BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1911 New York, January 1, 1912.

Hon, WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor:
Sir—In behalf of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, I have the honor to present the following report for the closing quarter of the year

The Department as a Whole.

After extensive study of the needs of the Department and a careful investigation as to which of these should be undertaken first, the Trustees have resolved to approve of the following requests for corporate stock for the year beginning July 1, 1912: Pavilions F and G, new Bellevue Hospital, \$1,250,000; enclosing ends of balconies, Pavilions A and B, to correspond with the new pavilions, \$8,500; purchase of site on 29th st. for new power plant, \$100,000; power plant, new Bellevue Hospital, \$150,000; enlargement of Bellevue Training School, \$200,000; site for school for Hospital Attendants, \$100,000; cost of building school for Hospital Attendants, \$200,000; additional funds required to complete new Out-Patient Department, Nurses' residence, boiler house, etc., Gouverneur Hospital (\$200,000 now available), \$150,000; alterations and addition to present Harlem Hospital, \$45,000; additional story on power and ambulance station, Harlem Hospital, to accommodate more employees, \$75,000; enlargement of Fordham Hospital, \$260,000; enlargement of employees' quarters, Fordham Hospital, \$125,000; enlargement of Nurses' residence, Fordham Hospital, \$90,000. Total, \$2,753,500.

Some disagreements which arose between the Board of Trustees and the various architects employed on contracts at the present time are in a fair way to being satisfactorily settled. These disagreements arose from the fact that the rate allowed by the American Institute of Architects differed, apparently, from that authorized by the City Law Department in certain cases. The preliminary contracts with the architects had been made for the rate, namely, 6 per cent., allowed by the American Institute of Architects, but the Trustees finding that 5 per cent. had been exacted in other work for the City, insisted upon a modification of the agreements in this sense. After conference and consultation with the Law Department of the City, the architects in question have agreed to accept the lower percentage.

After a transfer of \$5,750 within the appropriations had been effected, it is found that the sum of \$29,000 will still be required to meet the deficit in appropriations for the present year. This is in addition to the amount of \$5,000 already voted by the Board of Aldermen. It was found necessary at the end of November to advertise for fresh meats and vegetables for the balance of the year. In adopting specifications for bids upon supplies for the coming year the standards adopted by

the Committee on Standardization of Supplies were accepted. In view of the active building operations that will soon be under way at the several hospitals, and for the purpose of enabling the Superintendent to visit these hospitals without announcing his visit beforehand, the Trustees have requested anew that an automobile be provided for the Department.

Permission having been received from the Board of Aldermen, the General Medical Superintendent has arranged for the purchase of an electric truck in the open market at a cost not to exceed \$4,000.

An improvement affecting the arrangement for paying employees who are discharged or resign during the interval between pay days has been effected by the Department of Finance On presentation of an order properly signed, it has been arranged for them to receive their money. It is expected that this will prevent the

practice of employees assigning their claim for a consideration.

It has been arranged for Dr. S. S. Goldwater, Expert on Hospital Construction, to resume his position on the first of January, 1912, in order to be able to assist with his advice in the preparation of plans for all the new construction work now under contemplation.

The owner of the present residence of the General Medical Superintendent has made a request that the house be vacated. While the lease does not expire until October, 1912, in view of the fact that work will be going on in the adjacent house, it is desirable that this be done. The Trustees have accordingly instructed the General Medical Superintendent to seek at once for a suitable house or apartment for his occupancy until another residence can be obtained.

BELLEVUE HOSPITAL Pathological Laboratory.

The claim of Blake & Williams of \$1,050 for maintaining heat in the Pathological Building last winter, the responsibility for which was assumed by the P. J. Carlin Construction Company, contractors, remains unsettled, and in view of the fact that the Carlin Company now attaches conditions to the acceptance of the claim, the whole correspondence has been referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to what action should be taken by the Trustees to enforce payment of the claim.

New Laundry Building. The contract of the John H. Parker Company for the new laundry building was completed on September 30, and the payment of the final bill has been authorized by the Trustees. The offer of the Parker Company to allow \$900 for the omission of motor connections in the building was accepted on recommendation of the architects, good reasons being supplied why the connections could not be made at the present time. Plans and specifications for the installation of lighting fixtures in the new building have been received and referred to the Board of Estimate and

Apportionment for their approval. Corporate stock, in amount of \$12,000, has been issued to provide additional means for the installation of machinery in the new building. Two companies, the American Laundry Machinery Company and the Troy Laundry Machinery Company, put in estimates for this machinery, the first amounting to \$61,197, and the second to \$65,243, both to include removing the old machinery and the work of setting up the new. After consideration of a protest made by the Troy Laundry Machinery Company concerning the drawing up of the specifications, it was resolved to accept the lower bid, that of the American Laundry Machinery Company, and a contract was accordingly executed with them.

Pavilions I and K.

Authority has been given to advertise for bids for the construction of Pavilions I and K, the plans and specifications for these pavilions having received the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Proposed New Power Plant.

Property on the block north of the present Bellevue tract, namely, that between 29th and 30th sts., bounded by 1st ave. and the East River, having been offered the Trustees by a real estate concern, action was taken urging consideration by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the acquisition of a plot for the purpose of erecting an electric generating plant. The Trustees have been convinced from the beginning of the desirability of such a plant from the point of view of the economical supply of electricity for the Hospital, and they believe that the property in ques-

tion would afford an ideal site for this purpose. In acknowledging receipt of the communication the Board of Estimate suggested deferring the question until it could be taken up in connection with the Corporate Stock Budget for the coming Other Building Matters. Plans and specifications for the proposed roof wards on Pavilions A and B, the

estimated cost of which is \$32,000, have been received from the architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead and White. On motion of Mr. Farley, the Chairman of the Building Committee, they were returned to the architects with the request to provide a covering for the entire roof and not merely at the ends, as provided for in the plans submitted.

The plans and specifications for additional balconies on Pavilions A and B, the estimated cost of which is \$17,500, have been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. It is proposed to expend \$7,968 to enclose the ends of the balconies on Pavilions A and B to make them conform with the construction of the balconies on the new pavilions. Arrangements will be made for this in the Corporate Stock Budget.

Final payment has been made to the Namon Gewertz Company on the completion of their contract for altering Ward 31 into isolation quarters.

Fire Protection. Reference was made in the last quarterly report of the Trustees to the fact that the Fire Commissioner was undertaking, at the request of the Trustees, an investigation of fire conditions in the old buildings of Bellevue Hospital. A report of this investigation was received early in October from the Fire Commissioner. All the minor recommendations contained in this report were referred to the General Medical Superintendent to carry out without delay. The other changes recommended, involving as they did very considerable and extensive reconstruction, were referred to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a report by their engineers as to the best action possible for the Trustees in the premises. Word was received in due time from Messrs. Nelson P. Lewis, Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate, and Rudolph P. Miller, Superintendent of Buildings for the Borough of Manhattan, to whom the matter had been reported by the Board of Estimate for report. They advised the Trustees that in view of the approaching demolition of these buildings, it would be inadvisable to carry out the far-reaching structural changes recommended by the Fire Commissioner in his report. In acknowledging the receipt of the communication the Trustees expressed their desire to comply with all the suggestions made by the Fire Commissioner, provided that the money would be supplied by the Board of Estimate. The Board of Estimate, however, was unwilling to approve the more radical of these suggestions and denied authority to make the changes in the old buildings recommended by the Fire Department.

The H. C. Vogel Company, contractors for the installation of the sprinkler system in the Hospital, have been accorded an extension of 30 days on their contract on account of delays occasioned by their desire to proceed with as little noise and in-

convenience to the patients as possible.

The Medical and Nursing Service. The plan referred to in the last quarter's report to divide the children's service between the First and Fourth Medical Divisions, was rejected by the Board of Trustees, it being deemed to the better interests of the Hospital and the patients to leave the service substantially as it is. It was, however, suggested to the Medical Board that the following changes in the conduct of the service might, if approved by them, be made: First, that the internes of all four divisions of the Hospital be admitted to the children's wards in order that they may receive instruction in the care and treatment of the children, the same as the internes of the First Division now receive; second, that the patients in the children's wards who may be found to require surgical treatement be referred to each of the surgical divisions in rotation, instead of to the First Division alone, as is now the practice.

A rule has been adopted restricting the leave of absence to physicians working on salary in the Out-Patient Department to once a month. As these physicians are expected to attend their clinics in the Out-Patient Department on an average of 12 days in each month, more than one absence hereafter will be attended by a corresponding

deduction in the salary.

A protest has been received from the Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Social Service Bureau against the payment of \$800 to Nurses who are to live outside, instead of \$900 as previously allowed. Consideration of the matter was post-poned until such time as the Budget for 1913 should be under preparation, and the Executive Committee was informed that the recent ruling of the Municipal Civil Service Commission flxing \$180 as the limit for a position without maintenance over that of the same position with maintenance, was the Trustees' reason for stating the

lower amount of salary.

The resignation of Dr. Ernest S. Bishop as Resident Physician in the alcoholic wards was accepted by the Trustees early in November, Dr. Bishop retiring to find a much-needed rest after his self-sacrificing service in these most diffcult wards. Dr. Gregory, the head of the Alcoholic and Psychopathic Service, later submitted to the Trustees a plan for the improvement of this service, which has now been adopted, and which is expected to provide a very material improvement in the treatment and management of the difficult class of patients who come to these wards for treatment. The principal points of this reform are as follows: First, that the structural changes now under way in Ward 34 be completed as soon as possible; second, that suitable provision be made for the care of the critically ill and delirious patients in Ward 30 by providing for these patients, and for those in Ward 6, in some other part of the Hospital; third, that a clerk be provided, whose duty it shall be to keep the records and do such other work as may be assigned to him by the physician in charge; fourth, that two additional internes be provided for this service, to serve for a period of six months; fifth, that an additional salaried assistant be allowed at the rate of \$600 per year; sixth, that a request be made of the Board of Magistrates, or the Chief Magistrate, to have one of their Board visit the prison wards at stated periods and dispose of such cases as may be submitted for their consideration; seventh, that action be deferred in the matter of excluding so-called "rounders," pending further report from Dr. Gregory.

Miscellaneous. Word was received from the Municipal Civil Service Commission in September that they had acceded to the request of the Trustees to classing the position of Employment Agent,, at \$900 per year, as non-competitive. The reason of the Trustees for making this request was that the individual selected might have the necessary character and experience to undertake social welfare work among the em-In accordance with this plan, Mr. Arthur Yergin, who has had considerable experience in similar work in the Y. M. C. A., was appointed to the position, this appointment to take effect at the beginning of the year.

appointed Visiting Dentists. GOUVERNEUR HOSPITAL

The matter of a new site for the out-patient and other departments of the Hospital is still under advisement and consultation with the City's financial authorities. The needs that would have to be provided for are: A new Out-Patient Department Nurses' home, boiler plant and quarters for employees. Whether these purposes can all be provided for in a single building is problematical, and as yet undetermined. Acting upon the advice of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Trustees has requested that the sum of \$50,000 be transferred from an unexpended balance in the appropriation for Pavilions L and M, Bellevue Hospital, to a new fund to be established for the purchase of a site at Gouverneur. The Medical Board has appointed a committee to confer with the Trustees in planning for the needs of the. new Out-Patient Department.

To meet the temporary needs of the new nurses, the houses at 199-201 Monroe st., in the neighborhood of the Hospital, have been leased as a temporary home. In seeking new nurses to take the places of those formerly submitted by the Department of Public Charities, nurses with a knowledge of foreign languages will be given

It has been found necessary to alter the mooring of the ferryboat "Westfield," used as a tuberculosis day camp. An investigation of the condition of the boat has been undertaken with a view to determining how far it may be wise to expend any further money upon its equipment.

The Anderson-Martin Electric Company, having in charge the contract for the reconstruction of the lighting system at Gouverneur, have requested an extension of three weeks' time on their contract because of the destruction by fire of completed fixtures in the workshop of a subcontractor. The facts having been found to be as represented by the company, the extension of time was allowed.

Permission has been accorded Dr. I. H. Alexander to give a post-graduate

course in the Hospital, to physicians in his ear, nose and throat clinic. It is understood that Dr. Alexander received no compensation for this course.

The tentative plans for the extension of Harlem Hospital were approved by the hospital's medical board, at its meeting in October. The preliminary plans and specifications were submitted by Mr. Freedlander, the architect, at this time, and later received the approval of the Municipal Art Commission. Dr. Goldwater, when he assumes his position as Hospital Expert in the Department on January 1, will give his first attention to these plans.

Plans and specifications for the new Nurses' residence, in connection with this hospital, have been received from Mr. Almirall and approved by the trustees, subject

to certain amendments.

The Phillips Manufacturing Company, having the contract for the installation of a fire alarm system in the hospital, requested an extension of time on their contract, alleging that the contractors who are furnishing the gongs had been so rushed with work that they had not yet completed the equipment. The trustees were not satisfied with the reason given and refused the request accordingly.

The Department Estimate for 1912 has been amended by the insertion of an item \$12,000 to meet the cost of rewiring Harlem and Fordham Hospitals.

The erection of a fence to enclose the grass plot in front of the hospital has been arranged for, the cost not to exceed \$1,000.

A request by the Medical Board that provision be made in the Budget for the payment of salaries to some of the physicians employed in the Out-Patient Department has been refused for the present, the Budget having been adopted for the coming year. The trustees feel also that it should be possible to find physicians who are willing to give gratuitous service in these positions.

FORDHAM HOSPITAL.

The Bendetto & Eagan Construction Company, in charge of the work of enclosing and enlarging the balconies at Fordham, were granted an extension of time upon their contract for the reason that they were prevented by the hospital authorities beginning work on balconies of both wings of the hospital at the same time. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plus in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Bepartment of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a cartificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the

work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurteranure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned. The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless, The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suite and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting shall be made permanently self-supporting, beamholes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and
made to exclude wind and rain and present a
clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and
made watertight where they have been disturbed
by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name

and place of residence of the person making the him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as conbecome interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the mat-ters set forth in the blank forms mentioned be-

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.
