NEW YORK, October 5, 1875.

The Board of Health met this day.

#### Orders.

481 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

#### Suits for Penalties.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 20 cases.

#### Resolutions.

That the premises east of First avenue, between Forty-fifth and Forty-seventh streets, New York, by reason of the storage of manure, in respect to such business and accumulations, in the opinion of this Board, are in condition and in effect dangerous to life and health, and are hereby declared a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and that the proofs thereof be filed among the records of this Board.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be instructed to execute the order of this Board, requiring the removing of all manure and stable straw accumulated upon said premises.

That the application of Howard Pinckney, to record the birth of Francis Holbrook Bonney, be granted.

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent and City Sanitary Inspector has certified, under and pursuant to the provisions of chapter 566 of the Laws of 1871, and of chapter 549 of the Laws of 1875, amendatory thereof, that it is necessary for the protection of the public health that the parts and parcels of land within the corporate limits of the City and County of New York, hereinafter described, need to be drained by other means than by sewers: it is hereby

Ordered, That the said certificate be filed among the records of the Board of Health of the Health Department of the City of New York, and that the duplicates thereof, duly signed by the said Sanitary Superintendent and City Sanitary Inspector, be forwarded to the Department of Public Works of said city; and it is further

Ordered and directed, pursuant to the provisions of the acts hereinbefore recited, that the following-named parts and parcels of land within the corporate limits of the City and County of New York shall be drained by other means than by sewers, by and under the direction of the Department of Public Works of said city and county, said parts and parcels of land being situate as follows, viz.: Bounded by One Hundred and Thirty-third street, Tenth avenue, One Hundred and Thirty-first street, and Broadway.

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent and City Sanitary Inspector has certified, under and pursuant to the provisions of chapter 566 of the Laws of 1871, and of chapter 549 of the Laws of 1875, amendatory thereof, that it is necessary for the protection of the public health that the parts and parcels of land within the corporate limits of the City and County of New York, hereinafter described, need to be drained by other means than by sewers: it is hereby

Ordered, That the said certificates be filed among the records of the Board of Health of the Health Department of the City of New York, and that duplicates thereof, duly signed by the said Sanitary Superintendent and City Sanitary Inspector, be forwarded to the Department of Public Works of said city; and it is further

shall be drained by other means than by sewers, by and under the direction of the Department of Public Works of said city and county, said parts and parcels of land being situated as follows, viz.: Living between One Hundred Fiftieth and One Hundred Fifty-first streets, St. Nicholas and Tenth avenues.

That this Board will grant a permit to Henry A. Peck & Co. to dump street sweepings upon vessels at the foot of Thirty-eighth street, East river, for immediate removal from the city, but will not permit them to dump street sweepings upon the vacant lots at or near the foot of said street, or to stow or accumulate such material within the city limits.

That the Attorney and Counsel be directed to commence a suit against Dr. L. Goldschmidt, for violation of the Sanitary Code.

That the Attorney be directed to discontinue the suit against Dr. C. A. Smith, for violation of the Sanitary Code, he having made a satisfactory explanation.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to investigate the business of dumping manure at Sixth-second street and Eleventh avenue, and report to the Board.

That the hearing in the case of Swift & White be adjourned for one week.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to report to this Board the facts in relation to the necessity of sewerage and drainage in One Hundred and Fifty-first street, west of Tenth avenue.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to sell, in accordance with law, the two ambulances now stored at Staten Island.

That the services of Dr. Guy D. Daly, Assistant Physician at Riverside Hospital, and of C. Y. Hammond, John J. McNally, and Michael Murphy be dispensed with from and after October 15, for the reason that this Board has not the funds to pay their salaries.

That the Board of Police be requested to cause the arrest of all persons who shall violate sections 112 and 113 of the Sanitary Code, by dumping, depositing, or accumulating manure or stable straw upon grounds interlying Forty-fifth and Forty-seventh streets, east of First avenue, or elsewhere within the city limits.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to cause the arrest of all persons who shall violate sections 112 and 113 of the Sanitary Code.

## Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 2, 1875: The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 2,155, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 1,187 tenement houses, 147 private dwellings, 23 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 15 stores and warehouses, 63 stables, 75 slaughter-houses, 5 fat-rendering establishments, 1 stock yard, 2 sausage factories, 1 dumping-ground, 1 brewery, 1 gut-cleaning establishment, 19 sunken and vacant lots, 96 yards, courts, and areas, 68 cellars and basements, 80 waste-pipes and drains, 162 privies and water-closets, 98 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 24 dangerous stairways, 1 cistern and cesspool, 4 dangerous chimneys, 1 violation of the Sanitary Code, 1 dock, 1 dangerous building, 1 public sewer, and 21 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 883.  
During the past week 49 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

120 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.  
The Disinfecting Corps have visited 50 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 30 houses, 30 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

25 cases of small-pox were removed to the Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.  
87 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending October 2, 1875: Typhus fever, 3; typhoid fever, 35; scarlet fever, 14; cerebro-spinal meningitis, 4; measles, 2; diphtheria, 71; and small-pox, 39.

17 tanks and 2,541 cans of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy vaults of the city during the week ending October 2, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending October 2, 1875: Calves (bob), 1 carcass; calves (case), 1 carcass; hogs, 1 carcass; beef, 100 pounds; veal, 80 pounds; poultry, 218 pounds; and fish, 4,700 pounds.

## Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending October 2, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 586 burial permits for city deaths, 26 for bodies *in transitu*, and 36 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 586 deaths, 142 marriages, 404 births, 36 still-births, 26 applications for transit permits, and 53 returns from Coroners. There were 27 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, 4 of marriage, and 25 of death were issued from this Bureau. Three cases of deaths were referred to Coroners.

SIR—I have the honor to report the following as the results of tests made on milk taken from different cows in Orange County, N. Y. The mode of performing the test was as follows: All the milk coming from each cow at the time of milking was stirred together, a sample was then taken and cooled to 60° Fahr., when it was tested with the lactometer. The age of the cow and time of birth of the last calf was recorded at the same time. In many cases the data on these points could only be given approximately, as but few of the farmers keep a herd book, in which such matters are recorded.

It will be noticed that the milk from Alderney cows stands lower than the average of that from other cows. This is undoubtedly owing to the larger proportion of cream in their milk, a well known peculiarity of the milk from that breed of cows. In no case, however, does the test run below 102 deg. by the lactometer used as a standard by the Board.

The above results may be summed up thus:

Tests on the milk of 86 cows, including 7 Alderneys—Highest, 122; lowest, 102; average, 110.57.

Milk from 79 cows, not including Alderneys—Highest, 122; lowest, 102; average, 111.

Milk from the seven Alderneys—Highest, 112; lowest, 102; average, 105.7.

Wm. H. Wickham, the Mayor of the City of New York; Andrew H. Green, the Comptroller of the City of New York; Samuel A. Lewis, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and John Wheeler, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held September 27, 1875, were read and approved.

The Chairman offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sum of five thousand dollars is hereby transferred from the appropriation "Contingencies Law Department," 1875, the same being in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the appropriation "Salaries, Law Department," 1875, the amount of said appropriation being insufficient.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Chairman called up and offered for adoption the following resolution, laid over at meeting of September 27, 1875:

Resolved, That the sum of one thousand five hundred and eight dollars and thirty-three cents (\$1,508.33) is hereby transferred from the appropriation "Repair of Sea-wall at Battery," 1874, the same being in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the same title of appropriation for 1875, the amount of said appropriation being insufficient.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

And Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I have the honor of transmitting to you several resolutions, which I would request (if they meet your approval) should be laid before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for consideration and action. The sums proposed to be transferred are essential to meet deficiencies which are evident for the year 1875. The amount required for "Aqueduct—Repairs and Maintenance" was unforeseen, such as extraordinary repairs to aqueduct, caused by heavy rains in August; the repairing 18 of the 6-foot pipe on Eighth avenue and on Ninth street; relaying 30 in. main on Eighth avenue, between Seventy-third and Eighty-first streets, caused by change of grade, the old pipe being from 12 to 35 feet under grade; extra labor and coal for high service, etc.

The amount asked by transfer for "Supplies for and Cleaning Public Offices" is essential to meet the deficiencies that will accrue in furnishing fuel and necessities for the Departments, courts, and public offices to the end of the year; and the transfer for "Lamps and Gas, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards" is required to meet the terms of the contracts.

I would respectfully request that the application made by me on the 6th April, 1875, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the transfer of certain balances, amounting to \$30,127.42, to "Streets—Repaying and Repairs to Stone Pavements" for 1875, be withdrawn, and the inclosed resolutions adopted.
