The Nonkers Gas Company, in the fitting up of new lamps, include service-pipe and standpipes, and these become the property of the city.

The Naphtha Company does not include service-pipe or stand-pipes, as it uses none. In case an award of contract should be made to the Naphtha Company, and at some future time we should require gas, then, in that case, an additional expense would be incurred in fitting service and stand pipes for the gas, of at least \$5 per lamp, or a total of \$375. This would make a difference in favor of Yonkers Gas Company of \$241.

In view therefore of the above fact, and of the greater certainty and efficiency of gas-light, it would appear desirable that the lamps be erected for and lighted with gas.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,604, as follows, viz.: 7 public buildings, 68t tenement-houses, 165 private dwellings, 51 other dwellings, 13 manufactories and workshops, 17 stores and warehouses, 39 stables, 1 market, 41 slaughter-houses, 27 milk inspections, 1 tripe-house, 1 public sewer, 1 fat-rendering establishment, 18 sunken and vacant lots, 1 dock, 1 manure dump, 1 roadway, 50 yards, courts, and areas, 67 cellars and basements, 84 waste-pipes and drains, 254 privies and water-closests, 51 streets, gutters, and sinks, 2 dangerous stairways, 1 smoky, chimney, 2 cesspools, 1 piggery, 10 other nuisances. and sinks, 3 dangerous stairways, I smoky chimney, 2 cesspools, I piggery, 10 other nuisances, together with I visit to case of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 577.

During the past week 200 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary

and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 67 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the

165 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 45 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and funnigated 41 houses, 41 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Corps have disinfected 2,467 privies and water-closets, 396 cellars, 411 yards, courts, and areas, 309 garbage-boxes, and 1383/8 miles of street gutters.

I case of small-pox was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

SIR-831 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday SIR—831 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 14, which is an increase of 158 as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 467 less than the number reported during the corresponding week of 1876. The actual mortality during the week ending July 7, 1877, was 720, which is 174.6 below the average for the corresponding week of the past 5 years, and represents an annual death-rate of 34.74 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,077,490.

The mean temperature for the week, as furnished by Director Draper, of the Central Park Observatory, was 74.0 degrees Fahr., which is 1.6 degrees above that of the preceding week, but 9.9 degrees below that of the corresponding week of 1876. The deaths of children under 5 years

during the week were 530, against 449 for the preceding week, and 862 for the corresponding week of 1876. The residents of the tenement houses appeared to have suffered the greatest during the week, 56.3 per cent. of the total mortality reported were in this class of dwellings. Diarrhoeal diseases in children under 5 years of age caused 355 deaths, against 260 for the preceding week, and 596 for the corresponding week of 1876.

The increase of the mortality during the past compared with the preceding week was from the following causes, viz.: Small-pox, I; diphtheria, I4; malarial fevers, 2; diarrhocal diseases, I03; cancer, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, I6; bronchitis, I; pneumonia, 8; apoplexy, 4; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 27; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 3; typhus fever, I; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; deaths by drowning, 8; and a decrease of 2 from measles, 2 from scarlatina, 2 from erysipelas, 3 from typhoid fever, I from puerperal diseases, 3 from inanition, etc., 2 from rheumatism and gout, I0 from diseases of the heart, 2 from aneurism, 7 from marasmus, and 2 from cirrhosis and benefities.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 100 were in institutions, 468 in tenement-houses, 244 in houses containing 3 families and less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 13 in rivers, boats, streets, etc., 16 were on the basement floor, 202 on the first, 211 on the second, 182 on the third, 89 on the fourth, 16 on the fifth, and 1 on the sixth; 824 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 19 non-residents; 71 were stated as single, 112 married, and 57 widowed, and the condition of 591 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age; 393 deaths were of children under 1 year, 478 under 2 years, 530 under 5 years, and 37 were of persons 70 years

of children under 1 year, 478 under 2 years, 530 under 5 years, and 37 were of persons 70 years and over.

The disposition of 798 deaths and still-births, or 91.30 per cent. of the total number reported were in the following 14 cemeteries, which are in the vicinity of this city, viz.: Bayside (Jewish) 16, Calvary (Roman Catholic) 318, City (pauper burial ground, undenominational) 107, Greenwood (undenominational) 70, Lutheran (undenominational) 144, Cypress Hills (undenominational) 28, Evergreen (undenominational) 47, Woodlawn (undenominational) 20, St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal) 12, Union (Methodist Protestant) 12, Holy Cross (Roman Catholic) 7, Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish) 8, St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic) 3, Washington (undenominational) 6.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 14 was 74.0 degrees Fahr., the mean humidity was 74, saturation being 100, the mean pressure was 29.801 inches, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 838, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.58 inch, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

SIR—There were 831 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 14, 1877, which is an increase of 158, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 467 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending July 7, 1877, was 720, which is 174.6 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 34.74 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,077,490.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of Proceedings for the week ending July 14, 1877.

MEETING, WEDNESDAY, JULY 11.

The opening of the proposals for the construction of a bridge over the Harlem river, at the inter-

section of Madison avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, was further adjourned until Wednesday, the 25th day of July, 1877, at 9:30 A. M., at this office.

Messrs. Cyrus W. Field, James M. Constable, and Albert S. Bickmore were received as a Committee from the "American Zoological and Botanical Garden Company, limited;" and they presented a certificate of the incorporation of the company under the provisions of chapter 611, Laws

of 1875, and requested the Department to appropriate a portion of the Central Park for the purpose of establishing a zoological and botanical garden by said company.

The permission heretofore given allowing children under twelve years to use all portions of the Battery and City Hall Parks for recreation, was discontinued, and it was ordered that in the future

Battery and City Hall Parks for recreation, was discontinued, and it was ordered that in the future no one be allowed to walk on the grass in those parks.

An opinion was received from the Counsel to the Corporation, in which he states that "All the parks and places in the city are under the care and management of the Department of Public Parks, and I think that the general power conferred by the Charter of 1873, upon the Common Council, to regulate the use of the public streets, has been limited by the * * provision of chapter 850 of the Laws of 1873, which was passed subsequent to the Charter; and that within 350 feet from the outer boundary of any public park or place, the Park Department, and not the Common Council, has the power to designate hack stands."

It was referred to the President to report proper rules and regulations in relation to hacks and trucks standing around the public squares and places.

trucks standing around the public squares and places.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment was requested to transfer to the appropriation for "Surveying, laying out, monumenting, etc., north end of the island, and the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards," a sum sufficient to enable that work to be carried on throughout the

The claim of Mr. John G. Gent for \$263.15 for certain extra work in connection with the regulating, etc., of One Hundred and Fifty-first street, in the Twenty-third Ward, was disallowed.

The Civil and Topographical Engineer was directed to prepare plans for sewerage districts, wherever required, in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, in pursuance of the provisions of

chapter 381, Laws of 1865, and of chapters 329 and 604, Laws of 1874, and submit them to the Board for approval.

It was ordered that a pipe be laid from Eighth avenue to the Museum of Natural History Building, for the purpose of supplying Croton water to said building, when such work is approved by the Trustees of the Museum.

It was ordered that a 12-inch pipe be substituted for the present 8-inch drainage pipe at the Museum of Art Building, when such work is approved by the Trustees of the Museum.

The sum of \$1,200 was allowed the Angell & Blake Manufacturing Company on account; also, the sum of \$10,150 to the Receiver of the Watson Manufacturing Company on account of their

The Treasurer was authorized to issue orders for the removal of surplus material from the line of

the Central Park pipe sewer to Manhattan square.

The request of Mr. Michael Noonan for permission to take some rock from the line of certain streets in the Twenty-fourth Ward for use in the construction of the drains in the Twenty-fourth Ward,

was refused. The death of Patrolman Jacob Weismig on July 4th was reported.

Parker McCuen, police tailor, was restored.

The request of Mr. F. Goeiffenberg for three months' leave of absence without pay was

The request of Mr. Philip McMahon for permission to sell upon the Central Park a guide, called the "Central Park Guide," which he has published, was refused.

A communication was received from Mr. W. F. Shank, Engineer of the Gilbert Elevated Railway Co., asking permission to lay the foundations of the columns for the railroad of said company on the sidewalk of Reservoir square, from Fortieth street to Forty-second street, and inclosing a tracing showing the locations of the proposed columns.

Referred to the Counsel to the Corporation for his opinion as to the authority and jurisdiction of

the Department in the premises. In pursuance of a notice sent to each of the owners of property interested in the parade ground, stating that such persons will be heard at this meeting relative to discontinuing proceedings to acquire title to certain streets, etc., etc., Messrs. Jos. H. Godwin and other gentlemen were received and heard on the matter.

Plans were presented for the removal of the three-story trame dwelling-house on Riverside avenue, near One Hundred and Eleventh street, and the construction of a foundation on the new site to which it is to be removed.
