REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1908.

His Honor the Mayor, City Hall, New York City:

Sir—As required by section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to sulmit the following report for the quarter ending December 31, 1908:

On December 31, 1908, the total force was 9,958. In addition there were on pro-

On December 31, 1908, the total force was 9,958. In addition there were on probation 48 Patrolmen and 6 Doormen, or a total of 10,012.

The effective force on December 31, 1908, was 8,559; absent with leave, 117; without leave, 2; sick, 228; suspended 4; detailed 1,048; or a total of 9,958; During the last quarter the bisses in the several ranks were as follows:

Retired—Inspector, 1; Captain, 1; Lieutenants, 5; Sergeants, 5; Patrolmen, 34; Doormen, 3. Total, 49.

Died—Lieutenant, 1; Sergeants, 3; Patrolmen, 13; Matron, 1. Total, 18, Dismissed—Captain, 1; Sergeant, 1; Patrolmen, 19; Patrolmen on probation, 17. Total, 38.
