I return herewith, without my approval, a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on January 15, 1902, permitting Michael Murry to place, erect and keep a storm-door in front of his premises, No. 198 William street, Borough of Manhattan.

My objection to this resolution is that the granting of said permission should be subject to a general ordinance regulating such matters throughout the whole city, or throughout a specified portion thereof, in accordance with the provisions of section 50 of the Charter of The City of New York.

PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

No. 77.

New York, January 29, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—Please take notice that the petition and demand of the undersigned, John J. Shaughnessy, respectfully shows and contends as follows:

First—That by virtue of a resolution of the Council of The City of New York, made in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of The City of New York, and adopted by said Council December 6, 1898, your petitioner, John J. Shaughnessy, was duly appointed as an Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms to said Council, and thereupon your petitioner duly qualified and entered upon his duties as such Assistant, faithfully performing the same and so continued until the Officers and Members of the Board of Aldermen refused to recognize him as such Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms. That your petitioner has at all times, and now is, able and willing to perform any or all duties as may be required of him.

Second—That your petitioner is a veteran of the late Civil War, being an honorably discharged soldier of the United States Army, having served as such in the Union Army during the War of the Rebellion.

Third—That your petitioner has never been charged, accused or tried for incompetency in such office, nor given notice that any such charges were at any time stated against him, and there has been no hearing or trial on any stated charges.

Fourth—That your petitioner is informed by counsel, and verily believes, that the present Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, created by chapter 466, Laws of 1901, duly succeeds to all the rights and obligations of the Council aforesaid, and is the successor of said Council as the legislative body of The City of New York.

Fifth—That your petitioner is further advised by counsel, and verily believes, that he is protected in the enjoyment of his office, position or employment, as an Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, or removal therefrom by the present Board of Aldermen of The City of New York.

Sixth—That your honorable body by resolution adopted January 22, 1902, designated and appointed five certain persons to the office, position or employment of Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms; that previous thereto your petitioner had duly notified your honorable body by communication delivered through the Hon. Charles V. Fornes, President of the Board of Aldermen, and Hon. P. J. Scully, City Clerk, that your petitioner is a veteran of the late Civil War and demanded his retention in the public service as provided and required by the civil service laws referring to the employment of veterans.

Wherefore, your petitioner demands that he be by you designated and assigned to the performance of duty as Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms of the Board of Aldermen, or should it be determined that the position of Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms of the Council was by the provisions of the amendments to the Charter of The City of New York by chapter 466, Laws 1901, abolished, then and in that case it is demanded that you, the Board of Aldermen, shall transfer and appoint your petitioner to the office, position or employment of Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms of the Board of Aldermen, this demand being based upon the reasons set forth above, and upon the ground that your petitioner is a veteran of the Civil War, and is fitted to fill and discharge the duties of such office. By Alderman Dietz—

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, of The City of New York:

We, your petitioners, having a grievance to present, respectfully set forth, as follows:

Whereas, On the 17th day of October, 1899, the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, in regular session assembled, adopted the following ordinance, viz.:

"Sec. 1397. An ordinance to provide bridges over the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, at Ninety-ninth, One Hundredth and One Hundred and First streets and Park avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

"Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

"Sec. 1. If not inconsistent with the provisions of the Charter of any State law now in force, the New York and Harlem Railroad Company shall, between the first of March and the first of May, place, erect and keep, three bridges over Park

avenue at Ninety-ninth street, One Hundredth and One Hundred and First streets, Borough of Manhattan, respectively, two of said bridges to be for pedestrians and one to be so graded that it can be crossed by horses, vehicles, etc.

"Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed," and,
Whereas, The said ordinance was adopted by the Council on the 19th day of December, 1899, and,

Whereas, The said ordinance was thereafter presented to His Honor, the Mayor, for his approval thereof, and,

Whereas, Up to the 30th day of December, 1899, the said ordinance had not been returned by him (and the provisions of which ordinance is not one specified in section 30 of The Greater New York Charter) the said ordinance thereby taking effect as if it had been approved by His Honor, the Mayor, and

Whereas, The said ordinance has not been repealed nor modified and is still in full force and effect, and

Whereas, The New York and Harlem Railroad Company, the company mentioned in the said ordinance, has paid no attention to the provisions in said ordinance specified, though more than a reasonable time for its performance has elapsed, and

Whereas, The said ordinance was adopted for the benefit of the public who desire to cross the road-bed of the said company with safety, and who are now compelled to travel a long distance out of their way to safely cross the tracks of the said railroad company, and

Whereas, The compliance with the provisions of the ordinance above set forth would obviate the necessity of such circuitous route, and

Whereas, All the undersigned, your petitioners, are property owners and taxpayers, and the majority of them residents in the districts immediately bordering on Park avenue at Ninety-ninth street, One Hundredth and One Hundred and First streets, Borough of Manhattan, the respective places where the bridges in said ordinance mentioned should have been built, and

Whereas, The non-compliance by the above named railroad company with the provisions contained in the ordinance above set forth is of special injury to them inasmuch as it deteriorates the value of their respective estates, and

Whereas, No previous petition has been presented to this Honorable Board, nor any other Board,

Now therefore, we, your humble petitioners respectfully pray and demand that this Board see the proper officials upon whom the duty devolves to compel the enforcement and carrying out of this ordinance by the said New York and Harlem Railroad Company.

New York, January 21, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners of The City of New York, heretofore and on or about the 4th day of February, 1897, submitted to the Common Council of The City of New York, as then constituted, a report with respect to the proposed Rapid Transit Railroad in said city.

Since the said report was made, the routes and general plan for the Rapid Transit Railroad above mentioned have been duly approved by the municipal authorities of The City of New York, and by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in the First Judicial Department, and on the 21st day of February, 1900, a contract for the construction and operation of said Rapid Transit Railroad was duly made with John B. McDonald, Contractor, by The City of New York acting by said Board. Said Contractor is now engaged in the construction of the said railroad, pursuant to the terms of said contract.

Said routes and general plan provided, among other things, that the railroad should be constructed under and along Lenox avenue from One Hundred and Tenth street to One Hundred and Forty-second street, and thence turn to the eastward, passing under the Harlem River. Since that route was laid out, The City of New York has begun and almost completed the construction of a bridge across the Harlem River from One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, to One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, which will make One Hundred and Forty-fifth street a great east and west thoroughfare across the upper part of Manhattan Island. One Hundred and Forty-fifth street is the only wide street going from river to river, north of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street. It is desirable that a station should be placed at the end of said bridge at One Hundred and Forty-fifth street. This can be accomplished by extending the line northward under Lenox avenue to One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, and the cost of such extension, as the Board is advised, will not exceed \$350,000.

With the route as originally adopted and now under construction, all trains going up Lenox avenue would run to the Bronx Park, and it would be impossible to provide any separate service for the vast traffic originating on Manhattan Island north of One Hundred and Tenth street. By extending the tracks from One Hundred and Forty-second to One Hundred and Forty-eighth street it will be possible to start trains from this point as well as from the upper end of The Bronx, and thus afford the Harlem residents a special service. This will not interfere with the accommodations for The Bronx, but will be a benefit to the inhabitants of The Bronx, as it will relieve The Bronx trains from the burden of the Harlem traffic. Another reason for the modification of this route is that, if it be adopted, the contractor proposes to acquire and locate on Lenox avenue a terminal yard and repair shop. Parts of the terminal yards of the Manhattan Railway and the Metropolitan Street Railway Companies are now located on the Harlem River, and it is especially desirable that the terminal yards of the various railroad companies in New York should be kept together.

The said Board, after due consideration of the above reasons and by the concurrent vote of six members, has determined and established the modification in the routes and general plan of construction heretofore adopted, and hereby transmits to your honorable body a copy of the plan and conclusions as adopted, including such routes and general plan of construction.

The features of the plan of construction are those with which your honorable body is already familiar in the rapid transit system now under construction.

The contractor who has undertaken the construction of the railway, under the routes and general plan heretofore adopted, has agreed that the expense of constructing the portion between One Hundred and Forty-eighth and One Hundred and Fiftieth streets be treated as an expense for terminals and paid for out of the \$1,750,000 allowed for terminals in the contract for the construction and operation of the railroad. Annexed hereto is a copy of the contractor's letter making such offer, and a map showing the proposed extension.

Dear Sir—With reference to the proposed extension of the Rapid Transit Railroad from One Hundred and Forty-third street northward through Lenox avenue to the terminal properties, I beg to say that in case the same should be authorized I am willing and agree that the expense of constructing any portion of such extension between One Hundred and Forty-eighth and One Hundred and Fiftieth streets should be treated as terminals and paid for out of the \$1,750,000 allowed for terminals in the contract for the construction and operation of the railroad.

Copy Resolutions.

"Whereas, This Board did on the 14th day of January, 1897, and the 4th day of February, 1897, adopt certain routes and general plan for a Rapid Transit railroad in The City of New York, a copy of which is hereto annexed, entitled 'Copy Routes and General Plan'; and

"Whereas, The said routes and general plan were afterward duly approved by the municipal authorities of The City of New York and were duly consented to by Commissioners appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, which consent was duly confirmed by the said Appellate Division, in lieu of the consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along said routes; and

"Whereas, Thereafter and on or about the 21st day of February, 1900, The City of New York did, by this Board, enter into a certain contract with John B. McDonald for the construction and operation of the said Rapid Transit Railroad; and

"Whereas it is the interest of The City of New York and, in the opinion of the said John B. McDonald, it is likewise in his interest, as such contractor, and he desires that said routes and general plan shall be changed in the respect hereinafter mentioned, but without other change in the said routes and general plan; now therefore it is

"Resolved, That, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as in these resolutions hereinafter mentioned, the said routes and general plan heretofore adopted by this Board be and they hereby are modified by adding to the said routes the following, to wit—

"And also extending from a point under Lenox avenue, near One Hundred and Forty-second street, northerly under Lenox avenue to a point at or near its intersection with the street known as 'Exterior street,' including connections by necessary and suitable switches and tracks, or otherwise, with abutting properties used as terminal or storage grounds.

"The general plan of construction of the portion of the route hereby added shall be by tunnel in the same manner as provided in the routes and general plan for the construction of the rapid transit railroad under the portion of Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Tenth street and One Hundred and Forty-second street. There shall be at least two parallel tracks, with the right at any time to add a third track in the discretion of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners.

"A station and station approaches may also be built at the intersection of one of the streets intersecting Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-second and Exterior streets, as the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners may decide."

In all other respects the provisions of the said general plan of construction adopted January 14 and February 4, 1897, shall be applicable to the portion of the route hereby substituted; and it is further

Resolved, That whereas this Board has duly made the inquiries and investigation necessary or proper in the premises, and has determined that the modification aforesaid of the said routes and general plan are necessary for the interests of the public and of The City of New York, and should be established as herein provided, this Board does hereby determine and establish the said routes and general plan as hereby modified, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as hereinafter mentioned; and it is further

Resolved, That the said modifications of routes and general plans shall take effect only upon and after the following consents and approvals thereto shall be duly had, to wit:

1. The consent of the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York.
2. The consent of the Mayor of The City of New York.
3. The consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along streets or such portions of streets as are included in the portion of routes by these resolutions proposed to be substituted as aforesaid, or if such consent cannot be obtained, then in lieu thereof the determination of three Commissioners to be appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, duly confirmed by the said Appellate Division.

4. The consent of the said John B. McDonald, contractor, and of his sureties, as follows: Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, The City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia, American Surety Company of New York, National Surety Company and Perry Belmont.

It is further

Resolved, That this Board hereby adopts the drawing now produced and numbered one as showing the modifications or extension hereby adopted.

"Copy Routes and General Plan.

"January 14, 1897.

(Referred to in the foregoing resolutions.)

"One route as follows: Its center line shall commence at a point at or near the intersection of Broadway with Park row; thence under Park row and Centre street to a point at or near its intersection with new Elm street as proposed; thence under new Elm street, as proposed, to Lafayette place; thence under Lafayette place to Eighth street; thence across and under Eighth street, and thence under private property lying between Eighth and Ninth streets and east of the westerly side or line of Lafayette place, produced, to Fourth avenue; thence under Fourth avenue and Park avenue to Forty-second street; thence turning from Park avenue into Forty-second street, and taking for the purposes of the curve, if necessary or convenient, private property at the southwest corner of Park avenue and Forty-second street; thence under Forty-second street to Broadway; thence under Broadway to Fifty-ninth street; thence under the Boulevard to a point at or near One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street; thence by viaduct along and over the Boulevard to a point at or near One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence under the Boulevard and Eleventh avenue to a point on Eleventh avenue, situate north of One Hundred and Ninetieth street, and distant therefrom not less than one thousand and not more than one thousand five hundred feet, and thence under or over (as may be most convenient) private property to a point at the south-east end of Ellwood street, near Hillside street, and thence over Ellwood street to Kingsbridge avenue or Broadway; thence over Kingsbridge avenue or Broadway, as now proposed, to Riverdale avenue and thence easterly over Riverdale avenue to a point within five hundred feet of the present Kingsbridge station of the New York and Putnam Railroad Company.

"This route shall include a loop at the City Hall Park which shall connect with the portion of the route aforesaid along Centre street at or near the south end of that street, and thence proceed westerly and southerly under City Hall Park and Broadway, and thence easterly to again connect with the portion of the route aforesaid in Park row. All of the said loop shall lie under City Hall Park, Park row, between the south end of Centre street and Ann street, and the portion of Broadway adjoining the City Hall Park lying between Vesey and Murray streets. This route shall also include suitable tracks and connections from the City Hall loop to the Postoffice, such tracks and connections being under the City Hall Park and under the portion of Park Row between the south end of Centre street and Ann street. This route shall also include suitable tracks and connections from the portion of the route near the corner of Park avenue and Forty-second street to the yard and tracks of the Grand Central Station. All of the tracks and connections last mentioned shall be under Park avenue and

Forty-second street and private property to be acquired. By private property in this description is meant property not forming part of the streets of The City of New York and not belonging to The City of New York.

"Also a route as follows: Its centre line shall diverge from the route aforesaid on the Boulevard, between a line parallel to and one hundred feet north of One Hundred and Third street and a line parallel to and one hundred feet south of One Hundred and Third street; thence under private property to a point in One Hundred and Fourth street; thence under One Hundred and Fourth street to and across Central Park, West; thence under Central Park to the intersection of Lenox avenue and One Hundred and Tenth street; thence under Lenox avenue to a point near One Hundred and Forty-second street; thence curving to the east and passing under private property, One Hundred and Forty-third and One Hundred and Forty-fourth streets, to the Harlem river at or near the foot of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street; thence under the Harlem river and private property to East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street at or near its intersection with River avenue; thence under East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to a point near its intersection with Third avenue; thence with a curve to the left and under Third avenue to a point near its intersection with Westchester avenue; thence with a curve to the right to and under Westchester avenue, and thence by viaduct over and along Westchester avenue to the Southern Boulevard; thence over and along the Southern Boulevard to the Boston road, and thence over and along the Boston road to Bronx Park.

"The said general plan of construction hereby adopted is as follows:

"For the route under Park row and the said loop at City Hall Park, two parallel tracks; for the route from the point of connection of the City Hall loop with the route aforesaid at the southerly end of Centre street to the junction at or near One Hundred and Third street and the Boulevard, four parallel tracks; for the route from the junction at or near One Hundred and Third street and the Boulevard to the New York and Putnam Railroad Company's station at Kingsbridge, two parallel tracks; for the route from the junction at or near One Hundred and Third street and the Boulevard to Bronx Park, two parallel tracks.

"All of the above-mentioned tracks shall be placed on the same level, except that wherever required by special necessities of surface or sub-surface structures or other special or local necessities and for the purpose of avoiding grade crossings at the southerly end of Centre street and the One Hundred and Third street junction, any one or more of the tracks may be depressed below the level of the other tracks to a depth of not more than twenty feet.

"The tracks shall be of standard gauge, that is to say, of a width of four feet and eight and a half inches between the rails. There shall be twelve and a half feet width in the tunnels and on the viaducts for each track, except that at stations, switches, turn-outs, curves and crossovers the width may be increased to the extent permitted by the width of the tunnel. The tracks wherever passing over or under the streets shall be placed over or under the central part of the street, except that no tunnel or viaduct or any wall or part thereof under or along a street, shall, except at the stations, station approaches, curves and at places of access to the sub-surface structures, as hereinafter provided, be within a distance of five feet of the exterior line or side of the street. The tracks shall in all cases be placed in tunnels, except only that on the west side route on the Boulevard at or near One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street the tracks shall emerge from the tunnel and be carried upon a viaduct along the Boulevard to a point at or near One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street and there be taken again into tunnel, and except also that on the west side route at a point at or near One Hundred and Ninetieth street the tracks shall again emerge from the tunnel and be carried upon a viaduct over private property and the above-mentioned streets to the Kingsbridge station, and except also that on the east side from a point on Westchester avenue at or near Bergen avenue the tracks shall emerge from the tunnel and be carried upon a viaduct over and along Westchester avenue and the other streets above mentioned to Bronx Park.

"Wherever the tracks change from tunnel to viaduct, or from viaduct to tunnel, the change shall be so made as to occupy or obstruct the use of the surface of the street to the least possible extent consistent with the proper gradient for the tracks.

"The roof of the tunnel shall be as near the surface of the street as street conditions and grades will permit. The tunnel shall not be less than thirteen feet in height in the clear. The maximum widths of the tunnel in the clear shall be as follows:

"For the route under Park row and the City Hall Park loop, thirty-eight feet; for the route from at or near the south end of Centre street and to the commencement of New Elm street, fifty feet; for the route from, at or near the commencement of New Elm street to Lafayette place, sixty-eight feet; for the route from, at or near the commencement of Lafayette place to the junction at or near One Hundred and Third street, fifty feet; for the west side route from the junction at or near One Hundred and Third street to Kingsbridge station, twenty-five feet; and for the east side route from, at or near the junction at One Hundred and Third street to Bronx Park, twenty-five feet; except that wherever the nature of the streets necessitates a curve that an additional width of tunnel may be added not exceeding three feet for each track, and except that on Fourth avenue, from Thirty-second street to Forty-third street, the permissible width shall be sixty-five feet; and for the tunnel beneath the Harlem river and its approaches, the permissible width shall be thirty-five feet. At each cross street where accommodations for pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures have been provided within the tunnel, the tunnel may, in order to provide convenient access to such pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures, have within the limit of the sides or exterior lines of such cross street or such lines produced, an additional width on each side of the route not to exceed fifteen feet, and the area of additional width on either side not to approach nearer than twelve feet to either side or exterior line of such cross street. Footways between the tracks shall be provided the whole length of the line and accommodations arranged for the convenience and protection of employees.

"Whenever necessary for the proper support of the street surface, the roof of the tunnel shall be of iron or steel girders with brick or concrete arches supported by iron or steel columns and masonry walls, or the roof shall be a masonry arch. Viaducts shall be built with a width of twelve and one-half feet for each track and with an additional width of three feet on each side for outside footways. Viaducts may be built of metal or masonry, or of both.

"Adjacent tracks shall be connected by necessary and suitable switches and connections, and an additional track for siding accommodation may be constructed not to exceed in length one-quarter of a mile for each mile of roadway, but provided always that the side of the tunnel shall not, by the enlargement of the tunnel for that purpose, be brought within five feet of the exterior line or side of the street.

"Along Elm street, wherever the tunnel shall be in the clear not less than sixty-eight feet wide, the pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures shall be placed in suitable galleries in the tunnel at the outside of the exterior tracks. But any such pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures may be placed in suitable galleries beneath the tracks, or such pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures may be placed in the ground above or at the sides of the tunnel, or at the outside of the exterior tracks, and whenever so placed beneath the tracks, or in the ground above or at the sides of the tunnel, the width of the tunnel on New Elm street shall not be more than fifty feet. Pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures shall, at any part of the said routes, be removed or disturbed only when necessary for the construction and operation of the railway, and, if removed or disturbed, shall be placed under the streets in such manner and in such location that the use and service thereof shall not be impaired. Such pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures shall be left or shall be so arranged as to give free access for their repair or alteration, or for the placing with them of new pipes, wires, sewers and other like structures, and for making connections between the same and buildings at any time.

"Stations and station approaches shall, in general, be at the intersection of streets and shall be built under, or, if the position of the tracks so require, over, the streets and immediately adjoining private abutting property, or through private property to be acquired for the purpose, or both under or over streets and through private property as aforesaid, except that on the Boulevard, stations and station approaches may be in the centre of the street. The streets under or over which stations or station approaches shall be built may include cross streets, but no part of any cross street shall be used for a station or station approach at a distance greater than seventy-five feet from the exterior line or side of the street of the route. The word 'street,' wherever used herein, shall include an avenue or public place.

"Along the Boulevard there may be openings in the surface of the street from the tunnel for the purpose of ventilation and light; such openings shall be guarded

by convenient and ornamental inclosures. The openings shall not exceed twenty feet in width and fifty feet in length. No two openings shall be within fifty feet of each other. No opening or part thereof shall be within the limits of, or opposite to, any street intersecting the Boulevard; and within the distance of any one block on the Boulevard between any two adjacent crossing streets there shall not be more than two such openings.

"The general mode of operation shall be by electricity or some other power not requiring combustion within the tunnels or on the viaducts, and the motors shall be capable of moving trains at a speed of not less than forty miles per hour for long distances, exclusive of stops.

"The manner of construction shall be by tunneling or open excavation; it is further

"Resolved, That plans be prepared to show the route and general plan, in so far as they are hereby adopted, which said plans, when formally adopted, shall be deemed to be incorporated herein and to form a part hereof.

"February 4, 1897.

"Resolved, That this Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for the City of New York hereby adopts the drawings now produced and numbered from 1 to 60, both inclusive, as showing the route and general plan adopted by resolution of this Board on January 14, 1897, and that as provided in the said resolution the said drawings be deemed incorporated in and to form part of the said resolutions; and it is further

"Resolved, That the said route and general plan with the said drawings, and the said resolutions of January 14, 1897, be, and they hereby are adopted by this Board."

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—I respectfully call your attention to, and ask immediate action of your board upon, our request to let a contract, without advertising for bids, for an emergency hospital and disinfection plant to be erected in the Borough of Richmond. An appropriation of five thousand dollars has, as you already know, been made by the Board of Estimate at the request of the Board of Health; and the expenditure for the plant in question is not to exceed that sum. It seems to me absolutely necessary, however, that the erection of this station should be begun at once, whereas, if we are compelled to advertise for bids, it will cause a delay of six weeks or more. As the case stands now, there are absolutely no facilities for caring for smallpox patients in Richmond Borough and the disease seems to be spreading there. Under present arrangements, we are compelled to take patients suffering with smallpox from any part of Staten Island in our ambulance, carry them, often in severe weather, to one dock in the Borough on State property, and then transport them by our steamboat "Franklin Edson" to North Brother Island. Physicians, and the families of the afflicted persons in Richmond Borough, make great objection to this unduly severe treatment of patients; and I am sure your Board will appreciate the danger to human life involved.

In asking that the provision for the letting of this contract be set aside by a three-fourths vote of your Board, I am sure you will see that the request is made solely on the ground of the extreme urgency of the case. Respectfully yours,

Dear Sir—Under section 419 of the City Charter, no expenditure exceeding one thousand dollars can be incurred by any head of department or other City officer for any particular subject unless the same is authorized by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Aldermen.

An emergency now exists which compels me to ask for such authorization. The emergency has arisen in the following manner: The late Commissioner of Water Supply advertised for and had a public letting of bids for a contract for furnishing the pumping stations in the Brooklyn water system with coal for the year 1902. The lowest bidders were the firm of Curtis & Blaisdell, and their bid was transmitted by me to the Comptroller for his action as to the sufficiency of the sureties thereon. The Comptroller has returned the bid to me with his approval of the sureties, but in the meantime Messrs. Curtis and Blaisdell have asked to withdraw their bid.

The supply of coal on hand for operating the pumping stations is sufficient for about twenty-five (25) days, and if complications should arise to delay the execution of the contract with Curtis & Blaisdell the delivery of coal thereunder might be delayed until the present supply had become exhausted. That would create a situation which should, under all circumstances, be avoided. The Brooklyn water supply should not be imperiled for the want of coal to operate the pumping stations.

For these reasons I ask your Board by resolution to authorize me to make

such purchases of coal, in excess of the sum of one thousand dollars, as in my discretion may be necessary to tide over this emergency.

Dear Sir—In behalf of the Sisters of the Poor of St. Francis, who are about to erect a new Hospital on the block bounded by One Hundred and Forty-second street, Brook avenue, One Hundred and Forty-third street and St. Ann's avenue, I address you, with a request to see if the Sisters could be relieved of paying the fee for the sewer connections for their building. The Hospital is to be strictly a charity institution, the same as their other houses in the City. They are relieved from taxes and water rent, and hope they might also be allowed to enter the sewer without paying the usual tax.

The property covers the entire block above described, will contain 104,000 square

feet, and the roof area is 42,400 square feet. This first sewer, for which application has been made, is near the centre of One Hundred and Forty-third street, and five other sewer connections will be required hereafter, but the Department asks that the fee for drainage be paid for this first application to the amount of \$339.20.

Sirs—I beg respectfully to report that I have appointed as First Deputy Commissioner of Public Charities, Mr. James Edward Dougherty, and as Second Deputy Commissioner of Public Charities, Mr. Charles Ebenezer Teale, such appointments having been made by me on January 1, 1902. While the Charter specifically authorizes me to appoint a First Deputy and a Second Deputy it does not fix their salaries nor does the head of this Department appear to have any authority in fixing their salaries. I beg respectfully to request therefore that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment take such action as may be necessary, subject to ratification by the Board of Aldermen, to fix the salaries of these positions.

I would respectfully suggest that the salaries be fixed at \$5,000 per annum each. The former Deputy to the Commissioner of Public Charities for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx received a salary of \$5,000 per annum, and the Deputy to the Commissioner of Public Charities for the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens received the same amount. In the provisional estimate of expenses of this Department for the year 1902, the salaries of the First and Second Deputies were estimated at \$5,000 per annum each.

RULES OF THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

CHAPTER I.

Meetings.

1. The Board shall hold its regular stated meetings on the first and third Wednesday of each month at three o'clock P. M., unless otherwise ordered.

Special meetings, in addition to those provided for in the Charter, may be called (1) by adjournment to a day fixed at a regular meeting, (2) by the President under his own hand, or (3) by a call signed by twenty-five members.

The Clerk shall issue such notice to the members immediately after the signing of a call and at least twenty-four hours before the time of such meeting.

CHAPTER II.

Powers and Duties of the President.

2. The President, and, in his absence, the Vice-Chairman, shall take the chair at the hour of meeting. He shall call the Board to order, and, except in the absence of a quorum, shall proceed to business in the manner prescribed by these rules.

3. He shall preserve order and decorum. In case of disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobby or gallery he may cause the same to be cleared. He shall decide all questions of order, subject to appeal, which appeal shall be decided without debate. On every appeal he shall have the right, in his place, to assign his reasons for his decision, allowing the appellant an opportunity to present his reasons for appealing. He shall appoint all committees. When the Board shall decide to go into Committee of the Whole he shall name a chairman to preside therein.

In the absence of the Vice-Chairman he may substitute any member to perform the duties of the chair for a period not exceeding the legislative day on which such substitution is made, but for no longer period except by special consent of the Board.

4. He shall assign to the Sergeant-at-Arms and Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms their respective duties and stations.

CHAPTER III.

Of the Vice-Chairman.

5. The Vice-Chairman, when acting as President, shall be invested with all the powers and duties conferred upon the President.

CHAPTER IV.

Order of Business.

6. The order of business shall be as follows: 1. Reading of the minutes. 2. Messages and papers from the Mayor. 3. Presentation of petitions and communications. 4. Communications from city, county and borough officers. 5. Reports of special committees. 6. Reports of standing committees. 7. Special orders. 8. General orders. 9. Motions, ordinances and resolutions in the following manner: "The names of the members of the Board of Aldermen shall be called in alphabetical order, except that at every alternate meeting of the Board the names shall be called in reverse order, commencing at the end of the roll and calling the names in succession to the beginning of the roll; and in case an adjournment shall take place, pending the call, the roll shall, at the next meeting, be resumed where it was left off."

Messages from the Mayor and communications or reports from City or Borough officers may, however, be received at any time. The Committee on Rules or the Committee on Engrossed Resolutions and Ordinances, or (when the report involves the right of a member of the Board to his seat) the Committee on Privileges and Elections may likewise meet and report at any time. It shall also always be in order to call up for consideration a report from the Committee on Rules.

CHAPTER V.

Rights and Duties of Members.

7. A member presenting a paper shall endorse the same as follows: If a petition, memorial or report to the Board, with a brief statement of the subject of its contents, adding his name; if a notice or resolution, with his name; if a report of a committee, a statement of such report, with the name of the committee and member presenting the same.

8. No member rising to debate, make a motion or report or present a petition or paper, shall proceed, unless in his place, nor until he shall have been recognized by the President. While a member is speaking no other member shall entertain any private discourse or disturb another in his speech in any manner whatever. Unless otherwise provided by law, ordinance, or these rules, the roll shall not be called upon a vote unless two members demand it.

9. No member shall speak more than once on the same general question until every member desiring to speak on the question pending shall have spoken. He shall speak on the same subject but twice the same day without leave of the Board. No member may speak upon any matter for more than ten minutes at any time, except by permission of the Board.

10. A member desiring to be excused from voting or to explain his vote, may, when his name is called, make a brief statement, not occupying more than five minutes, of the reasons for making such request, or for voting in the manner he does. If he make a request to be excused, the question of excusing him shall then be taken without debate by a vote without a roll call. If any member refuses to vote, unless he be excused by the Board, or unless he be interested, such refusal shall be deemed a contempt, and shall be so recorded on the minutes.

11. In case a less number than a quorum shall convene, those present are authorized to send the Sergeant-at-Arms or any other person for the absent members.

12. In all cases of absence of members during the sessions of the Board the

members present may take such measures as they may deem necessary to secure the presence of the absentees, and, in addition to suspension for a given period, may inflict such censure or penalty as they may deem just on those who shall not render sufficient excuse for their absence. No member shall leave during a meeting without permission of the President of the Board.

CHAPTER VI.

Duties of the Clerk.

13. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have the journals containing the proceedings of each meeting printed and copies thereof and of the calendar in the next paragraph referred to placed on the files of and mailed to the President and other members within five days after such meeting; also to have the proposed ordinances, resolutions and other documents placed on the files of the President and other members in the order of their numbers. All reports of committees submitted shall constitute a part of the proceedings of each meeting.

14. He shall prepare and cause to be printed for each meeting a list in detail of all matters ready for consideration at such meeting. Said list shall be known as the Calendar and shall include all vetoes, messages from the Mayor and other City and Borough officials and departments that have been laid over for future consideration, special orders and general orders, and any other matters which have been presented to the Board and which remain undetermined. In case any matters on the calendar of a particular meeting are not acted upon, they shall be continued upon the calendar of the next meeting and of each succeeding meeting, in their order, until finally disposed of. The calendar shall state, in regard to any ordinance or resolution, the vote required to pass it, and if it be a matter referred to in section 48 of the Charter, then also the day when the time limitation in said section contained will expire. He shall place copies of the calendar on calendar files on the desks of the members and keep copies on file in his office, the same as other documents. He shall also see that all proposed ordinances and resolutions are acted upon in the order in which they are reported and stand upon the calendar, unless otherwise directed by the Board in the manner hereinafter provided.

15. The certificate of the Clerk of the Board shall be attached to every proposed ordinance or resolution, to the effect that the same has been duly passed or is deemed to have been duly passed by a vote, as required by the provisions of the Charter of The City of New York, and he shall transmit the proposed ordinance or resolution by message to the Mayor.

16. He shall transmit to the proper authorities all ordinances or resolutions required by the Charter to be acted upon by other officers or departments of the Municipal Government before being passed by the Board.

17. He shall keep index records convenient for reference of all ordinances, resolutions, petitions and other matters introduced in or presented to the Board.

18. He shall prepare and furnish to each member, in printed form, copies of the regular rules of the Board.

CHAPTER VII.

Duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms and Assistant Sergeants-at-Arms.

19. The Sergeant-at-Arms and Assistant Sergeants-at-Arms, except when absent in the discharge of their duties, shall be in constant attendance upon the sessions of the Board, and, under the direction of the President, shall aid in enforcing order on the floor, in the gallery, in the lobbies, and in the rooms adjoining the Aldermanic Chamber, and also see that no person remains on the floor unless entitled to the privileges of the same. They shall also discharge such other duties as are directed by the President.

CHAPTER VIII.

Committees and Their Duties.

20. The standing committees shall be as follows—

To consist of nine members each: Finance, Law and Legislation, Railroads, Bridges and Tunnels, Streets, Highways and Sewers, Docks and Ferries.

To consist of seven members each: Affairs of Boroughs, Rules, Parks; Water Supply, Gas and Electricity; Public Buildings and Markets, Public Education, Public Health, Penal Institutions, Public Charities, Privileges and Elections, Police, Street Cleaning, Salaries and Offices, Buildings, Fire, Public Printing, Printed and Engrossed Ordinances and Resolutions.

21. Committees shall report, in writing, on all matters referred to them, with a brief statement of facts and their opinion in relation thereto, and a resolution or ordinance proposing the necessary action by the Board. The report itself shall not be subject to amendment. Every report shall state the time when the subject matter of such report was referred to the committee by the Board, and the action, if any, taken by the committee pursuant to any instructions of the Board. Every report shall lay over until the next regular meeting, unless otherwise ordered by a two-thirds vote of all the members present.

22. It shall require a three-fourths vote of all the members present to discharge a committee from further consideration of any matter referred to such committee. No matter that has been referred to a committee shall be acted upon by the Board until the committee has reported thereon or has been discharged. A committee, however, to whom there shall have been referred any such matter as is specified in section 48 of the Charter, or any matter in regard to which any law or ordinance fixes a time limit, for the consideration thereof by the Board, shall at the last regular meeting of the Board preceding the expiration of such time limit, be deemed to be discharged from the further consideration thereof. A committee which shall have been instructed to report at a certain meeting shall be deemed to be discharged from further consideration of the matter referred to it unless it shall report at such meeting or shall receive from the Board a further extension of time to report.

(Take in section 48 of the Charter.)

CHAPTER IX.

The Introduction and Passage of Ordinances and Resolutions.

23. All enactments shall be by ordinance, so far as practicable.

24. Every proposed ordinance or resolution shall be introduced by a member, or on the report of a Committee, and, unless otherwise ordered, shall be referred to a standing or special committee to consider and report thereon.

25. There shall be two classes of unfinished business, known respectively as General Orders and Special Order. All motions, resolutions, ordinances, reports of committees, etc., not finally disposed of on the legislative day introduced, shall be placed on the list of General Orders, unless otherwise ordered.

26. The list of General Orders shall be prepared in the numerical order of their introduction. Each Alderman, in his alphabetical turn, may call up two general orders.

27. Any ordinance or resolution may upon introduction be immediately considered, provided such action is not in conflict with the provisions of the Charter. An ordinance or resolution of the character referred to in section 30 of the Charter shall not be so immediately considered except by unanimous consent. Other ordinances or resolutions shall not be so immediately considered except by the consent of a majority of the members present. In the event that immediate consideration is proper, the proposed ordinance or resolution shall be read, section by section, and shall be subject to amendment and debate before being adopted. No ordinance which is amended shall be adopted until it has been reprinted as amended, except by a two-thirds vote.

(Take in Section 30 of the Charter.)

28. When a special order is under consideration it shall take precedence of any other special order set for a subsequent hour of the same day, but such other special order may be taken up immediately after the previous special order has been disposed of. Any such matter as is specified in section 48 of the Charter shall at the last regular meeting of the Board preceding the expiration of the time limit in said section contained be deemed to be a special order and shall take precedence of all other special orders. Such matters among themselves shall take precedence according to their order of introduction.

29. When any proposed ordinance or resolution requiring the concurrence of two-thirds, three-fourths, four-fifths or five-sixths of the members, as provided in the Charter is under consideration, such concurrence shall not be requisite except on the question of its final passage.

(Take in Section 39 of the Charter.)

30. All proposed ordinances and resolutions may be reconsidered by a vote of the majority of all the members present and voting; nor shall any proposed

ordinance or resolution be referred to a special committee with power to report complete, unless such proposed ordinance or resolution has previously been read through and considered by sections.

All ordinances introduced shall be in writing. Ordinances which are amendatory of or repeal any existing law, code or ordinance, or any part of either thereof, shall contain in parenthesis the part amended or repealed and shall have the new part which is to be inserted marked by underscoring. When the ordinance is printed in the minutes the new part shall be in italics instead of underscored.

CHAPTER X.

Motions and Their Precedence.

31. When a question is before the Board, only the following motions shall be received, and such motions shall have precedence in the order stated here, viz.: (1.) for an adjournment; (2.) for a call of the Board; (3.) to lay on the table; (4.) for the previous question; (5.) to postpone indefinitely; (6.) to postpone to a day certain; (7.) to refer; (8.) to amend.

The motion to adjourn, or for a call of the Board, or to lay on the table, shall be decided without debate, and shall always be in order. Upon motions not debatable no member shall be allowed to explain his vote or give his reasons for asking to be excused.

32. All motions shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the President or any member of the Board, delivered to the Clerk, and read before the same shall be debated; any motion may, by general consent, be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment.

If the question in debate contains several points, a member may have the same divided, provided the sense will admit thereof.

A motion to postpone, commit or refer, until it is decided, shall preclude all debate of the main question.

When a blank is to be filled, and different sums and time shall be proposed, the question shall be first taken on the highest sum and the longest time.

33. When a question has once been put and decided, it shall be in order for any member of the Board who voted in the majority to move for the reconsideration thereof; but no motion for the reconsideration of any vote shall be in order after the proposed ordinance, resolution, message, report, amendment, or motion upon which the vote was taken, shall have gone out of the possession of the Board; nor shall any motion for reconsideration be in order unless made on the same day on which the vote was taken, or on the legislative day next succeeding. But when a proposed ordinance or resolution shall have been recalled from the Mayor, a motion for reconsideration may be made at any time thereafter, and all resolutions recalling a proposed ordinance or resolution from the Mayor shall be regarded as privileged. No vote shall be reconsidered upon either of the following motions:

To adjourn.

To lay on the table.

CHAPTER XI.

Questions

of Order.

34. All questions relating to the priority of business shall be decided without debate.

When the reading of a paper (other than a petition) is called for, and the same is objected to by any member of the Board, it shall be determined by a vote without debate.

35. When a point of order is raised, the member speaking shall take his seat until the President shall have determined whether he is in order or not. Every question of order shall be decided by the President, subject to an appeal by any member of the Board. No second appeal shall be determined until the original appeal shall have been decided. If a member shall be called to order for words spoken, the words excepted to shall be immediately taken down in writing by the Clerk.

CHAPTER XII.

Attendance of Quorum—Call of the Board.

36. If at any time during a session a question shall be raised by any member of the Board as to the presence of a quorum, the presiding officer shall forthwith direct the Clerk to call the roll, and shall announce the result, and such proceeding shall be without debate; but no member, while speaking, shall be interrupted by raising the question of a lack of a quorum, and the question as to the presence of a quorum shall not be raised oftener than once in every hour, unless the lack of a quorum shall be disclosed upon a roll call of the ayes and noes. Whenever, upon a roll call, any member who is upon the floor of the Aldermanic Chamber refuses to make response when his name is called, it shall be the duty of the presiding officer, either upon his own motion, or upon the suggestion of any member of the Board, to request the member so remaining silent to respond to his name, and if such member fails to do so, the fact of such request and the refusal shall be entered in the journal, and such member shall be counted as present for the purpose of constituting a quorum.

37. For the purpose of securing the attendance of members a call of the Board may be ordered at any time, but such call shall not be in order when the voting on any question, has begun unless it shall appear upon an actual count by the President that a quorum is not present.

CHAPTER XIII.

Miscellaneous Provisions.

38. The roll call of the Board shall be in alphabetical order, except that the Presidents of the Boroughs, the Vice-Chairmen and the President of the Board shall be called last, and in the following order:

President of the Borough of Richmond, President of the Borough of Queens, President of the Borough of the Bronx, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Vice-Chairman, and the President of the Board. They shall be called by their respective titles instead of by their names.

39. Whenever a claim is referred to a committee, and the committee reports that the claim ought not to be allowed, and the report is adopted by the Board, it shall not be in order to move to take the papers from the files for the purpose of subsequent introduction, unless the claimants shall present a memorial for that purpose, stating in what manner the committee has erred in its report, or that new evidence has been discovered since the report, and setting forth the same in the memorial.

40. The following persons only shall be admitted to the floor of the Aldermanic Chamber during its sessions:

1. The Mayor, his Private Secretary and Chief Clerk.

2. Heads of Departments and their Deputies.

3. Reporters of the Public Press.

4. Persons in the exercise of an official duty directly connected with the business of the Board.

5. Such other persons as may by resolution be granted the courtesy of admission to the floor.

6. Members may by card admit persons to that part of the Chamber in the rear of the railing. No such privilege shall, however, extend beyond the legislative day for which it is given.

41. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Cushin's Manual" shall govern the Board in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the Board.

42. A rule of the Board may be altered, suspended or rescinded, or a new rule may be added, by a three-fourths vote of all the members, and not otherwise. A motion to suspend, alter or rescind any rule or to add a new rule, shall not be in order without the unanimous consent of the Board, unless one week's previous notice in writing thereof shall have been given specifying the purpose of the proposed suspension, alteration, rescission or addition.

Alderman James moved that the vote by which Chapters 2, 3, 4 and 8 of the above report were adopted January 15, 1902, be reconsidered.

Which was adopted.

Alderman James moved that the Board proceed to consider the report section by section.

Which was adopted.

At this point the Vice-Chairman took the chair.

Alderman Alt offered the following as a substitute for Rule 1 of Chapter 1.

1. The Board shall hold its regular meetings on Tuesdays of each and every week at one o'clock P. M., unless otherwise ordered.

Alderman Bill offered the following as a further amendment of Rule 1 of Chapter 1:

The Board shall hold its regular stated meetings on first and third Tuesdays of each month at one o'clock P. M., unless otherwise ordered.

Which was decided in the negative.

The amendment of Alderman Alt was then adopted.

At this point the President resumed the chair.

Alderman Stewart moved that the second paragraph of Rule 1 be amended by striking out the words "twenty-five" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "fifteen."

Which was adopted.

Alderman James moved that Section 3 of Chapter 2 be amended by striking out the words "Committees" from next to the last line of said section, and insert in lieu thereof the words "standing committees; also all special committees unless the Board shall order otherwise."

Which was adopted.

Alderman Stewart moved that the second sub-division of Section 3 of Chapter 2 be amended by striking out at the beginning of the said section the words "In the absence of the Vice-Chairman."

Which was adopted.

Alderman Oatman moved that Section 10 of Chapter 5 be amended by striking out at the end thereof the words "If any member refuses to vote, unless he be excused by the Board, or unless he be interested, such refusal shall be deemed a contempt, and shall be so recorded on the minutes."

Which was adopted.

Alderman Wafer moved to amend Section 12 of Chapter 5 by striking out after the word "censure" in said section the words "or penalty."

Which was adopted.

Alderman James moved that the second paragraph of Section 20 of Chapter 8 be amended by adding at the end thereof the following words, "Water Supply, Gas and Electricity; Parks; Salaries and Offices."

Which was adopted.

In accordance with foregoing motion Subdivision 3, of Section 20 of Chapter 8 was amended by striking therefrom the words "Parks; Water Supply, Gas and Electricity; Salaries and Offices."

Alderman Goodman moved that Subdivision 6, of Section 40, of Chapter 13, be amended by inserting after the word "railing" the words "former members of the Board of Aldermen or Municipal Assembly to be admitted without card."

Which was adopted.

Alderman Walkley moved that Section 42 of Chapter 13 be amended by striking out the words "three-fourths" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "three-fifths."

Which was adopted.

Alderman James moved the adoption of the report of the Committee on Rules as amended.

Which was adopted.

Dear Sir—On July 5, 1901, during an unprecedented rainfall, a portion of the main sewer in Hegeman Avenue, said sewer being in sectional area equivalent to a circle 96 degrees in diameter, burst, the invert of same sinking, and the arch destroyed for a distance of 180 linear feet. This break extends from the east curb-line of Hinsdale Street, 180 linear feet easterly.

Request was made from the Department of Sewers in July, 1901, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an appropriation sufficient to repair this sewer at that time. No money being allowed for same, it has been impossible to repair the sewer up to this date.

In the examination of this break, on July 10th, and recently on January 15th, it was ascertained that the sewer, for a distance of about 20 feet, was founded on unstable ground, or the bed of an old creek; therefore, it is recommended that when the sewer is rebuilt, the same be founded on piles for a reasonable part of this length.

It is estimated that the cost of this repair will be about \$5,000; therefore, pursuant to Section 419 of the Charter, authority must be given the President of the Borough to enter into contract for same.

I enclose herewith an appropriate resolution, recommending that the same, or one drawn to the effect of the substance contained therein, be presented to the Board of Aldermen, requesting their immediate action.

I respectfully suggest the advisability of having this matter presented to the Board of Aldermen by Alderman Alt of the district. Yours respectfully,

Sec. 2. When two years shall have elapsed after this ordinance shall take effect, no person or corporation may propel, by using steam power, any carriage, or car or locomotive or vehicle of any kind along the said railway, or any part thereof, or use any motive power other than electricity for propelling any carriage or car or locomotive or vehicle of any kind along the said railway, or any part thereof, or by any motive power conduct, propel or bring any steam engine or locomotive along said railway, or any part thereof.

Sec. 3. Any person or corporation directly or indirectly violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall for each and every violation thereof pay a fine of One hundred dollars. Compliance with this ordinance may also be enforced by any or all of the usual remedies allowed by law.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
