APPROVED PAPERS

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending June 20, 1885.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to S. L. McBride to place and keep a stand for the distribution of free ice water on the sidewalk, near the curb, in front of No. 14 East Fourteenth street, provided such stand shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the street by the public; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 1, 1885. Received from his Honor the Mayor, June 15, 1885, without his approval of objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Gertrude Gloeckner to place and keep a stand on the sidewalk, near the curb, at the corner of McComb's Dam road and One Hun-dred and Fifty-fourth street, provided such stand shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the street by the public, nor exceed five feet long by two feet wide; such permission to continue_only during the pleasure of the Common Council. Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 1, 1885. Received from his Honor the Mayor, June 15, 1885, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized to lay water-pipes in One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, between Eighth and St. Nicholas avenues, pursuant to the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, sections 189 and 194.

Resolved, That Croton-mains be laid in Eighty-first street, from Eighth to Ninth avenue, as provided in chapter 381, Laws of 1879.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected and street-lamps lighted in One Hun-dred and Sixty-eighth street, from North Third avenue to Fulton avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 3, 1885. Approved by the Mayor, June 15, 1885.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected and street-lamps lighted in the Southern Boulevard, from Decatur avenue to Hull avenue, and in Hull avenue, from the Southern Boulevard to Suburban street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 8, 1885. Approved by the Mayor, June 15, 1885.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected and street-lamps placed thereon and lighted in Monroe avenue, from Kingsbridge road to Clay avenue, under the direction of the Com-missioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 8, 1885. Approved by the Mayor, June 15, 1885.

Resolved, That the vacant lots on the block bounded by Lexington and Third avenues, and One Hundred and Twenty-second and One Hundred and Twenty-third streets, be fenced in, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 8, 1885. Approved by the Mayor, June 15, 1885.

Resolved, That Croton water-pipes be laid in One Hundred and Thirteenth street, between Fourth and Madison avenues, as provided in chapter 381, Laws of 1879.

Resolved, That the National Guard in the City of New York and vicinity be and they are hereby invited to act as a military escort to the distinguished guests of the city on the occasion of their arrival with the noble gift of the French nation—Bartholdi's colossal statue of "Liberty Enlightening the World"; and that the Committee of Arrangements heretofore appointed take charge of all the necessary dispositions for that purpose.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 12, 1885. Approved by the Mayor, June 18, 1885.

The Common Council of the City of New York extend to the officers and sailors of the "Isere" a cordial welcome on their arrival at this port. Among the stirring and unique instances of modern times, the rare illustration of national good-will afforded by the French Republic will stand out as typical of the spirit of brotherhood, of a love of liberty, of reciprocal respect for grand national characteristics creditable to both nations, a beacon in this century of progress and enlightenment.

As participants in this act of international comity, the officers of the "Isere" and the represent-atives of the City of New York meet on common ground dedicated to peace and civilization. We appreciate the kindly motives which prompted this gift from the people of France, and shall ever cherish it as a noble monument of fraternal regard.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Lambert Brothers to retain the post surmounted by a clock now in front of No. 902 Third avenue, on the sidewalk near the curb-stone; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 8, 1885. Received from his Honor the Mayor, June 20, 1885, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, Wednesday, June 10, 1885, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Commissioners present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works, Commis-sioners James C. Spencer, William Dowd, and C. C. Baldwin.

Also, Acting Chief Engineer Fteley ; Consulting Engineer Davis.

And Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the stated meeting of June 3 were read and approved. The Committee on Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of the fifth monthly estimates of work done by contractors, included in vouchers Nos. 800 to 809, and of the bills included in vouchers Nos. 810 to 820; all of which were approved by the Board and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction made report, dated the 8th instant, with recommendations, as follows :

Ist. The Committee submitted requests from the Chief Engineer for authority to purchase the necessary furniture for the auxiliary offices of the Engineers of the Second, Third and Fifth Divisions, at a cost not to exceed \$108; and for the purchase of 8,000 copies of standard diagrams, for recording the cross-section measurements in the aqueduct tunnel, at a cost not to exceed \$275; with recommendations that both requests be granted; which recommendations were approved by the Commissioners, and authority given the Chief Engineer to make the purchases within the limits of cost named cost named.

cost named.
2d. The Committee reported that having been informed by the Chief Engineer that two Inspectors of Masonry were now required on some portions of the Aqueduct work, and applications in due form having been received from Philanzo Edick and George B. Burbank, who appear to be qualified for the work, the Committee had directed the Chief Engineer to examine said applicants as required by the rules, and to report upon them to the Board at this meeting.
3d. The Committee reported that they had made further investigation of the matter of an allowance to Division Engineer Wolbrecht of keep for his horse whilst necessarily in use by him upon the work of the Commission; and that they saw no reason to recall their recommendation of May 20th, that such allowance be made; and, therefore, adhered to the said recommendation.
Commissioner Baldwin moved that the recommendation of the Commissioner be approved by the the form by requiring that such allowance be made only when the horse is kept in the stables of the Commission. This motion was not seconded.
The motion of Commissioner Baldwin was then adopted by a majority vote, Commissioner Dowd voting in the negative.

The Committee on Construction next submitted a communication from Acting Chief Engineer Fteley, of this date, describing the lands necessary to be taken in fee, and for the easement rights required, for the construction of the New Aqueduct on Manhattan Island, as follows: Ist. A width of IOO feet, to be taken in fee, from Tenth avenue to Harlem river : also a certain amount of land, as proposed by the Commissioner of Public Works, to the United States bulkhead line.

Resolved, That the vacant lots on the northwest corner of Seventh avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street be fenced in, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works ; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 8, 1885. Approved by the Mayor, June 15, 1885.

Resolved, That an improved iron drinking-fountain (for man and beast) be erected in front of No. 1873 Second avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Resolved, That the name of Franklin P. Duffy, recently appointed a Commissioner of Deeds, be and is hereby corrected so as to read Franklin P. Duffey.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 15, 1885.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to extend the high-service water-pipes so as to connect the buildings on Tenth avenue, between Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets, with the high-service water supply.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 8, 1885. Approved by the Mayor, June 18, 1885.

Four lots, 25 feet by 100 feet, or thereabouts, to be taken in fee, at the southeast corner of Tenth avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, for the working plant of Shaft No. 28. 3d. Four lots, 25 feet by 100 feet, or thereabouts, to be taken in fee, at the southeast corner of Tenth avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street, for the working of Shaft No. 29. 4th. I understand also, from the Chief Engineer of the Department of Public Works, that for the working of Shafts Nos. 30, 31 and 32, the adjoining streets can be opened, thus giving sufficient room for the operations of the contractors without taking any land from private parties. In relation to which the Committee recommended that the Commissioner of Public Works be requested to include on the approximate ways the lands described in the first four cloures of the above

In relation to which the Committee recommended that the Commissioner of Public Works be requested to include on the property maps the lands described in the first four clauses of the above report as necessary to be taken in fee, or for easement in perpetuity ; and that in regard to the lands required for Shafts Nos. 30, 31 and 32, the Committee on Construction be directed to ascertain whether the streets upon which those shafts would be located can be opened and placed at the dis-posal of the Commission within the required time, and if so, to give the necessary directions with regard thereto for the preparation of the said property maps. These recommendations were approved by the Commissioners, and notice thereof directed to be given to the Commissioner of Public Works.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Public Works, dated June 10, 1885, submitting forms of contract, specifications and bonds, for building the new gate-house and section I of the New Croton Aqueduct, at Croton Dam ; subject to an additional clause necessary to fully protect the present aqueduct and its appurtenances, while the new work is under construction. On motion of the Commissioner of Public Works, the above forms were referred to a Special Committee, composed of the members of the Commissioners at as early a day as practicable ; and the

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Secretary was directed to have copies of said forms prepared immediately for the use of said Com-

The Comptroller gave notice, under date of June 6th, of the issue of a warrant for voucher not certified by the Aqueduct Commissioners, and appertaining to the work of the Commissioners of Appraisal for New York County; amounting to \$59.19; which communication was ordered placed upon file, and entered upon the books of this Commission.

The Secretary submitted an abstract of Balance of Accounts ending May 31, 1885, as shown by the books of the Commission ; which, on motion of the Comptroller, was referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit for consideration and such report as they may deem necessary.

Acting Chief Engineer Fteley presented a communication dated this day, with an estimate of the probable cost, and time of completion of the new gate-house, and its appurtenances at Croton Dam; which, on motion of Commissioner Spencer, was referred to the Special Committee to which was referred the forms of contract, etc., for constructing said gate-house, this day submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works.

The Acting Chief Engineer, in accordance with his instructions from the Committee on Construc-tion, then presented the applications of Philanzo Edick and George B. Burbank, for Inspectors of Masonry; both applicants having been examined by him, and approved.

Commissioners Baldwin, Dowd and Spencer then endorsed upon the application of George B. Burbank, their certificate of his competency and experience, as required by section 40 of the act, and Mr. Burbank was thereupon appointed by the Commissioners an Inspector of Masonry, at the rate of compensation heretofore fixed by the Commissioners. The application of Mr. Edick was laid over for further consideration.

On motion of Commissioner Dowd, the Committee on Construction were requested to examine all applications for Inspectorships, as the same are received, and to forward those made in compli-ance with the established rules to the Chief Engineer for examination of the applicant; and after the applicant has been examined and approved by the Chief Engineer, to certify, as required by section 40 of the act, to the competency and experience of such applicants as are, in their opinion, duly qualified for the position.

A request was made by the Stenographer, George Lucas, a member of the Seventh Regiment N. G. S. N. Y., for leave of absence, with pay, during the week ending June 27, to attend the State Camp at Peekskill with his regiment. On motion of Commissioner Spencer, the leave of absence was granted.

The Commissioners then adjourned.
