Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 228, 251, 55, 8 and 0, against 215, 249, 53, 9 and 1 for the previous week, a total of 542 against 527. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Twelfth, Seventeenth and Twenty-third Wards, and the decrease in the Eleventh and Thirteenth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Tenth and Twelfth Wards, and the decrease in the Fourteenth and Eighteenth Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Seventh Ward, and the decrease in the Twelfth Ward. Four of the 8 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and I was below Fourteenth street, West. No case of small-pox was reported.
