Hewitt, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby give notice thoas and indices to be completed, to the thirtieth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, which is hereby designated by me as the date upon which said act shall go into operation in said Register's office. Others of them who have shed privileges and, have come to regard them as their absolute right, and openly claim that they should be regarded as such, and that the favorable action of your Department in permitting their continuance is a matter of course. And in cases where damages are being assessed for such wharfage rights, taken by your Department in con-structing the new water-front, they actually ask to be compensated for their property by the City as though they had a fee simple right to the enjoyment of the benefits accruing from the shed privi-lege "; beit therefore Resolved, That the Attorney-General of the State of New York be informed of these obstruc-tions, and that he be requested to take immediate action concerning the same for the purpose of absting them, and for securing to the public free access to such wharkes, piers and bulkheads. Sanitary Bureau

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending ember 26, 1887:

November 26, 1887: There were 5,023 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police. There were 305 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police. There were 4,0 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report. There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 37 permits. There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 2 permits. There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 4 miscellaneous permits. There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 46 permits.

The certificates of 620 births, 67 still-births, 328 marriages and 625 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 26, 1887. This shows a decrease of 34 births and 45 deaths, an increase of 18 marriages, and the same number of still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 56 births, 9 still-births and 42 marriages and a decrease of 90 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from whooping cough decreased 1; malarial fevers, 3; puerperal diseases, 7; diarrhoeal diseases, 10; inantion, 3; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; bronchits, 1; heart diseases, 9; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrotula, 10; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; convulsions, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 6; gastritis, gastro-enteritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 7; vanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preternatural births, 3; surgical operations, 1; while the deaths from scalatian increased 5; diphtheria, 6; croup, 4; typhoid fever, 2; cancer, 3; pneumonia, 1; apoplexy, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 13; suicide, 5; and drowning, 1. The number of deaths from measles, erysipelas, cerebro-spinal fever and aneurism was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 101 were in institutions, 369 in tenement-houses, 134 in houses containing three families or less, 12 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 16 were on the basement floor, 170 on the first, 161 on the second, 115 on the third, 86 on the fourth, 30 on the fifth, 00 nthe sixth; 613 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 12 non-residents; 86 were stated to be single, 178 married, 69 widowed, and the condition of 292 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 625; still-births, 67; bodies in transitu, 18; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 74 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 630 births, 232 Smarriages, 67 still-births, 625 deaths; 18 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 116 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 7 transcripts of the birth record, 4 of marriage, and 92 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 26, 1887, was 40.3 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 30.027; the mean humidity was 67, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 943, and the total amount of rain-fall was o.ot inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 610 deaths and still-births, or 88.15 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (lewish), 21; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 279; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 50; Greenwood (undenominational), 33; Lutheran (undenominational), 87; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 17; Evergreen (undenominational), 37; Woodlawn (undenominational), 25; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 18; Union (Methodist Protes-tant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L.
