An Ordinance to Amend Section 6, Article 1, Chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to Street Fires.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Section 6, article 1, chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 6. Street fires; permit required. No person shall kindle, build, maintain or use a fire upon any dock, pier or bulkhead; nor in or upon a street or vacant lot, without a permit from the fire commissioner. A permit to kindle, build, maintain and use a fire in or upon a public street for the purpose of conducting a trade or business may be issued by the fire commissioner upon an application giving such information as may be required by him, and upon receipt of a fee of \$0.50, except that no fee shall be required for permits issued for the kindling and maintaining of such fires for the sole purpose of destroying fallen leaves outside of the fire limits. No permit shall be issued, however, to kindle, build, maintain or use a fire—

(a) Within 15-feet of a fire hydrant;

Within 2 feet of the surface of any stone pavement;

On or within 2 feet of the surface of any asphalt pavement, except for the ourpose of repairing, removing or constructing the same.

A fire kindled, built and maintained under a permit issued in conformity with the provisions of this section shall be continuously under the care and direction of a competent person from the time it is kindled until it is extinguished.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately. Adopted by the Board of Aldermen March 21, 1916.


