MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held
Wednesday, June 18, 1913, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Present—President Frank Gallagher and Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Richard Welling. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the exempt class, under the heading “Bureau of Public Works in Each Borough” the following: Chief Engineer of Sewers, Queens. There were no appearances.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including the competitive class, part 1 (ungraded positions), group 3 (positions of a special or miscellaneous character), the title, Superintendent of Dependents.

J. McKee Borden, Esq., Secretary of the Department of Public Charities, and Angus P. Thorne, Esq., Superintendent of the Bureau of Dependent Adults of that department, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. There was no opposition and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held June 11 were approved.

On motion, the matter of the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the exempt class the title “Chief Engineer of Sewers, Queens,” was ordered continued on the calendar.
