

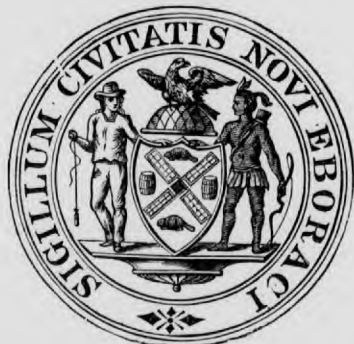

SANITARY BUREAU.

Work of the Sanitary Inspectors.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases, for the quarter ending September 30, 1885:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 87,218.

The number of complaints made was 18,594.

The number of complaints received from citizens was 5,165, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 1,055 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port: 111 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; 2,334 permits to scavengers to empty privies; and 134 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

This service was made throughout the city by districts, to each of which an inspector was assigned. They visited the tenement-houses consecutively, from house to house, and such other houses as contained the indigent classes, unable to employ physicians. Whenever the cases required, more than one visit was made, treating the case through.

It will be seen that, allowing the usual average of four and a half persons to a family, that the number of persons under these visits was about 510,345, and among these 3,934 were prescribed for, which would be about one in every 129 persons.

There were but two deaths reported. Wherever nuisances were found, or unsanitary conditions requiring attention, they reported them and they were referred to the regular corps of Sanitary Inspectors for the proper enforcement of the remedy.

The universal remark of this Corps was, that there was far less sickness found among this indigent class than in former years, and this apparent exemption seemed to be due to the greater cleanliness enforced by the Health Department in tenement-houses, and largely attributable to the improved atmospheric surroundings caused by the abolishment of the old privy vaults in the yards.

These summer visits of the Medical Summer Corps of Inspectors are received with great pleasure and gratitude by the indigent class, and there is no question but that many lives are saved thereby, as well as sickness and suffering ameliorated.

During the three months ending September 30, 1885, nine thousand nine hundred and eighty-three (9,983) permits were granted for burials. During the same period two hundred and forty-five (245) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; seven hundred and twenty-five (725) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; one thousand one hundred and twenty-one (1,121) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; one thousand two hundred and ninety-five (1,295) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and seven hundred and sixty-eight (768) transcripts of the records of deaths, eighty-seven (87) of marriages, and ninety-three (93) of births from said records were issued. There were five thousand and eighty-four (5,084) persons registered as married during the quarter, and seven thousand six hundred and twenty-four (7,624) children were born during the same period.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending September 30, 1885, the number of notices issued by the Board was 6,074. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees, and agents to violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon re-inspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, Wednesday, October 28, 1885, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Commissioners present—Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, and Baldwin.

Also, Chief Engineer Church; Consulting Engineer Davis, and Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams, of the Department of Public Works.

Vice-President Dowd presided.

The minutes of the stated meeting of October 21 were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills included in vouchers Nos. 1178 to 1187, which vouchers were, on motion of Commissioner Baldwin, approved by the Commissioners, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction made reports, with recommendations, as follows:

1st. Dated October 28, 1885. Submitting a request from the Chief Engineer for an appropriation of \$500 for additional furniture and fixtures for the offices of the Division Engineers and the auxiliary offices, and recommending that the appropriation be made.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer, this recommendation was approved by the Commissioners and the appropriation made.

2d. Dated October 26, 1885. Recommending the promotion of George B. Burbank from Inspector to Assistant Engineer.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer, Mr. Burbank was promoted to the position of Assistant Engineer, with compensation at the rate of \$1,800 per annum, to date from the 1st of November next.

3d. Dated October 26, 1885. Recommending an appropriation of \$150 for an additional level, for use at the Saw Mill river crossing; and, on motion of Commissioner Spencer, the appropriation was made.

4th. Dated October 27, 1885. Recommending that a culvert be built across the dumping-ground of Shaft 20, and by agreement made in pursuance of section 33 of the Act.

On motion of Commissioner Dowd, this report was laid over until the next meeting.

Notice, dated October 24, 1885, was received from the Comptroller of the issuance of warrants for vouchers not certified by the Aqueduct Commissioners, and appertaining to the work of the Commissioners of Appraisal for New York City and County and for Westchester County, amounting to \$1,006.31; which notice was ordered placed on file and entered upon the books of this Commission.

The Secretary presented a letter from the Counsel to the Corporation, dated October 21, 1885, in response to questions in relation to the temporary easement right required over the lands of Bartholomew Ryder, at Shaft 4, in the town of Newcastle; which was read, and on motion of Commissioner Spencer, the matter was referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit for adjustment.

The Chief Engineer made report, dated October 28, 1885, in response to the resolution of the Commissioners of October 21, in relation to the prevention of accidents to workmen upon the construction of the New Aqueduct; which report was read, and, on motion of Commissioner Baldwin, was referred to the Committee on Construction.

The Chief Engineer next presented a report, dated 28th of October, upon amending the rules and regulations for the government of the Engineer Corps of this Commission; which report, on motion of Commissioner Spencer, was referred to the Committee on Construction.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 27th day of October, 1885, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 206 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 206. That no privy-vault, or cesspool, shall be allowed within thirty feet of any tenement or lodging-house, hotel or manufactory in the City of New York, of a greater depth than three feet; nor unless it be connected at the upper end with the Croton water and at the lower end with the street sewer, and provided with an outlet at the lowest point and on the bottom, so as to admit of the complete discharge of the contents whenever the outlet is opened and the vault or sink is flushed with water. The outlet shall be kept closed, except during the process of flushing, with a tight-fitting plug, so as to effectually prevent the escape of gases and offensive odors; and sufficient water shall at all times be kept in the vaults or sink to prevent solid matter adhering to the bottom. The sides and bottom of every privy-vault, cesspool, or school sink in the City of New York must be impermeable and secured against any saturation of the walls or the ground about the same.
