62 basins repaired; 11 basin heads set; 73 basin hoods placed; 61 basin hood plates set; 5 basin covers placed; 37 basin grate bars set; 1,046 manholes examined; 68 manhole heads set; 54 manhole covers placed; 48 manholes repaired; 2 manholes built; 1,579 linear feet brick sewer repaired; 94 linear feet pipe sewer built; 1,463 cubic feet brickwork built; 425 cuts opened; 124 cuts refilled; 372 square yards pavement relaid; 629 cubic yards earth excavated; 628 cubic yards earth refilled.

245 feet of B. M. sheeting placed; 294 feet of B. M. sheeting drawn; 43 loads debris removed on account of repairs; 22 steam complaint examinations; 364 house connections repaired; 33 house connections examined; 5 examinations for building department; 24,070 inspection of changes to basins and sewers; 17 square feet sidewalk laid; 80 linear feet spur pipe laid; 7 sewer examinations (Mr. Klein); 1 manhole inspected; 36 culverts repaired; 29 examinations of sewer complaints; 482 culverts examined; 3 overflows examined; 46 curves examined; 117 manhole offsets examined; 38 bulkheads examined; 4,003 linear feet of barrel sewer examined; 580 linear feet of brick sewer pointed; 55 manhole heads examined; 3 culverts built.

**Complaints Received**—235 water in premises; 40 basins stopped; 69 manhole covers broken; 1 basin cover broken; 9 manhole covers dangerous; 13 bad odor from basin; 65 sewer stopped; 3 manhole heads to grade; 6 basins and sewers examined; 8 bad odor from sewer; 13 manhole covers missing; 8 sewers broken; 1 lost articles; 5 sewer needs cleaning; 6 sewer gas; 1 steam from basin; 1 grate bars needed; 2 sewers defective; 155 were without cause for complaint.

#### Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

The minor repairs that are made in regular routine manner are noted in the tabulated form at the conclusion of this report. The open market orders and check orders are treated in the same manner. The larger and more important work accomplished during this quarter will be treated in detail by buildings as follows:

##### MUNICIPAL BUILDING.

Since Submitting the report for the quarter ending September 30, 1914, the United States Volunteer Life Saving Corps has moved into the building and now occupies space on the third floor south. The Committee on Social Welfare and the Committee for the Revision of the City Charter, of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, occupy space on the fifth floor, south, and the Mayor's Committee on Unemployment occupies space on the eighth floor, south.

**Janitorial Service**—The entire building, exclusive of the tower and windows, is now cleaned by departmental employees. The contract for cleaning the windows of this building expired on December 31, 1914. The work under this contract has been very poorly and unsatisfactorily performed. Arrangements have, therefore, been made to do this work during the year 1915, with departmental labor. In addition to the regular cleaning of the building, the department has assumed the responsibility of moving, cleaning and oiling the furniture and making minor repairs to same.

**Elevator Service**—The elevators have been operated since June 30, 1914, by departmental employees. The elevator plant and equipment is not as yet completed, and the department has experienced great inconvenience on account of the shortage of cars due to the painting of the shafts, repairing of doors, installing of door operating and locking devices, motor and other troubles. In spite of these difficulties about 4,200 City employees and 10,000 visitors are daily accommodated by this service.

**Heating, Lighting and Ventilation**—The entire mechanical and electrical equipment is now being maintained and operated by this department. It has been found necessary to practically replace all ceiling lights in the building with higher powered lamps. This work was done at the request of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. These changes, together with the installation of desk lamps, have entailed a great deal of additional work.

**Telephone System**—The expense of telephoning between departments located in the Municipal Building has been practically eliminated through the installation of the interdepartmental switchboard. This switchboard supplies telephone service for the following departments, in addition to the interdepartmental service: Department of Taxes and Assessments, Public Recreation Commission, Panama-Pacific Exposition Committee, Office of the Building, Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal in Condemnation Proceedings, Examining Board of Plumbers. During the three months ending December 31, 1914, the switchboard supplied service as follows:

Incoming messages, 13,555; outgoing messages, 12,898; interdepartmental messages, 51,541; total, 77,994. The present saving on interdepartmental service alone is approximately \$300 per month. A contract for an additional switchboard has been awarded, and when this installation is completed, it is intended to keep these switchboards in continuous operation, supplying service to all departments, both day and night, Sundays and holidays.

**Information Bureau**—A revised directory of the departments, located in the building was compiled and issued on November 30, 1914. The directory of the Department and bureau heads has been revised and brought up to date. The index of the City employees located in the Municipal Building has proved to be of great value to the public as well as the departments. This index shows that there are 4,155 employees housed in the building, of whom 3,676 are males and 479 are females.

**Work Performed by Mechanics—Plumbing**: The records show that 207 jobs, for which written orders were issued, were completed. Besides this work, a strict and careful inspection of all plumbing work in the building is maintained. **Electrical**: The records show that 810 jobs were completed, for which written orders were issued. The time consumed per job varied from 15 minutes to several days. Besides this work, a careful inspection of lamps, fuses, etc., is maintained. **Carpenter and Locksmith**: The records show that the following work has been performed in this branch: repairs to furniture, 104 jobs; repairs to hardware, 406 jobs; measuring and replacing glass, 16 jobs; miscellaneous, 123 jobs. Total, 649 jobs.

**Elevator Construction and Repairs**—In this branch of the service, two Mechanics and four Helpers are employed. The work is divided into two branches, mechanical and electrical, with an experienced man in charge of each branch. The general repairs of the elevator apparatus is taken care of by these men and their helpers. A careful inspection of all elevators and machinery is maintained. Once a month a written report of the condition of all elevator apparatus is made to the office.

**Employees**—The following is a list of the force employed in the Municipal Building, as of December 31, 1914: 1 Assistant Engineer, 1 Janitor, 1 Elevator Dispatcher, 3 Attendants, 2 Clerks, 1 Electrician, 1 Electrician's Helper, 1 Marble Setter, 1 Foreman Mechanic, 1 Chief Engineer, 3 Engineers, 1 Oiler, 5 Laborers, 5 Firemen, 45 Elevatormen, 16 Laborers, 1 Assistant Foreman, 2 Cleaners (Female), 121 Cleaners (Male), 2 Elevator Constructors, 4 Elevator Constructor's Helpers, 1 Plumber's Helper, 3 Telephone Operators.

**The More Important Jobs Done by Bureau Squads**—Relined six engine room boilers and installed new arch blocks in each boiler; stained, varnished and glazed about 1,200 square feet of partition on the 20th floor; laid 100 square yards of carpet on the 20th floor; did numerous carpenter repair jobs, including installation of partitions on 20th floor; installed a dictaphone system in the offices of the Commissioner of Public Works; installed a call bell system in the offices of President Marks; also placed permanent buzzer system in the offices of the Bureau of Buildings, and maintained the Paymaster's intercommunicating telephone system. Repairs were made, on open market order, to the railing around the ash hoist and stairway, and open market order was given for placing of linoleum in the anteroom of the offices of the Borough President and Commissioner of Public Works.

#### OTHER BUILDINGS.

**City Hall**—Painted the ceilings, walls, woodwork and floor of the entire third floor for the new quarters of the Municipal Art Commission. Also painted the circular stairway leading up to these quarters. Cleaned and painted the Mayor's library and revarnished parquet floor. Revarnished the metal work of three fire places of the Governors' Room. Furnished and installed lumber for alterations to the platform in the Board of Estimate Chambers, and touched up the painting in connection with these alterations. Cleaned the upholstery, varnished and rubbed the woodwork, all furniture of the Mayor's Reception Room (about 40 pieces of furniture). Reset all marble bases in the Board of Aldermen's Chambers and took up and reset about 25 tiles in the corridor and toilet of these chambers. Installed a radiator in the office of the Assistant Secretary to the Mayor. Cleaned and repaired the gutters and leaders on the building. Made several alterations and repairs to the steam heating system. Cleaned and repaired all Cryer valves. Repaired flooring and woodwork on third floor. Placed locks on all doors. Put the lighting system in first-class condition. Installed electric heaters. Panelled off the slop sink and circular stairs on the second floor. Installed an electric tea kettle in the ladies' room on the second floor. Hung fire extinguishers throughout the building. Altered and completed work on the first floor at the east end of the building for the new offices of the President of the Board of Aldermen, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Minority Leader of the Board of Aldermen. Made repairs in both the east and west end of the Mayor's Reception Room, replacing considerable rotten structural lumber and floor beams. Completed the new stairway from the second to the third floor. Regilded thirty-seven gilt frames and cleaned the oil paintings for the same.

**County Court**—Installed a new concrete floor in the north end of the storeroom (about 400 square feet). Removed turned-down and reinstalled the armature of electric elevator motor in the pent house on the roof; also had the brushes refitted to the commutator. Overhauled, repaired and cleaned all Cryer valves. Maintained electrical equipment in good working order, making numerous repairs to electric light, call bells, fan motors and elevators. Completed the removing of all spectators' platforms in the various court rooms and rebuilt benches, so as to be portable. Removed all light standards from the Judges' desks and substituted portable desk lights. Completed the work of painting the court rooms in light color in order to give a brighter tone to the rooms.

**Criminal Courts Building**—Painted two Magistrates' detention pens, officers' room, receiving room, corridor and toilet in Special Sessions prison pen; also repaired plaster work on four sides of the dome in the main rotunda of the grand jury room on the third floor. Repaired ceiling in the room of Judge Wadham's secretary. Removed plaster covering from the ducts on three sides of the grand jury reception room (about 35 square yards). Braced the form work securely to the ceiling and relathed and replastered. Placed new cut-off ropes on elevators Nos. 1 and 5. Placed new operating rope on elevator No. 2. New bolts for crank pin box on engine of elevator No. 2 and placed new wrist pins on engines for elevators Nos. 1 and 3. Installed 144 Turbine valves in two elevator pumps to increase economy of operation. Prepared plans for proposed new court rooms. Installed brush holders on Diehl generator with new reaction type brushes of one-half carbon and one-half graphite to improve the commutator and decrease wear. Also had the commutator turned down and panelled off smoothly. Made numerous repairs to the roof due to expansion and contraction on account of the movement of the building. Maintained electrical equipments, call bells, motors, dynamos and fans in good condition; also made numerous repairs to sash chains. Repaired bronze gate in office of Clerk of General Sessions; purchased new rug for office of Secretary to Judge Wadham, and recovered the sofa for the Court of General Sessions.

**City Court**—Installed an additional radiator in Judge Lynch's Chambers. Installed window sashes in all windows of basement, first, second and third floors. Overhauled, cleaned and repaired all Cryer valves.

**Hall of Records**—Painted Room 612 and erected scaffold for, and painted and decorated the plain panels on the east and west sides of the rotunda. Replaced fifteen broken wash basins, changing the waste line and basin clamps, so that hereafter regular basins taken from stock may be installed instead of special basins heretofore used. The basins now used cost about \$8.50 each, while the regular basins which can now be used from stock will only cost \$2.25 each; furthermore, there always has been a delay in securing the special types. Changed location of the water supply of the eighth floor toilet at the water tank. Finished various jury boxes, railings, desks, etc., for the Surrogate's Court. Repaired the tile on the roof. Placed new tiller rope on No. 1 elevator; new cut off cables on No. 3 elevator; new operating and safety cables on No. 1 elevator; new main lifting cables on No. 4 elevator and new plunger rods on No. 3 elevator. Overhauled valve gear of three Corliss engines to overcome lost motion due to wear. Installed three new turn tables in the boiler room for shifting coal cars to replace defective and worn out turn tables. Tested and overhauled the Johnson system of automatic temperature control on all floors. Installed new steam piping in the east pump room to replace defective piping. Repaired roof gutters. Maintained electrical equipments, such as clocks, lights, motors, elevators, signals, and cleaned up a number of grounds in short circuits. Kempt the buzzer systems in repairs and reversed a number of light brackets to improve illumination. Did the necessary electrical work in connection with removal of Corporation Counsel's office. Repaired the glass dome light over the main rotunda. Completed 50 per cent of the work of numbering the rooms throughout the building, in accordance with modern office building numbering.

**East 57th Street Court**—Installed a marble screen in front of the fixtures in the men's toilet. Repaired and repainted sashes through the building. Repaired and painted roofs, gutters, ventilators and leaders; also made several repairs to steam heating plant.

**Harlem Court**—Varnished the rail and platform in the Magistrates' Court. Installed pipe covering in the boiler room. Placed a new rain leader on the west side of the building. Built a new court room for the Magistrates' Court to be known as Part 2.

**264 Madison Street**—Turned down commutator of elevator and reset brushes to fit.

**West 54th Street Court**—Painted the elevator car. Changed the piping system in the boiler room to enable the operation of the plant by low pressure system instead of high pressure, thus producing a saving in operation. Repaired the radiator connections in the women's toilet; in the offices of the Street Cleaning Department; in the hall to the Judges' chambers and installed air valves. Also repaired leak in heating stock. Placed now flooring of cork composition in the elevator. Repaired roof over Part 2 court room and over east side of the elevator shaft. Contract let for counterbalanced stairway and ladder to comply with recommendations of the Fire Department.

**Sixth District Court, 155 East 88th Street**—Furnished and placed a gilded sign 27 feet by 18 inches, reading "Sixth Municipal Court" on the face of this building.

**First Street and Second Avenue Court**—Repaired linoleum and furnished seven new shades for the Court and Clerks' rooms. Installed a new radiator in the court room. Maintained in good order the exhaust fan motor. Bids were asked for wire window guards on the Second Avenue side of the court.

**49 Lafayette Street**—Painted store on the corner of Leonard and Lafayette Streets and the entire fifth floor. Overhauled the plumbing on the first, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, tenth and eleventh floors. Varnished and glazed partitions erected by the carpenter squad. Made a complete inspection of the mechanical equipment of the buildings and found it necessary to make several repairs to the two passenger and two freight elevators. Plans and specifications for the lighting of the ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth floors were submitted to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. Prepared plans and specifications for the necessary alterations required for the ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth floors for the use of the Municipal Civil Service Commission. Prepared plans and specifications for fitting up of the fifth floor for the use of the Department of Licenses. Also fitted up the store floor



for the New Employment Bureau. This building was turned over to the Bureau rather suddenly in the latter part of the year and a sufficient force to operate it was drawn from the other buildings in the Bureau.

**Municipal Asphalt Plant**—Prepared plans and specifications for heating and plumbing systems in the tractor and trailer shed and the contract has been advertised and awarded. A small amount of electrical work was also done and a number of drip pans were made for use in the engine room.

**New Children's Court**—Prepared plans and specifications for stock furniture and shades for this building. Checked up the specifications and plans made out by the architects for electric lighting fixtures. Made the final payments on the general construction contract; plumbing contract; heating contract and vault contract. The elevator and electric contract is practically completed; only the final tests remain to be made. Contract for interior finish work is about 86 per cent. completed. The building as a whole is 98 per cent. completed. Firemen have been assigned to operate this building and an attendant has been assigned to look after it in a janitorial capacity.

**BATHS.**  
**Allen Street**—Reset two dozen shower room seats. Repaired as far as possible all shower room doors. It is our intention to eventually install a new standard door in this and other baths. Rebabbed crank-shaft boxes on No. 1 engine and installed a new section of 7-inch main steam header to replace defective section.

**Carmine Street**—Repaired latches on all shower room doors, also calibrated the electrical meters on main switchboard and reset meters.

**West 60th Street**—Renewed the hot water manifold on second floor, men's side, supplying hot water to all showers. Installed six royal flush valves in toilets. Placed a new drip system to take the leakage through the second floor waterproofing. Cleaned and varnished the oak partition in the office of the waiting room. Installed a wringer on slop sink, so that patrons might wring out bathing suits. Also made additional braces for the slop sink in order to stand this strain.

**East 23rd Street**—Rebuilt the rear brick wall of No. 2 boiler using a special insulating brick to keep in the heat. Built a pier to support pump in the engine room. Installed 50 new seats in the shower stalls on both the men's and women's sides. Relocated waste pipe from slop sink to men's toilet. Repair marble throughout bath, install a screen tank in suction of the refiltration pump and also installed swinging bracket for the bonnet of the screen tank. Commenced work of placing a new additional radiator in the pool room. Cut 2-inch observation holes in upper portion of all shower room doors, in order to detect thievery; also put a new warning gong in the pool room.

**East 76th Street**—Repaired and plastered ceiling in the men's waiting room and also did considerable repair work to put marble in this bath in good condition throughout. Repaired feed water meter; turned down armature of the generator and refitted brushes to the same. Also turned down commutator of two dynamos and put them in good running order.

**East 109th Street**—Placed wire guards over the main roof sky-light. Overhauled a defective reducing valve to make it steam tight. Painted the first floors of the men's and women's shower sections.

**Rutgers Place**—Repaired vault lights. Overhauled the main reducing valve on account of irregular condition. Prepared plans and specifications for the erection of an iron and glass enclosure at the rear of the swimming pool. This work is now in course of construction.

**East 54th Street**—Reset in a secure manner all marble seats throughout the bath and removed all seats from shower portion of the bathing compartments and used them to replace those broken in the dressing portion of the stalls. Placed new piston rods in the boiler feed pumps. The work of installing the two new swimming pools in this bath and the alterations and additions to the heating and plumbing caused thereby has not yet been completed. Plans and specifications for new ventilating fans and engines have been prepared. Piping over the boilers has been rearranged.

**West 41st Street**—Removed smoke stack from the west side of the roof. Opened and replaced about 2 square yards of side walls in the vault under the sidewalk to permit retubing of boiler No. 1. Prepared plans and specifications for the installation of feed water heater and feed water meter. Also prepared plans and specification for enlarging pipe trenches in the engine room floor.

**Cherry and Oliver Streets**—Replaced tell tale line on the roof broken by frost. Caulked boiler No. 2 and stopped the leakage around the same and around rivets. Installed automatic temperature regulators for the Tobey hot water generator. Removed the arc lamps in the gymnasium and installed in their place nitrogen Tungsten lamps. Put roofs and two roof tanks in repair.

**Rivington Street**—Installed rubber treads on steps of the stairway leading to the swimming pool. Also placed railing along stairs and between the piers at the rear end of the plunge. Put in 110 new shower room doors. Installed a pressure regulating valve for the house pump to maintain a constant pressure on the house service. Shifted soda tank to facilitate adjusting of orifice valves on chemical pots. Replaced leaky filters. The following work in connection with the alterations and improvements in this bath has been completed: The high pressure water system comprising the house pump, pressure tanks, piping from the Croton supply to the pump, to the tanks and to the main header supplying the house; control valves, pressure reducing valves, gauges, safety valves, connections between compressor, tank and filters; high pressure connections to and from heater; by-pass connections for high pressure to shower floors; by-pass around circulating pump to allow water from the deep end of the plunge to flow back by gravity to the sediment end of the tank; overflow to sediment tank; application of felt insulating covering of all piping and tanks and finished painting all covering and exposed iron. Relocated temperature regulator and renewed piping; installed valve on the chemical mixing pot; installed steam and exhaust connections for house pump with control valve and asbestos insulating covering.

**West 28th Street**—Changed position of some of the shower heads. Inspected contract work on heating and plumbing system. The heating system is about 95 per cent. completed and the plumbing work 85 per cent. completed. The building itself is 98 per cent. completed. An application has been made for money to equip it with proper furniture, gymnasium fittings and a laundry. It has been arranged to have a model of this building made to be sent to the Panama Exposition at San Francisco. An attendant has been placed in charge of this bath and a stationary engineer and two firemen employed to operate the heating plant in order to keep the building in proper condition during the cold weather.

**Free Floating Baths**—The floating baths, which were located during the summer in six berths along the water front, were towed back to their winter quarters at the foot of 22d Street in South Brooklyn. In connection with this it was necessary to take down bridges, gang-ways and platforms running from the bath to the piers. It was also necessary to disconnect these baths from the Croton water supply, removing the valves, meters, shutting off the taps, etc.

**Interior Baths—Patronage**—The total bath patronage during the quarter ending December 31st, was 1,308,817. Of this number 885,520 bathers were men and 423,297 were women. This shows a proportion of over two male bathers to one female bather. Appended to this report table "A," which gives in detail the patronage per bath per month and grand totals for both men and women.

COMFORT STATIONS.

**Chatham Square**—Renewed water lines throughout, installing extra valves so that it will not be necessary to shut down the entire station when making repairs. It has been found that in making repairs to plumbing it was necessary to close down the entire station and the installation of these extra valves will only make it necessary to shut off from the public that particular toilet which is being repaired. Maintained and made repairs to the ventilating motor fans.

**Mail Street**—This station having been placed in good condition by the installation of a new floor this year, it was not found necessary to make any repairs of importance. It was, however, necessary to put in new vault lights in a portion of the station under the park. These vault lights had been smashed by Park Department employees, who ran their wheelbarrows over them.

**Greeley Square**—Owing to the fact that this station will undoubtedly be entirely changed because of subway construction, it was deemed advisable to make no large repairs. The motor fan and ventilating apparatus, however, was put in good working order.

**Hanover Square**—Took apart the centrifugal sewage pump and trued up the shaft. A new oil cup was installed and the pump reset in place. This work was done by an outside machinist. The reserve sewage pump was repaired and refitted with a new chain, bearings and supports. Work was also done in keeping in repair and good running order the motors of the sump pumps.

**Sheriff and Delancey Streets**—Overhauled all fixtures throughout. Made and installed new doors in women's toilets.

**Park Avenue and 125th Street**—Set three new saddles in entrance doorways.

**Third Avenue and 129th Street**—Substituted key switches for push button switches, so that members of the public could not interfere with the lighting of the station by turning off push button switches.

**Washington Market**—The plumbing of this station was entirely overhauled and all water pipes near outside walls were covered to prevent freezing. Also changed the radiator connections from the mains to improve circulation of hot water.

**Queensboro Bridge**—By an arrangement with the Department of Bridges, two toll houses which were not being used by that department were turned over to us for use as comfort stations. These toll houses were fitted up by the Bridge Department, with the understanding that this Bureau would supply the necessary supplies and force to operate and clean the station. On October 29th these stations were opened to the general public, and have been in operation regularly since that time. In connection with their opening and operation, it was necessary to make certain changes. The plumbing was overhauled, floors painted and a cork carpet placed in them. The windows were reglazed with Florentine glass. Repaired covering of water lines in the subway under the station to prevent freezing. Made out plans and specifications and had them approved for an electric lighting system. Both stations have been equipped with electric lights, wired from the Bridge Department panel board in the subway. Two gas steam radiators were installed in the stations and a complete gas piping steam connection to the meter in the subway. Equipped stations with shelves and closets.

**Market Near Comfort Station**—A tentative plan was prepared for enclosure of the market space under Queensboro Bridge; plans showing the construction of marble and glass partitions between the arches on all sides were prepared and also a marquise along the entire 59th Street front. Prepared a tentative plan and estimate for the construction of a farmers' shed along the curb line.

MARKETS.

**Washington**—Painting of the interior of the market is 75 per cent. completed. All leaders on the interior of the outside walls were taken down and reset. Bad piping was replaced, bends eliminated and cleanouts installed. The work of installing a refrigerating plant was completed. This plan consists of ammonia compressors and condenser, brine tank, centrifugal circulating brine pumps and a system of brine mains throughout the market, including the thorough insulation of the mains with cork covering. A brine meter was installed so that the amount of brine distributed to individual standholders might be ascertained. Additional outlets in the brine mains were made so that connections might be made in the case of the construction of a mezzanine floor. A rental sheet was prepared for the Finance Department with regard to the space allotments to various merchants in the market. The electric lighting plans and specifications were checked up by this office and sent to the printers. The interior alterations of the market were finished up by the completion of the new floors, counter fronts, etc. The roof repairs were 90 per cent. completed. All wire and fittings not in actual service were removed so that the painting of the interior of the market would not be hampered. Temporary storm doors were erected at the entrance to the temporary sheds on the sidewalk. Regulations for fixtures to be constructed in the market were prepared, reviewed and adopted and are now in the hands of the printer.

**Washington and Gansevoort**—Contract was let for eight new double hung doors. Replaced about 50 square yards of plaster on the second floor, and painted about 500 square yards of wall and ceiling surface. Repaired sidewalks in both markets, amounting to about 10 square yards. Made numerous repairs to roofs; removed lath and plaster and replaced with metal ceiling at stands at 36 to 42 Bloomfield Street.

**Fulton**—Removed sidewalk stands from Fulton Street, Front Street and Beekman Street sides of the market, with the exception of two stands. Boarded up the window openings and barricaded the doors of the street entrances.

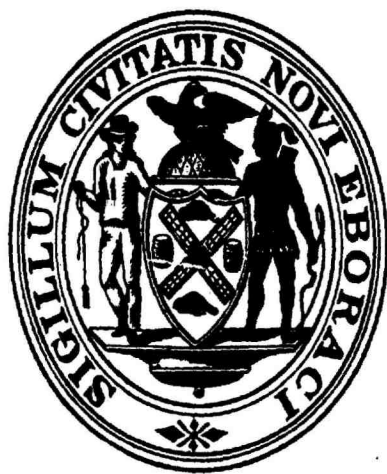

No person other than one who shall have graduated after a course of training of not less than two years' duration from a hospital training school for nurses shall practice as or hold himself or herself out to be or be by any one held out or represented to be a trained, graduate or certified nurse, or use any letters, words, figures or device to indicate that such person is a trained, graduate or certified nurse.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Far Rockaway Transportation Company, Inc., the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

#### PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

THIS CONTRACT, made and executed in duplicate this day of 1915, by and between THE CITY OF NEW YORK (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the FAR ROCKAWAY TRANSPORTATION COMPANY, INC. (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, WITNESSETH:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

SECTION 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to maintain and operate a stage or omnibus route for public use in the Borough of Queens in The City of New York, upon the following routes, to wit:

1. Beginning in Central Avenue at its intersection with City Line at or near McNeil Avenue, thence along Central Avenue to South Street, thence along South Street to Rue de St. Felix Street; all in the former Village of Far Rockaway, Borough of Queens.
2. Beginning in the former Village of Far Rockaway, at the intersection of Central Avenue and Cornaga Avenue, thence along Cornaga Avenue to Sea View Avenue, thence along Sea View Avenue to Atlantic Avenue, thence along Atlantic Avenue and the Boulevard to Washington Avenue, thence along Washington Avenue to Fifth Avenue, in the section known as Rockaway Park in the Borough of Queens.
3. Beginning in Mott Avenue at its intersection with Point Breeze Place, thence along Mott Avenue to Central Avenue; all in the former Village of Far Rockaway, Borough of Queens.

And to cross such other streets and avenues, named and unnamed, as may be encountered in said routes.

The said routes hereby authorized are shown upon a map entitled:

"Map showing the proposed stage or omnibus routes of the Far Rockaway Transportation Company, Inc., in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, to accompany petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

Dated June 15, 1914

and signed by Herman Bose, Jr., Secretary and Treasurer.

A copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, and is to be substantially followed; provided that temporary deviations therefrom may be permitted as hereinafter set forth.

SECTION 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right to maintain and operate said stage or omnibus routes shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of ten (10) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of five (5) years upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege. Such right and privilege shall be valued as if the Company had not exercised the same for the said period of ten (10) years, and no allowance shall be made to the Company in such valuation by reason of such exercise.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract unless the Board shall, during the original term of this contract, permit another company or an individual to

operate stages or omnibuses over all or a portion of the routes herein authorized.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding five (5) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, unless the Board shall, during the original term of this contract, permit another company or an individual to operate stages or omnibuses over all or a portion of the routes herein authorized, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested persons selected in the following manner:

One disinterested person shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested person shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested person, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract unless the Board shall, during the original term of this contract, permit another company or an individual to operate stages or omnibuses over all or a portion of the routes herein authorized. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(b) During the first term of one (1) year a sum which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross receipts, but which sum shall not be less than five hundred dollars (\$500).

During the succeeding term of four (4) years an annual sum which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than five hundred dollars (\$500).

During the remaining term of five (5) years, an annual sum which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than two thousand dollars (\$2,000).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City and for the purpose of determining such gross annual receipts, the Company shall keep accurate accounts of all fares collected within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights or franchises at a different rate.

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions over the same streets and avenues, hereinafter described.

Fifth—At the termination or forfeiture of this grant, the City, at the election of the Board, shall have the right to purchase all or any part of the property of the Company used for the purpose of the operation of the stage or omnibus system hereby authorized at a sum equal to a fair valuation of such property, exclusive of any value which such property may have by reason of this contract.

If the Company and the City cannot agree upon a fair valuation of such property, then the valuation thereof shall be determined and fixed by three arbitrators selected in the following manner:

One disinterested person shall be chosen by the Company; one disinterested person shall be chosen by the Board, and the two so chosen shall choose a third disinterested person. The decision under oath of any two of such persons, who shall be so selected, shall be final and conclusive.

If either the Company or the City fails to appoint an arbitrator as herein provided, or should the first two arbitrators fail to agree on the selection of the third arbitrator within thirty (30) days after the first two arbitrators shall be chosen, or if no two arbitrators so selected shall agree upon the valuation of such property within sixty (60) days after the arbitrators shall be so selected, then such valuation may be fixed by a commissioner appointed by the Supreme Court on the application of either party.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent con-

sent or consents; and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Seventh—The Company shall commence operation within three (3) months from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor; provided that such period may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided, further, that when the commencement of said operation shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement of such operation may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board, the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceeding.

Eighth—Nothing herein contained shall be construed as permitting the grantee to erect any structures whatever upon City streets, and the Company shall not construct or maintain any fixture or structure in the street unless especially authorized by resolution of the Board.

Ninth—All vehicles which may be operated pursuant to this contract shall comply with the following general requirements:

1. They shall be propelled by power generated or contained within the vehicle itself, but no power shall be used which will in its generation or use produce smoke or noxious odors sufficient in the opinion of the Board or its authorized representatives to constitute a nuisance.

2. The maximum weight, including fuel, water, oil or any other material or any accessories used in operation, shall not exceed nine thousand five hundred (9,500) pounds.

3. The seating space shall not be more than that sufficient to accommodate forty (40) adults.

4. The maximum width shall not exceed seven feet two inches (7'2").

5. The maximum height shall not exceed eleven feet eight inches (11'8").

6. The maximum length shall not exceed twenty-four feet (24').

7. They shall be designed and constructed in a manner which will permit ease and freedom of movement under all conditions.

8. The distribution of weight on axles, length of wheel base and other features of design shall be such as to avoid skidding as far as possible and shall be such as to permit easy steering and control.

9. They shall be fitted with brakes capable of stopping and holding the same under all conditions.

10. They shall be so constructed that the oil or grease cannot drop on the roadway.

11. All parts shall be so constructed that no undue noise or vibration shall result from operation.

Tenth—No stage or omnibus shall be operated pursuant to this contract unless there shall be painted thereon in letters sufficiently large to be clearly visible for a distance of seventy-five feet:

(a) The name of the Company owning and operating such vehicle.

(b) The number of the vehicle which is assigned to it upon receiving the approval of the Board or its authorized representatives.

(c) The number of adults for which the vehicle has seating space.

Eleventh—No advertising signs shall appear on the outside of any stage or omnibus.

Twelfth—The destination of each stage or omnibus shall be plainly indicated on the front of the vehicle, and shall be illuminated at night.

Thirteenth—The number of passengers to be carried in any vehicle shall at no time exceed the seating capacity of the vehicles.

Fourteenth—The inclosed portion of all stages or omnibuses which are operated on said routes shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force affecting surface railway cars or such laws and ordinances affecting stages or omnibuses as may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be in force, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Fifteenth—The inclosed portion of all stages or omnibuses operated on said routes shall be well lighted or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—Before any stage or omnibus is put in service it must be submitted to the Board or its authorized representatives and receive the approval thereof. If any vehicle which may be so submitted for approval shall not conform with the requirements herein or should any such vehicle for any reason be considered by the Board or its authorized representatives unfit for public use, then the Board or its authorized representatives may refuse such approval, in which case the Company shall not operate such vehicle. If after a vehicle shall have been so approved, defects develop which in the opinion of the Board or its authorized representatives render it unfit for public service, then the Board or its authorized representatives may require the withdrawal of such vehicle from service.

Seventeenth—All vehicles operated pursuant to this contract shall be maintained in good and safe repair and in a manner which will in all ways render the vehicle fit for public service. The Company shall permit the Board or its authorized representatives to inspect at all reasonable times any or all the vehicles used by the Company. If upon inspection any vehicle shall appear in the judgment of said Board or its authorized representatives to be unfit for public service, then the Company shall, upon notice, immediately withdraw such vehicle from service, and shall remedy the defect and notify the Board or its authorized representatives that the defect has been remedied before such vehicle shall be restored to service.

Eighteenth—All laws and ordinances affecting the operation of stages or omnibuses now in force or which may be in force during the term of this contract shall be complied with by the Company. The Company shall also comply with and enforce the carrying out

of any orders or regulations which may be issued by the Board, designed for the protection of persons, of property or of the comfort and health of the public.

Nineteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon any stage or omnibus route herein authorized shall not exceed ten (10) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than ten (10) cents for one continuous ride from any point on any of the stage or omnibus routes hereby authorized to any other point on any of said routes.

Twentieth—Stages or omnibuses shall be run on said routes at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes during the period of each day between 6 o'clock a. m. and 12 o'clock midnight, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by resolution of the Board.

Twenty-first—The Company shall, at its own expense, do anything and everything within its power to keep its vehicles in operation on regular schedules during the existence of snow and ice in the streets and avenues upon which the Company is hereby authorized to operate, and if it shall be necessary to remove such snow and ice to the side of the roadway in order to so operate, then such removal shall be done under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the President of the Borough of Queens, but in no event shall snow or ice so removed be allowed by the Company to obstruct the crosswalks of any street.

Twenty-second—It is understood that the Company shall operate, pursuant to this contract, only the routes herein authorized, but should vehicular traffic be diverted from any portion of any of the streets or avenues upon which the Company is hereby authorized to operate because of fires, parades or because of any other event which will close the street to vehicular traffic temporarily, then the Company may use such other streets or avenues as are necessary to continue the operation. If, however, for any reason any of the streets and avenues in which the operation is hereby authorized shall be closed to vehicular traffic for a longer period than twenty-four hours, then the Company shall communicate with the Board or its authorized representatives and obtain authority for the operation upon other streets and avenues for the period during which said street or avenue may be closed.

Twenty-third—Should it be deemed advisable by the Board at any time during the term of this contract to require the Company to operate extensions to the routes herein authorized, additional route or routes in substitution for those herein authorized, and the Board shall so order, then the Company shall, upon notice by the Board, apply for a franchise or right to operate such extension, additional or substituted routes and accept a franchise therefor upon terms and conditions similar to those contained herein, and for a term expiring not later than the date of the expiration of this contract, provided that the Board shall not hereunder require the Company to extend its routes for a distance greater than one mile during any calendar year.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries, and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-fifth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-sixth—The Company shall keep accurate books of the performance of different types of vehicles and the different services rendered and the cost thereof, and shall at any time furnish the Board, or its authorized representatives, such information with respect thereto as shall be requested.

Twenty-seventh—In case of any violation or breach of failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board or its authorized representatives, acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Any false entry in the books of the Company or false statement in the reports to the Comptroller as to a material fact, knowingly made by the Company, shall constitute such a violation or breach of failure to comply with the provisions herein contained as to warrant the forfeiture of the franchise.

Nothing herein contained shall affect in any way the right of the Company to apply to a court of competent jurisdiction for review of any action of the Board forfeiting the franchise or consent herein granted.

Twenty-eighth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy



such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages or at the option of the Board this contract may be forfeited upon ten (10) days' notice to the Company.

**Twenty-ninth**—The Company shall assume all liability for damages to persons or property occasioned by reason of the operation of the stage or omnibus routes authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

**Thirtieth**—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, and the maintenance of vehicles in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract; and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions or compliance with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board acting hereunder, relating to the roadway, repair, maintenance or withdrawal from service of vehicles, the Company shall pay a sum of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each vehicle that shall not be properly heaved or lighted in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters, as fixed or liquidated damages, all of which sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the sums as fixed or liquidated damages in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not pay such liquidated damages in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed damages, or where the amount of such damages is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such damages from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), and in default thereof this contract may be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City. These provisions for the recovery of such damages are in addition to the right to forfeit the franchise conferred by Section 2, Subdivision Twenty-seventh of this contract.

**Thirty-first**—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction shall be deemed to be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

**Thirty-second**—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title" encountered in the routes hereinabove described and upon or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to operate stages or omnibuses.

**Thirty-third**—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

**Section 3.** Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

**Section 4.** The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
