That the application of Daniel H. King for permission to erect certain buildings be granted upon certain conditions.

That the Secretary be directed to call the attention of the Commissioner of Public Works, to the fact that the supplies furnished the Sanitary Bureau of this Department as per requisitions, viz: complaint, and proof "blanks" "scavengers returns" and other blanks are invariably short of the complement and request his attention to the same.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to submit monthly a report upon the number and nature of the inspections made by each inspector the number of complaints made, together with the absences, sick leaves, absence from court and such other information as may serve to inform the Board of the practical efficiency of the Bureau of Inspection.

That the application of P. A. H. Jackson, in

respect to setting aside a judgment, be and is hereby denied.

Whereas, there has been a weekly increase in the number of cases of small pox during the past few weeks (statistics of which are appended) and

Whereas, great difficulty is experienced in procuring the necessary vaccine lymph.
Resolved, That this Board feels constrained to urge immediate action upon the bill now before the State Senate, the passage of which will give this Board the authority and means of taking the necessary action to prevent the spread of small pox in this city and vicinity.

Resolved, That a copy of the above preamble and resolution be signed by the President and Secretary, and forwarded to the Hon. James W. Booth, chairman of the Health Commission of the Senate.

The number of reports thereon received from the inspectors was 636.

During the past week 41 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the inspectors for investigation and report.

The disinfecting corps have visited 50 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 48 houses, 48 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, &c.

18 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital by the ambulance corps.

Permits have been granted to consignees of 34 vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the health officer of the Port.

104 permits have been granted to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy vaults.

Comparative statement of contagious diseases for the two weeks ending March 21, 1874.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported for the week ending March 21, 1874: typhoid fever, 6; scarlet fever, 79; measles, 40; cerebro spinal meningitis, —; diphtheria, 49, and small-pox, 23.

265 loads of night soil were removed by the night scavengers from the privy vaults of the city.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending March 21, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 557 burial permits for city deaths, 21 for bodies in transitu, and 61 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 557 deaths, 178 marriages, 490 births, 61 still-births, 21 applications for transit permits, and 58 returns from Coroners. There were 27 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcript of birth record, 4 of marriage and 29 of death were issued from this Bureau. One case of death was referred to Coroner.

BUREAU OF THEATRES, HOTELS, SCHOOLS, HOUSES, CHURCHES, FACTORIES AND SPECIAL SURVEYS.

Abstract of operations during the week ending March 21, 1874:

THEATRES.

Eleven theatres and places of public amusement have been visited and inspected during the week, as follows, to wit: Berry's Opera House, Booth's, Daly's 5th avenue, Tivoli, Niblo's, Germania, Stadt, Olympic, Metropolitan, Bowery, and the Grand Opera House, and no infractions of section 29 of the building law noted in either.

HOTELS.

Ten hotels, boarding and lodging houses have been carefully inspected as to their condition, means and facilities for egress and escape in case of fire, viz: The Anthony House, 834 Broadway; Madison square Hotel, Broadway and 21st street; Newbeck's, 252 Fulton street; Ocean House, 151 Cedar street; Lickwick, 147 and 149 Cedar street; Crittenden, 1142 Broadway; Libby, 386 Fourth avenue; boarding and lodging house, 208 5th avenue; boarding and lodging house, 1128 Broadway; Garvey House, Broadway and 42d street, and in all cases where such means and facilities were found to be insufficient, the owners or parties in interest have been notified to forthwith provide additional fire safeguards.

FACTORIES.

Fourteen factories and buildings used for manufacturing purposes have been thoroughly examined as to their condition, and the means, facilities and appliances therein severally provided for the protection, egress or escape of their employees and operatives in the event of fire, and where such means are found to be insufficient, the parties in interest have been notified and required to provide such additional fire safeguards as being deemed necessary had been recommended by the inspectors charged with the duty of such examinations.

SPECIAL EXAMINATIONS OR SURVEYS.

Special examinations have been made of 2,758 buildings, heretofore provided with fire escapes, as to the condition of such escapes and their being kept in good repair, free from obstructions, and available for use in the event of fire.

Removals of 14 hotel and factory leases have been made in which the law has been complied with.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

STATED SESSION, March 18, 1874.

To the Board of Education:

The Finance Committee report herewith the Annual Apportionment of that portion of the School Fund which, by the act of 3d of July, 1851, section 15, is to be distributed to the several schools named in said act, and in the several other acts authorizing their participation in the School Fund.

The total average attendance of the pupils in the schools entitled to participate in this apportionment for 1874, as set forth in the returns made by the Principals under oath, ending the 1st of October, 1873, and upon which average the apportionment is based, is eighty-nine thousand one hundred and eighteen (\$9,118), and the sum to be apportioned is as follows:

1st. An amount equal to the State quota.....	\$524,724 18
2d. One-twentieth of one per cent. on the taxable property of the City and County New York.....	564,569 82

Total, one million eighty-nine thousand two hundred and ninety-four dollars.....\$1,089,294 00

or about \$12 22 per scholar.

The details of the attendance in the Ward Schools by Wards, and in the Normal, Colored, and Corporate Schools, and the amounts apportioned to each are presented in the schedules annexed.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution, confirming this apportionment of the moneys provided for by the Legislature for this purpose, and in compliance with the requirements of the act named above.

Resolved, That the school moneys for the year 1874 be apportioned to the several schools entitled to participate therein, according to the annexed schedule, and that a copy thereof be duly authenticated and filed with the Chamberlain of the city.

From the proceedings of the Board of Assistant Aldermen, March 23, 1874:

PAPERS FROM THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

Being a resolution as follows:

Whereas, Some mode of transporting passengers and freight rapidly from one end of this city to the other, and to intermediate points, seems to have become a necessity, in which are involved not only the convenience of our citizens, but also the future growth and prosperity of this metropolis.

And, whereas, the failure for many years of the numerous schemes and projects for furnishing this mode of transit, in consequence of the unwillingness of capitalists to invest in the construction of them, renders it morally certain that private capital cannot be induced to lend its aid to the accomplishment of this much needed work, and that, therefore, means must be sought in other directions.

And, whereas, the people of the City of New York have, if they so desire, the right to provide themselves with facilities of transit. Now, therefore, in order that their wishes on the subject may be had, be it

Resolved, That the Legislature be, and they are hereby requested to enact a law by which the question shall be submitted to the voters of this city at the next general election, as to whether or not means of rapid transit shall be furnished by and on the credit of the city.
