Quarterly report of work done by paid and unpaid labor during the quarter ending September 30, 1902.

CARPENTER'S REPORT.

Old Prison.

Making and putting up shelving for record book; making two benches for ice cooler; repairs, fixing cots and tightening bolts; taking out windows and taking off doors; putting in glass; repairing ½ dozen bedsteads; patching floor; fixing 1 dozen bedsteads; also floor in hall; repairing Keepers' chairs.

New Prison.

Making 1 dozen shelves; also frame for bathtub; putting up moulding in chapel and new office; repairs; 1 chair and 1 dozen bedsteads repaired; planing doors and windows, and repairing 1 dozen bedsteads; putting in 3 panes of glass; fixing ½ dozen bedsteads.

Female Prison.

Repairing benches.

Boys' Prison.

Making two benches and four shelves.

Dormitory.

Eight bedsteads repaired.

Cellar.

Making 1 rack in storeroom and using 100 feet of lumber for shelving; repairing and putting hinges on doors.

Kitchen.

Repairs to steps leading to kitchen.

Yard.

Making frame for cover of sewer; making four wooden horses for oil barrels; making racks for potato bags; repairs; fixing ice box and 4 horses for oil barrels; repairing doors and windows in shed.

PLUMBER'S REPORT.

New Prison.

Two 2-quart tin dippers; 3 new springs for locks; 6 bolts for locks; 1 lock repaired.

Female Prison.

Two brass bibbcocks; 1 lock.

Boys' Prison.

One lock and two brass bibbcocks.

Kitchen.

Two 10-gallon tin boilers; 3 soup boilers.

Laundry.

Twelve feet of tin gutter; 6 long sheets tin.

Cellar.

25 steam valves.

PAINTER'S REPORT.

Old Prison.

Three pounds ultramarine blue; 1¼ gallons of raw oil; 4 pounds French ochre; ¾ gallon mixed paint; ¾ gallon varnish; ½ gallon mixed French ochre; 6 pounds metallic (dry); 1 gallon turpentine; 2 gallons tar paint; 1 gallon gray paint and 3 pounds putty.

New Prison.

Five pounds emerald green; ¼ gallon oil; 7 pounds mixed paint; 1½ gallons boiled oil; 20 pounds white lead; 2 pounds French yellow ochre; ½ gallon turpentine ground in oil; 15 pounds Venetian red ground in oil.

Boys' Prison.

127 pounds white lead; 5 pounds metallic brown; 10¼ gallons oil; 26 pounds French ochre; 2 gallons turpentine; 3 pounds raw sienna; 6½ pounds drop black; four pounds emerald green; 6 pounds bronze green.

Roof.

10 pounds paint skin.

Hon. THOMAS W. HYNES, Commissioner, Department of Correction:

Dear Sir—I respectfully transmit herewith a quarterly report of work done by paid and unpaid labor during the three months ending September 30, 1902, to wit:

CARPENTER'S WORK.

At Fourth District Prison—by unpaid labor. Putting in three lights of glass, size 4 inches by 12 inches, in cell windows on first tier, male prison; one new window sash, 15 inches by 8 inches, put on window in cell of first tier; material used, 1 dozen 3/4-inch screws and 1 pound putty.

At Fifth District Prison—by unpaid labor. Putting in three lights of glass, size 14 inches by 16 inches, one in door of laundry and two in windows of ten-day house; new wire sash cord adjusted in five windows of male prison.

At Sixth District Prison—by unpaid labor. Putting in eighteen lights of glass of various sizes in windows of male and female prison; material used, 3 pounds putty and one putty-knife.

At Seventh District Prison—by unpaid labor. Adjusting seven new window shades of the following sizes: 4 shades 3 feet 6 5/8 inches by 6 feet; 1 shade 3 feet 8 inches by 6 feet, and 2 shades 19 1/2 inches by 6 feet.

At Seventh District Prison—by unpaid labor. Installing new electric buzzer, connecting hall with office.

Plumbing and Tinsmithing.

At Second District Prison—work done under supervision of staff. Repairing and overhauling fireplace under boilers, material used: 150 fire bricks and 2 barrels fire clay. By paid labor: repairing all the slate roofs and repairing and painting all the tin roofs.

At Third District Prison—by paid labor. Installing a new shower bath in cell No. 36; also wash basin with hot and cold water; construction of small boiler in cellar to supply hot water for bath and wash basin; valves repaired and washers put in closets of cell No. 11 on first tier; lock repaired on main gate; closets and tanks repaired and urinal cleaned in cell No. 8 on first tier; leak repaired on Croton water pipe; water pipes cleaned and trap repaired in kitchen; one new 5/8-inch brass faucet put on washtub in kitchen.

At Fourth District Prison—by paid labor. Installing new bathtub on third tier and construction of proper connection supplying hot and cold water for same; 1 new sink put up in women's prison; 1 two-light bronze gas fixture put up in office; also 18 feet of new gas pipe adjusted; by unpaid labor: 2 new 5/8-inch brass faucets put on sink in women's prison; 3 1/2-inch brass faucets put on stationary washtubs in kitchen; 2 1/2-inch brass faucets put in cells on second tier.

At Fifth District Prison—by paid labor. Installing 2 new shower baths in laundry, work in course of construction; cleaning and repairing No. 9 Defiance range, model 1893, and furnishing the following material to make repairs: 1 front grate, 1 set of fire bricks, 1 ash pan, 1 long cross, 2 short crosses, 1 damper and rod, 1 pair of oven bricks and 1 back rest for grating; cleaning waste pipe in cell No. 13, female prison, and putting in new trap and waste pipe; also cleaning out waste pipe in ten day house; material used: 1 1/2-inch rough brass trap, 2 1/2-inch close nipples, 2 1/2-inch ells, 2 1/2-inch nipples 6 inches long, 1 1/2-inch tee, 2 1/2-inch sockets, 4 feet 1 1/2-inch galvanized iron pipe, 1 pound oakum, 5 pounds lead, 1 1-inch washer, charcoal, employed 1 plumber, 3 days' labor; by unpaid labor, putting in a new 5/8-inch brass faucet on sink in kitchen; clearing and removing obstruction in sewer in yard and kitchen.

At Seventh District Prison—by paid labor. Installing of two new shower baths in the northwest corner of laundry; description of work done and material furnished: (1) Sink—the present sink on front breast of chimney was reset with all new connections. (2) Showers—there were furnished and put in two polished brass, adjustable, ground joint large rain-head showers, with polished brass valves with china name plates; the showers have a 1/2-inch supply and 3/4-inch mixing column (for hot and cold water), they waste through polished brass removable strainers, which are set in tile. (3) Slate—there were furnished and erected two slate shower stalls, 7 feet high by 4 feet long by 3 feet wide, with 6-inch stiles in front; the stalls were made of blue slate. (4) Tiling—in place of the concrete, which was taken up, a layer of flooring consisting of marble mosaic was laid, with 3/4-inch Italian marble saddles placed at doors of dressing room and 1 1/4-inch marble saddles 1 1/2-inch high was placed at entrance to the showers to prevent water flowing out; the connection with main hot and cold water supply pipe was constructed to carry 3/4-inch galvanized iron supplies direct to the showers, with valves to control same on each line. (5) Woodwork—there was furnished and erected an oak partition 7 feet high, with neat capping all around and containing a doorway to each dressing room; the doors are full-sized 1 1/2-inch thick, paneled, quartered oak, with solid bronze butts and door knobs; the stalls are partitioned in centre between dressing room with quartered oak; there is a 6-inch high slate base adjusted on both sides all around the partition.

By unpaid labor. Clearing out tanks, male and female departments.

Miscellaneous Work.

At Fifth District Prison—by paid labor. Repairs on van No. 4, setting front tire and trimming felloes, material used, 2 hub bolts; repairs on van No. 6, new step irons adjusted, material used, 6 bolts; new double corner iron step cover put on, material used, 6 rivets; fastening clips and new nut to king bolt.

Painters' and Kalsominers' Work.

At Second District Prison—by prison help. Whitewashing engine room, 1 barrel lime, 5 pounds U. M. blue and 5 pounds kalsomine glue; painting and retouching all parts, wherever necessary, material used, 100 pounds white lead, 10 gallons raw oil, 10 gallons turpentine, 2 gallons liquid dryers, 10 pounds chrome green, 5 pounds drop black, 10 pounds Indian red, and 2 whitewash brushes.

At Third District Prison—work done by prison help. Painting 49 water-closets, also a border 3 feet high around the outside of cells in male and female prison. Material used: 15 pounds burnt umber, 10 pounds lamp black, 2 gallons turpentine, 3 gallons boiled oil and 2 gallons liquid dryers. Whitewashing walls of cellar: Material used: 1/2 barrel finishing lime, 3 pounds U. M. blue and 1 pound calc. glue.

At Fourth District Prison—work done by prison help. Painting women's prison, 2 windows in prison kitchen, 5 windows in prison hall, 2 windows in women's dormitory, all wire screens on six windows, five cells on first tier, two windows and bars in office, the gate and stile in yard, stormhouse, sink and stationary washtubs in prison kitchen and roof of vegetable house, all receiving two coats of paint each. Material used: 150 pounds white lead, 5 gallons raw oil, 4 gallons turpentine, 1 gallon dryer, 1 pound burnt umber, 1 pound burnt sienna and 2 pounds yellow ochre.

At Fifth District Prison—by prison help. Painting a 4-foot base and calimining ceiling and whitewashing walls of corridor in basement. Material used: 10 pounds princess metallic, 10 pounds whitewash lime and 1/2 pound U. M. blue.

At Seventh District Prison—by prison help. Painting hall and entrance to office, ten-day house, railing and ironwork in male and female prisons, laundry washtubs and side walls, bars on windows in hall and painting kitchen. Material used: 50 pounds white lead, 5 gallons raw oil, 1 gallon liquid dryer, and 3 gallons asphaltum.

The prisons were cleansed of roaches, waterbugs, etc., by the services rendered by the P. M. Frank Disinfectant Company.

The usual amount of cleaning, laundrying, cooking and other general work done in all prisons by unpaid prison help.

Steamboat "Massasoit"—Repaired 2 bolts for coal cart, 7 1/2 inches by 1/2 inch.

Workhouse—Repaired: 2 tires cut, welded and reset; 4 bolts, 3 1/2 inches by 5-16 inch; 1 wagon wrench welded; 1 whiffle tree; 1 bolt, 1/2 inch by 6 inches; 3 bolts, 3/4 inch by 5 inches; 4 bolts, 5-16 inch by 3 inches; 7 washers, 3/4 inch; 1 whiffle tree bolt welded and treaded; 14 bolts, 1/2 inch by 5 inches; 7 bolts, 5-16 by 7; 9 bolts, 7/8 by 3; 6 bolts, 3/8 by 4; 8 bolts, 5-16 by 4; 6 bolts, 3/8 by 3; 2 bars iron, 1/4 by 1 1/4 by 24 inches.

Steamboat "Fidelity"—Repaired: 2 bolts welded, 1/4 inch by 8 inches.

Workhouse—Made 1 spring for wagon; 15 feet 2 feet by 3-16 sheet iron; 10 feet 1 1/2 inch by 3/4 inch sheet iron; 12 feet 1 1/4 by 5/8 sheet iron; 16 feet 1 1/4 by 3/4 sheet iron; 15 feet 1 1/2 by 1 1/2 flat iron; 11 feet 1 1/2 by 5/8 flat iron; 6 feet 2 1/2 round iron; 4 feet 4 1/2 round iron; 18 feet 1 1/2 by 2 1/2 round iron; 175 1/4 by 5-16 rivets; 1 coal bucket (complete).

Steamboat "Minnahanonck"—Made 1 fire hoe blade, 11 inches by 8 inches, of 5/8-inch iron; 24 hook bolts, nuts and plates; 4 slice bars, each 9 feet by 1 1/2 inches; 1 eye bolt, 1 foot long, 1-inch iron; 1 dozen trick keys, 3/4-inch iron.

Central Office—Made 5 feet of 2 foot by 3-16-inch sheet iron; 24 1/4 by 5-6 rivets; 6 feet of 2 foot by 5-6 iron (for handles).

Branch Workhouse, Hart's Island—Repaired—General overhauling of wagon; 2 shaft clips; 5 tiers cut, welded and reset; 8 bolts, 7-16 by 8 inches; 12 bolts, 3/4 inch by 2 inches; 1 pair 7-inch clips; 2 boxes; 2 coal buckets; 1 piece sheet iron, 30 inches by 2 feet; 6 bolts, 1/2 inch by 2 inches; 60 rivets, 3/8 inch by 1 inch.

City Prison (Tombs)—Made 1 railing rod, 6 feet 3/4 iron, threaded both ends.

Central Office Stables—Made 1 box wrench.

Essex Market Prison—Made 14 feet of cut hinges, 14-foot by 1-inch iron.

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

Department of Street Cleaning,
City of New York,
New York, October 24, 1902.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—In forming to you the quarterly return for the three months, July, August and September, 1902, I have to report as follows:

Sweeping.

The sweeping of this city has been done with an average total force of 2,484 men (see Table A). These men have swept 412 miles of streets in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx and 496 miles in the Borough of Brooklyn each day. Thirty per cent. of this distance is covered from two to three times daily. This is rendered necessary by the very heavy traffic or by the character of the inhabitants. The Rapid Transit Commission has fourteen miles of open cut in the Borough of Manhattan and is hauling over the streets to the rivers 5,112 cubic yards of earth and rock per day from these open cuts, and has many tons of material stored on the side streets along these fourteen miles. There are in process of construction 1,289 buildings in the Borough of Manhattan alone; there are hauled daily to the rivers from these buildings about 3,000 cubic yards of cellar dirt. There are 1,558 feet of gas main being laid and 5.43 miles opened for repairs. There are about 1.29 miles of water main being laid and the telephone, steam heating and electric companies have 22.18 miles of surface torn up for the purpose of building subways and repairing plant. While the surface of the city is in such a condition of upheaval the work of this Department is rendered exceedingly difficult.

The character of the inhabitants on the east side of the city south of East Houston street and east of Broadway is such that within the boundaries of the Fourteenth and Sixteenth street sweeping sections, namely, from Broome street to East Houston street, and from Broadway to the East river, there are daily picked from the street by the Sweepers of this Department eighteen tons of garbage. This is not the garbage exposed in cans in front of the tenements of this district, but is the refuse

and offal thrown from the windows of the tenement houses, falling between curb line and curb line. This eighteen tons must be picked by hand daily from the surface of the street, in order that it may not be mixed with the ashes and street sweepings in making the fill upon Riker's Island. The contributory causes for these conditions are the ignorance of the inhabitants of this district, who have no idea of sanitation or of personal responsibility in this matter, and the push-cart privileges which are extended to whomever may apply to peddle upon the public thoroughfare, and to many who abuse this privilege by peddling without any license at all. These people line both sides of the street, in direct violation of Section 531 of the Revised Ordinances of New York City, often crowding into tiers two deep, particularly on Rivington, Hester, Orchard, Ridge, Norfolk, Suffolk and Eldridge streets. It has only been possible to render these thoroughfares habitable by the method of daily washing with a hose in the First, Second and Fourth Districts, namely, south of Canal street, east of Broadway and south of East Eleventh street. We have been, during all these months, daily washing with hose gangs all of these streets that we possibly could cover, certain of them every day, others of them every other day, until the entire district has been covered. This was rendered possible by the loaning to this Department of thirty lengths of condemned fire hose by the Fire Commissioner and by the purchase of 5,500 feet of hose by this Department.

The inestimable value of this washing can only be appreciated by the inhabitant and proven by the photographs of the air conditions throughout this district. On August 5, 7, 9, 12, 14 and 16, at certain locations and stations all over The City of New York, Agar plates were exposed between the hours of 2 and 2.30 p. m. and notes were made of the nature of the pavement, whether asphalt or belgian or granite block, the amount of traffic, single or double lines of horse cars or electric tramway, and the nature of the locality, whether tenements, stores or business houses, thickly populated or small population, pushcart markets or in the neighborhood of large markets like Washington, Gansevoort and Wallabout. Careful notes were also made as to whether the pavement was flushed or not flushed, hand swept or scraped. These plates were exposed at curb level and at six feet above, and the number of colonies of bacilli were found to greatly vary. It was found advisable in making these exposures in the various parts of the city to not only make them simultaneously, but also to eliminate all possible conditions that might have effect upon the number and class of bacilli that might be found. To this end, when making exposures on transverse streets, they were all made on the same side of the street and at the centre of the block, care being taken to select localities that were as similar as possible, not only in heights of buildings and in class of pavement, but also with reference to the work going on in that vicinity—that is, with the market districts, tenement districts, etc. The centre of the block was selected so as to be as far as possible from the eddies formed at the intersection of streets by the winds, by passing traffic or other causes. On longitudinal streets the same care was taken, and we are now in possession of seven series of experiments covering six stations to the series. In places where there was a large amount of traffic, where pushcarts were in large numbers, in a tenement district densely populated, as many as 9,600 colonies appeared in a fifteen-minute exposure. In another part of the city, where the pavement was asphalt, although the traffic at this point was quite heavy, the location residential and the avenue well flushed, only fifty-four colonies were found on a fifteen-minute exposure, while in another portion of the city, upon a well cleaned, flushed asphalt pavement, where traffic is extremely light, and where the surrounding property is entirely residential, at six feet above the curb line but five colonies were found.

August 1.—In market locations there was an average deposit of 11 colonies per square inch per minute, whereas in locations of general stores and under good conditions the average deposit was 2.3 colonies per inch-minute (practically five times less).

August 16.—Push-cart localities gave 22.7 colonies per inch-minute, and the maximum was 30 per inch-minute or 1,800 per inch-hour.

The general average of the tenement district on the lower east side that day was 21.3 colonies per inch-minute.

August 5.—Residential localities show an average of .08 colonies per inch-minute.

Tenement and push-cart localities show an average of 5.4 colonies per inch-minute.

A ratio of 1 to 67.5 of all exposures (42).

The maximum was 30 colonies per inch-minute—Stanton street between Pitt and Ridge streets.

The minimum was .06 colonies per inch-minute—Trinity avenue between One Hundred and Sixty-fifth and One Hundred and Sixty-sixth streets, Bronx.

From the standpoint of the number of colonies alone, that is, dealing with dirt in a broad sense, there are several points that are plainly demonstrated and others that may require exposures of plates over long periods in order to intelligently draw conclusions.

The isolation of specific pathogenic germs is next to impossible; we are therefore basing deductions on the general conditions of the air, that is, in what degree of purity it is found and how do localities compare in degree of purity.

The first point to be noted is that the air for the first foot above the pavement is, as would naturally be supposed, the most dangerous.

Secondly, the effect of traffic as a distributor of bacteria should be noted in two ways. The vibrations and disturbances caused by the passage of a slow moving, heavy truck have the effect of loosening the dust and the street dirt in the interstices of the pavement and on the surface. This is more or less true of all traffic, but especially so under the conditions mentioned. Light and rapid traffic creates air currents which pick up the dust and dirt and foul the air. Rapid and heavy traffic, such as street cars, act both as looseners and distributors of the dirt. This is especially true of electric cars which hug the surface and make strong currents of air. The surfacing of the streets, therefore, should not only be as clean as possible but the dust should be so treated as to resist the effort of traffic to disseminate it. Washing the streets would, therefore, appear to be the proper method to overcome the bad effect of traffic.

There is but one way to sanitariously cleanse asphalt pavement exposed to the constant bombardment of refuse from windows, the droppings and scavengings of fish and other foods which are prepared for market and the table upon push carts in the open street, and that is by thoroughly washing the surface with water and cleaning with a rubber squeegee.

Carting and Collection.

In the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx it will be perceived in looking at the totals in table B that in the months of July, August and September, there has been an increase of 22,104 loads collected in 1902 over 1900 and an increase of 17,053 loads over 1901. Also, that, while there were 200,519 loads of material collected under the head of ashes in 1901, yet there were only 45,574 loads of garbage collected in that year, while in 1902 we collected 62,889 loads of garbage. This most distinctly shows not only a generally increased collection, but also a very marked increase in the thoroughness of the primary separation; 17,315 loads of garbage have been kept separate from the ashes and delivered to the New York Sanitary Utilization Company, thus rendering the ash cleaner and fit for land fill. This is a very great step in the right direction.

In 1900, in the Borough of Brooklyn, paper trucks were calculated at two loads, in 1901 at three loads, and in 1902 again at two loads. This explains the apparent rise in the number of loads (table C) in 1901 and subsequent decrease in 1902. These loads (with the exception of the garbage) have been hauled to private land dumps in the Borough of Brooklyn. Where last year the average price was 25 cents per cart load of a cubic yard and a half and 50 cents per truck load of four cubic yards, it is now 10 cents per cart load of one and one-half cubic yards and 20 cents per truck load of four cubic yards, and in some cases free.

Respectfully inviting attention to the lowest columns of totals in Tables B and C, where the number of loads collected in January, February and March, 1902, are shown, I would say that 309,671 loads in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and 138,895 loads in the Borough of Brooklyn, making a total of 448,566 loads collected in July, August and September, 1902, is the greatest amount that our already overworked horses in the Department can handle. It will be seen from an examination of these tables that 442,540 loads of ashes, rubbish and garbage were collected in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and 229,140 loads in the Borough of Brooklyn in January, February and March, 1902, making a total of 671,680 loads. It is certainly to be predicated upon this showing that the Department will be required to collect and haul in 1903, in January, February and March no fewer number of loads than in January, February and March, 1902, and we have not a sufficient number of horses to make this collection.

It will be seen by Table D that we have at present writing altogether in the Department 1,301 draft horses. It is necessary for them at present to haul 7,314 cubic yards daily. They are doing all that it is possible for them to do. On June 21, 1902,

I communicated with your Honor, as Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting from that Honorable Board, a bond issue for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and subsequently submitted another for the Borough of Brooklyn alone for horses, carts, harness, cart covers, sweeping machines, etc., amounting for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, to \$65,000, and for the Borough of Brooklyn, to \$145,000. On July 15 the Board of Estimate and Apportionment passed a resolution approving of this bond issue for the Borough of Brooklyn, and on July 26 approved of the issue for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. Both these resolutions have been rejected by the Honorable Board of Aldermen.

The urgent necessity for these supplies cannot be overestimated or their importance too strongly emphasized. The condition of many of the horses of the Department now doing daily work is well-nigh deplorable, and this work cannot be continued by them except for a comparatively short time. The strain to which they have been necessarily subjected is beyond animal endurance, and the only hope of improving these conditions depends upon a large increase in the present number, and until that is possible these conditions must grow worse daily. The depleted condition of this Department in the matter of horses, carts, etc., in one single street cleaning district necessitated, during January, February and March of this year the employment daily of from fifty to sixty double trucks at the rate of six dollars per day, and this hiring continued practically throughout the winter, resulting in a largely increased cost to the Department over what it would have been had the equipment been sufficient. In other parts of the city large numbers of horses were also hired for the same purpose, and this necessitated added expense to the City, which would have been avoided had the Department been properly equipped.

Table E will show the total number of Department horses on hand January 1, 1902; the number purchased since that date, also the number remaining on hand October 1, 1902. From the appended table it will be seen that there were on hand and purchased since January 1, 1902, in the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, 1,656 horses, and on October 1, 1902, there were remaining on hand 1,301 horses, showing a loss of 355 horses, or, in other words, the Department lost five horses more than the 350 that had been purchased during the period named, so that at present writing the Department is worse off in the matter of horse flesh than when I took office. There are a number of causes that have contributed, namely: first, there were a number of old and worn-out horses, others were unserviceable and had passed their period of usefulness, due to excessive hard work, and the constant strain to which they were necessarily subjected, which involved their covering an average distance of twenty miles a day for six days in the week, and a somewhat lighter task on Sundays. Others again died from disease or injuries incidental to departmental work. Besides the distance of twenty miles per day traveled by these horses, the appended table marked F shows the increased burden in loads hauled by them in a comparison of the average number of loads hauled daily (excluding Sundays) in the year 1901, as compared with the daily number of loads hauled for the first six months of 1902. This table will also show a comparison between the number of loads hauled during the first three months of the years 1901 and 1902, and showing an excess in 1902 over the year 1901 of 45,973 loads for the three months named only, and this may serve to give some idea of the increased task which it was necessary to put upon the Department horses, the equipment and the entire Department force as well.

I have appended a table marked G in order that a correct idea may be formed of the growth of the work in that particular location in the City bounded by Broadway, East Houston street, Broome street and the East river. This comprises what is designated in the Department as the Fourteenth and Sixteenth Sections, both of which are most difficult to keep in anything approaching a proper and sanitary condition, and this exhibit will show a comparison between the number of loads hauled in these two sections for a given time in the years 1901 and 1902.

During these months of July, August and September, which are the lightest months of the year in this collecting account, it has been possible to haul from the lower parts of the city, where the population does not leave town for the summer months and is much more dense, the ashes, rubbish and garbage which are their daily output. Now that the inhabitants in the residential portion of the town are beginning to return to their houses and are requiring an increase of service it will be necessary to withdraw from the tenement house districts and return to the residential portion of the city those horses and carts which have been transferred for the purpose of collecting in the tenement house districts. It is impossible, with the number of horses and carts at present at our disposal, to handle the collection in anything like a proper manner. Already our horses are hauling loads of a yard and a half cubic measurement twenty miles a day, and many as far as five-and-twenty miles. This overwork is pressing upon the Department and rapidly wearing out its horses.

I have gone at length into this subject in order that there may not be the slightest misunderstanding in regard to the nature and growth of the work of the Department, its paramount importance, and the urgent necessity for the requisite amount of money with which to purchase such articles and equipment as are absolutely needed to prosecute the work in an efficient, thorough and sanitary manner.

Final Disposition.

The garbage collected by the Department is finally disposed of by the New York Sanitary Utilization Company at their reduction plant at Barren Island, and is not a charge to the Department save for the payment of the monthly contract price, which is \$19,333.33. The ashes and rubbish have been disposed of by placing them upon land fills, mainly at Riker's Island, during these months, from July 1 to September 5 no material of any sort being dumped at sea. On the 5th of September, owing to a break in the crib at Riker's Island, due to its faulty construction, it was necessary to send material again to sea. This break being closed by a boom of logs and timber, we are again continuing our fill at this point.

Beginning on February 18 last, ashes and rubbish have been constantly filled within the crib at Riker's Island. At first the scows were unloaded by hand labor and wheelbarrows. This was a tentative effort, resulting so successfully that a one-yard "orange peel" bucket was installed upon the pier at the northerly end of the island, and it, with its attendant train of cars, continued this fill until June 20, when there was added the dredge "Hell Gate," loaned to this Department by the United States Government, together with the steam pump "Hudson" and the tow boat "Gen. A. A. Humphries." The dredge "Hell Gate" having a five-yard bucket, is capable of unloading four scows a day. This material was placed within the crib and blown into position and leveled by a two and one-half inch stream of salt water driven with great force by the powerful pumps of the "Hudson." As soon as the material reached a proper height within the fill it was covered by eighteen inches of earth taken from the Island. This material has so improved in quality by reason of the efficient primary separation spoken of in my last report that it can be handled in a perfectly sanitary manner in making these land fills. At present writing we have put in behind the crib at Riker's Island 182,245 cubic yards, making a redeemed surface of land ready for the City uses of about ten acres. The lowest estimated value which can be placed upon this land is \$10,000 per acre. The total area of this crib being sixty-three and one-half acres, with increased machinery we will be enabled, I trust, to complete it within the next twelve months, thus adding sixty-three and one-half acres to the City property. This work has been done with the aid of Dr. Lederle, the President of the Board of Health, who has in every way assisted this Department with his advice and counsel in the sanitary handling of this entire work. Other material during these months, which could not be handled at Riker's Island due to the lack of proper machinery, was sent to land fills at Newark and Dutch Kills. This was done in order that the beaches during the bathing season might be kept free from pollution which has caused so much discomfort during past years.

I would respectfully call your attention to the fact that this Department owns but twenty-two flat scows and three steam dumpers. All other means of water transportation for handling the output of the city wastes must be hired from private owners. The three steam dumpers cannot be used for making land fill owing to their peculiar construction. The twenty-two flat scows were built in 1880 and 1881, five by J. D. Leary and eighteen (one scow was lost at sea) by Poillon. They are now old, rotten and unseaworthy, and are a large and constant expense in the way of repairs. There has been spent for scow hire since January 1, 1898, as follows:

At this present rate of expenditure it should amount to about \$160,000 for the year 1902. Could this money have been expended for the building of scows instead of for the hiring, we would have our scows and from 40 to 50 per cent. of the estimated total cost for the year.

In view of this enormous expenditure for scow hire, on June 21 I requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the appropriation of a bond issue of \$100,000 for the construction of twenty scows, in order that the City might own a part at least of the water transportation necessary for the handling of its wastes. This was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and forwarded to the Honorable Board of Aldermen and there rejected. It is an increasing necessity that the City should own its own means of water transportation. At any time by a shortage in the scow market or by a cabal the price of scow hire can be advanced indefinitely, and the output of the city waste cannot be handled in this island at present writing without water transportation.

I append to this report a copy of a letter to me bearing on this subject from Captain Alexander Ross Piper, who during these months was Superintendent of Final Disposition and to whom belongs the credit of most efficiently carrying out all the detail of the land fill at Riker's Island, the keeping of the beaches clean and the formation of the contract for final disposition of ashes and rubbish in the Borough of Brooklyn by means of the electrical trolley system. He has proved himself in his department a most efficient officer. It will be exceedingly difficult to replace him.

*Owing to indisposition of Commissioner Nagle, due to a broken leg, the Deputy Commissioner, Captain Francis Marion Gibson, late of the Seventh Cavalry, was in charge on the 1st of June, 1901, and on account of a very large shortage in the sweeping account he laid off 500 Sweepers on the 3d of June and 200 on the 14th of July. This accounts for the large decrease in the number of Sweepers during these two months in 1901. We are still over 200 Sweepers below the force of September 1, 1900.

Hon. JOHN MCGAW WOODBURY, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Nos. 13 to 21 Park Row, City:

Sir—I have the honor to place before you the following proposition, which from a business standpoint I believe should be taken up.

The Bureau of Final Disposition at this season, when there is less amount of refuse to dispose of than at any other time of the year, is hiring from forty (40) to fifty (50) scows per day. These scows are used in connection with the twenty-two (22) which are owned by the Department. The hiring of a single scow amounts in the year to \$1,825 as a minimum. In the winter season the number of scows hired runs as high as sixty (60). In view of these facts I have the honor to request that this Department be permitted to contract for the building of twenty (20) flat scows, at a price of from \$4,000 to \$5,000. Such an investment would make a direct saving to the City of about \$1,000 per year per scow. If we allowed \$5,000 per scow the interest on \$5,000 at 5 per cent. would be \$250. Depreciation should be figured from 5 to 10 per cent., and taking the maximum would amount to \$500 per year. Repairs would certainly not run during the first five years more than \$50 to \$75 per year. The excess of the price of hiring is about \$1,000 per year per scow, and twenty scows will, therefore, save the city about \$20,000.

I believe it is good business for the City to own its own plant and thus obviate any chance of having the City placed at the mercy of contractors, who may by combination, at times, prevent the City from obtaining scows.

I suggest the building of twenty scows at present and twenty scows later, giving the Department an equipment of about sixty scows, and I think the market can be depended upon to supply the balance, as it is not probable that all scow owners would at any time go into a combination.

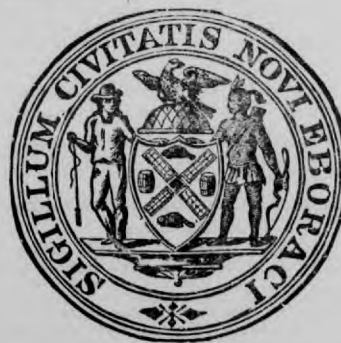

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which with the proper envelope in which to enclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
