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## BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

The City of New York, September 1, 1903.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at the office of the Mayor, at 11.30 o'clock a. m.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Copies of the minutes of the meeting held August 19, 1903, were presented by the Acting Secretary and approved by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Mr. Marsh, representing the Comptroller, was present, and in response to advertisements in the "City Record" and in the corporation newspapers in the Borough of Brooklyn, of date July 28, 1903, the following bids or proposals were received for the erection and completion of the proposed armory building for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, in the Borough of Brooklyn, namely:

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the bids and proposals for the erection and completion of the proposed armory building for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, N. G. N. Y., in the Borough of Brooklyn, be referred to the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens, for tabulation and report at a meeting of the Armory Board, to be held Thursday, September 3, 1903, at 12.30 o'clock p. m.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Acting Secretary presented a statement of appropriations and expenditures on armory accounts up to and including August 31, 1903.

The Acting Secretary presented a notice of violation from the Bureau of Buildings as to plumbing work being done in the Forty-seventh Regiment Armory by an unregistered plumber without a permit from the Bureau of Buildings.

The Acting Secretary reported that the Armory Board was doing no work in the building in question, but was advised that the work was being done by the State, and he was directed to so communicate to the Bureau of Buildings.

A communication was received from Jacob Leitner, Third and Wendover avenues, submitting for the consideration of the Armory Board a plot of land as an armory site, located on the northerly side of One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, between Cauldwell and Trinity avenues.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx.

The Acting Secretary presented the bill of A. D. F. Hamlin, advisory architect, for professional services in conducting the competition for the proposed armory building for Troop C.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Armory Board does hereby approve the bill and expense of A. D. F. Hamlin, architect, amounting to five hundred dollars (\$500), for professional services as advisory architect in connection with the proposed armory for Troop "C," N. G. N. Y., in the Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with the resolution of the Armory Board of date April 11, 1902, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur and the Comptroller authorized to pay the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Acting Secretary presented the bill of Clinton & Russell, for professional

services, in connection with the new armory building for the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G. N. Y.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Messrs. Clinton & Russell, architects, the sum of fifteen thousand four hundred and thirty-two dollars and fifty cents (\$15,432.50), on account, as per accompanying voucher, for professional services rendered in connection with the preparation of plans for the armory for the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G. N. Y., at Thirty-fourth street and Fourth avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Acting Secretary presented the bill of Homer L. Bartlett for a survey of Troop "C" site.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Armory Board does hereby approve the bill and expense of a survey of the site for the proposed armory for Troop "C," N. G. N. Y., in the Borough of Brooklyn, on the easterly side of Bedford avenue, extending from President to Union street, of Homer L. Bartlett, in the sum of one hundred and sixteen dollars (\$116), and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur and the Comptroller authorized to pay.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Acting Secretary presented the bills of Horgan & Slattery for professional services for the preparation of plans and specifications and details and the supervision of the work in the erection of the First Battery armory, in the Borough of Manhattan, namely, contract of Michael J. O'Brien, balance \$206.48, and Luke A. Burke, balance one thousand nine hundred and thirty-two dollars and twenty-five cents (\$1,932.25).

The Mayor offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay Messrs Horgan & Slattery, architects, the sum of two hundred and six dollars and forty-eight cents (\$206.48), as per accompanying voucher, in full for professional services in preparing plans and specifications for the armory building for the First Battery, N. G. N. Y., and installation of the plumbing and gas fitting therein, in the Borough of Manhattan, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be respectfully requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Messrs. Horgan & Slattery, architects, the sum of one thousand nine hundred and thirty-two dollars and twenty-five cents (\$1,932.25), as per accompanying voucher, in full for professional services in connection with the preparation of plans, specifications and details for, and the supervision of the construction of the First Battery Armory on West Sixty-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be respectfully requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Acting-Secretary presented the bills of Werner & Windolph, architects, for professional services in preparing plans and specifications for the removal of violations on several of the armories in Manhattan, Brooklyn and Queens, and stated that the approval of these plans and specifications by the Advisory Architects had only been received the evening previous. The Acting Secretary was directed to communicate with the architects, and advise them that as soon as the estimates for the work could be received on which to base their fee for professional services, the bills would be audited.

Communications were received from Hunt & Hunt, of dates August 27 and 29, calling attention to the transmittal of the specifications for the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory and the approval of the plans by the Bureau of Buildings; also presenting bills for professional services.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Messrs. Hunt & Hunt, architects, the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500) on account, in accordance with the "Programme of Competition," as per accompanying voucher, for professional services in preparing plans and specifications for the armory building for the Sixty-ninth Regiment, N. G. N. Y., in the Borough of Manhattan, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be respectfully requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Acting Secretary presented the bill of Lord & Hewlett for payment, on account for professional services in the preparation of plans for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and the Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Messrs. Lord & Hewlett, architects, the sum of three thousand one hundred and seventy-eight dollars and fifty-seven cents (\$3,178.57), as per accompanying voucher, on account, for professional services rendered in connection with the preparation of plans for the armory for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, N. G. N. Y., in the Borough of Brooklyn, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A motion to adjourn to Thursday, September 3, 1903, at 12.30 o'clock p. m., was adopted by the following vote:

## BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

The City of New York, September 3, 1903.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at the office of the Mayor at 12.30 o'clock p. m.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with.

The committee to whom was referred, at the meeting held September 1, the bids and proposals for the erection of the proposed armory building for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, in the Borough of Brooklyn, reported that they find the bids of James McFerran, No. 106 East Twenty-third street, for the erection and completion of the armory, the lowest, and recommend the acceptance of the bid marked "Alternative B," which provides for a copper roof on the drill shed, at the sum of \$342,000. They recommend that, for this purpose, an appropriation of \$56,000 be made, in order to accept the bid of James McFerran; and submitted the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the report of the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens be received and adopted; that the sum of fifty-six thousand be and hereby is



appropriated for the erection of the proposed armory building for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, in addition to the \$310,000 heretofore appropriated; that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same, and the Comptroller authorized to issue the necessary bonds therefor, under the provisions of section 134 of the Military Code.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the bid of James McFerran, of No. 106 East Twenty-third street, in the Borough of Manhattan, for materials and work required in the erection and completion of the Second Battalion Naval Militia Armory Building, in the Borough of Brooklyn, The City of New York, amounting to the sum of three hundred and forty-two thousand dollars (\$342,000), for Alternative "B," be accepted as being the lowest bid for said work, subject to the concurrence of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in these resolutions and to the Comptroller's approval of the sureties thereon; that when the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have so concurred, and the Comptroller has approved the sureties, the Chairman of this Board be authorized to execute the contract on behalf of the Board.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That all the other bids be rejected, and that the Comptroller be requested to return the amounts deposited by the unsuccessful bidders.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A representative appeared before the Board and desired to make a correction in the bid of L. W. Seaman, Jr., & Son, for the erection and completion of the armory building for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, which had been presented at the previous meeting; he stated that the firm, in making their bid, had erred in the amount. He said that Alternative B should have been \$367,500, Alternative C should have been \$366,500, and Alternative E should have been \$349,500.

His statement was received.

A communication was received from Major Bridgman, commanding Squadron "A," relative to suitable stable room for that organization.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the application of Major Bridgman for suitable stable accommodations for Squadron "A" be referred to the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A motion to adjourn was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments,

## BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Sections 30 and 106 of the Plumbing Rules and Regulations of the Borough of Brooklyn are hereby amended to read:

Sec. 39. "All connections between lead pipes and between brass or copper pipes must be made by means of wiped solder joints, and all floor flanges of all sanitary fixtures and all connections between said fixtures and waste or soil pipes, where said connections are on outlet or sewer side of trap, shall be made without the use of red lead, putty, plaster, cement or any other similar substance."

Sec. 106. "All earthenware traps must have heavy brass floor plates, soldered to the lead bends, or, where brass or iron pipes are used, to be screwed to the same and bolted to the trap flange, and the joint to be made gas-tight without the use of red or white lead or any similar substance or rubber washers, the use of which, in the making of said connections, is hereby prohibited, and no device for such connections will be permitted to be used unless it has been approved by the Bureau of Buildings."

The Plumbing Rules and Regulations for the Borough of Brooklyn are hereby amended by adding the following sections:

### PART XVI.

#### Gas Piping and Fixtures.

Sec. 161. Hereafter the gas piping and fixtures in all new buildings and all alterations and extensions made to the gas piping or fixtures in old buildings must be done in accordance with the following rules, which are made in accordance with the provisions of section 89 of the Building Code.

For additional requirements of public buildings, theatres and places of assembly, see Part XXI. of the Building Code.

Sec. 162. Before the construction or alteration of any gas piping in any building or part of any building, a permit must be obtained from the Superintendent of Buildings. This permit will be issued only to a registered plumber and in conjunction with the permit for plumbing and drainage. Application must include all floor plans complete, showing each and every outlet and the number of burners to go on each outlet. Small alterations may be made by notifying the Bureau of Buildings, using the same blank forms provided for alterations and repairs to plumbing.

Sec. 163. Before any fixtures are connected with the gas piping, a permit must be obtained from the Superintendent of Buildings, application for same to be made on forms furnished by the Bureau of Buildings.

Sec. 164. All gas pipe shall be of the best quality wrought iron and of the kind classed as standard pipe and shall weigh according to the following scale:

3/8-inch, 0.56 pounds per foot;  
1/2-inch, 0.85 pounds per foot;  
3/4-inch, 1.12 pounds per foot;  
1-inch, 1.67 pounds per foot;  
1 1/4-inch, 2.24 pounds per foot;  
1 1/2-inch, 2.68 pounds per foot;  
2-inch, 3.61 pounds per foot;  
2 1/2-inch, 5.75 pounds per foot;  
3-inch, 7.54 pounds per foot;  
3 1/2-inch, 9.00 pounds per foot;  
4-inch, 10.66 pounds per foot.

No pipe allowed of less than 3/8 inch in diameter.

Sec. 165. All fittings (excepting stop cocks or valves) shall be of malleable iron.

Sec. 166. There shall be a heavy brass straightway cock or valve on the service pipe immediately inside the front foundation wall.

Iron cocks or valves are not permitted.

Sec. 167. Where it is not impracticable so to do, all risers shall be left not more than five feet from front wall.

Sec. 168. No pipe shall be laid so as to support any weight (except fixtures) or be subjected to any strain whatsoever. All pipe shall be properly laid and fastened to prevent becoming trapped, and shall be laid, when practicable, above timbers or beams instead of beneath them. Where running lines or branches cross beams they must do so within thirty-six inches of the end of the beams, and in no case shall the said pipes be let into the beams more than two inches in depth. Any pipe laid in a cold or damp place shall be properly dripped, protected and painted with two coats of red lead and boiled oil or tarred.

Sec. 169. No gas pipe shall be laid in cement or concrete unless the pipe and channel in which it is placed are well covered with tar, nor within six inches of an electric wire, excepting where they immediately join outlets.

Sec. 170. All drops must be set plumb and securely fastened, each one having at least one soldered strap. Drops and outlets less than 3/4 of an inch in diameter shall not be left more than one inch below plastering, centre-pieces or woodwork.

Sec. 171. All outlets and risers shall be left capped until covered by fixtures.

Sec. 172. No unions or running threads shall be permitted. Where necessary to cut out to repair leaks or make extensions, pipe shall be again put together with right and left couplings.

Sec. 173. No gasfitters' cement shall be used, except in putting fixtures together.

Sec. 174. All gas brackets and fixtures shall be placed so that the burners of same are not less than three feet below any ceiling or woodwork, unless the same is properly protected by a shield, in which case the distance shall not be less than eighteen inches.

No swinging or folding gas brackets shall be placed against any stud partition or woodwork.

No gas bracket on any lath and plaster partition or woodwork shall be less than five inches in length, measured from the burner to the plaster surface or woodwork. Gas lights placed near window curtains or any other combustible material shall be protected by a proper shield.

Sec. 175. Gas outlets for burners shall not be placed under tanks, back of doors or within four feet of any meter.

Sec. 176. All buildings shall be piped according to the following scale:

Pipe 3/8 inch, 26 feet, 3 burners;  
Pipe 1/2 inch, 36 feet, 6 burners;  
Pipe 3/4 inch, 60 feet, 20 burners;  
Pipe 1 inch, 80 feet, 35 burners;  
Pipe 1 1/4 inches, 110 feet, 60 burners;  
Pipe 1 1/2 inches, 150 feet, 100 burners;  
Pipe 2 inches, 200 feet, 200 burners;  
Pipe 2 1/2 inches, 300 feet, 300 burners;  
Pipe 3 inches, 450 feet, 450 burners;  
Pipe 3 1/2 inches, 500 feet, 600 burners;  
Pipe 4 inches, 600 feet, 750 burners.

Sec. 177. Outlets for gas ranges shall have a diameter not less than required for six burners, and all gas ranges and heaters shall have a straightway cock on service pipe.

Sec. 178. When brass piping is used on the outside of plastering or woodwork it shall be classed as fixtures.

Sec. 179. All brass tubing used for arms and stems of fixtures shall be at least No. 18 standard gauge and full size outside, so as to cut a full thread. All threads on brass pipe shall screw in at least 5-16 of an inch. All rope or square tubing shall be brazed or soldered into fittings and distributors, or have a nipple brazed into the tubing.

Sec. 180. All cast fittings, such as cocks, swing joints, double centres, nozzles, etc., shall be extra heavy brass. The plugs of all cocks must be ground to a smooth and true surface for their entire length, be free from sand-holes, have not less than 3/4 of an inch bearing (except in cases of special design), have two flat sides on the end for the washer, and have two nuts instead of a tail screw. All stop pins to keys or cocks shall be screwed into place.

Sec. 181. After all piping is fitted and fastened and all outlets capped up, there must be applied by the plumber, in the presence of an Inspector of the Bureau of Buildings, a test with air to a pressure equal to a column of mercury 6 inches in height, and the same to stand for five minutes; only mercury gauge shall be used. No piping shall be covered up, nor shall any fixture, gas, heater or range, be connected thereto until a card showing the approval of this test has been issued by the Superintendent of Buildings. And, again, when all fixtures are hung, a similar test shall be applied in exactly the same manner, excepting that one burner fixture will be omitted to permit of applying a pump and gauge. On the Inspector's report of this test as above, a final approval card in duplicate will be issued by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Sec. 182. No meter will be set by any gas company until a certificate is filed with them from the Bureau of Buildings certifying that the gas pipes and fixtures comply with the foregoing rules.

Sec. 183. When for any reason, it may be impracticable to comply strictly with the foregoing rules, the Superintendent of Buildings shall have power to modify their provisions so that the spirit and substance thereof shall be complied with. Such modification shall be endorsed upon the permit over the signature of the Superintendent of Buildings.

Resolved, That in accordance with the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, the request of the Department of Street Cleaning for authority to transfer George Breck from the position of Section Foreman to that of Clerk be denied, the examinations for the respective positions being essentially different, and

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he is hereby instructed to call the attention of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning to the necessity of assigning Mr. Breck to perform duties appropriate to the title held by him.

A letter was presented from the Commissioners of Accounts forwarding a copy of a letter addressed to the Mayor with reference to filling a vacancy in the position of Examining Engineer at a salary of \$1,800 per annum. The letter was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Commissioners of Accounts with reference to the case of W. B. Kaufman, Clerk, who desires to be increased from \$1,200 to \$1,500 per annum without examination, in view of the fact that he formerly held a position at a salary of \$1,640.

On motion, the Assistant Secretary was instructed to inform the Commissioners of Accounts that it would be necessary for Mr. Kaufman to pass a competitive examination for promotion.

A letter was presented from the Department of Education, accompanied by a printed description of the duties performed by John Sheridan, Inspector of New Buildings, whose salary the Department desires to increase from \$27 to \$30 per week. After consideration, the Commission decided that for purposes of promotion the position of Inspector of New Buildings should be considered to be included in Schedule E.

A letter was presented from the Health Commissioner, communicating a copy of an opinion of the Corporation Counsel to the effect that where the act of the head of a department in removing an employee is simply one of discretion, and not the result of a judicial investigation, the action based on this discretion can be changed and the order of removal can be rescinded, and informing the Commission that in accordance with this opinion of the Corporation Counsel, he had reinstated John G. Tate, a Clerk who was removed on charges on April 23, 1903. On motion, duly seconded, it was

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
