Commissioner of Correction—Letter of Appreciation with Respect to Resolution of Board of Aldermen Directing Attention to Inequalities in Salaries.

Department of Correction of The City of New York, Commissioner's Office, Municipal Building, Centre and Chambers Streets, New York, January 8, 1917.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Dear Sir—In reply to the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted by the Board on January 1, 1917, referring to inequalities in compensation and extravagances which should be eliminated, I wish to say that I appreciate the action of the Board of Aldermen in approving many of the salary increases which were adopted by the Board of Estimate in order to wipe out inequalities in compensation of this department, and also the action of the Mayor in vetoing three eliminations of increases, which unfortunately got mixed up with the educational and other new positions and increases around which the real differences were centered. The employees of this department are paid small salaries and I wish to assure you that in my judgment there are no extravagances in compensation within the department. Very respectfully,

Commissioner of Correction—Request for Authority to Draw on Account of Certain Contingencies.

Department of Correction of The City of New York, Commissioner's Office, Municipal Building, Centre and Chambers Streets, New York, January 8, 1917.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Dear Sir—I hereby respectfully request permission to draw upon the Comptroller by requisition a sum not exceeding Seventeen hundred dollars (\$1,700), and in like manner renew the draft as often as may be necessary to the extent of the appropriations set apart for the Department of Correction in the 1917 Budget. Code No. 2656, Office Supplies, Code No. 2673, Expressage and Deliveries, and Code No. 2678, Donations to Discharged Prisoners, but no renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall have been accounted for to the Comptroller by voucher or vouchers certified by the Commissioner covering the expenditure of the money paid thereon.

It is proposed to utilize this money for payments of such character that it is impossible to issue Open Market Orders to cover, viz.: Code 2656, Office Supplies. This money is to be used for the purchase of postage stamps. Code 2673, Expressage and Deliveries. The money from this account is to pay expressage charges on goods shipped between New Hampton and New York, and is necessary as the Wells Fargo Expressage Company has refused to grant us credit, and insists on payment of all bills on or before the tenth of the ensuing month.

In Code 2678, Donations to Discharged Prisoners, it is necessary to have cash on hand in order to carry out the provisions of section 324, chapter 12 of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York in relation to donations to discharged prisoners. Respectfully,

President, Borough of Richmond—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$9,264, to Pay Wages of Employees in Bureau of Street Cleaning.

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Richmond.

Bureau of Street Cleaning, Borough Hall, New Brighton, New York City, January 10th, 1917.

Board of Aldermen, Municipal Building, New York:

Dear Sirs—The attention of your Board is respectfully directed to the discontent among the employees of our Bureau of Street Cleaning because they are unable to meet the increased cost of living with their meager wages. Many of the more dissatisfied employees, who were our oldest and best men, have left, to take positions elsewhere at higher pay, and as better wages are easily obtained outside the City service, other employees are threatening to leave.

It is very important that Street Cleaning work be carried on without interruption and with the utmost regularity, and how to do so is a very serious problem, in view of our inability to hold the men.

We desire to remedy this situation by raising the wages of our poorer paid men, commencing January 1st, 1917, and for this purpose \$9,264 is required. Your Board is therefore respectfully requested to authorize the issuance of special revenue bonds in the amount named, \$9,264, to be used as follows:

\$6,048 00 for increasing the wages of 126 sweepers from \$744 to \$792 per annum.
2,400 00 for increasing the wages of 50 drivers from \$792 to \$840 per annum.
288 00 for increasing the wages of 4 drivers from \$768 to \$840 per annum.
\$28 00 for increasing the wages of 11 hostlers from \$792 to \$840 per annum.

Board of Education—Request for Special Revenue Bonds and Authority to Draw on Account of Contingent Expenses.

Board of Education, Park Avenue and 59th Street, New York, January 11, 1917.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith certified copies of reports and resolutions adopted by the Board of Education at a meeting held on January 10, 1917, as summarized below:

1. Requesting the Board of Aldermen to adopt a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$4,000, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Revised Charter, for the purpose of providing means to defray the expense, in part, of erecting a four-room portable building on Mermaid avenue, near West 32d street, Borough of Brooklyn.

2. Requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen to extend from December 31, 1916, to March 31, 1917, the time for which obligations may be contracted for against the issue of Special Revenue Bonds, in the sum of \$2,500, for the purpose of defraying the cost of the removal of the portable building now in the rear of Public School 48, The Bronx, and the re-erection of the same on a site to be leased at Clason Point, The Bronx.

3. Requesting the Board of Aldermen to authorize the Comptroller to advance moneys from the Special School Fund for the year 1917 to be accounted for by vouchers to be subsequently submitted for approval, as follows:

(a) \$500 to be used for petty cash expenses of the principal of the Manhattan Trade School for Girls.

(b) \$100 to be used for petty cash expenses of the Bureau of Attendance.

(c) \$670 to be used for paying the car fares of pupils attending the Elementary and Trade School for the Deaf, Manhattan.

(d) \$700 to be used for paying the car fares of the pupils attending classes for the blind and the guides who accompany them to and from school.

(e) \$1,000 to be used for petty cash expenses of the Board of Education.

If your honorable board will grant this request it will greatly facilitate the work at New Hampton; will result in cheaper prices and save the cost of advertising.

Sir—In pursuance of the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, application is hereby made for the adoption of a resolution authorizing and empowering the Commissioner of Parks, for the Borough of The Bronx, to purchase in the open market, the several parts required to make the necessary repairs to its Auto Lawn, Horse and Hand Lawn Mowers, during the year 1917, at a cost not to exceed fifteen hundred and forty-seven dollars (\$1,547).

To and including the year 1915, contracts were advertised and awarded for repairing lawn mowers used by this department. These contracts included the parts and labor necessary to make all repairs.

In 1916 a contract was advertised for the repairing of the lawn mowers under the jurisdiction of this department, but no bids were received.

It was therefore necessary to issue open market orders from time to time for the repairing of the lawn mowers. These orders were issued for parts and labor. This is not considered a very satisfactory manner of making these repairs, and the amounts mentioned above for the purchase of parts were allowed in the budget.

It is impossible to make a contract for the purchase of the parts, inasmuch as the various parts to be replaced are not known until such time as a number of machines are taken apart.

This department has the following lawn mowers: 6 auto lawn mowers, 58 horse lawn mowers, 136 hand lawn mowers, 18 putting green mowers.

On December 22, 1916, your Board approved a rate of \$2,990 for the Janitor of Public School 81, Queens, to take effect November 16, 1916. An Ordinance to Amend Section 601 of Article 29 of Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances Relating to Shut-off Valves.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 601 of article 29 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances relating to shut-off valves.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 601 of article 29 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances relating to shut-off valves is hereby amended to read as follows:

§601. Shut-off valves.

Every building hereafter erected and also every existing building [other than residence buildings occupied exclusively by 1 or 2 families and having not more than 15 sleeping rooms,] which may be supplied from some outside source with gas, vapor or fluid, shall have a conveniently accessible inverted stop-cock or other suitable device fixed to the supply pipes leading into the building at a place outside of the building, so arranged as to allow the supply to be shut off. Such stop-cock or other device shall be so marked as to indicate either the contents and purpose of the supply pipe to which it is attached, or the company to which the device belongs.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Sirs—Under date of November 14, 1916, I requested your Honorable Board to co-operate with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the purpose of enabling the various departments of the city government to escape as much as possible of the hardship due to the then extraordinary condition of the coal market and the high price of coal. Thereupon you followed the action of the Board of Estimate in waiving the standard specifications governing coal purchases by the adoption of a resolution empowering the city departments to purchase coal in amounts aggregating more than \$1,000 by open market order instead of by contracts. The action of the Board of Estimate and your action was limited, however, in accordance with my request, to purchases by departments to meet their needs during the remainder of the year 1916.

I now request of your Honorable Board the extension of your resolution so as to make it applicable to purchases of coal by the various city departments and borough presidents for the supply of their respective needs up to April 30, 1917. This request is occasioned by the fact that the condition of the coal market, after a temporary improvement, is now substantially the same as it was at the time of my first request. This was shown at a recent opening of bids submitted to the Central Purchase Committee for coal to be supplied during the first quarter of 1917, when it was found that the best price bid was about twice the normal price.

Realizing that situation, the Board of Estimate, at its meeting of December 28, 1916, waived the specifications as to such purchases of coal as may be required by the city up to April 30, 1917. I urge upon your Honorable Board the pressing need for your co-operation in supplementing the action of the Board of Estimate by the action which I have indicated to be applicable also to coal purchased to meet requirements up to April 30, 1917.

If your Honorable Board will take the action recommended, it will not follow necessarily that all purchases of coal within the period mentioned will be made in the open market. The attempt will be made, so far as possible, to make purchases by contract. It is only when proposed contract prices are found to be prohibitive that the authority asked of your Honorable Board will be exercised. When exercised, it will, of course, be fairly used, and purchases in the open market will be made only after competition. That course I shall prescribe for the Central Purchase Committee and for the other departments directly subject to my jurisdiction, and I have no doubt that the borough presidents will do likewise as to their offices. Gentlemen—Application is hereby made for permission to expend the following sums for urgent repairs to buildings in the New York City Home District, B. I. Kings County Hospital, and the Brooklyn Home for the Aged and Infirm, without public letting:

N. Y. City Home for Aged and Infirm, B. I. \$14,500 00
Kings Co. Hospital and Brooklyn Home for Aged and Infirm 10,500 00

When the 1916 budget was prepared, allowances were made for specific repairs to be made to the buildings of the above institutions together with those in the other institutions of the Department. Specifications for all of the repair work were made, and while there were insufficient funds to advertise and enter into contract for all of this work, an opening of bids was held for the repairs to be made in the City Home District.

The lowest of a number of bids was \$37,580. The next low bidder for this particular contract was \$51,236. It was found that the specifications upon which the low bidder based his estimate, were incorrect in that some fifteen pages were entirely omitted and fifteen other pages were duplicated by the printer in binding these specifications. There has been insufficient time between the cancellation of this award of contract and the expiration of the current year's appropriation, to proceed with advertising for new bids.

In order that these repairs may be made as was intended by the appropriating bodies when the funds were granted, it is the desire of the Department to do this work by open market orders. Several bids have been obtained for each particular item of work provided for. It is desired to award to the low bidders for each of these particular repair jobs, and issue open market orders.

Experience shows that by this method much cheaper prices can be obtained and work performed more expeditiously than by grouping all of the work in one large contract and requiring bidders to file bonds and sureties, and necessitating the printing of specifications for minor repair work of this nature.

Your early attention to this matter will be very much appreciated.

It was named in honor of General Alexander, Lord Stirling, who commanded the Maryland regiment, which was almost entirely massacred at the battle of Gowanus, commonly called the Battle of Long Island, on August 27th, 1776.

The time seems opportune for this correction, and the undersigned takes this initiative in proposing it for the following reason, viz.:

The paramount importance of this battle in which Great Britain employed the largest force, both naval and military, ever gathered against this country, has never till very recently been recognized by any memorial celebrations held on that anniversary.

The first attempt to recognize this day was made by me on Aug. 27th, 1913, when I recited in the theatre at corner of 5th Ave. and 4th St., Brooklyn, near where the Maryland soldiers were slain, my poem entitled "The Trilogy of Gowanus," a copy of which publisht in the Kings County Historical Society, I hereto append.

The first elaborate celebration was held this year in Prospect Park, under the direction of the president of that society, and many historic sites were marked with suitable inscriptions.

I am also especially interested herein for the reason that my great grandfather, Gideon Deming 3d, who was engaged in that battle as a member of a Connecticut regiment, and "narrowly escaped capture," as the record says, died at my home in Albany, after having survived so long that I knew him personally.

Section 1. Section 252 of article 18 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to Streets and particularly relating to Tan Bark on Streets, as contained in the Code of Ordinances adopted June 20, 1916, and approved July 6, 1916, is hereby amended to read as follows:

§252. Tan bark on streets. The mayor or [any alderman,] the department of health, the police commissioner, or the inspector or captain of police assigned to the precinct in which the premises are situated, shall, upon application, grant permission to lay tan bark in the carriageway in front of any premises occupied by a sick or convalescent person, to the extent of 500 feet in any direction from said premises; providing all expense of placing and removing the bark shall be paid by the person making such application. The bark so placed in any street shall be removed, upon the order of the commissioner of street cleaning, within 5 days after the recovery or death of such sick or convalescent person, and, upon failure or neglect to comply with such order, then it shall be removed by the commissioner, who may sue for and recover the cost of such removal in the manner provided for the collection of penalties.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

My Dear Mr. President—On November 17th last I forwarded to the Comptroller of the City of New York a bill in my favor for services rendered as Acting Surrogate of the County of Richmond in the Estate of Cecilia Morris, deceased, in which the Hon. J. Harry Tiernan, Surrogate, filed a certificate of his disqualification to act in the matter, and upon which certificate an order was made by Mr. Justice Jaycox of the Supreme Court, empowering the District Attorney to discharge the duties of the said Surrogate in the matter of that estate, said certificate and order being made in accordance with the Code of Civil Procedure governing such cases. The bill in question amounts to \$104.16, and I enclose a copy thereof, the original being on file in the Comptroller's office. I may add that upon all of the dates mentioned in the said bill I was and still remain the District Attorney of Richmond County, and the Hon. J. Harry Tiernan at the said dates was then, and still is, the County Judge and Surrogate of this County.

Under date of December 2, 1916, I was advised by the Comptroller that the Corporation Counsel, to whom he had submitted the papers and bill, had directed his attention to section 2485 of the Code of Civil Procedure. I quote:

"Section 2485 provides that:

"Where an officer of the county performs the duties of the surrogate with respect to a particular matter wherein the surrogate is disqualified or precluded from acting, the supervisors of the county, or board of aldermen, must allow him a compensation equal pro rata to the salary of the surrogate, to be audited and collected in the same manner."

The Corporation Counsel further states that, in accordance with the provision last quoted, the Board of Aldermen must allow the District Attorney compensation as therein provided, and, until allowance shall have been so made, payment cannot legally be made.







Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.
