BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1916.

The Department as a Whole.

Great difficulty has been experienced during the past quarter in obtaining a sufficient number of employees. Up to the middle of October there have been 288 changes in the staff of the laundry and 336 in that of the kitchens and dining rooms. It is difficult under such conditions to obtain an efficient service throughout the hospital.

The department has been forced to appeal for revenue bonds to meet deficiencies and anticipated deficiencies in their annual appropriations. A notice was given that the deficiencies in food supplies would be provided in the manner mentioned, while the remaining deficits might be cared for by a transfer of funds within the appropriations.

Owing to the failure of the contractor to complete the job of altering the grate bars at Bellevue, it has been necessary to buy No. 1 buckwheat coal at a very high cost instead of No. 3 Buckwheat coal under contract. For this reason it has been necessary to ask for special revenue bonds in the amount of \$4,000 for fuel.

In consequence of opening some new departments at Bellevue an additional \$12,000 has been necessary for medical and surgical supplies and equipment.

During the month of December it has been necessary to purchase meats, poultry and eggs in the open market at an expense of \$17,000, the special revenue bonds requested of the Board of Aldermen not having become available. In all, the amount of special revenue bonds requested to cover the departmental deficits was \$51,000.

In execution of the project for the treatment and after-care of infantile paralysis cases, request was made of the Board of Trustees of The New York Orthopaedic Dispensary and Hospital for the use of their old building at 126 E. 59th st., Manhattan. An inspection by the Fire Department, however, showed that the condition of the building was such as to render it inadvisable to adopt its use for the purpose specified. An appropriation of \$1,800 from the City's fund for this purpose was assigned to this department for the payment of the services of temporary employees required in the care of the infantile paralysis cases.

The Trustees protested to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment against the contemplated plan of placing all the repair and maintenance work of the hospitals of this department under the Department of Plant and Structures. Action postponing such transfer was taken by the Board of Estimate, and the Trustees hope that their protest will be heard when the matter comes up again for discussion.

Permission has been given by the Bureau of Municipal Research to make a study of the interne service at Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund having been unable to dispose of the old ferryboat "Westfield," the Trustees advertised the same for auction, and it was finally disposed of for the sum of \$1,105.

Bellevue Hospital.

The reorganization of the medical service has proceeded satisfactorily and several new special services of great value to the community have been inaugurated. On the First (Columbia) Division, the Department of Laryngology and Otology, under the direction of Dr. Cornelius G. Coakley, has been established and it is now organized on a satisfactory basis. The same may be said of the new Neurological Service under the Second (Cornell) Division, of which the Director is Dr. Foster Kennedy, and for which service an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$3,216 has been requested to pay for the salaries of the following additional employees: Graduate Nurses, 1 at \$720 and 1 at \$600 per annum; Pupil Nurses, 6 at \$96 per annum; Men Attendants, 2 at \$240 per annum; Women Hospital Helpers, 4 at \$210 per annum.

The opening of the new Eye Department, under Dr. Charles H. May, Fourth Division, awaits the purchase of the necessary instruments, revenue bonds for which in the amount of \$2,000 have been requested of the Board of Aldermen.

The use of the new X-ray Department of Bellevue Hospital, one of the finest plants in the country, if not in the world, has been delayed, awaiting appropriations for the purchase of the apparatus and equipment. The installation of the department in its new quarters was made on Dec. 20. It has been decided to assign two internes to this department to serve after the fashion of internes on the medical service. They are to receive maintenance, but no salary, and are to serve one year in the department.

The Department is co-operating in the plans of Police Commissioner Woods for the establishment of a Psychopathic Laboratory in the Police Department. It is proposed to have four physicians undertake this work, and, as much of it will be done at Bellevue, it will be desirable to provide maintenance for these men.

The Trustees have already expressed their regret at the resignation of Clara D. Noyes, Superintendent of Training School for Nurses. Miss Noyes will be succeeded by Amy Hilliard, authority for whose appointment under Rule XII, Paragraph 5, of the Civil Service rules, has been requested of the Civil Service Commission. Miss Hilliard reported for duty on Nov. 27.

BUILDING MATTERS.

The Trustees have urged again upon the Board of Estimate the growing need for beginning the construction of Pavilions F and G, the next item on the programme for the completion of Bellevue Hospital. With these pavilions go the construction of the general kitchen, of great importance to the welfare of the patients, especially during the cold weather, when the transference of food for long distances through slippery yards and walks is of serious detriment to the food.

Trouble has been had with the Reliance Engineering Company, contractors for the installation of the power plant equipment. On the recommendation of Mr. John C. Quinn, Combustion Engineer, and the Building Committee, an extension of time to Nov. 10 was allowed this contractor. On Nov. 15 Mr. Quinn reported that this company had discontinued all work under its contract and that most of the work already performed had been executed in bad faith and not in accordance with the specifications, recommending in consequence that the Trustees declare the contract abandoned. This was done and the sureties notified and asked whether or not they would elect to complete the work. This having been declined by them, the Trustees, under clause "K" of the contract, obtained further bids, the lowest of which, that of C. R. Jacobsen, in the sum of \$1,755, was accepted. In view of the urgency of completing the

boilers, an order of the Board in this amount was issued to C. R. Jacobsen to complete the work.

An extension of time for fifteen days, on account of the delay caused by the removal of the furniture in the building, was allowed Charles Schmidt, contractor for the painting work in pavilions A and B. A further extension of an equal number of days was later allowed the same contractor, the reason being inability to allow him possession of the rooms. The work has now been completed in accordance with the plans and specifications and within the time allowed.

Two extensions, the first of forty-five days and the second of six weeks, on account of freight congestion and strikes, had to be allowed the contractors for the erection of the new balconies on pavilions I and K.

The drainage of the roadways around pavilions L and M has now been completed, as well as the curbing and grading of the roadways.

Estimates have been asked for the construction of an iron fence on 1st ave., covering the space from the Pathological Building to the Catholic Chapel.

The payment of the retained percentage on the contract for the construction of the roof wards on pavilions A and B has been made the contractors, the work being satisfactory.

Bids for the alterations to the old Administration Building at Bellevue for the reduction of fire hazards were received on Dec. 12 and the lowest bid, that of A. W. King, in the sum of \$14,487, was accepted and the contract awarded.

Continued efforts on the part of the New York Edison Company to obtain permission to conduct an investigation of the electric and steam plants at Bellevue have met with refusal on the part of the Trustees, whose own investigations have proved satisfactory in convincing them of the relative cost of an individual plant and the service rendered by this company.

Urgent request has been made of the Borough President of Manhattan to have 29th st. paved for the remainder of the distance to the river. Great difficulty has been experienced in getting ashes and garbage removed by the Street Cleaning Department on account of the lack of proper pavement.

The old prison ward has been transformed into a poliomyelitis clinic. The prisoners are now accommodated in one of the wards on the main floor of the old Administration Building, where the conditions are much superior with regard to air and light.

The amount of time spent at the hospital and the number of visits made by physicians and surgeons appointed upon the recommendations of the universities, in accordance with the recent reorganization of the medical and surgical services, is to be the subject of a report to the Trustees by the General Medical Superintendent each month.

The present scattered condition of the several medical services has rendered it very difficult to get patients from the Admitting Office to the wards, and also for visitors to find their way about. Reference has already been made to the difficulty in transporting food. This has been done on trucks, and it is not only hard on the men having to operate these trucks but it is hard on the trucks themselves in going over the rough snow and ice; many have been broken as a result.

Gouverneur Hospital.

An extension of time for sixty days was allowed the John H. Parker Company on their contract for completing the construction of the new Out Patient Department building at Gouverneur. The prevailing freight congestion and the delay in obtaining the site were the grounds for this extension. Very satisfactory progress has been made upon the building. An issue of corporate stock in the sum of \$17,500 has been requested of the Board of Estimate to provide the equipment required for the new building.

The Edison Company has been requested by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to set a meter and electric current in this building, and plans and specifications for the lighting fixtures, at an estimated cost of \$2,250, have been submitted to the Board of Estimate for their approval.

An extension of sixty days on their contract was granted E. Rutzler Company for the heating work in the new building. Delay in completing the floors was the principal reason for this extension. A request by this contractor for permission to omit temporary heating and connections for sterilizers required in the contract was refused by the Trustees as beyond their power, and action was taken at the same time to require them to furnish the heat necessary. On account of the delay of the general contractor in finishing the building, a further extension of thirty days from Dec. 19 was allowed.

A similar extension on the contract for the plumbing work in the new building was rendered necessary by the same conditions. Plans and specifications for additional plumbing fixtures, at an estimated cost of \$5,843, have been transmitted to the Board of Estimate for their approval.

It has been necessary to have spikes driven in order to provide safe anchorage for the new boat camp "John H. Huddleston." The changes necessary to make this boat adaptable to the service to which it has been assigned have now been completed.

Request for the provision of a salary for the Director of the Tuberculosis Service at Gouverneur Hospital was refused by the Board of Estimate.

The Director of the Medical Service at Gouverneur has called attention to the need of a properly equipped laboratory and a full-time laboratory assistant has been asked for by the Trustees, which was allowed in the budget for 1917.

Harlem Hospital.

The Southern Surety Company, which undertook the completion of the abandoned contract of the Andrews Building Company, having failed to proceed with the work with due diligence, the Trustees declared the contract abandoned and notified this company to discontinue all work under it. It was then necessary to proceed in the manner prescribed by law, namely to advertise for bids for the completion of the work, with the provision that should the cost thereof exceed the sum retained on the contract, the expense will be charged to the Southern Surety Company. A new contract for this work was awarded to the Voss Ice Machine Works in the sum of \$5,500, another firm, which bid the same amount, having waived its claim on their bid for this work.

It has been decided to enlarge the ambulance platform at an estimated cost of \$1,557, and to raise the floor of the corridor from the ambulance platform to the level of the floor of the building, thus doing away with the inclined plane and mak-

ing it possible to hang double swinging doors, the doorway to be the entire width of the hall.

Directions have been given for laying out the grounds to the east of the new wing, requiring the construction of a retaining wall between the upper and lower terrace. The space to the north of the building will be laid out as a grass plot.

The request to allow the use of the dental room at the hospital for a clinic for the benefit of Public School 89 had to be declined for the reason that the clinic is in use every day by the hospital's own staff of one Resident and five Visiting Dentists.

The W. H. Jamouneau Company, contractors for the installation of screens and awnings at the hospital, have been requested to show cause why their contract should not be declared abandoned, by reason of their refusal to complete the work.

Fordham Hospital.

The Trustees report, with much regret, the death on Nov. 23 of Dr. T. Joseph Dunn, Visiting Physician at Fordham Hospital.

The installation of a new fire main in place of the old one, which leaked badly, has been authorized and the work accomplished. The lease of the premises at 2333 Cambrerleng ave. has been renewed as a dormitory for the over-flow of nurses engaged in the wards at Fordham.

On the recommendation of Mr. Farley, Chairman of the Building Committee, a steamheating arrangement has been provided for the tent used for the poliomyelitis cases at this hospital.

It has been decided to dispose of the X-ray plates and discontinue records on file at the hospital after a period of five years, on account of the lack of proper storage facilities, provision, however, being made that a written report of the X-ray examinations and records relating thereto be retained.

No provision was made in the Budget for 1917 for a paid Pathologist at this hospital, but such a request will be included in the departmental estimate for 1918.

Neponsit Beach Hospital for Children.

The wards of the hospital have been painted.

The work of the contractors for the construction of balconies at this hospital has been completed and the final payment authorized. The balconies are now at the disposal of the child inmates of this hospital and are of great service in the treatment and care of the patients.

It has been decided to make alterations on the fourth floor of the hospital in order to provide a schoolroom for the patients. This will be undertaken as soon as practicable.




