## BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,  
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,  
MONDAY, OCTOBER 15, 1900.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—Robert A. Van Wyck, the Mayor; Bird S. Coler, the Comptroller; Thomas L. Feltner, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.  
Absent—John Whalen, the Corporation Counsel; Randolph Guggenheimer, the President of the Council.

The reading of the minutes of the meetings held October 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, 1900 was dispensed with.

The Board proceeded to the consideration of the Budget for the year 1901.

The Comptroller presented the following statements:

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,  
CITY OF NEW YORK, October 11, 1900.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I submit herewith statements showing in detail the amounts necessary to be included in the Budget for the year 1901 for the payment of the principal of and interest on the City Debt. The totals of these amounts, as compared with the appropriations for the same purposes for the year 1900, are as follows:

The increase in the amount required for the Payment of the Interest on the City Debt may be regarded as normal. The increase in the amount required for the Redemption of the City Debt is chiefly due to the following items:

1. Increase in the amount required for Sinking Fund installments under the mandatory provisions of the Charter, \$541,776.39.

2. Revenue Bonds redeemable in 1901 which, to the amount of \$1,100,000, were issued to provide for the payment of awards in street opening proceedings, also under the mandatory provisions of the Charter.

3. Revenue Bonds redeemable in 1901 which to the amount of \$1,124,275.86 were issued under the mandatory provisions of the so-called Davis Law to provide for the increase of salaries of school teachers during the year 1900.

In addition to the foregoing statements I also present statements of all bonds maturing during the year 1901 and payable from the Sinking Fund or from assessments; and statements showing item by item the detail of the manner in which the Sinking Fund installments have been calculated.

I also present a statement showing the condition of the Fund for Street and Park Openings. On October 1, 1900, the excess of the liability of this fund over the cash balance was \$1,184,553.06. Under the provisions of section 175 of the Charter, it is necessary to insert this amount in the Budget for the ensuing year. Last year, for the first time in many years, no such item appeared in the Budget owing to the fact that practically no street opening proceedings were confirmed, during the year 1899 pending certain decisions from the Court of Appeals on the question of whether interest due on awards could be assessed against property benefited by the street openings.

In October, 1898, the amount inserted for this item in the Budget for the year 1899, was \$4,428,313.56, which was the largest amount ever inserted for that purpose.

It is to be noted that in addition to this item of \$1,184,553.06 for the Fund for Street and Park Openings, there also appears an item in the appropriation for the Redemption of the City Debt, amounting to \$1,100,000, to redeem Revenue Bonds issued during the current year for the replenishment of the Fund for Street and Park Openings. These two items therefore aggregate the sum of \$2,284,553.06, which must be borne next year by the taxpayers on account of the liabilities of this fund. Such an undue burden of taxation from this cause demands explanation. It is due, in my opinion, to two causes:

First—The practice of vesting title in the City to lands required for street openings, in advance of the confirmation of the reports of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment. In all such cases interest runs on the awards retroactively from the respective dates when such titles vested in the City, and I believe that this practice of anticipating the vesting of title has been abused in the past five years very unduly. The amounts of interest disbursed by the Fund for Street and Park Openings in recent years is as follows:

Under the decisions of the Court of Appeals no part of this can be assessed against adjacent property benefited by the street opening and these amounts therefore are a clear loss to the City.

Secondly—There is also, in my opinion, a great abuse of the provisions in the statute under which the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have made partial and separate reports which embody only the awards for damages, leaving the assessments to be subsequently confirmed, from which the City is reimbursed for the awards and expenses of the proceeding. Before this was done, it was customary for the Department of Finance in paying awards to deduct from the amount thereof the amount of the assessment, and to pay over only the difference.

In many proceedings the assessments practically offset the awards and the whole transaction was more of a bookkeeping nature than one involving actual outlays from the City Treasury.

At the present time, however, the City is forced to comply with the orders of Court confirming the partial reports and pay the whole amount of the awards to property-owners and wait indefinitely the pleasure of the property-owner in regard to the payment of the assessments.

The following four instances, selected from many, will illustrate forcibly the extent to which the City has suffered from this practice.

I.—Acquiring title to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse.

—on account of which an assessment of 25 per cent. thereof, amounting to \$569,936.34, remains to be laid upon property benefited.

II.—Opening One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, from the Southern Boulevard to the Harlem river, in the Twenty-third Ward—Awards and expenses.....

\$1,162,507 31

—on account of which an assessment of 50 per cent., amounting to \$581,253.66, remains to be laid upon property benefited.

III.—Opening Elm street—Awards and expenses.....

\$5,604,962 26

—on account of which an assessment of 50 per cent., amounting to \$2,802,481.13, remains to be laid upon property benefited.

IV.—Opening Mott avenue, from Railroad avenue to One Hundred and Sixty-first street, in the Twenty-third Ward—Awards.....

\$193,136.51

—an assessment for the entire amount of which remains to be laid upon property benefited.

The foregoing four instances alone, represent advancements of this fund to property-owners aggregating \$4,146,807.64, which would be present assets of the fund if the assessments had been confirmed at the same time as the awards. In fact, if that had been done, most of this amount would have been collected by this time and the taxpayers would have been relieved from a burden of taxation in the ensuing year of \$2,284,553.06.

I also present communications from the State Comptroller, showing that the amounts required to be inserted in the Budget for State Taxes aggregate \$6,959,037.12, being a decrease from the amounts required for 1900 of \$946,450.90.

I also present a statement of premises leased by the City, the rentals whereof are not chargeable against the rent appropriations made to the several departments of the City Government and which should be provided for under appropriate accounts in the Budget for 1901, the aggregate amount thereof being \$361,799.56, an increase of \$19,219.65 over the amount of the same appropriation in the Budget for 1900.

SUPREME COURT,  
APPELLATE DIVISION—FIRST DEPARTMENT,  
NEW YORK, October 11, 1900.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—We find it will be necessary to modify our requisition for an appropriation for the salaries, heating and maintenance of the Court-house of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the year 1901. Our original estimate provided for the appointment of a Day Engineer and a Night Engineer, and the salary fixed for the Night Engineer was \$900 per year. As the plan requires the constant attendance of an Engineer it was necessary that each one appointed should work twelve hours a day every day including Sundays. The Engineers appointed claim that they are only required to work eight hours a day by the Labor Law and refuse to work longer. This will necessitate the appointment of three Engineers in all. We also find that, under the prevailing rate of Wages Law, Engineers appointed to these positions are entitled to the prevailing rate of wages which requires us to pay them \$3.50 a day for eight hours work, that being the prevailing rate as we understand it. We will then require the services of three Engineers, and the salary of the two Assistant Engineers will have to be fixed at \$1,000 per year. Our original estimate provided for one Fireman, but as the Fireman also claims that under the provisions of the Labor Law he is required to work only eight hours a day, it will be necessary for us to have two Firemen instead of one. A Night Watchman is required, for whom we have provided a salary of \$720 per year. We have endeavored to obtain a Watchman for that salary, but have been unable to do so, as all of those to whom we have offered the position have refused to accept it for that salary. As we are required to appoint a Watchman from the State Civil Service List and as the person certified on that list has refused to accept the position at the salary fixed, we have found it necessary to increase his salary to \$1,000 per year. We have increased the amount allowed for electric light and power to \$5,500, as, from an examination of the costs for those services since the first of January, it would appear that the amount asked for before might not be sufficient. We therefore ask for an allowance of \$5,500 per year for that purpose. The estimate for coal was based upon the price charged prior to the present strike of the coal miners, but as the price has been largely increased in consequence of that strike, and as it is impossible to tell how long this increase will continue, we have deemed it necessary to provide for an increase of \$375 of that amount. We also ask for an increase of the amount awarded for repairs of the building from \$1,000 to \$2,000 to provide for any contingency in consequence of some necessary alterations which will be required to get a new building in operation. We have asked for a small increase in the general cleaning and engine-room supplies, as from an estimate of the costs from the first of January it would appear that the amount asked for was too small. We have also asked for an allowance of \$500 for contingencies. This sum is asked for in order that there should be a small allowance made for the happening of any contingency which it is impossible to foresee. After the building has been in operation a year we will be able to make exact estimates, but as it is almost impossible to foresee just what will be required it has been thought advisable to make some provision for an emergency which cannot now be foreseen. The estimate submitted was made up in the absence of the Judges and upon our return to town we found the necessity of making this provision.

I have made this communication to you at the request of the Court and with the concurrence of my associates.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller of The City of New York, No. 280 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan:

SIR—This office is to-day in receipt of a communication from the Deputy Commissioner, boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, calling attention to an error made by him in the Departmental Estimate for 1901 for said boroughs, in the cases of certain volunteer fire departments, Borough of Queens, under the operation of chapter 82, Laws of 1900, and requesting that said estimate be corrected in the following respects:

Wandowenock Fire Hook and Ladder Company, Newtown, increase from \$1,000 to \$1,200.  
Engine and Hose Company No. 1, Flushing, reduce from \$1,200 to \$800.  
Engine and Hose Company No. 1, Whitestone, reduce from \$1,200 to \$800.

This will necessitate a net reduction of \$600 from the total amount called for to carry out the mandatory feature of the above law, that is to say, a reduction of \$600 from \$60,200, leaving \$59,600.

The following is the Deputy Commissioner's explanation in regard to the matter:

"The mistakes originated in this way: The Wandowenock Fire Hook and Ladder Company is using a steam fire-engine, and an examination of its articles of incorporation shows that it is authorized to use such apparatus. Engine and Hose Company No. 1 of Flushing and Engine and Hose Company No. 1 of Whitestone were chartered as such, but have discontinued the use of steam fire-engines and substituted hose wagons therefor, consequently they are not entitled to the amount provided by the law above referred to for steam fire-engines."

I have the honor to request that the Departmental Estimate of this Department, boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, for the year 1901, submitted for the consideration of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of the 4th instant, be modified as requested by the Deputy Commissioner.

A similar letter has been forwarded to his Honor the Mayor, as Chairman of said Board, and to the Municipal Assembly.

The tax books do not give a special valuation of this area, since it forms part of a tract of land bounded by One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, the Speedway, One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street and Eighth avenue, which tract is owned by one party.

The total valuation of this tract is, according to the tax books, \$280,000, and the area required for the High Bridge Park Extension, being nearly one-eighth of the area of the whole tract, can be estimated, therefore, at \$35,000.

Hon. BIRD S. COLLE, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. John Whalen, Corporation Counsel, in a communication under date of October 10, 1900, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, incloses a resolution adopted by the Board of Public Improvements at a meeting held September 26, in relation to the "opening and extending of High Bridge Park, between One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and the centre line of One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, east of the Speedway, in the Twelfth Ward of the Borough of Manhattan," and requesting the Corporation Counsel to take the necessary proceedings for the acquisition of title.

Pursuant to the provisions of chapter 284 of the Laws of 1900, it will be necessary for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the concurrent vote of all its members, to approve of such proceedings by the Corporation Counsel.

The plot of ground which it is proposed to acquire is a strip of land lying to the east of the "Public Driveway" (called the Speedway), and varying in width from about 60 feet on the northerly side of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, to 123 feet, more or less, on the centre line of West One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street prolonged.

The matter was initiated in the Board of Public Improvements by a letter from Hon. George C. Clausen, Park Commissioner, boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, under date of February 13, 1900, which reads as follows:

"Under the provisions of paragraph 2 of section 415 of the Greater New York Charter I have the honor to request that the Board of Public Improvements will take steps to acquire, for park purposes, the strip of property between High Bridge Park and the Speedway on the west side, and private property on the east, north of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, to an extent that will prevent the erection of any buildings to obstruct the view of the Harlem river and the opposite shore."

"This is one of the most beautiful and interesting views in the city. Its protection is of great importance from a park standpoint; so great, indeed, that it is difficult to understand why the matter did not receive attention at the time the other property was condemned for park purposes. A possible explanation may be that the great popularity of the Speedway as a place of resort for the general public, as well as the owners and drivers of road horses, was not fully foreseen."

"On account of the great difference in the levels of the two boundary lines I have mentioned, this protection can be easily secured by the acquisition of a very narrow strip of ground. None of the adjoining property could be improved in a manner to constitute an obstruction and be objectionable as a park feature except that which abuts upon the retaining-wall of the Speedway approach. The acquisition of a strip of this adjoining land would, with the difference in levels, make it practically impossible to erect obstructive buildings. It is also of importance to prevent the danger of damage to the foundations of the Speedway retaining-wall."

On February 21 the Board of Public Improvements passed resolutions, pursuant to section 436 of the Charter, deeming it for the public interest that the map of The City of New York be altered by laying out this extension of High Bridge Park as proposed, and ordering that a public hearing be held on the matter on the 14th day of March, 1900.

The hearing was held on the said day, and the following communication from Park Commissioner Clausen was read:

"I am informed that the subject of acquiring title, for the use of the public, of land required for an extension to High Bridge Park adjoining the public driveway at One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, is to be considered at your meeting of the 14th instant. The subject is of great importance from a park standpoint, as the peculiar situation of the approach in the driveway renders it possible for adjoining property-owners, as the lines run at present, to so build up in improving their property as to destroy the river view, which is the chief scenic charm of the approach. The topography is such that the great difference in levels within a narrow strip of adjoining land will permit absolute protection against this objection to be secured by the acquisition of a very small area."

It seems remarkable that this land was not included in the original condemnation proceedings, though, at the time, the amount of protection to be so secured probably escaped notice."

No one appearing in opposition to the change it was so made by resolution and a form of ordinance was prepared for transmission to the Municipal Assembly.

The ordinance was duly passed by both houses and was received from the Mayor on August 7, without his approval or disapproval of the same.

The Board of Local Improvements of the Nineteenth District of the Borough of Manhattan, at a meeting held September 11, passed resolutions, recommending to the Board of Public Improvements that proceedings be initiated to acquire title to land for the extension of High Bridge Park, as above, which recommendation was approved by the Board of Public Improvements, as is shown by the resolution of that Board accompanying the communication of the Corporation Counsel.

I have caused an examination to be made of the land proposed to be acquired, and it would appear to me that the necessity of such action is warranted, for the reasons set forth in the communications of the Commissioner of Parks for the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, as quoted above.

On the map, as presented, the land lying to the west of the public driveway, and immediately north of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, is shown and designated as High Bridge Park, and was acquired pursuant to the provisions of chapter 102 of the Laws of 1893 as amended by chapter 804 of the Laws of 1895, as "An Addition to the Public Driveway," and in consequence the land proposed to be acquired is entitled "The Extension to High Bridge Park," and is more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the northeast house-line intersection of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and the Speedway;

1st. Thence northerly along the eastern house-line of the Speedway for 1,022.20± feet to its intersection with the centre line of West One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street;

2d. Thence easterly along the centre line of West One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street for 123.34± feet;

3d. Thence southerly along a line parallel to the western house-line of Eighth avenue for 1,009.33± feet to the northern house-line of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street.

4th. Thence westerly along the northern house-line of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street for 60.0± feet to the point of beginning.

A statement of the tax valuation of this property shows that it is part of plots assessed at a total valuation of \$280,000, the proportionate amount of which that will fall upon the land to be acquired is estimated at \$35,000.

I am of the opinion that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly approve of the initiation of proceedings by the Corporation Counsel.

4th. Thence westerly along the northern house-line of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street for 66.0± feet to the point of beginning.

As I shall have to advertise these contracts for at least ten days and then submit any award or awards that I may make to your Board for its approval, after said advertisement, before execution, and as I desire that the contractors under the same shall have ample time to make preparations before the snow comes, I request as speedy action as possible in the matter.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—The Hon. Percival E. Nagle, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, in communication of October 6, 1900, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmits for the approval of the Board of the terms and conditions thereof, "nine blank forms of contracts, to be executed in triplicate, one for each of the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, which have been approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel. These forms are substantially the same as those which were approved by your Board last winter in two contracts, one for Manhattan and The Bronx and one for Brooklyn, whereas I now propose to have a separate contract for each of these three boroughs.

"As I shall have to advertise these contracts for at least ten days, and then submit any award or awards that I may make to your Board for its approval, after said advertisement, before execution, and as I desire that the contractors under the same shall have ample time to make preparations before the snow comes, I request as speedy action as possible in the matter."

I have examined the forms of contract submitted, and find them similar, in every respect, to those submitted heretofore, except that they are proposed to be made for each of the three boroughs, separately.

The surety required for the Borough of Manhattan is \$100,000; for the Borough of The Bronx it is \$25,000, and for the Borough of Brooklyn, \$50,000.

A special deposit is required to be made with the Comptroller, on or before the signing of the contract, to the amount of \$10,000 for the Borough of Manhattan; \$2,500 for the Borough of The Bronx, and \$50,000 for the Borough of Brooklyn.

The fourth paragraph of the contract is as follows:

"4th. It is further mutually covenanted and agreed by and between the parties hereto that, for the purpose of ascertaining the amount of snow and ice removed and disposed of, under the provisions of this contract, the party of the second part shall station, at each of the places designated by the said Commissioner for loading the snow and ice, one or more representatives, whose duty shall be to deliver to the representatives of the party of the first part one token, called a 'loading coupon,' for each and every full-sized load of snow or ice loaded at the places designated as aforesaid, upon carts, trucks or other vehicles of the party of the first part, and such snow and ice so loaded shall forthwith be carried by the party of the first part to the dumps or places of final discharge designated thereby by the said Commissioner, and there be discharged by the party of the first part; that at each of the said dumps or places of final discharge each of the parties hereto shall station one or more representatives whose duty shall be as follows: For each and every full-sized load of snow and ice loaded and carried as aforesaid by the party of the first part to such dump or place of final discharge and there discharged, the representative of the party of the first part shall deliver to the representative of the party of the second part one of the tokens aforesaid, called 'loading coupons,' whereupon the said representative of the party of the second part shall deliver to the said representative of the party of the first part one token, called a 'voucher check,' by way of acknowledgment of the snow and ice so discharged."

By paragraph 14 of the contract the payment for the work is to be by the cubic yard.

There is no provision made in the contract as to the manner of obtaining the number of cubic yards.

In the instructions to District Superintendents, issued by Commissioner McCartney November 1, 1899, which, as I understand, are substantially to apply to the work this year, the following directions are given:

"Loading Foremen must, under no circumstances, give a coupon for a load less than a yard and a half, or two coupons for a load less than three yards, and so on. The vehicles must not only be full, but be heaped up and rounded off, under the seat and in the rear. Determination must be shown in turning back all incomplete loads again and again if necessary. Vehicles not holding the required volume are to be turned away from the work altogether."

"The number of loading coupons due for loads in the various kinds of carts and trucks is as follows:

"1 coupon—one-ton coal cart; private ash carts and the ordinary dirt carts used on street railway work the past summer (these hold from 1.3 to 1.6 cubic yards, water measure, and must be heaped up in all cases).

"2 coupons—two-ton coal carts; brick trucks with extra strips (4 inches to 6 inches) above their sideboards; manure carts; asphalt wagons of the proper capacity.

"3 coupons—three-ton coal trucks; certain furniture wagons and vans of the proper size.

"4 and 5 coupons—large coal wagons and a few vans.

"Inform both the Loading and Dump Foremen of the presence of any unusually large vehicles on the work and of the number of coupons that are to be allowed for them. These vehicles should be properly described and distinguished. The small dirt and sand carts holding one cubic yard or less must not be used unless their capacity is increased one-half. Sand trucks with two horses, but holding a little less than two yards, and requiring shoveling in order to be emptied, are under no circumstances to be allowed more than one coupon, and are not to be used at all above Fourteenth street, unless vehicles are very scarce and special orders are given by the District Superintendent.

"Brick trucks of ordinary size must be made to have the extra 4-inch or 6-inch strips in order to receive two coupons. Without the strips they will be permitted to work for only one coupon, and if their owners object they are to be referred to the District Superintendent in order to have the vehicle measured. Measurements are to be made by District Superintendents and Assistant Snow Inspectors upon request and in every case of reasonable dispute. Merchandise and peddlers' wagons will be used only in the First, Second and Third Districts, and only then when they do not interfere with the work of the dump carts. They must be heaped up in the rear and under the seat in front, as well as in the centre.

"Simply because any vehicle has two horses attached it is not necessarily to be given two coupons."

In these same instructions, the duties of the Dump Foreman are described as follows:

"19. Dump Foreman will preserve order at the piers, keep these free from snow at all times, regulate the movement of carts and push the work of dumping as rapidly as possible.

"When a full load of snow, accompanied by an authorized loading coupon, is dumped, the Foreman will take the loading coupon from the driver and at once hand a brass check to the contractor's representative and place the loading coupon on his spike file. Coupons must never be taken from any person except actual drivers, or brass checks given to other than the contractor's man.

"Where possible, stand with the contractor's man at the street end of a pier or to one side of a bulkhead and cause the empty carts to return single file on opposite side from the full ones; receive coupons from drivers only when on their vehicles and after properly dumping.

"The number of checks for various size loads is given in Section 11 of these instructions. No matter how many loading coupons are presented by driver, give only the brass checks called for by size of load. In case of dispute refer drivers to District Superintendent or to Assistant Snow Inspector for the measurement of their vehicles. All loads which have sunk below the sides of the vehicle must be turned back into nearest street to fill up.

"When a foreman is cold and desires shelter he may enter dump-house, but must first supply his sweeper, who will act in his stead, with a definite number of brass checks. Drivers must not come to the dump-house with coupons. The same method will be followed if foreman leaves for his meal or other reason, but the sweeper so acting must always render an exact account at the end of such service for which the foreman alone will be held responsible. At all other times the sweeper should stand out on the pier to turn back incomplete loads, prevent empty carts from 'repeating,' and to keep the string-piece shoveled off. He is not to take loading coupons from drivers if his foreman is so employed.

"The contractor's representative and the Dump Foreman are not to take turns in giving out checks. The latter is not to distribute the contractor's vouchers under any circumstances, nor is the former to get loading coupons from the drivers and turn them over to the Dump Foreman for brass checks. Each transaction must be a single and complete one, and no balancing with the contractor's representative at the end of a rush or when the work is completed will be permitted.

"If the contractor's representative is not present when dumping begins, or if the dump is uncovered by him during the day, the foreman will write his name on the back of the loading coupons presented by drivers, and will call off the book and coupon number of each to his sweeper, who notes same in memoranda at back of foreman's account book. These coupons are returned to drivers after dumping, and they may be cashed when the contractor's man returns or is replaced. Those so cashed must be checked off the list previously noted, and a comprehensive report of the entire transaction should be attached to foreman's account sheet for the day. Whenever a dump is thus uncovered, notify the District Superintendent or Snow Inspector as soon as possible.

"Dump Foreman will allow the Assistant Snow Inspector to examine his brass checks and loading coupons at any time.

"It will be considered a grave offense for a Dump Foreman to stop anywhere after leaving his dump until he reaches the District Superintendent's office.

"Dump Foremen must be instructed daily as to the order and marking of the loading coupon which they are to accept, and no other is to be accepted until their orders are changed.

"Brass checks will not be loaned or transferred except in unbroken bags, and only then when an absolute necessity arises. Where one Foreman relieves another each must have his own separate supply and must render his own account.

"Checks are to be given out consecutively, both as regards strings of one hundred and single checks. The strings must be unbroken, each check being taken off in turn. When the last check of a string has been given out the Foreman will place a rubber band around the loading coupons received for that string. These packages of coupons are to be counted at night, but left absolutely undisturbed. All, except the last package, should contain one hundred coupons; but, if for any reason they do not, be very careful to write down only the number actually contained on the outside of the envelopes into which all the coupons for the day are placed.

"When the last check in a bag has been given out the Foreman will note the time on the bag slip found in each, but need not fill out the remainder of the slip until night. Each empty bag, with its proper bag slip inside, will be given to the District Superintendent at night and will be forwarded, together with the envelope containing the coupons, to the Snow Office the next morning in same manner as District Superintendent's and Foreman's accounts.

"20. In all instructions for snow removal by the word 'Foreman' is meant any Department employee in charge of a snow dump or loading gang."

It is seen by these instructions that the "token" called a "loading coupon" is for "each and every full-sized load of snow or ice loaded." This is entirely indefinite, and the "voucher check" is equally indefinite, and, under the contract, there is no way prescribed for any calculation of the number of cubic yards handled.

But in the regulations contained in the "instructions" quoted above, it is required that the loading foreman "must, under no circumstances, give a coupon for a load less than a yard and a half, or two coupons for a load less than three yards, and so on."

This shows an approach to a definite measure, but still is not exact. The "voucher check" as used is always for "one load." The instructions say "the number of loading coupons due for loads in the various kinds of carts and trucks is as follows:

"One coupon, one ton coal cart.

"Two coupons, two ton coal carts; brick trucks with extra strips (4 inches to 6 inches) above their sideboard; manure carts; asphalt wagons of the proper capacity.

"Three coupons, three ton coal trucks; certain furniture wagons and vans of the proper size.

"Four and five coupons, large coal wagons and a few vans."

The above shows the manner in which more than "one token called a loading-coupon" is authorized to be given for a load of the proper capacity. The unit adopted appears to be the cart or truck load of 1½ cubic yards capacity, so that the contract in part four prescribing "one loading coupon" for each and every full sized load, and a corresponding "voucher check" is misleading, and involves a complex system of execution to be carried out by numerous employees working day and night in every variety of bad weather, in which much guessing as to capacity of vehicles must be exercised.

In view of the difficulties of administering the system proposed in Paragraph 4 of the contract, on account of the indefinite and varying capacity of the numerous carts, trucks, etc., I would propose that a "loading coupon" should only be given for the exact measured capacity of the cart, truck, etc., and that the "voucher check" be made to correspond thereto. The measured capacity to be expressed in cubic yards.

The only other manner of making these measurements is that proposed by Commissioner James McCartney in his communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment June 11, 1899, by which the amount of snow and ice to be removed by the contractor is ascertained by multiplying the area of snow and ice removed by the depth as officially reported for each day by the United States Weather Bureau in New York or by an observatory for the purpose established by this department, if the establishment of such observatory shall turn out to be practicable."

(See Minutes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for 1899, page 611.)

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment declined to approve this system, designated as Form No. 2 (Minutes, page 613).

With the exception above noted, as to definite measurement, the forms of contract submitted are drawn with great care and minuteness, and may properly receive the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as to their "terms and conditions."

The Comptroller offered the following resolution and Budget for the year 1901:

## BUDGET FOR 1901.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the affirmative vote of all the members thereof, makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and one, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said city for the said year; secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the State taxes and charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, for the said year, and, thirdly, the amount audited pursuant to the provisions of chapter 525 of the Laws of 1897, and which, according to the provisions of said act, is to be raised by taxation levied upon the taxable property in the Thirty-second Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of ninety-eight millions one hundred thousand four hundred and thirteen dollars and forty-three cents (\$98,100,413.43).

## CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:  
1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be kept so as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.



2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

It is hoped that the cost, when developed by the actual bids, will be found much less than has been estimated; but, as above indicated, that cannot be determined with any greater accuracy at this time."

The specifications and form of contract inclosed have not been approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel, as required by section 2 of chapter 556, Laws of 1897.

The only objection I can urge to the form as submitted, is that the contract is to be made "by and between The City of New York, party of the first part by the Commissioner of Parks, for the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond; and

"Whereas, It appears to me that the City should be represented by the 'Board of Parks,' which is by the Charter the head of the Department of Parks, which succeeds the 'Department of Public Parks,' named in the law. In the only other contract for work on this building, called Contract No. 1, the contract reads: 'between The City of New York, party of the first part, by the Commissioner of Parks.' I call attention to this point that it may be taken into consideration by the Corporation Counsel.

I will state for your information, not in the way of objection, that

The amount of security required is \$700,000.

The amount of deposit to be made by bidders is five per cent. of this amount.

That the partial payments to be made to the contractor are fixed at 90 per cent. of the amount of work done. The time allowed for the completion of the contract is two years and six months.

The specifications are full, and satisfactorily explain the work to be done.

The plans are very complete in all the details necessary to form a full judgment of the work to be done under this contract.

This contract includes all the masonry required above the foundation walls, now being laid under another contract, "including the upper parts of the foundation walls, arches and openings in the same, brickwork for the backing of all stonework, for piers, arches and other masonry work, as shown or described, all stone masonry within the building, including bluestone work, granite work, chimneys, flues for warming and ventilating ducts, recesses for pipes, fireproof floor construction, fireproof partitions, fireproof ceilings and roofs, waterproofing, pumping," etc., granite steps on the Fifth avenue front, etc.

The entire exterior of the building on all fronts and courts, the walls of the Fortieth street entrance passage, and the low extension on Fortieth street is to be of white marble.

The interior marblework of this contract is that in the following rooms and portions of the building, viz.:

"The rotunda on the first floor, Fifth avenue side.

"Hall between Fifth avenue rotunda and the exhibition room, stopping at the junction of the corridor at the north and south ends.

"Stairs on both sides of Fifth avenue rotunda, from the first to the third floor.

"The rotunda and hall on the second floor on the Fifth avenue side.

"The hall on the third floor on the Fifth avenue side.

"The vault of the Fifth avenue rotunda with vault penetrations connected with it.

"The basement hall on Forty-second street, from the entrance door up to delivery room door, and up to connections with the corridors at the east and west sides of this hall.

"The hall in corresponding situations on the first, second and third floors.

"The stairs from the basement floor, Forty-second street side, up to the third floor.

"The stair halls from the basement to the third floor on Forty-second street side.

"The small hall leading up to the elevator inclosure on all of the floors.

"Vaulted ceilings of all of the above halls on the Forty-second street side.

"The exhibition room complete on the first floor.

"All of the work in the above rooms, halls, stairs, etc., will be included, excepting all floors, vault of the third floor hall on the Fifth avenue side, and the flat ceilings from the outer members of the cornice. All other work in these rooms will be done under this contract, including entire wall surfaces with pilasters, columns, bases, caps, panels, piers, lintels, vaults, arches, reveals, jambs, and soffits of all openings, stairs, soffits of stairs, railings, balusters, pedestals, penetrations of vaults, intersections of vaults, and all other work except as above noted.

"The construction of the various portions is described in detail under the separate headings.

The marble for all exterior work, as prescribed in the specifications, "is to be white, with a very slight amount of clouding of gray blue. The material must be of such character that it will retain its white color under the action of the weather without discoloration from chemical changes or decomposition of the surface. No marble will be accepted which changes in color through any such decomposition of the surface, and the architects will not accept any material of which a sample cannot be shown which has been in a building and exposed to the weather for at least twenty years, the condition of such sample to be considered in the selection of the material for the Library Building.

"The general color and character of material desired will be similar to the character and color of the so-called Drexel Building, at the southeast corner of Broad and Wall streets, in this city.

"The markings of the material must be uniform, so that the finished work will not show spots of color or marking except in the courts, where a greater amount of clouding and color will be permitted, but this must not exceed the clouding and color on the south face of the bank building at the northwest corner of Fourteenth street and Eighth avenue, New York City.

"Stone is to be a pure marble, containing not less than 95 per cent. of pure carbonate of lime, or a dolomite containing not less than 55 per cent. pure carbonate of lime and not more than 45 per cent. of carbonate of magnesia. The stone is to be of uniform density throughout, and to be free from cracks, cleavages, seams, pits or other defects which impair its appearance or durability. If dolomite is used it must have the different elements evenly and thoroughly distributed throughout, and no material will be accepted which shows distinct deposits of magnesia or other unsimulated elements.

"The stone to have an ultimate crushing strength of not less than 15,000 pounds per square inch when tested in two-inch cubes under hydraulic pressure on pine cushions. The stone must be of uniform texture throughout, and must show uniform and fine crystallization."

The material for all interior marble work "must have the same characteristics, in all particulars, as the material for the exterior marble work, but must have less amount of marking and must be of the trade grade known as statuary.

"All of the interior marble work will be of this grade of stone, excepting only the shafts of the columns in the Exhibition Room on the first floor, which will be of Connemara marble. The statuary marble is to be perfectly white, free from defects and discolorations, uniform in texture and density. Sample of this material showing area of not less than 20 square feet will be furnished by the Contractor, and if approved by the Commissioner and by the Architects, will be used as a standard for all of the interior work, except the columns as above specified. Connemara marble to be clear, sound, dark green stock, free from cleavages or other defects."

The building is to be fireproof throughout, except the doors and windows, and part of the flooring; a large portion of the floors will be of marble, but a portion will be of wood, laid on the fireproof construction. None of this flooring is in this contract.

The carpenter work of the specifications is only what is necessary as the construction progresses, and is temporary in its character.

The contract includes the installation of a telephone system, to be kept up during the construction of the building.

There is no granite exposed on the building except for the exterior steps. There is no base course of granite. "The material for steps and other granite work on the exterior, or wherever exposed, to be around white granite, uniform in color and texture, free from seams or other imperfections."

The contract provides "That this contractor shall allow and appropriate for the entire expense of furnishing the models complete at the building ready for use, the sum of \$47,000."

This lump sum, as I understand, has been estimated with care to be the amount that will be required for the model work, which must be done by first-class sculptors. It is an objectionable item for a contract, as it is a fixed amount for undefined work, but in artistic work of the character contemplated, I do not know that a better plan can be devised than proposed in the contract. I think it should be provided in the contract that no greater amount will be paid than that specified and that if the work shall amount to less than the sum named the difference shall be credited to the City.

The plans show an imposing building with a front on Fifth avenue of 396 feet 6 inches, extending back on Fortieth and Forty-second streets 271 feet 11 inches, and I think they may properly receive the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The cost of construction has been estimated with care by the Architects, and is as

near as it can be made in advance.....	\$2,700,000 00

The Commissioner asks that bonds be authorized for this work to the amount of \$3,000,000; as the estimate is made with care I do not see why so large a margin should be provided for. I would recommend an issue of \$2,850,000.

The form of contract may be properly approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment when it shall have been approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel.

DEAR SIR—At a regular meeting of the above Association, held on September 4, complaints were received from several of our members regarding the insufficient equipment and support of the Arverne Hose and Engine Company. It was stated that we are improperly guarded against fire because of the impossibility of sending our engine and hose cart to the place of conflagration within a reasonable time. Recently the firemen had to secure the horses from the spunking cart several blocks distant, bring them to the engine-house and hitch them to the engine. Said horses were old and decrepit, and one died from the after effects.

The Association passed the following resolution:

"That the Committee on Grievances be instructed to present to the New York Fire Department a report of the poor condition of the Arverne Hose and Engine Company; also the necessity for immediately providing a permanent attendant at the engine-house and four horses; also that the Board of Fire Underwriters be requested to induce our application for the above."

SIR—In relation to the application of the Arverne Hose Company No. 2 (Arverne-by-the-Sea, Borough of Queens) for an appropriation under the provisions of chapter 82 of the Laws of 1900, for the purpose of purchasing a hose-wagon and horses, etc., I would state that upon investigation the following facts appear to be clearly established:



(a) That Arverne Hose Company No. 2 was incorporated on May 24, 1900, subsequent to the passage of chapter 82, Laws of 1900.

(b) That for several years prior to said May 24, 1900, there was a fire company in Arverne known as the Arverne Engine and Hose Company No. 2, which, under the provisions of said Law of 1900, would be entitled to receive \$1,200.

(c) That the two companies combined are entitled to receive for the year 1900, under the provisions of chapter 82, Laws of 1900, the sum of \$2,000, as against \$625, which would have been their pro rata share of the \$5,000 appropriated for 1900 for the maintenance of the Rockaway Beach Fire Department, in which the Arverne Company is included.

(d) That the Arverne Hose Company is now in possession of a hose wagon of Gleason-Bailey manufacture of 1894, which has a capacity of 600 to 700 feet of hose, and, according to statements of the Fire Chief of Rockaway Beach and members of the Arverne Hose Company, or of the Engine and Hose Company, is now in good condition.

(e) That under the provisions of chapter 82 of the Laws of 1900 the ten companies forming the Volunteer Fire Department of Rockaway Beach will receive for the year 1900, in separate stated payments, a sum aggregating \$10,000, as against \$5,000, appropriated for the maintenance of said Rockaway Beach Fire Department for the years respectively of 1898, 1899 and 1900.

(f) That, in addition to the total amount of \$10,000, which must be paid under the mandatory provisions of said law, the Rockaway Beach Fire Department has also made requisition for a further sum of \$6,850 for apparatus, fire-alarm system, etc.

(g) That the companies forming the Volunteer Fire Department of Far Rockaway will be entitled to an appropriation under said law of a sum amounting in the aggregate to about \$3,800, as against an aggregate of \$10,000, payable to the companies forming the Volunteer Fire Department of Rockaway Beach, notwithstanding the fact that the Volunteer Fire Department of Far Rockaway has to cover and protect a territory very much larger than the territory covered by the Fire Department of Rockaway Beach, and the real estate value of which, to wit, in Far Rockaway is nearly three times greater than the value of the real estate included within the districts covered by the Rockaway Beach Fire Department.

(h) That under the mandatory provisions of said law appropriations must be made for the volunteer fire service in the Borough of Queens, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$61,800, and that in addition to this amount the Fire Commissioner has submitted an estimate showing that the sum of \$76,034 will be required for a fire-alarm system and apparatus in said borough during the year 1901.

In view of the above facts, and that the estimated increase in the cost of maintaining the volunteer fire companies in said borough amounts to nearly \$120,000, it is recommended that no appropriation be made for the purchase of apparatus, etc., excepting the appropriations which may be made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and included in the Budget of expenses of conducting the public business of The City of New York for the year 1901.

SIR—Hon. George C. Clausen, Park Commissioner for the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, in communication, through the Secretary of the Park Board to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requests the Board to "authorize a bond issue to the amount of \$53,000, the estimate of the amount required to pave with asphalt pavement the Eighty-sixth street Parkway."

"This thoroughfare from Central Park, West, to Riverside drive is, by special act of the Legislature, a parkway and under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks. It is one of the wide streets, and its improvement has been on the lines suggested by this fact and its designation as a parkway, with high-class resident structures."

"For several years the old block pavement has been in very bad order, and the residents upon this street, as well as the general public, have asked for the improvement of the pavement. It is also a work of necessity, from the Department's standpoint, to permit its being properly maintained as a parkway."

This is a wide residential street and the present pavement is considerably out of repair, and there is a general desire to have the rough stone pavement replaced by asphalt. I think such a pavement would be a very great improvement in this important street, and I would recommend that the work be done.

I think, however, that the grades between Amsterdam avenue and the Boulevard, 3.05 per cent., and between the Boulevard and West End avenue, 3.35 per cent., are too great for an asphalt pavement. Those portions of the street might be paved with asphalt blocks.

The estimate of cost is \$53,000. This estimate is as near as can be made in advance.

I presume the work, if authorized, will be done under section 48 of the Charter, which requires "that, in case of the issue of bonds or other evidences of indebtedness for the repaving of streets the vote of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment must be unanimous."

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it extend to the wishes of the petitioners such favorable consideration and



action as will enable the Citizens' Water Supply Company to make full response to the requirements of the inhabitants along the aforesaid street, if embraced within the territory of its franchise and the terms thereof, and the law in the matter make obligatory so to do.

Also, Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit to this, the Local Board of the borough aforesaid, at its meeting held October 12, 1900, the petition of owners of real estate on Prospect street, between Catharine and South streets, in Fourth Ward of borough and city aforesaid, that permit be issued to the Jamaica Water Supply Company for the extension of its mains along said street from and to the points aforesaid; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it extend to the wishes of the petitioners such favorable consideration and action as will enable the Jamaica Water Supply Company to make full response to the requirements of the inhabitants along the aforesaid street, if embraced within the territory of its franchise and the terms thereof and the law in the matter may make obligatory so to do.

Also, Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit to this, the Local Board of the borough aforesaid, at its meeting held October 12, 1900, petition of owners of real estate on Gaston avenue (in Arverne) Fifth Ward, Borough and City aforesaid that permit be granted to the Queens County Water Company to extend its mains along said avenue from the railroad crossing to a point six hundred (600) feet northerly thereof; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it extend to the wishes of the petitioners such favorable consideration and action as will enable the Queens County Water Supply Company to make full response to the requirements of the inhabitants along the aforesaid avenue, if embraced within the territory of its franchise, and the terms thereof and the law in the matter may make obligatory so to do.

Also, Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, did, at its meeting held September 5, 1900, refer to this the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, in said city, the matter of petition made by the Astoria Silk Works and others to have the grade of Winthrop avenue, between Barclay and Goodrich street, in First Ward of borough in city aforesaid changed by lowering same for the purpose of making said avenue more suitable for heavy trucking for which it is destined to be used to the grade desired by the petitioners, as shown on plan and profile submitted by them; and

Whereas, Notice of public hearing thereon before this Board on this 12th day of October, 1900, was duly published and such hearing having been afforded, and no person appeared thereat in opposition to the desired change of grade; and

Whereas, After due consideration given the aforesaid subject, this Board concludes that to change the grade of Winthrop avenue in conformity with the wishes of the petitioners would be to the best interests of this City, and of all concerned; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that the grade of Winthrop avenue be changed, as set out and described in the petition presented to it by the "Astoria Silk Works" and other property-owners, on March 7, 1900, and more particularly shown and described in the profile map of Winthrop avenue, made by Stevenson Twile, dated February 21, 1900.

On motion, the resolution, etc., adopted on the aforesaid subject, on September 21, 1900, was rescinded.

On motion, it was directed that this Board appear as a "Committee of the Whole" before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and advocate that a larger appropriation be made to Department of Highways for the year 1901, consistent with the requirements of this Borough.

It was ordered that the Long Island Railroad Company be communicated with and informed that it is the opinion of this Board that the railroad crossing at Atlantic avenue and Union place in Brooklyn Hills, this Borough, is not sufficiently safeguarded, and that they be urged to promptly comply with the requirements therein.

Adjourned to October 19, 1900.
