Ordered, That all persons in said building, situated on Lot No. 143 Allen street, in the Borough of Manhattan, be required to vacate said building on or before May 10, 1904, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing and draining thereof, and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises likely to cause sickness among its occupants.

And further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of and in said building and be served as the law requires, under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent.

Whereas, The premises No. 327 East One Hundred and Twenty-second street, Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being, in the opinion of the Board, in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom.

That the front area be cleaned and disinfected; that the opening of the 6-inch soil pipe in the cellar be sealed gas-tight; that the storage of foodstuffs in the cellar be discontinued.

That the wooden floor of horse stalls and stable and the saturated earth beneath same be removed, the site cleaned and disinfected, and the floors of the stalls be cemented and so graded as to discharge all liquids into a water-tight, properly trapped, sewer-connected valley drain; that each stall be provided with a movable rack.

Whereas, The premises Nos. 324 to 328 East One Hundred and Eighth street, Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being, in the opinion of the Board, in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom.

That the saturated earth be removed from beneath the stable floor, the ground space cleaned and disinfected, and cemented and so graded and drained as to discharge all liquid filth therefrom into properly trapped, sewer-connected drains; that the privy vault in yard be emptied, cleaned and disinfected and filled with fresh earth; that the yard be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected; that hereafter all manure be kept inside the stalls and removed from the premises daily, unless pressed in bales, barrels or boxes, so as to reduce it to not more than one-third the original bulk; that the walls and ceilings of the rag-shop be cleaned and whitewashed.

Whereas, The premises No. 96 Cherry street, Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being, in the opinion of the Board, in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the roofs, the vacant rooms and the cellar be each cleaned and disinfected and all refuse removed; that the floors of the halls, stairs and rooms throughout the house be cleaned and scrubbed; that all paper be removed from the walls and ceilings throughout the halls and rooms, and the walls and ceilings of the halls and rooms throughout the house and of the cellar be cleaned and whitewashed; that all loose plaster be removed from the ceilings in the extension rooms; that the floors of the rooms in the extension be properly repaired and made secure; that the main roof and the roof of the extension and the water supply pipes and valves of the water-closets in the yard be each repaired so as not to leak; that properly adjusted, new metal flashings be placed about the woodwork over each sink; that the main waste pipe from sinks be ventilated by extending the same in full calibre with all joints properly lead-calked through and not less than two feet above the roof; that the defective earthenware house drain be removed, its site cleaned and disinfected and filled with fresh earth and replaced by extra heavy cast-iron pipe, at least six inches in diameter, with all joints properly lead-calked and connected to the house sewer by a gas-tight joint, and that it be provided with a fresh-air inlet of similar material, at least four inches in diameter, and with running trap, placed near the front wall of the building, provided with proper handholes and trap screw ferrules.
