

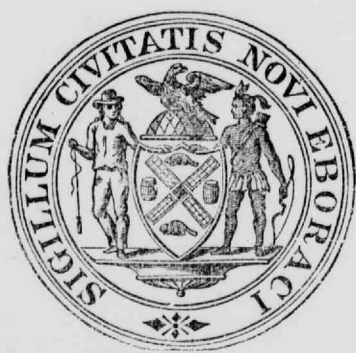

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held September 19, 1877.

Present—Hon. Smith Ely, Jr., Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Patrick Keenan, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller stated he had taken the usual proceedings to dispose of the franchises of the ferries, as advertised, but had sold only the following, viz.:

Ferry from Chambers street, North river, to Pavonia avenue, New Jersey; ferry from Houston street, East river, to Brooklyn, E. D., and ferry from Thirty-fourth street, East river, to Hunter's Point, Long Island—the representatives of the other ferries advertised declining to bid on account of the mode of appraisement of the franchises and of certain conditions in the proposed form of lease.

Communications were submitted from the Staten Island Railway Company, John I. Stevens, Secretary; Hoboken Land and Improvement Company, W. W. Shippen, President, and The Associates of the Jersey Company, A. L. Dennis, President, stating in detail their objections to the system of leasing the ferries adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and to the terms and conditions of the proposed lease.

The Comptroller submitted a statement of the gross receipts of several ferry companies, and the amounts paid to the city by the same for the five years previous to 1877.

The Counsel to the Corporation stated his views in relation to the various objections of the ferry companies submitted by their representatives, and suggested that the officers of the different companies and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund meet for consultation in relation to the various questions at issue, in order, if possible, to agree upon some form of leasing the ferries which will be acceptable to all parties.

Whereupon the Comptroller submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the sale of ferry franchises, as advertised to take place on the 20th inst., be postponed to Thursday, the 27th inst.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That when the Board adjourns, it be to Tuesday, the 25th inst.

The following resolution, submitted by the Comptroller, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Clerk of this Board invite the representatives of the ferry companies to be present at the meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to be held on the 25th inst.; and, also, request the said representatives to call upon the Counsel to the Corporation, at his office, prior to the meeting of this Board, on the 25th inst., for consultation, in relation to their objections to the manner of leasing the ferries, and to the proposed form of lease of ferry franchises, in order to secure, if possible, harmonious action in the matter of leasing the ferries, by the parties interested.

A communication was received from John O'Donnell, Chairman of Farmers' Co-operative Union, in relation to fines imposed on John S. Croucher and Skidmore Langdon, for incumbrance of Hudson street, by market wagons, which, on motion, was referred to the Comptroller.

The Comptroller submitted the appraisement of the valuation of the lease of the premises on the northeast corner of Third avenue and East Eighty-fifth street, by S. C. Holmes.

Whereupon the following resolution was, on motion, adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby approve of the appraisement of the valuation of the lease of the premises northeast corner of Third avenue and East Eighty-fifth street, by S. C. Holmes; and that the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to lease the same at public auction to the highest bidder.

The Comptroller submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That a warrant be executed in favor of J. Nelson Tappan, Chamberlain, for the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), of the moneys deposited to the credit of "Croton Water Rents"; to be paid into the City Treasury, to the credit of "Croton Water Rent, refunding account"; to be applied to the refunding of duplicate and erroneous payments of Croton Water Rents.

A communication was received from A. V. Winans, President, in relation to the ferry from Ninety-second street, East river, to Astoria, which, on motion, was referred to the Comptroller.

The application of Edwin M. Harrison, for grant of land under water, between Duane and Jay streets, North River, was received, and, on motion, referred to the Comptroller.

A communication was received from the Commissioners of Docks in relation to change in width and location of Pier (old) No. 43, North river, which, on motion, was referred to the Comptroller.

The coat to be a double-breasted frock, the waist to extend to the top of the hip, and the skirt to within one inch of the bend of the knee. Buttons as per sample. The pantaloons plain; the vest single-breasted, with eight police buttons placed at equal distances.

The shield to be worn upon the vest, and to be made of yellow metal (fire gilt), and to have over the top a ribbon of the same containing the word "Surgeon," as per sample.

The uniform of the Chief Surgeon to be the same as for Police Surgeon, and the shield to have a ribbon containing the words "Chief Surgeon," as per sample.

This resolution to take effect October 1, 1877.

[BOARD OF EXAMINERS.]

At a meeting of the Board of Examiners, held at the office of the Department of Buildings, at No. 2 Fourth avenue, on Tuesday, the 18th day of September, A. D. 1877, at 3 P. M., pursuant to call of the Superintendent of Buildings.

At which were present—W. W. Adams, Henry Dudley, J. Banta, E. Dobbs, and James M. McLean, Esqrs.

Superintendent W. W. Adams presiding.

The minutes of previous meeting having been read for information of the Board, the Chairman submitted the hereinafter-named petitions and applications:

Petition of John Commisky, for permission to vary the provisions of the "Building Law," so far as to permit him to enlarge the building 809 Ninth avenue, by constructing an additional story thereto of the same thickness as the present walls (eight inches), and extending the building an additional eighteen feet, as per Specifications and Plans No. 989 of Alterations to Buildings, filed September 11, 1877. Application granted.

Petition of J. H. Waterhouse, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the "Building Law" in the erection of his two buildings proposed to be erected on the east side of Avenue A, fifty feet south of southeast corner of One Hundred and Seventeenth street and Avenue A, as to permit the erection of the walls of the same above the line of the first story floors thereof (8) eight inches thick, to a height of forty-four feet above the curb level, as provided in Specifications and Plans No. 576 for Erection of Buildings, filed September 12, 1877. Petition granted, provided that the front and rear walls of said buildings be constructed 12 inches in thickness all the way up.

Petition of Jacob Berman, for exemption from the operations of the "Building Law," relative to providing iron shutters, and that his buildings, Nos. 313, 315, 317, 319, 321, and 323 East Twenty-second street, may be exempted from the provisions thereof. Petition and case referred back to the Bureau of Fire Escapes for special investigation and report thereon.

Petition of J. H. Van Reed, for permission to so far deviate from the provisions of the "Building Law" as to permit him to construct an additional story upon and to the building 448 Canal street, which building is 25 feet front and rear, 40 feet in depth, and 35 feet in height, front and rear walls being 12 inches, and the party walls but 8 inches in thickness (and where raised as proposed, will not exceed 44 feet in height from curb level to the highest point), and to lower the beams of the first story of the building, and rest the same on an 8-inch brick wall, to be built alongside of the stone foundation walls, as provided in Specifications and Plans No. 988 of "Alterations to Buildings," filed September 11, 1877. Petition granted, provided that the alterations proposed be carried out in accordance with recommendations of the Inspector, "except as to resting of beams of the first floor upon a girder, said beams when lowered to be rested on brick walls built alongside of the foundation walls."

Application of James Floy, for permission to vary or deviate from the provisions of the "Building Law," so far as to permit him, in the erection of two buildings (each to be 12.6 x 55, three stories, 44 feet in height from curb level), on the south side of One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, 200 feet west of Fourth avenue, to construct the party walls thereof but eight (8) inches in thickness, as provided in Specifications and Plan No. 585 for "Erection of Buildings," filed September 17, 1877. Application granted.

Application of George Keller, for permission to erect three buildings on the northeasterly corner of One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street and Third avenue, Melrose, and to so far deviate from the provisions of the "Building Law" as to permit the construction of the walls of the second and third stories thereof but eight (8) inches in thickness, as provided in the Plans and Specifications No. 586 for "Erection of Buildings," filed September 18, 1877. Application granted.

Petition of I. L. Hoppock, for permission to make alterations in and to the building No. 38 West Fourteenth street, in accordance with provisions of Plans and Specifications for the Erection of Buildings No. 559, filed September 1, 1877, and begging for a reconsideration of the decision of the Board, made and rendered at session of September 14, 1877, relative thereto. Petition received, read, and ordered filed, and, upon motion, the former decision of the Board relative thereto adhered to—all of the members voting in the affirmative.

Application of Patrick Lavelle, for permission to deviate from the provisions of the "Building Law," in proposed alterations to the buildings on rear of the lot 229 East Twenty-eighth street, and erecting additional story thereto, as and in accordance with Specifications and Plan No. 944 of "Alterations to Buildings," filed August 28, 1877 (the first story walls of the present building being 12 inches thick, the second story but eight (8) inches thick). Application granted.

The minutes of the meeting were then read and approved, upon motion, and, there being no further business, the Board, upon motion, adjourned.

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section of the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 188. That hereafter, no Texas, Colorado, or other dangerous cattle shall be driven through or along the public streets, except in those cases only where the cattle shall be landed at the foot of the street leading to the slaughter-house to which such cattle shall be destined, and where the street shall be effectually barred or closed, so as to prevent the escape of such cattle during the transfer from the dock to such slaughter-house, and no such cattle shall be landed except in accordance with the provisions and restrictions of this ordinance.
