

PROCLAMATION.

\$1,000 REWARD.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, New York, September 6, 1875.

Whereas, James H. Noe was brutally assaulted at his place of business, at No 275 Greenwich street, in this city, on the 22d day of August, 1875, by one or more persons attempting a burglarious entry of his premises, and died from the effect of the wounds then received, on the 26th day of August, 1875; now,

I, WILLIAM H. WICKHAM, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby offer a reward of one thousand dollars for the discovery and conviction of the party or parties who may have committed the deed, the said reward to be paid on the conviction of the said party or parties, and the certificate of the District Attorney that such conviction was had upon the testimony of the person or persons claiming the reward. But all claims not presented to the Mayor within twenty days after such conviction shall be disregarded.

On motion of Commissioner Voorhis, it was Resolved, That the Superintendent of Police be and hereby is directed to furnish this Board with a list of all places in this city, together with the names of the proprietors thereof, where intoxicating liquors, wines, ale or beer are sold or given away, and whether the same are licensed or not; if licensed, the class thereof, with the date of expiration of same, to whom issued, and for what place.

Resolved, That the Superintendent of Police be and hereby is directed to furnish the Board with a list of all places in this city, with the names of the proprietors thereof, where intoxicating liquors, wines, ale or beer are sold or given away, and which places are the resort of thieves, prostitutes, gamblers, vagrants, and disorderly or suspicious persons.

Resolved, That the Superintendent of Police be and hereby is directed to furnish this Board with a list of all places in this city where intoxicating liquors, wines, ale, or beer are not sold or given away, and which places are the resort of thieves, prostitutes, gamblers, vagrants, and disorderly or suspicious persons, with the nature or character of business transacted in such places.

A report of Inspector Thorne, Third District, relative to murder of Abraham Weisberg, at West Farms, was referred to the Committee on Rules and Discipline.

Whereupon, on motion of Commissioner Smith, it was Resolved. That the thanks of the Board of Police be presented to Inspector Thomas W. Thorne, of the Third Police District, and to the officers and Patrolmen who aided him, for the zeal, energy, and ability they displayed in the case of the murder of Abraham Weisberg, committed at West Farms on the 19th of September, 1875, and for securing the necessary evidence to obtain a verdict against the murderers by the Coroner's jury.

The Committee on Pulse and Discipling presented the following resolutions, which were

The Committee on Rules and Discipline presented the following resolutions, which were

Resolved, That Rules 300, 301, and 392 be amended, so as to read as follows:

Rule 390. Whenever any officer of the Police Force, while on patrol duty, shall find children between the ages of eight and fourteen years in the streets, between the hours of nine A. M. and three P. M., of any school-day of the Public School days of New York, they shall obtain their names and the names of their parents or guardians, and place of residence, and report them to the Captain of his Precinct. The onicer shall, on taking the names of the children, direct them to go to school, and warn them, if found on the street again during school hours, they will be liable to arrest—all voting ave.

Rule 301. Each Captain or Sergeant of Police in command of a precinct shall make a daily report to the Superintendent of such children so reported to him, a copy of which shall be furnished to the Superintendent of Truancy—all voting aye.

Rule 392. It shall be the duty of all officers of a precinct, while on patrol duty, to disperse all crowds of boys over 14 years of age who may be found loitering at the corners or upon the streets, or near public places, obstructing the highway or the entrance to public or private buildings—all voting ave.

or near public places, obstructing the highway or the entrance to public or private buildings—are voting aye.

Resolved, That Patrolman Samuel Jenness, Twelfth Precinct, be transferred to the Twenty-third Precinct, and remanded to patrol duty.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of Captian H. V. Steers, Twenty-ninth Precinct, be forwarded by the Chief Clerk to General J. M. Varian, commanding Third Brigade N. G. S. N. Y., by which it appears that Captain Steers surrendered the possession of the colors upon the order of the Colonel of the Seventy-first Regiment, who is believed by the Board of Police to be the usual custodian of regimental colors.

Resolved, That the following order of examination for the promotion of Sergeants, Roundsmen, and Patrolmen of the Municipal Police Force of the City of New York be adopted, and that the Superintendent be directed to publish the same to the Force in General Order:

A Board of Examiners, to consist of the Superintendent and four Inspectors, with the Captain in Charge of the School of Instruction acting as Recorder, shall meet in the school-room of the Central Office on every Monday for one hour (at such hour as shall be selected by the Superintendent on the previous Saturday) for the examination of candidates for promotion, who may be ordered by the Board of Police for examination. Any three of the first named, shall constitute a quorum for business, and, in the absence of the Superintendent, the ranking Inspector shall preside. In the absence of the Recorder of the Board, the Drill Sergeant shall act as such. Each member of the Board shall of the Recorder of the Board, the Drill Sergeant shall act as such. Each member of the Board shall and as such beauting shall mark t. 2, 3, 4. ness, and, in the absence of the Superintendent, the ranking Inspector shall preside. In the absence of the Recorder of the Board, the Drill Sergeant shall act as such. Each member of the Board shall keep separate notes of the examination of each case, and under each heading shall mark 1, 2, 3, 4, according to the merit of the candidate—No. I being the most proficient. After each examination is completed, each member shall sign his name to the note of record, which shall recite the rank and name of the candidate, and such note shall then be put into an envelope, sealed and directed to the Board of Police, and placed in charge of the Recorder of the Board, who shall, after the adjournment, take all such envelopes and place them in the hands of the President of the Board of Police, who shall present them to the Board of Police for consideration when required.

Sergeants and Roundsmen, who are candidates for promotion, shall be examined—

I. Upon such laws of the State of New York as pertain to the duties of the Police Force of the City of New York.

2. Upon the city ordinances as far as the duties of Policemen require them to take cognizance 3. The Manual of the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Police, comprehending the powers and duties of Captains, Sergeants, and Patrolmen under all circumstances.

5. The United States Infantry Tactics, so far as to include the School of the Soldier and of the Company.

6. The Manual of the use of the Club, as authorized by the Department of Police.

Patrolmen who are cited before the Board of Examiners for promotion to Roundsmen, shall be examined thoroughly upon the Manual of the Rules of the Board of Police, and the United States

Infantry Drill, and the Manual of the Club, as authorized by the Board of Police.

The appearance, deportment, general intelligence, and record of each of the candidates of all grades will be noted, and each one will be required to make out a report, in writing, in the presence of the Board of Examiners, on some question pertaining to Police matters, which question shall at that time be presented by the Board of Examiners. The reports shall, after scrutiny by the members of the Board, be placed in the hands of the President of the Board of Police, with a copy of the record of the proceedings of the day—all voting aye.

On recommendation of the Committee on Repairs and Supplies, it was
Resolved, That the communication of Inspector Speight, offering the use of his horse for Police
purposes in the Fourth Inspection District, free of expense to the Police Department, with the exception of the feeding and snoeing, be entered in the minutes of the Board, and that the proposition
made in said communication be and the same is hereby accepted—all voting aye.

FOURTH INSPECTION DISTRICT, NEW YORK, September 27, 1875.

To the Hon. Board of Police Commissioners:

DEAR SIRS—To properly perform the duties in my district, I should have a horse, wagon, harness, etc. The horse, wagon, etc., should be kept where I could get them night or day. The harness has already been furnished me by the Department; I have also a requisition for a wagon. The horse to be used should be of that kind that you could jump out of your wagon and leave standing, without a moments' notice. I have just such a horse, and if your Honors will allow me, I will give his services to be used by me for Police purposes, free of expense, with the exception of feeding, shoeing, etc. I respectfully ask that your Honors will take action on this matter on or before the 5th of October, as I have been hiring a horse eight times a month for the last two months, which expires on the 5th October.
