

The total amount of moneys which came into the hands of the Public Administrator during the year 1879 was the sum of eighty-two thousand two hundred and twenty-six dollars and fifty-three cents (\$82,226.53); and the amount distributed by him for expenses, payments to creditors and to next of kin, was the sum of ninety-four thousand eight hundred and forty-nine dollars and seventy-

The cents (\$94,849.79.) The total amount paid into the City Treasury during the year 1879 was the sum of seven thousand five hundred and seventy-one dollars and nine cents (\$7,571.09); being for commissions and intestate estates.

intestate estates. When the undersigned took possession of his office he found that the account of the Public Administrator and Comptroller with the Guardian Savings Institution showed a balance due from that bank of fourteen thousand two hundred and thirty-three dollars and sixty cents (\$14,233.60). The undersigned has made diligent effort to collect the amount from the receivers of the said Institution, without success, and m consequence thereof a large number of estates cannot be finally closed. The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 17, 1880: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,763, as follows, viz.: I public building, 844 tenement houses, 109 private dwellings, 60 other dwellings, 13 manufactories and workshops, 12 stores and warehouses, 35 stables, 14 slaughter-houses, I lime-kiln, I garbage dump, 2 manure dumps, 2 lodging-houses, I railroad, I public sewer, II sunken and vacant lots, 62 yards, courts, and areas, 88 cellars and basements, 152 waste-pipes and drains, 234 privies and water-closets, 16 street gutters and sidewalks, 9 dangerous stairways, 9 smoky chimneys, I piggery, 18 other nuisances, together with 67 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease. The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 706.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 796. During the past week 92 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. Permits were issued to the consignees of 59 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the

Health Officer of the Port.

III permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks. The Disinfecting Corps have visited 93 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 78 houses, 78 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. Two cases of contagious diseases were removed to Riverside Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Bureau of Vital Statistics. The certificates of 472 births, 45 still-births, 175 marriages, and 457 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 17, 1880. This shows a decrease of 105 births, 7 marriages, and 91 deaths, and an increase of 7 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when com-pared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was a decrease of 86 births and 175 deaths, and an increase of 4 still-births, and 30 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 1; malarial fevers, 3; diarrhoeal dis-eases, 3; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 19; pneumonia, 2; heart diseases, 1; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; convulsions, 11; apoplexy, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 24; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 11; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and preternatural births, 4; surgical operations, 2; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 3; croup, 2; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; puerperal dis-eases, 2; inanition, 1; bronchitis, 2; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 3. The number of deaths from diphtheria, whooping cough, erysipelas, cancer, suicide, and drowning, was the same in both weeks.

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Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchilis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and combared with the three preceding weeks.



Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 76 were in institutions, 235 in tenement houses, 134 in houses containing 3 families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 2 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 4 were on the basement floor, 83 on the first, 133 on the second, 98 on the third, 45 on the fourth, 10 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth. 454 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-residents. 55 were stated to be single, 111 married, 58 widowed, and the condition of 233 was not stated ; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age. The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 457 ; still-births, 45 ; bodies in transitu, 18. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 47 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 472 births, 175 marriages, 45 still-births, 457 deaths, 18 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 32 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 4 of marriage, and 27 of death were issued during the week. The mean temperature for the week ending January 17, 1880, was 33.9 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.169, the mean humidity was 90, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 713, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.22 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

SIR—There were 457 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, January 17, 1880, which is a decrease of 91, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 175 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending January 10, 1880, was 551, which is 3.4 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.92 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,105,145.
