DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

Report of Transactions, January 24 to January 30, 1910.

Communications Received.

From Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Request for statement of corporate stock fund appropriations made to the Department of Correction and in force on December 31, 1909. Statement transmitted.

From Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Acknowledging receipt of request for modification of Salaries and Salaries and Wages schedules for Department of Correction, 1910, which has been transmitted to the Comptroller. On file with General Bookkeeper and Auditor.

From Civil Service Commission—Stating that letter from Department of Correction had been received, to the effect that five (5) Drivers had been transferred to that Department from the office of the Sheriff of Kings County, transfers to take effect January 1, 1910. Salary, \$1,000 per annum each. Reinstatements have been noted on Civil Service records. (Action taken to comply with requirements of chapter 381, Laws of 1909.) On file.

From Civil Service Commission—Stating that appointment of Thomas McGuire for expert service (typewriting specifications) had been approved and Mr. McGuire had been exempted from examination. Compensation not to exceed \$500 per annum. On file with General Bookkeeper and Auditor.

From Civil Service Commission—Excepting from examination Dr. Charles E. Caulfield, Veterinarian (expert service). Compensation not to exceed \$750 per annum. (See paragraph 6, Rule XII., Civil Service Rules.) On file with General Bookkeeper and Auditor.

From Civil Service Commission—Approving of temporary appointment of Maurice P. Sullivan, for fifteen days, as Mate on Steamboats. Non-competitive examination will be given Mr. Sullivan for appointment pending establishment of an eligible list. On file.

From Civil Service Commission—Transmitting eligible list for position of Resident Physician at Penitentiary, Blackwells Island. All asked to call in reference to appointment.

From Civil Service Commission—Civil Service states that letter was received from former Commissioner, dated January 17, 1910, stating that salaries of eight (8) Keepers had been increased, in accordance with rule as to length of service as Keeper in Department. Secretary states that these salaries cannot be so increased until they shall have passed a promotion examination, with the exception of one, whose increase was from \$900 to \$1,050 per annum, both these amounts being in the same grade. The reason for such ruling by the Civil Service Commission is that on December 10, 1909, a regrading of the prison service became effective, and examinations are now required in order to pass to a higher grade. Examinations will be arranged for at an early date. On file.

From the Comptroller—Receipt for security deposits accompanying proposals for vegetables, opened January 20, 1910. On file with General Bookkeeper and Auditor.

From the Comptroller—Returning proposals, with approval of the sureties thereon: R. P. Lawless, for vegetables; C. H. Matilage, groceries. Awards to be made and contracts drawn.

From State Commission of Prisons—Secretary states that preliminary plans and specifications for new Penitentiary to be erected at Rikers Island were sent to the State Commission of Prisons, but that the final plans and specifications have not been filed. The Commission, therefore, asks that a blue print of the final plans and copy of the final specifications be sent to its office in Albany, as required by the State law. Matter will receive due attention. Receipt of Secretary's letter acknowledged.

From the Armory Board, New York City—Sending list of articles (brooms, brushes, etc.) needed by the armories and asking if same can be furnished from the Penitentiary, Blackwells Island. Referred to Warden of Penitentiary, who reports that all articles on list can be supplied from the Manufacturing Bureau of that institution.

The minutes of January 25, 1910, were read and approved.

Report No. 1838 of the Chief Engineer, dated February 1, 1910, transmitting Estimate No. 39, Croton Falls Construction Company, for month of December, 1909, revised by the deduction of all quantities of work done in connection with the electrozone pipe sewer at the diverting dam, was received and ordered filed.

The Committee on Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of estimate contained in voucher No. 32, amounting to \$70,521.19, which was approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment, by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Cowan, Ten Eyck, Ryan and Windolph—4.

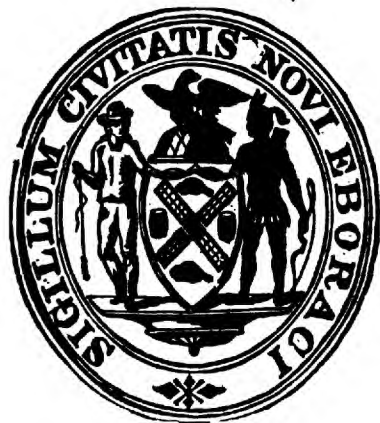
