Amendment to the rules and regulations for Plumbing, Drainage and Water Supply of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan.

That section 39 of the rules and regulations for Plumbing, Drainage and Water Supply of Buildings shall read:

"All connections between lead pipes and between brass or copper pipes must be made by means of white soldered joints, and all floor flanges of all sanitary fixtures and all connections between said fixtures and waste or soil pipes, where said connections are on outlet or sewer side of trap, shall be made without the use of red lead, putty, plaster, cement or any other similar substance."

That section 106 of the rules and regulations for Plumbing, Drainage and Water Supply of Buildings shall read:

"All earthenware traps must have heavy brass floor plates soldered to the lead bends or, where brass or iron pipes are used, to be screwed to same and bolted to the trap flange and the joint be made gas-tight without the use of red or white lead or any similar substance or rubber washers, the use of which in the making of said connections is hereby prohibited and no device for such connections will be permitted to be used unless it has been approved by the Bureau of Buildings."

In the Board of Aldermen, received March 16, 1903, and referred to the Committee on Finance; March 31, 1903, by said Committee reported to the Board and laid over under the rule.

April 28, 1903, the Board of Aldermen having failed to pass upon the proposition within six weeks after the same was received, either by an affirmative vote or by a failure of a majority of all the members of the Board of Aldermen to vote against the same, therefore, in accordance with the provisions of section 48 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the proposition is deemed to be passed.

That, in pursuance of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted by that Board on the 6th day of March, 1903, be and the same hereby is approved, viz.:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the street grades in the territory bounded by Fulton street, Euclid avenue, Liberty avenue, Atkins avenue and Dresden street, in the Twenty-sixth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to change the grades of the aforesaid streets as follows:

#### "A."—Atlantic Avenue (North Side).

#### PARCEL A.

AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to create and organize the Fire Department of the Village of Edgewater and provide for the government thereof," and adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Edgewater December 12, 1888.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section four of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to create and organize the Fire Department of the Village of Edgewater and to provide for the government thereof," adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Edgewater December 12, 1888, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 4. A Chief Engineer and three Assistant Engineers of said Department shall be elected by the members of said Department on the second Monday of May, 1901, and every two years thereafter, who shall hold their offices for two years from the first day of June next following, and until their successors are duly elected and qualified. No person shall be eligible to the office of Engineer or Assistant Engineer unless he shall have been an active Fireman at least three years or more immediately preceding said election, a member in good standing of some one of the companies belonging to said Department and a resident of the Village of Edgewater. The Assistant Engineer must be a resident and member of a company located in the district in which he is a candidate, and shall be chosen by the companies located in that district.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Sec. 3. A copy of this ordinance shall be transmitted to each company in the Fire Department of the Village of Edgewater.

## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

December 31, 1902.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—The Municipal Civil Service Commission has the honor to present herewith the report of its operations and actions for the quarter ending December 31, 1902. During this period the Commission has held eleven meetings at which matters considered and acted upon, of special importance, are as follows:

By an arrangement with the office of the City Record the Municipal Civil Service Commission may efficiently advertise its examinations in the technical journals and the daily papers. Heretofore we have only been able to forward to the daily papers and technical journals notices of our examinations which, if published, have been treated as news matter.

A system of conducting non-competitive examinations for positions included in Schedule F and constituting the minor positions in the Department of Health, Department of Public Charities, Department of Correction, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, Nautical School and Truant School of the Department of Education, Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School, Brooklyn Public Library and Queens Borough Library has been inaugurated. The positions above referred to were formerly included in the Exempt Class and persons were appointed to such positions without any examination. Under the present system an examination is made necessary and the system as instituted requires an examination of sufficient scope to determine the candidate's qualifications.

A manual of instructions to candidates has been prepared and will be issued for distribution in the early part of the year. The manual contains general information regarding the method of conducting examinations.

The time within which an appeal could be taken from the rating of the examiners has been limited in the past to a period of thirty days from the date upon which the candidate was notified of his percentage. This period has been reduced to fifteen days.

The preparation of a new promotion blank with reference to promotions in the uniformed forces of the Police and Fire Departments.

The question of inaugurating a system, and one which will not prove cumbrous, for the identification of candidates for examination and also of persons who have been certified for appointment. The identification of the candidate who is certified for appointment can only be successful with the hearty co-operation of the City departments. In regard to candidates for examination, the Commission seeks to identify the candidate by his handwriting and by statements to be compared with those contained in his application. In the case of Patrolmen and Firemen the identification is facilitated by the fact that the candidate is required to undergo a thorough physical examination, which includes a measurement of the various parts of the body, and a duplicate of the results of this examination is forwarded to the Police and Fire Departments as the case may be. In the Labor Class, a record is kept of the height, weight, age and color of hair and eyes of the candidate. A duplicate of this record is sent to the department to which the person is certified, and in case the person who reports for employment does not correspond with this record, it is evidence that either the person who passed the examination is not the party who filed the application, or that the person who appeared for appointment is not the party who passed the examination. In either case the facts are reported to the Commission by the department and the name of the person is stricken from the eligible list. A further abuse is the impersonation by some one of a person who was formerly employed in the City service and of whom this Commission has no identification. In order to stop this abuse the Commission has, with the co-operation of the City departments, instituted an examination of all persons employed in the Labor Class in the service and is making a complete record of each person employed in the manner above stated.

Appended hereto you will find tables showing the chronological order of examinations held and the chronological order of lists prepared of the names of persons examined, and the length of time required in the preparation of such lists, for the quarter ending December 31, 1902.

During the month of November the offices of the Commission were removed from No. 346 Broadway to No. 61 Elm street. On that account the work of the Commission was considerably interrupted and the amount of work performed by the Commission during that quarter was materially less than that performed in any other quarter during 1902. The change, however, was a most advantageous one, and the Commission now has considerably more room than formerly and much more suitable accommodations. At No. 346 Broadway the Commission occupied a number of small rooms on one floor covering 7,500 square feet of space. At No. 61 Elm street it has two entire floors covering 11,300 square feet of space. The rent is considerably less than that paid at No. 346 Broadway and the change will result in a net saving to the City during the term of our lease of \$15,000. The second floor of the building is occupied entirely by the examining division. A part of this floor is used as an examining room in which 150 candidates can be accommodated. The remainder of the floor is used by the Chief Examiner and his staff. The work of preparing examination papers and rating them is accomplished there. The third floor is occupied by the executive division and the Labor Bureau.

The Commission has already transmitted to you a copy of the annual report for the year 1902 submitted to the State Civil Service Commission.

The tables attached to this report show, in figures, the amount of work accomplished by the Commission during the quarter, but they give no adequate idea of the details of the work nor the amount of time, care and attention which experience has shown must be devoted to each examination which is conducted under the supervision of the Commission if it is to have a successful result, and to the other work of the office. The Commission ventures, therefore, to lay before you for your information a very brief statement of the system of receiving applications, holding examinations, preparing eligible lists, certifying them, verifying payrolls and recording the transactions of the Commission. For the sake of illustration an examination for the position of Patrolman may be selected.

The date of the examination for the position is fixed and duly advertised in the City Record. A copy of the advertisement is sent to each of the daily papers in the City as a matter of news, and, where desirable, is permanently advertised through the arrangement with the City Record, and bulletins are posted in the offices of the Commission in the City Hall and in other public buildings. The advertisement shows the date upon which the Commission begins to receive the applications, and the date upon which their receipt is closed, the time intervening covering a period of not less than eighteen days.

A person who desires to compete in the examination may obtain an application blank upon request, either in person or by mail, and, after filling it out, he may file it in like manner. When presented the application is carefully examined, and if executed in proper form, is recorded in chronological order and given an application number. Its receipt is duly acknowledged. The name of the applicant is recorded upon a card, and the card is preserved in its alphabetical order in a file kept for that purpose. There is then placed upon the application blank a second number, known as the index number. This latter number is carried throughout the entire system and is used to identify the candidate, except at the time of the examination, when another and a secret number is used.

The answers of the candidate to the questions on the application blank are compared with his answers to like questions on previous application blanks, if he has filed any, and if any discrepancy appears, the matter is referred to the Board of Examiners for investigation and report, as are also all other questions as to the character of the candidate.

When an application is finally accepted it is filed in alphabetical order of position and numerically, according to the number, with other applications for the same position. A card bearing the name, application number and index number in each case, is also filed alphabetically, and the Commission is thus enabled to refer to any application at a moment's notice.

The candidate is notified of the date, time and place of the examination, about ten days or two weeks before it takes place. He is required to present this notice when he appears for examination. The candidate is first subjected to a thorough medical and physical examination by the medical examiner. About seventy-five such candidates are examined each day. If he fails, he is notified of that fact; if he is successful, he is admitted to the mental examination.

The examination papers of the candidate on each subject in the mental examination are marked by the same two examiners, and the candidate receives as his mark on each subject the average of the examiner's marks. These averages are then multiplied by the respective weights attached to the subjects in which they have been examined, and the general average in the mental examination is computed. The final rating is then determined by multiplying the percentages in the physical and mental examinations and in experience by their respective weights.

If the candidate receives a passing mark his character is investigated before his name is placed upon the eligible list. The candidate is notified of the result of his examination, his examination papers are filed with his application, and a complete history of his case is recorded on the index card. After his name is placed upon the eligible list in the order of his ascertained average, his name is certified in its order in response to requisitions. The eligible list from which certification is made, is kept in a book especially prepared for the purpose.

The names of persons who are upon eligible lists are indexed upon the card catalogue system. This prevents the recertification of the name of any person dismissed from a position for cause within the period fixed by the rules.

When an appointment is made, the card of the appointee is taken from the index referred to above and forwarded to the clerks in charge of the roster and payrolls. The cards of all employees in a given department are filed together and are subdivided, according to the bureaus to which such employees are assigned.

All payrolls are verified from the roster before being certified by the Commission, and a careful record is kept of all rolls received and forwarded to the Department of Finance. The roster clerks are charged with the duty of recording all changes in the Civil Service of the City.

In the Labor Bureau the system of recording and filing is virtually the same as that employed with reference to the positions in the competitive class.

The system of filing correspondence is very similar to that used in business houses. There is no detail which is not carefully recorded and indexed, and it would not be possible to conduct the business of the office under any other system.

### Superintendent's Report.

Doctor William Mabon, Superintendent of Bellevue Hospital, reported as follows:

Recommending increase of salary to three and a half dollars a day for eight hours' labor for Engineers. Also that a regular Engineer from the Civil Service list be employed in place of Patrick J. Clark, Fireman, now acting as Engineer.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That, as soon as the Comptroller shall consent, the salary of Engineers be advanced to \$3.50 per day for eight hours' work. Also that a certified Engineer from the Civil Service list be engaged in place of Patrick J. Clark, now acting as Engineer.

A letter was received from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, enclosing blank forms for positions in the non-competitive class, and requesting that hereafter applicants for such positions in this Department be required to fill out application blanks, which will be used by the Departmental Board of Examiners in making certification as the result of examinations held by them.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That, whereas the Municipal Civil Service Commission, in letters under dates of March 18 and April 1, requires the Department to have application blanks properly filled out for all positions at a salary over one hundred and fifty dollars per annum, and whereas it is impossible for the Departmental Board of Examiners to supervise this work at Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, the Municipal Civil Service Commission be requested to appoint the following list of non-competitive examiners:

Alterations and Repairs—The remodeling of the old college building was reported as still being in progress. It is believed that this work cannot be completed within the time of the contract, viz.: one hundred and twenty working days from the 6th of January.

Plumbing has been placed in dormitory 50, which is occupied by men employees and was formerly without any facilities of this kind.

The Supervising Engineer reported that the defects in dormitory 45, as well as in the repairs to the upper gutter and iron work around the roof of the main building, had been corrected.

The New York Telephone Company is now installing the wiring for the interior telephone system.

Doctor Biggs reported to the Superintendent that cases of tuberculosis treated in the dispensary at Gouverneur Hospital were not being reported to the Board of Health, and unless this were done, action would be taken against the physicians. The Superintendent expected to have an interview with the staff concerning this matter.

At Harlem Hospital the Supervising Nurse requested that the third story of the Dispensary be fitted up for a dormitory for the men who now sleep in the room next to the Isolation Building. As it appeared inadvisable to have men employees in the same building where maternity cases are cared for, action in this matter was deferred until the Superintendent's next visit to the institution.

The defects in the repairs of the roofs and gutters of the Harlem Hospital Building were corrected by the contractors, and the Superintendent reported that the painting of the dispensary and the hospital building was very nearly completed.

Minor repairs were made to the kitchen range and to the water faucets in the kitchen and dining room at Fordham Hospital, and progress was reported in the painting of that institution.

The visit of the Superintendent to the Boston City Hospital was productive of a number of suggestions which the Superintendent is having prepared in the form of a report to be presented later to the Board of Trustees.

### Communications.

A communication was received from Doctor Valentine Wildman, formerly Examiner in Lunacy at Bellevue Hospital, calling attention to an error in the Civil Service Commission's records by which he is stated to have resigned his position as Examiner in Lunacy, and asking that the Board of Trustees take steps to correct the mistake.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

ized the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals to complete the construction of Gouverneur Hospital; and

Whereas, It is deemed necessary and expedient to appoint architects to prepare plans and specifications for completing the construction of said hospital and supervising and superintending the erection and completion of said wing.

Resolved, That this Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals proceed to erect, construct, equip and furnish a new wing to Gouverneur Hospital, to be located and built on the west end of the present Gouverneur Hospital, as an extension to the same.

Resolved, That R. F. Almirall, No. 31 Chambers street, New York City, be and he hereby is employed as architect for the structure designated; such employment to be in accordance with the contract prepared by the Corporation Counsel after the printed form adopted and approved by the Law Department, which said contract is hereby approved and ordered to be executed by the President and Secretary of this Board.

Resolved, That the said architect be and he hereby is instructed to proceed forthwith to prepare plans, drawings, form of contract and specifications for said hospital structure, pursuant to the terms of the said contract, and as may be required by further action of this Board.

Dr. William Mabon, Superintendent of Bellevue Hospital, reported as follows:

Bellevue Hospital—Repairs. The contractors are now putting in the concrete floors at the Cornell College Building.

The wiring of the main building is nearly completed. The contractor reports that there is some trouble about completing arrangements for increasing the consumption of current to meet the increased number of lights. Application was made to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and the Commissioner's reply to it is submitted for your consideration.

New sterilizers have been placed in the operating room of Wards Nos. 8 and 9, and the few defects which have appeared will soon be corrected by the contractors.

The interior telephone system is being installed by the New York Telephone Company.

Six new window guards have been placed upon the windows of the laundry.

The repairs to the fire doors, which were neglected by the contractor, are nearly completed.

The plastering called for in the top of the elevator shaft in the main building has been completed, and the architects informed the Supervising Engineer that a nominal reduction for painting will be made. As the amount of work is so small and can be done by our own painters, it would not be advisable to stop the elevator while it is being done.

On the 7th of April the representative of the architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, and the Superintendent visited the Presbyterian Hospital, and notes of the visit have been made.

Representatives of the County Visiting Committee of the State Charities Aid Association having verbally expressed the opinion that enough sheets and pillow cases were not kept in stock, the Superintendent reported that an investigation shows nearly ten sheets for each bed—a larger allowance than is provided for in most hospitals, but necessary for the needs of Bellevue owing to the rapid change in service.

The Superintendent reported having communicated with the Department of Docks to ascertain if it was their intention to provide a dump for the Street Cleaning Department at Pier 52 (Gouverneur slip), East River, and, if so, to afford the Board of Trustees an opportunity of a hearing. The letter was acknowledged; but information covering this matter had not yet been received.

A resolution has been adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommending to the Board of Aldermen certain increases in the salaries at Bellevue Hospital. Inasmuch as this resolution was in accordance with the request made on March 5 and did not cover the resolution passed by the Board of Trustees at their meeting held April 2, it would seem necessary to ask the Board to adopt another resolution fixing the salaries of Engineers at \$3.50 a day for eight hours' work. Since the resolution adopted on March 5 the Comptroller has refused to pass certain other salaries which were not included in said increases, and I would recommend the following increases, subject to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen:

Chief Stenographer, \$1,000 00

One Clerk, 900 00

Auditor and Contract Clerk, 1,900 00

Gouverneur Hospital—The Supervising Engineer presented to the Building Department plans for the installation of a bathroom for the Supervising Nurse, and the Superintendent recommended that, upon the approval of the plans by the Building Department, the Board advertise for bids. The plans are complete and are so prepared that if additional rooms on other floors at any time have to be fitted up they can be fitted up at a very slight cost.

The Superintendent reported that he had had an interview with the House Staff at Gouverneur Hospital, and informed them of the action to be taken by the Department of Health if the members of the staff did not comply with the law about reporting cases of tuberculosis. The Superintendent instructed the Supervising Nurse of Gouverneur Hospital to send a weekly report of cases of tuberculosis to the Board of Health.

Harlem Hospital—The Superintendent reported that the painting of the Hospital and dispensary buildings and the plumbing of the bathroom and the diet kitchen are practically completed. An estimate has been received for plastering certain wards on the second story of this building so that they can be occupied by nurses, and thus relieve crowding in other parts of the institution.

Fordham Hospital—The hospital and administration building are now painted and present a very good appearance.

The Superintendent reported that the Chief Inspector of the Department of Health recently visited Bellevue Hospital to ascertain the degree of annoyance caused by cinders and soot from the electric light plant in East Twenty-eighth street. A high wind from the southeast was prevailing, and but little evidence of the nuisance could be seen, and the Inspector instructed the Superintendent to wait until conditions were better, when, upon request, he would send a representative of the Department of Health.

Preparation of plans and specifications by the Supervising Engineer for new plumbing in two towers (the fixtures and changes to be such as would meet the needs until the new hospital is built) was recommended by the Superintendent.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to establish new salaries for the positions of the Auditor and Contract Clerk, the Chief Stenographer, and one Clerk, in accordance with the recommendation of the Superintendent.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Commission be requested to pass a special resolution excepting from competitive examination Doctor George T. Creevey, recently appointed anesthetist to Bellevue Hospital, and allowing in his case compensation to an amount not to exceed two hundred and fifty dollars in any one year.

#### Superintendent's Report.

Doctor William Mabon, Superintendent of Bellevue Hospital, reported as follows:

In accordance with the resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees on December 11, 1902, the following Notaries and Commissioners of Deeds were requested to sign a waiver releasing the City from claim for fees:

Miss Nora Brown, Walter Bartleman, George O. Sayre.

The last named transmitted a letter refusing to sign the waiver and release except from the date it was presented. After considering all the facts in the case, it would appear advisable to have him sign from the present time.

On April 15 the Superintendent called upon the Deputy Comptroller, Mr. Smith, and, after a conference with him and the Auditor of the Department of Finance, Mr. McKinney, it was agreed that the salaries of Enginemen could be fixed at \$3.50 a day and Firemen at \$2.50 a day without a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Instructions have accordingly been given to place them on the payroll at that rate, to date from April 15, 1903.

In regard to a communication from the Honorable Robert G. Monroe, enclosing copy of a letter sent by him to the United Electric Light and Power Company, the Superintendent reported as follows: After conferring with the representative of the Law Department and the Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, it was found that the reason for the refusal to authorize the turning on of the current was because no contract had been executed between the company and the City. The secretary of the company informed the Superintendent that the current would be turned on and that the company would take chances of receiving compensation.

The number dining in the Doctors' Dining Room has increased from 38 to 44, and hence it is necessary to increase the amount expended for fresh fruits and vegetables. This has been fixed for a long time at one hundred dollars a month, and the Superintendent recommended an increase of fifteen dollars, making the total expended for this purpose one hundred and fifteen dollars a month.

The elevator engine had to be shut down for repairs, to complete which it would take about forty-eight hours.

Doctor Parks M. King, the Junior House Physician at Harlem Hospital, was reported ill.

Frederick Uhl, Ambulance Driver at Harlem Hospital, ran over a boy on the 10th of April, causing a fracture of the humerus. His report and that of the Ambulance Surgeon were submitted to the Board of Trustees.

The Superintendent presented the report of the Supervising Engineer covering the repairs at the various hospitals belonging to the Department.

The following resolutions, having been duly moved and seconded, were adopted: Resolved, That, in view of the increase in the number of the staff, the Superintendent be authorized to expend for fresh fruits and vegetables for the table of the house staff at Bellevue Hospital one hundred and fifteen dollars a month.

Resolved, That all Notaries Public and Commissioners of Deeds who are employed by this Department and who have done work for this Department be reimbursed the amount paid by them for their commissions, and that upon the receipt of this reimbursement and one dollar they be requested to sign a waiver.

#### Communications.

A communication was received from J. E. Butterworth, contractor in charge of the work of converting the old Cornell Medical College building into a dormitory or women employees, informing the Board of the Strike of the carpenters employed on the building, and asking for extension of time on his contract in consequence. On motion, duly seconded, the same was placed on file.

A communication from Doctor Louis K. Neff, Acting Secretary of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital, inclosing credentials of Doctor Edward K. Hall, No. 228 West One Hundred and Twenty-first street; Doctor Vincent E. Quinn, No. 909 Cauldwell avenue, Doctor M. J. Sittenfield, No. 73 East Ninetieth street, and Doctor H. F. Nordeman, No. 106 West Forty-seventh street, all of whom were nominated to positions in the Harlem Hospital Dispensary.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That these credentials, being entirely satisfactory to the Board of Trustees, the nominations of Doctors Hall, Quinn, Sittenfield and Nordeman to positions in the Children's Clinic, Class in Medicine, Class in Surgery and Genito-Urinary Clinic, respectively, be and they hereby are confirmed and approved.

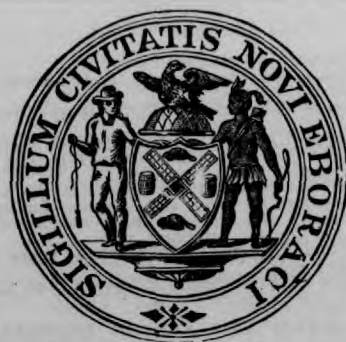

#### BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO THE New York and Long Island Traction Company the right or franchise to construct and operate a street surface railway in, upon and along certain streets and highways and bridges in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the New York and Long Island Traction Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the privilege to construct and operate a double-track surface railway, with all connections, turnouts, switches, crossovers and suitable stands necessary for the accommodation and operation of said railway, by the overhead system of electricity, or any other motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same, in, upon and along the following named streets and highways and bridges, all situated in the boroughs of Queens and Brooklyn, City and State of New York, set forth in the following description of routes:

First—Beginning at a point on Fulton street (otherwise known as the Hempstead and Jamaica turnpike), at the easterly line of the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York; running thence northwesterly on and along said Fulton street to the intersection of said Fulton street and the Jerico turnpike at or near Queens, in the Borough of Queens; with a branch line from the intersection of said Hempstead and Jamaica turnpike and Sherwood avenue; running thence southerly on and along said Sherwood avenue to Old Country road, all in the Borough of Queens.

Second—Beginning at a point at the intersection of said Fulton street and Springfield road at or near Queens, in the Borough of Queens; running thence southwesterly on and along said Springfield road to a road known as Old Country road; thence generally westerly on and along said Old Country road past the intersection of said Old Country road and South street, to a point on said Old Country road about opposite Bryan avenue in Hollis Park; thence generally westerly on and along private property to Farmer avenue; thence westerly on and along said Bryan avenue to its intersection with South street; thence westerly on and along South street to Puntine street in Jamaica; thence northwesterly on and along Puntine street to Linden street; thence westerly on and along Linden street to New York avenue; thence southerly on and along New York avenue to South street; thence westerly on and along South street to Prospect street; thence northerly on and along Prospect street to and across the bridge over the tracks of the Long Island Railroad to Fleet street; thence westerly on and along Fleet street to Twombly place; thence westerly on and along Twombly place to Church street; thence northerly on and along

Church street to Fulton street in Jamaica; with a branch line from the intersection of said New York avenue and Linden street in Jamaica; thence northerly on and along New York avenue to a point on New York avenue, south of the tracks of the Long Island Railroad; thence westerly on and along private property crossing Union Hall street and Washington street to a point on Prospect street, south of the tracks of the Long Island Railroad in Jamaica; also on and along Centre street, from Union Hall street to Washington street, all in the Borough of Queens.

Third—Beginning at a point at the boundary line between The City of New York and the Town of Hempstead, Nassau County, New York, on private property contiguous to and lying north of the conduit of the Brooklyn City Water Works in the Borough of Queens; running thence westerly on and along private property contiguous to and adjoining the property of the Brooklyn City Water Works on the northerly side thereof; crossing Ocean avenue (otherwise known as the road to Wright's mill), Rosedale avenue, Foster's Meadow road, the property of the Brooklyn City Water Works, known as conduit branch, Springfield road, Farmers avenue, New York avenue, Rockaway turnpike, to the junction of the Three-Mile road and Old South road; thence westerly on and along said Old South road to the road to Bergen's Landing; thence westerly on and along private property contiguous to and adjacent to the right of way of the Brooklyn City Water Works and on the northerly side thereof crossing Old South road, Hawthorne Creek road, road to Remsen's landing, Centreville avenue at the southerly end thereof, road to landing or Woodhaven road at the southerly end thereof, and Cedar lane, to the right of way of the Cross Country Railroad Company; thence northerly and westerly on and along private property crossing Old South road to a point on Eldert lane about 500 feet south of Liberty avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn; thence northerly on and along Eldert lane to Liberty avenue.

Fourth—Beginning at a point on the Jerico turnpike at the extreme easterly boundary line of The City of New York and the Town of North Hempstead, Nassau County, New York, running thence westerly on and along said Jerico turnpike to a point at the intersection of said Jerico turnpike and the Hempstead and Jamaica turnpike (otherwise known as Fulton street), all in the Borough of Queens.

And with the right or franchise to cross such other streets and highways and bridges (named and unnamed), as may be encountered in said routes.

Section 2. The grant of this franchise is subject to the following conditions:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and highways and bridges, to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the grantee, or in the event that such consent cannot be obtained, the grantee shall obtain the favorable determination, confirmed by the Court, of three Commissioners, appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, before said railway is built or operated.

Second—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years from the date when this ordinance is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise, but such renewal shall not provide for any further renewal. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railway by itself, and shall not include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successors or assigns. It shall be made in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railway company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railway company. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Third—Upon the termination of the said franchise, right or privilege, whether original or renewed, if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or its successors in authority shall so desire, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee necessary for traction purposes upon the said streets and highways and bridges, and of the land in private ownership upon which the said railway shall be operated or the easements of right-of-way or other necessary easements in such lands, as the case may be, including power-house, equipment, tracks and appurtenances, which plant and property shall be and become the property of the City of New York at the option of the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, on the termination of this grant and the payment to the grantee of such valuation. The valuation shall be based upon a fair appraisal of the property, excluding any value derived from the franchise, and such value shall be determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority; provided that in the valuation of the land in private ownership, on which such railroad is constructed, or the easements affecting such land, as the case may be, their value shall not be fixed at an amount in excess of the original cost thereof, to the grantee of said franchise, its successors or assigns. A sworn statement of such cost executed by such grantee and verified by the affidavit of one of its officers, shall be filed with the Comptroller of the City of New York, before any act is done by the grantee or its successors or assigns in the construction or operation of the railway upon any route hereinbefore mentioned, which includes private property.

Fourth—The New York and Long Island Traction Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay for this franchise to The City of New York, the following sums of money: During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$1,000, and which shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts derived from passenger and freight traffic, within the limits of The City of New York, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$1,000; during the remaining twenty years of the term, an annual sum which shall not be less than \$2,000, and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts as above, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$2,000.

In computing the amount of the gross receipts derived from passenger traffic and above referred to, the routes hereinafter mentioned shall be considered, and the persons who are upon the cars of the company at any point upon such routes shall be deemed to have paid the fare provided

to be paid by the ordinance granting the franchise aforesaid, whether they enter or leave the car upon such route or upon any other route upon which the grantee or its successors or assigns operates its cars.

Such sums shall be paid into the treasury of The City of New York on November 1, in each year; provided, however, that the first payment shall only be for that proportion of the above sums as the time from the signing of this ordinance by the Mayor to September 30 next preceding shall bear to the whole of one year. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and the provisions of the Railroad Law as it existed at the time of the adoption of this ordinance relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies shall, as to said railway, be strictly followed. The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns, to The City of New York for the rights and franchise hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the grantee, its successors or assigns, for said franchise, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute.

Fifth—The said annual charge or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewed, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway company providing for payments for street railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or franchises hereby granted, whether original or renewed, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives, so far as this franchise is concerned, any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant.

Sixth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the New York and Long Island Traction Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—The said railway may be operated by overhead electrical power, substantially similar to the system of overhead electrical traction now in use by the New York and North Shore Railway Company, or by the underground electric system now in use by the Interurban Street Railway Company in the Borough of Manhattan, and by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners, and consented to by the owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law.

Provided that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, upon giving to the grantee, its successors or assigns, one year's notice, in writing, may require it or them to operate its railway upon the whole or upon any portion of its route by underground electrical power substantially according to the system now in use on the railways in the Borough of Manhattan above referred to, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system, and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets and highways and bridges of The City of New York.

Eighth—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York, who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and the railway and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.

Tenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five cents within the limits of The City of New York; the said company shall not charge any passenger more than said sum for one continuous ride from any point on said railway, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof within the limits of The City of New York. The rates for the carrying of property upon the cars of the grantee shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, and shall be subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice and hearing to the grantee, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon said grantee, its successors or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such services than provided for by it.

Eleventh—The cars on the said lines as proposed shall run at intervals of not more than one hour, both day and night, and as such often as the reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the city ordinances; provided, however, that said railway company during the first five years of this franchise shall not be required to operate its cars on any of its lines within The City of New York between the hours of twelve o'clock midnight and four o'clock a. m. each day, unless the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said city shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of its cars during said hours.

Twelfth—The said railway company shall apply to each car run over said railway a proper fender and wheelguard in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Thirteenth—All cars on said railway shall be heated through the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Fourteenth—The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side of said streets, free and clear from ice and snow.

Fifteenth—The said railway company, as long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks



upon said streets and highways and bridges, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of said streets and highways and bridges, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street and highway and bridge, and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper city officer at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Sixteenth—The said railway company, its successors and assigns, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and highways and bridges hereby granted, shall cause the entire roadway of each of the same to be watered at least three times in every twenty-four hours when the thermometer is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, except that when the width of any roadway between curb lines shall exceed 60 feet, then a roadway of but 60 feet shall be watered as above.

Seventeenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained this grant may be forfeited and avoided by the City of New York, by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railway company.

Eighteenth—If any of the streets and highways and bridges above referred to, or described, shall not now be open or in use as public highways, no right or franchise therein shall vest in the grantee by virtue of this ordinance until after such streets and highways and bridges shall be legally opened as a public highway, and such right or franchise shall expire at the end of the term created by this ordinance as above set forth. Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed as an obligation on The City of New York in respect to the opening of such streets and highways and bridges, nor as in any manner granting property or rights of any kind in or upon its lands now owned or occupied by it under any title, except only the public streets and highways and bridges in the usual acceptance of such terms, which are specifically referred to above.

Section 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of article 4 of the Railroad Law, as it existed at the time of the adoption of this ordinance applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted hereafter affecting the surface railways operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Section 4. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that at any time after five years from the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railway hereby granted, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, if it deems it necessary in the public interest so to do, may require the grantee, its successors or assigns, in case the railway upon any portion of the routes above described shall consist of a single track, to construct and operate a second track upon any or all of the routes hereby granted, whether on streets, highways and bridges or upon any private property or right-of-way included in any of such routes so as to make a double-track railway.

Section 5. Said grantee shall commence construction within three months from the date when it has obtained complete legal authority to begin construction, including necessary permits from the city officials and departments and shall complete the construction of at least ten miles of single track railway on or before July 1, 1904, otherwise this grant shall be thereupon forfeited and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings. If upon any of the routes above described, or upon any portion thereof, there shall not be constructed and in actual operation by July 1, 1905, a railway properly equipped and operated as provided by this ordinance, the said route or portion thereof shall be conclusively taken to have been abandoned by the company, and so much of the rights and franchises hereby granted as pertain to such routes, or parts of routes, not then constructed from and after July 1, 1905, shall be thereupon forfeited and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings. Provided that such time may be extended upon the same conditions as to forfeiture under and for causes specified in section 59 of the Railroad Law, as it now exists, and by a properly executed instrument in writing; and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may similarly extend such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year, if, in their discretion, it seems best so to do, and that the city officials or departments who or which shall at the time of such construction have authority over the said streets and highways and bridges, may similarly extend, by properly executed instrument in writing, such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year further, if reasonable, in their judgment, by reason of requirements as to the manner of construction imposed by the city officials.

Section 6. If for any reason the right or franchise of the grantee in any of the streets, highways and bridges above described shall cease, or if for a period of six successive months the railway tracks upon any of such streets, highways and bridges shall not be operated as provided for in this ordinance, the Comptroller of The City of New York may require the grantee, its successors or assigns, to remove its tracks and other structures upon such streets, highways and bridges within thirty days after notice, and in default of their removal pursuant to such notice, the proper local authorities having jurisdiction may cause them to be removed and The City of New York may recover the cost and expenses of such removal, either by deducting them from the fund deposited as required in section 7 hereof, or by action; and the rights and franchises of the grantee, its successors or assigns, in such portions of the streets, highways and bridges, in case any such exist, shall forthwith and immediately cease upon the removal of such tracks, or structures and without judicial or other proceedings.

Section 7. This grant is upon the express condition that the New York and Long Island Traction Company, within thirty days after the said company has been duly authorized to operate its railway and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of three thousand dollars, either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by such company of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality of construction of the railway and, in case of default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company. Or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this grant relating to the headways of cars, fenders and wheel guards and the heating of the cars and the watering of

the streets, the said company shall pay a penalty of \$50 a day for each day of violation, and the further sum of \$10 a day for each car which shall not properly be heated or supplied with fenders and wheel guards in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters. In case of any drafts so made upon this security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice, in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of three thousand dollars, and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said city. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Section 8. This grant shall not become operative until said railway company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within ten days after the adoption of this ordinance.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

##### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be received unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either included in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City or New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
