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### REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING JUNE 30, 1874.

POLICE DEPARTMENT, 300 MULBERRY STREET,  
NEW YORK, July 30, 1874.

To the Honorable WILLIAM F. HAVEMEYER,  
Mayor of New York:

The Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York, pursuant to section 27 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, and in obedience to your instructions, dated June 30, 1874, respectfully submit a report of the operations and actions of the Police Department for the three months ending the 30th day of June, 1874.

#### REPORT.

An act of the Legislature passed in 1874 reduced the number of Police Commissioners to four. On the seventh day of May last his Honor the Mayor appointed Abraham Disbecker to be Commissioner of Police.

On the seventh day of July, 1874, his Honor the Mayor appointed George W. Matsell and John R. Voorhis to be Commissioners of Police, to fill vacancies caused by the resignations of Hugh Gardner and Oliver Charlick.

On the ninth day of July, 1874, Abram Duryee, Abraham Disbecker, George W. Matsell, and John R. Voorhis, Commissioners of Police, held a meeting at the Central Department of Police, and organized the Board of Police by choosing Mr. Commissioner George W. Matsell to be President of the Board of Police, and appointing Mr. Commissioner Abram Duryee to be Treasurer of the Board of Police.

On the same date the Board thus organized held their first meeting and created and appointed Committees of the Board, as follows:

- Committee on Street Cleaning—Commissioners Disbecker, Duryee, and Voorhis.
- Committee on Station-houses—Commissioners Voorhis, Disbecker, and Duryee.
- Committee on Finance—Commissioners Duryee, Matsell, Disbecker, and Voorhis.
- Committee on Rules and Discipline—Commissioners Voorhis and Duryee.
- Committee on Surveys—Commissioners Disbecker and Voorhis.
- Committee on Printing and Stationery—Commissioners Disbecker and Voorhis.

The President to be (*ex officio*) member of all Committees.

On the 28th day of July, 1874, the Committees on Station-houses and Printing and Stationery were abolished, and their duties devolved on a Committee designated as the Committee on "Repairs and Supplies," consisting of Commissioners Voorhis, Disbecker, and Duryee.
