Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 1, 1881:

January 1, 1881:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,484, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 591 tenement-houses, 101 private dwellings, 72 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 7 stores and warehouses, 29 stables, 37 slaughter-houses, 1 lime kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 2 gas mains, 3 sunken and vacant lots, 65 yards, courts and areas, 107 cellars and basements, 208 waste-pipes and drains, 187 privies and water-closets, 3 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 16 dangerous stairways, 4 cesspools, 3 smoky chimneys, 4 other nuisances, together with 30 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 579.

During the past week 98 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 69 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the

Health Officer of the Port.

104 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 170 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 146 houses, 146 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Eleven cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the ambulance corps.

The certificates of 523 births, 55 still-births, 139 marriages, and 673 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January I, 1881; this shows an increase of 100 births, 11 still-births, and 26 deaths, and a decrease of 61 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was a decrease of 10 births, and an increase of 12 still-births, 2 marriages and 165 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria decreased 4; croup, 2; typhus fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 2; inanition, 6; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 3; pneumonia, 9; meningitis and encephalitis, 6; convulsions, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 9; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preternatural births, 2; drowning, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 1; scarlatina, 5; whooping cough, 2; erysipelas, 3; typhoid fever, 2; malarial fevers, 4; diarrhœal diseases, 14; bronchitis, 7; heart diseases, 3; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; apoplexy, 4; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1. The number of deaths from alcoholism, phthisis pulmonalis, cirrhosis and hepatitis, and suicide was the same in the two successive weeks.

SIR—There were 673 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, January 1, 1881, which is an increase of 26, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 165 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending December 25, 1880, was 649, which is 152 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.97 per 1,000 persons living, the population, according to the last U. S. Census, being 1,206,577.

CHAPTER 123.

An Act in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven

not having been paid within the time heretolore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year. ot exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
