

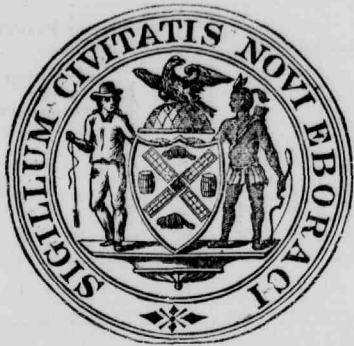

The Board of Health met this day.

Hearing.

M., when the question of house plumbing will be considered.

Action of the Board on Tenement-house Plans.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 556-2) for light and ventilation of the six-story tenement-house, 25 feet 5 inches by 47 feet, proposed to be built on a lot 25 feet 5 inches by 60 feet 9 inches, at No. 339 Washington street, submitted to this Board by J. Connolly, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 561) for light and ventilation of two four-story tenement-houses, each 18 feet by 45 feet, proposed to be built on a lot 50 feet by 54 feet, on the northwest corner of Forty-first street and Third avenue, submitted to this Board by C. C. Buck, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that each of the light shafts have a clear area of 12 square feet, the houses to be each 19 feet wide, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 562) for light and ventilation of the five-story tenement-house, 30 feet by 54 feet, with an extension 36 feet deep by 26 feet wide, proposed to be built on a lot 30 feet by 100 feet, on the north side of Eightieth street, 15 feet east of Lexington avenue, submitted to this Board by Hubert, Pirsson & Co., under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 563) for light and ventilation of the five-story tenement-house proposed to be built at No. 548 West Forty-seventh street, submitted to this Board under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, by Cauvet and Rosenstock, be and is hereby disapproved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 564) for light and ventilation of the four-story tenement-house, 25 feet 5 inches by 60 feet, proposed to be built on a lot 25 feet 5 inches by 100 feet, on the northeast corner of One Hundred and Seventh street and Tenth avenue, submitted to this Board by R. S. Townsend, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that a shaft be constructed 2 feet 6 inches by 5 feet in area, to light and ventilate the inside rooms on the second, third, and fourth floors, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 26, 1880. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,811, as follows, viz.:

3 public buildings, 768 tenement houses, 125 private dwellings, 113 other dwellings, 12 manufacturing and workshops, 23 stores and warehouses, 47 stables, 14 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 gut cleaning establishment, 1 packing house, 24 sunken lots, 1 rag establishment, 1 smelting works, 2 aqueducts, 2 public sewers, 1 pier, 1 lodging house, 1 public bridge, 69 yards, courts, and areas, 75 cellars and basements, 92 waste pipes and drains, 291 privies and water-closets, 35 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 19 dangerous stairways, 5 smoky chimneys, 5 cesspools, 30 other nuisances, together with 76 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 928.

During the past week 238 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 120 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

103 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 73 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 69 houses, 69 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

3 cases of contagious disease were removed to hospital by Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 519 births, 42 still-births, 170 marriages, and 1,038 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 26, 1880; this shows a decrease of 1 birth and 331 deaths, and a decrease of 4 still-births and 53 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was a decrease of 73 births and 74 marriages, and an increase of 4 still-births and 476 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 3; diphtheria, 4; whooping cough, 4; erysipelas, 2; inanition, 1; cancer, 10; bronchitis, 10; heart diseases, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; premature and preterm births, 3; surgical operations, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 2; croup, 9; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 5; diarrhoeal diseases, 278; alcoholism, 4; rheumatism and gout, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 5; pneumonia, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 5; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; convulsions, 5; direct effect of solar heat, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 7; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; drowning, 6. The number of deaths from malarial fevers, aneurism, apoplexy, cirrhosis and hepatitis and suicide, were the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 529 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 664 under two years; 713 under five years, and 39 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age were 327 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 68.69 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 142 were in institutions, 614 in tenement houses, 259 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 17 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 15 were on the basement floor, 217 on the first, 290 on the second, 182 on the third, 131 on the fourth, 36 on the fifth, 5 on the sixth; 1,036 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 non-residents, 76 were stated to be single, 138 married, 61 widowed, and the condition of 763 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 1,038; still-births, 42; bodies in transitu, 17; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 103 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 519 births, 170 marriages, 42 still-births, 1,038 deaths, 17 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 64 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 10 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 34 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 26, 1880, was 78.6 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.810, the mean humidity was 59, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,074, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 909 deaths and still-births, or 89.73 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 17; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 418; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 112; Greenwood (undenominational), 59; Lutheran (undenominational), 190; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 29; Evergreen (undenominational), 65; Woodlawn (undenominational), 23; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 13; Union (Methodist Protestant), 9; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 6; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 8; Washington (undenominational), 13.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending June 19, 1880, was in the following Wards, viz.: First, 9; Second, 2; Third, 3; Fourth, 13; Fifth, 7; Sixth, 18; Seventh, 42; Eighth, 23; Ninth, 27; Tenth, 34; Eleventh, 40; Twelfth, 72; Thirteenth, 28; Fourteenth, 21; Fifteenth, 12; Sixteenth, 24; Seventeenth, 48; Eighteenth, 36; Nineteenth, 108; Twentieth, 39; Twenty-first, 49; Twenty-second, 50; Twenty-third, 11; Twenty-fourth, 4.

The actual mortality for the week ending June 19, 1880, was 720; this is 227 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1879, and 259 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 33.68 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,111,470.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia was 19.96; Brooklyn, 20.91; St. Louis, 16.74; Baltimore, 32.33; Cincinnati, 27.0; New Orleans, 28.22; Buffalo, 15.2; Charleston, 41.91; Dayton, 15.45; Lowell, 17.33; Worcester, 18.64; Cambridge, 15.48; Lawrence, 28.26; Lynn, 10.46; Springfield, 13.08; Augusta, Georgia, 26.95; Dubuque, 12.13. SIR—There were 1,038 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 26, 1880, which is an increase of 331, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 476 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending June 19, 1880, was 720, which is 259.0 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 31.20 per 1,000 persons living, the population, according to the U. S. census (which is not yet complete), is upward of 1,200,000.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1880.

CHAPTER 474.

AN ACT enabling any corporation created by act of congress of the United States to acquire, hold, use and improve real estate for the purposes of an international exhibition

Passed May 28, 1880.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for any corporation created by act of congress of the United States, with power to hold an international exhibition in the state of New York under the supervision and auspices of the national government, by its president, commissioners or their agents, engineers, superintendents or others in their employ, to enter upon all lands or waters within the corporate limits of the city of New York, for the purpose of surveying, exploring, sounding, leveling and laying out the grounds necessary to be used for the holding of the international exhibition provided for by the act of congress aforesaid, and to make such dykes, dams, ditches and drains as may be necessary and of locating the same, and to do and erect all necessary work, structures, buildings and appendages thereon, doing no unnecessary injury to private or other property, and when the grounds, dykes, dams, ditches and drains and the location of other necessary works and structures shall have been determined upon, and a survey of the same duly made and filed by any such corporation, in the office of the clerk of the city and county of New York, it shall then be lawful for any such corporation, by any of its officers, agents, engineers, superintendents, contractors, workmen and other persons, in their employ, to enter upon, take possession of, hold, have, and use, occupy, excavate, fill in and grade such lands so surveyed and located; upon any arrangement or agreement entered into by any such corporation and the owners of the said lands, either by purchase, lease or otherwise.

Sec. 2. That if any such corporation or its officers or agents cannot agree with the owner or owners of such required lands or real estate for the use or purchase thereof, or if, by reason of the legal incapacity or absence of such owner or owners, no such agreement can be made, a particular description of the lands so required for the use of any such corporation shall be given in writing, under the oath or affirmation of some engineer or proper agent of such corporation, and also the name or names of the occupant or occupants if known and their residence, if the same can be ascertained, to any justice of the supreme court, who shall cause such corporation to give notice thereof to the person or persons interested if known, and in this state, and if unknown and out of the state, to make publication thereof, as he shall direct, for a term of not more than twenty nor less than ten days, and to assign a particular time and place for the appointment of commissioners, at which time, upon satisfactory evidence to him of the service or publication of such notice aforesaid, he shall appoint three disinterested persons to act as such commissioners to assess the price or value of said lands or the use thereof, who shall be affirmed or sworn before the said justice faithfully to execute the duties of such appointment, and after like notice to both parties of time and place, shall meet, review the premises and hear the parties and evidence if desired and thereupon make such decision and award together with a description of the said lands and the quantity, by whom owned and how situated and bounded, in writing, under their hands and seals, or the hands and seals of any two of them, to the justice by whom they were appointed, to be by him returned and filed in the office of the said clerk of the city and county of New York, together with all the papers, before him relating thereto to be kept as a public record, and copies taken, if required by either party; and if either party shall feel aggrieved by the decision and award of the said commissioners, the party so aggrieved may appeal to the supreme court, at a special term thereof, by proceeding in the form of a petition to said court, with five days' notice in writing to the opposite party, of such appeal, which proceeding shall vest in the said supreme court full right and power to hear and adjudge the same, and upon payment or tender of the sum so found by the commissioners, such corporation shall be deemed to be seized and possessed of all such lands and real estate, appraised as aforesaid, such seizure and possession not to prejudice the right of either party to further appeal, if they or either of them feel aggrieved. But no appeal as herein provided or allowed shall prevent such corporation from taking, using and occupying the said land or lands upon the filing of the aforesaid report, the value and damages being first paid, or upon a refusal to receive the same upon a tender thereof, or the owner or owners thereof being under legal disability, the same being first paid into the United States Trust Company; provided, that nothing in this act shall be so construed as to authorize the said United States international commission to enter upon and use any of the public parks of the city of New York for the purposes of said exhibition, except that by permission of the park commissioners of the said city the said United States international commission may erect a permanent building or buildings in such public park or parks as may be designated and under such restrictions as may be imposed by said park commissioners.

Sec. 3. That the said lands so taken, used, occupied, leased or purchased by any such corporation, shall be exempt from taxation so long as used or occupied by any such corporation for the purposes of said exhibition, not exceeding the term of five years.

Sec. 4. That the said United States international commission be and is hereby authorized and empowered to enter upon, close and use for the purposes of said exhibition, any streets, roads and avenues in the city of New York running through or by, or contiguous to the grounds which may be selected for the purposes of said exhibition. And it is hereby declared that such streets, roads and avenues as may be thus entered upon, are closed from the time of entering upon them until the first day of January, eighteen hundred and eighty-five unless sooner given up by said United States international commission; and the said United States international commission shall not be liable for any damage by reason of the closing of such streets, roads or avenues, and when such streets, roads or avenues are no longer needed for the purposes of said exhibition, they shall be restored as nearly as possible to the condition in which they were when entered upon.

Resolved, That a free drinking-hydrant, for man and beast, be placed at the junction of Third and Fourth avenues, in front of the premises No. 392 Bowery, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Resolved, That the Clerk of the Common Council be and he is hereby authorized and directed to cause one thousand copies of all laws relating particularly to this city, passed at the late session of the Legislature, to be printed in the usual manner in document form, for the use of the Mayor, Common Council, and Departments; the expense of procuring certified copies of such laws, which shall not exceed the usual fees, to be paid from the appropriation for "City Contingencies" by the Comptroller.

Resolved, That the vacant lots on the westerly side of Broadway, between Fifty-fifth and Fifty-sixth streets, be fenced in, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 22d day of June, 1880, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following amendment of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Resolved, That, section 190 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 190. That every owner, lessee, tenant, and occupant of any stall, stable, or apartment in which any horse, cattle, or swine, or any other animal shall be kept, or of any place in which manure or any liquid discharge of such animals shall collect or accumulate, within the built-up portion of said city, shall cause said liquid and manure to be at once removed to some proper place, and shall at all times keep or cause to be kept such stalls, stables, and apartments, and the drainage, yard, and appurtenances thereof, in a cleanly and wholesome condition, so that no offensive smell detrimental to health shall be allowed to escape therefrom; and when within three hundred feet from any occupied dwelling-house, or of any manufactory where more than five persons are employed, the removal from the stables shall not be made, nor shall the manure or refuse from the stable be allowed to run man on any street or place near such stable, any time between 8 o'clock A.M. and 11 o'clock P.M., without a permit from this Board. Every such stall, stable, or apartment, where horses or cattle are kept, shall have an underground and properly covered manure vault of not less than sixty-four cubic feet capacity. But the Sanitary Superintendent is authorized to issue permits to be regularly reported to this Board, regulating such removal within said hours.

CHAPTER 123.
AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.
The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such

payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
