

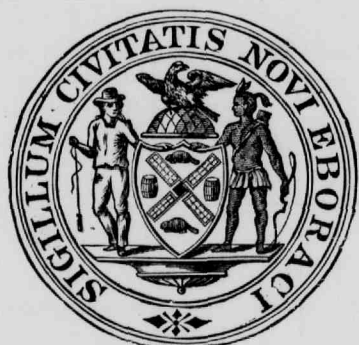

APPROVED PAPERS.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Francis A. Cusack to erect a storm-door inside the stoop-line, about 6 feet 6 inches high and 4 feet 6 inches wide, at No. 368 Bleecker street, corner of Charles street, the work to be done at his own expense; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 21, 1879.
Approved by the Mayor, November 10, 1879.

Resolved, That One Hundred and Fourth street, from Fourth to Fifth avenue, be paved with Belgian or trap-block pavement, and that at the several intersecting streets and avenues crosswalks be laid where not now laid, and relaid where those now laid are, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works, not in good repair, or are not upon a grade adapted to the grade of the proposed new pavement, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending November 8, 1879, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending November 1, 1879.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., *Sanitary Superintendent and Register:*

SIR—There were 492 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 8, 1879, which is a decrease of 2, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 48 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1878. The actual mortality for the week ending November 1, 1879, was 533, which is 74.6 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.14 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,102,395.
