No. 410.

Resolved, That in pursuance of section 407 of the Greater New York Charter, the Building Committee of this Board be and is hereby directed to prepare and report to this Board a "Building Code" in amended and revised form, providing therein for all matters concerning, affecting or relating to the construction, alteration and removal of buildings or structures erected, or to be erected, in The City of New York; and it is further

Resolved, That for the purpose of properly preparing said Building Code the said committee be and it is hereby authorized to engage the services of the following experts, each of whom shall be a resident of The City of New York, and shall have been engaged not less than five years in his respective calling, to wit:

Two (2) architects, one (1) structural engineer, one (1) sanitary engineer, one (1) engineer recommended by the Board of Fire Underwriters, two (2) master builders, two (2) mechanics skilled in building trades, and one (1) lawyer, and such clerical assistants as may be necessary.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, May 29, 1906.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, June 12, 1906, without his approval or disapproval thereof; therefore, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it.

No. 411.

Resolved, That, pursuant to subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds in the amount of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for the purchase of an automobile for the use of the Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan.

Whereas, The Exempt Volunteer Firemen's Association of the State of New York will hold their thirty-fourth annual convention at Jamestown, N. Y., during the week beginning August 20, 1906; and

Whereas, Many of the old heroes are nearing the last alarm; and

Whereas, Many of these veterans we hold in such esteem are employed in the various departments of The City of New York; and

Whereas, Under the several administrations of the City preceding the present one all honor was paid to these worthy veterans and time allowed them to attend their various conventions; and

Whereas, We find that it is but doing justice to the men who protected our homes at the risk of their lives in days gone by; therefore be it

Resolved, That all employees of The City of New York who are exempt veteran firemen be allowed four days, with pay, from August 21 to August 24, 1906, inclusive, provided that in each case satisfactory proof shall be given to the head of the Department that such employee has attended the thirty-fourth annual convention of the Firemen's Association, which is to be held at Jamestown, N. Y., during the week beginning August 20, 1906; and be it further

Resolved, That his Honor George B. McClellan, Mayor of The City of New York, be and is hereby respectfully requested to attach his signature of approval to the resolution of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for the purpose of purchasing and erecting additional street signs in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 27, 1906, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purpose therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding five thousand dollars (\$5,000), for the purpose of purchasing and erecting additional street signs in the Borough of Brooklyn, and that, when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding five thousand dollars (\$5,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purpose aforesaid."

No. 414.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), for the purpose of providing means to pay for carefully studied plans of the completed museum building and accessories, etc., in connection with the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences, Borough of Brooklyn.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 27, 1906, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes specified.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of Section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), for the purpose of providing means to pay for carefully studied plans of the completed museum building and accessories, etc., in connection with the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences, Borough of Brooklyn, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid; and be it further

Resolved, That if the architects who prepare the preliminary plans and drawings should furnish the final plans, detail drawings, specifications and supervision for the work of erection and equipment of any addition to said museum building, the compensation for such services to be four per cent. (4%) on the cost of the work until the entire cost of the said work not heretofore undertaken shall equal \$5,000,000.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and requested to advance the Department of Education, for the expenses of the representation of the Department of Education at the Milan Exposition, and for the maintenance of the New York Public School exhibit at said Exposition, from the Special School Fund of the Department of Education for the current year, and from the appropriation therein entitled Incidental Expenses, the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200); the said sum to be accounted for by vouchers to be subsequently submitted to the Comptroller for approval.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of eleven hundred dollars (\$1,100) to provide means for the acquisition of property on Flatbush avenue and Sterling place, Borough of Brooklyn, the examination of the title and surveys of the same.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment May 18, 1906, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Whereas, The Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen reports at its meeting held May 8, 1906, that the matter of the issue of Corporate Stock for the acquisition of property at the intersection of the northeasterly side of Flatbush avenue with the southerly side of Sterling place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, be returned to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment so that the same can be returned to the Board of Aldermen, with extension of time to investigate the matter; and

Whereas, It will therefore be necessary to readopt the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted March 30, 1906, authorizing the acquisition of the property and the issue of Corporate Stock; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves and selects the following lands and premises located in the Borough of Brooklyn, for use as a Municipal Court Room, which lands are bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point at the intersection of the northeasterly side of Flatbush avenue with the southerly side of Sterling place and running thence easterly along the southerly side of Sterling place 186 feet 3 inches; running thence southerly at right angles with Sterling place 57 feet 3 inches; running thence northwesterly 27 feet 1 inch; running thence southerly on a line drawn at right angles to Flatbush avenue 82 feet 9 inches to the northeasterly side of Flatbush avenue, and running thence northwesterly along the northeasterly side of Flatbush avenue 146 feet 1 inch to the point or place of beginning, said premises being known as old Lots Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 in old Block 7, Ninth Ward, now known as Lots Nos. 12, 11, 10, 9 and 18 in Block 1169, section 4, on the tax maps of the Borough of Brooklyn for the purposes of taxation, and which said lots were heretofore sold for the non-payment of taxes July 22, 1903, certificates of the sale of which were delivered to the Comptroller of The City of New York, are registered in the office of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears in the Borough of Brooklyn, in Liber 83 by the certificates Nos. 7502, 7503, 7504, 7505, 7506.

—and the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to enter into contracts for the acquisition of the above-described property at a price not exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1,000), said contracts to be taken by the City subject only to taxes, assess-

ments and water rates and sales for the same due and unpaid, said contracts to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding eleven hundred dollars (\$1,100) to provide for the acquisition of the above-described property, the examination of the title and surveys of the same, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding eleven hundred dollars (\$1,100), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
