

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1879.

CHAPTER 268.

An Acr relating to the office of commissioner of jurors of the county of New York. Passed May 8, 1879; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as fol-

Section r. The commissioner of jurors in the city of New York, hereafter appointed, shall be paid in full satisfaction for his services a yearly salary of five thousand dollars and shall be allowed for contingent expenses, including clerk hire and all other incidental expenses, a sum not to exceed six thousand dollars per annum, which shall be audited and paid as the expenses of other officers of said city and county are audited and paid; and said salary and allowance shall be in lieu of all fees or compensation heretofore a charge upon the county of New York or the mayor, aldermen, and commonalty of the city of New York.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the board of estimate and apportionment of said city, from time to time, as it may determine, to fix the salaries to be paid as in this statute directed. The salaries in this act provided for shall be paid monthly by the mayor, aldermen, and commonalty of the city

Sec. 3. The fees known as jurors' fees or fines, shall be paid into the treasury for the benefit of the sinking fund, for the reduction of the city debt.

Sec. 4. All acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed; but such repeal shall not take effect until the expiration of the term of office of the present commissioner of jurors.

Appointment of Commissioners.

It appearing by the application, made to me on the 4th day of March, 1879, by fifty reputable householders and taxpayers of the City and County of New York, in the State of New York, verified upon oath before a Justice of the Supreme Court, that there is need in said city and county of a street railway or railways for the transportation of passengers, mails and freight; and thirty days not having expired since said application, now, in pursuance of the provisions of the act entitled, "An Act further to provide for the construction and operation of a steam railway or railways in counties of the State," passed June 18, 1875, three-fifths being present, I, Edward Cooper, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby appoint the following five persons, residents of said city and county, to be commissioners under and in pursuance of the provisions of said act, namely: Henry F. Spaulding, Benjamin G. Arnold, Henry G. Stebbins, Lewis G. Morris, Samuel R. Filley.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto signed my name, the 2d day of April, 1879.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to C. W. Luyster to place and keep a bay-window on the building on the southwest corner of Madison avenue and Sixty-seventh street, as shown on the annexed diagram, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Public Works;

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, May 13, 1879. Approved by the Mayor, May 26, 1879.

Resolved, That the sidewalks on both sides of Eighty-fourth street, from Third to Fourth avenue, be flagged full width, where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Buck & Stelges to place and keep a watering-trough on the sidewalk in Beach street, near the southeast corner of Beach and West streets, the work to be done and water supplied at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, May 20, 1879. Approved by the Mayor, May 26, 1879.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby respectfully requested to inform this Board, at his earliest convenience, what progress, if any, has been made in the work of regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter-stones, and flagging Fortieth street, from the First avenue to the East river, as provided in resolution and ordinance of the Common Council, approved by the Mayor December 11, 1878, and in case the work has not been commenced, the reason for the delay.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, May 20, 1879. Approved by the Mayor, May 26, 1879.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to M. Gross to place and keep a barber-pole on the sidewalk near the curb-stone in front of No. 1273 Third avenue, said pole not to exceed 9 inches in diameter and 10 feet in height, the work to done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the placeure of the Common Council. pleasure of the Common Council.
