

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a report of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending

The totlowing is a report of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 5, 1884:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,257, as follows, viz.:

I public building, 512 tenement-houses, 79 private dwellings, 59 other dwellings, 6 manufactories and workshops, 22 stores and warehouses, 21 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 2 lodging-houses, 1 lard rendering establishment, I public sewer, 8 sunken and vacant lots, 70 yards, courts and areas, 72 cellars and basements, 162 waste pipes and drains, 149 privies and water-closets, 12 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 10 dangerous stairways, 3 cisterns and cesspools, 3 chimneys dangerous and smoky, other puisances.

During the past week 107 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

45 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

30 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 60 premises where contagious diseases were reported, and have disinfected 56 premises, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 704 births, 54 still-births, 313 marriages and 576 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 5, 1884. This shows an increase of 247 births, 5 still-births, 57 marriages, and 13 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1883, there was an increase of 109 births and 97 marriages, and a decrease of 12 still-births and 32 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 6; whooping cough, 3; typhoid fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 3; rheumatism and gout, 4; cancer, 4; pneumonia, 12; heart diseases, 17; convulsions, 1; apoplexy, 4; gastritis, enteritis and peritonits, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; premature and preternatural births, 4; suicide, 2; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 2; diphtheria, 3; croup, 7; erysipelas, 5; malarial diseases, 3; diarrhœal diseases, 6; inauition, 1; alcoholism, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 5; bronchitis, 11; aneurism, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1, and drowning, 1. The number of deaths from cerebro-spinal fever, marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, meningitis and encephalitis was the same in the two successive weeks.

The ages of 120 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year. 159 under two years, 199 under five years, and 52 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 2 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 34.55 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 113 were in institutions, 322 in tenement-houses, 127 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 16 were on the basement floor, 121 on the first, 131 on the second, 109 on the third, 60 on the fourth, 16 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth; 573 were stated to be residents of New York City and 3 non-residents; 77 were stated to be single, 140 married, 88 widowed, and the condition of 271 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 576; still-births, 54; bodies in transitu, 14. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 63 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 704 births, 313 marriages, 54 still-births, 576 deaths, 14 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 77 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 7 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 51 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending January 5, 1884, was 26.8 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.829, the mean humidity was 75, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,635, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.99 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Obsergers. vatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 546 deaths and still-births, or 86.67 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 13; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 230; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 74; Greenwood (undenominational), 38; Lutheran (undenominational), 97; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 11; Evergreen (undenominational), 34; Woodlawn (undenominational), 15; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 6; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 9; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 1; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 5; Washington (undenominational), 10.

The actual mortality for the week ending December 29, 1883, was 573; this is 24 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1882, and 51.4 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.29 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,336,159

SIR—There were 597 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, January 12, 1884, which is an increase of 21, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 86 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1883. The actual mortality for the week ending January 5, 1884, was 566, which is 69.4 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.00 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,337,661.

The examination showed fissures aggregating 2,000 feet in length. The repairs were finished and water was again turned on by 4 F. M., on Saturday, the 17th instant.

While the flow through the aqueduct was interrupted the supply in the Central Park reservor was drawn down five set.

the supply in the Central Park reservo'r was drawn down five eet.

This loss of supply in the city reservoirs, occurring now, as winter is appreaching, makes it necessary to take extra precautions against waste of water. Being aware of the temptation to leave faucets open in cold weather to prevent freezing in the pipes, I specially protest against that practice, and appeal to all citizens to abstain from wasteful use of water in any manner whatever. The present condition of the supply and the possibility of a recurrence of similar leaks in the aqueduct make it my duty to give this public notice that I shall hereimafter resort to the peremptory measure of shutting off the water in all places where persistent waste is discovered.
