## Sanitary Bureau

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 28, 1888 : There were 4,994 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police. There were 4,31 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police. There were 4,31 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report. There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 31 permits.

The certificates of 686 births, 62 still-births, 246 marriages and 802 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 25, 1888. This shows an increase of 76 births, 65 still-births and 53 deaths, and a decrease of 61 mar-riages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1883 there was an increase of 101 births and 67 deaths, a decrease of 17 marriages and the same number of still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria decreased to ; croup, 2; erysipelas, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; malarial fevers, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 1; bronchits, 1; pneumonia, 4; convulsions, 5; gastuitis, gastro enteritis and peritonitis, 3; Birght's disease and nephritis, 5; suicide, 3; drowning, 2; while the deaths from small-pox increased 3; measles, 3; scarlatina, 1; typhoid fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 5; diartheeal diseases, 6; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 3; heari diseases, 8; marsuns, tabes mesenteric and scrofula, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; apoleky, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 9; premature and prefermatural bir hs, 16.
