptroller of The City of New York from entering into contracts for the acquisition of any portion of the above described property at private sale subject to the approval of this Board."

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of fourteen thousand four hundred and seventy-one dollars and seventy-five cents (\$14,471.75) to provide means for the purpose of permanently bettering the Queens County Court-house, Long Island City, Borough of Queens.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 7, 1904, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding fourteen thousand four hundred and seventy-one dollars and seventy-five cents (\$14,471.75), to provide means for the purpose of permanently bettering the Queens County Court-house, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding fourteen thousand four hundred and seventy-one dollars and seventy-five cents (\$14,471.75), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

Nor shall any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, superintendent, manager, engineer, fireman, or any other person, cause, suffer or allow smoke, cinders, dust, gas, steam or offensive or noisome odors to escape or be discharged from any such building, locomotive engine, place or premises, or from any restaurant, hotel, apartment house or other building, place or premises where furnaces are maintained or employed in the working of engines, to the detriment or annoyance of any person or persons not being therein or thereupon engaged, or so that the same shall enter any building, public street or avenue of The City of New York, or pollute the air therein; and every furnace employed in the working of engines shall be so constructed as to consume or burn the smoke arising therein or therefrom."

—which was laid upon the table for one week.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
