Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—I am in receipt of a communication bearing date 2d September from J. W. Stevenson, Esq., Deputy Comptroller, in which he states that under date of August 20, 1902, the Executive Committee of the Board of Education passed a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer the sum of \$8,000 from the General School Fund for the Borough of Brooklyn for the year 1901 to the appropriation contained within the Special School Fund for the same year and the same borough, entitled "Salaries of Janitors in Public Schools."

Mr. Stevenson states that before presenting this matter to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, he begs to be advised whether a transfer of this character can properly be made.

The answer to Mr. Stevenson's communication requires the consideration of two sections of the Charter of 1897, as amended by chapter 751 of the Laws of 1900, that Charter being in force in the year 1901.

It is provided in section 1060 of the Charter of 1897 as amended, as above stated, in part as follows:

"Section 1060. All moneys raised for educational purposes in The City of New York shall be raised in two funds, to be known as the Special School Fund and the General School Fund, respectively. The General School Fund shall consist of all moneys raised for the payment of salaries of the borough and associate superintendents and all members of the supervising and teaching staff throughout all boroughs, in conformity with section 1091 of this act. The Special School Fund shall contain and embrace all moneys raised for educational purposes not comprised in the General School Fund. It shall be the duty of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and of the Municipal Assembly to indicate in the Budget in raising the Special School Fund the respective amounts thereof which shall be available for use in the territory within the jurisdiction of each of the School Boards. The General School Fund shall be raised in bulk, and for the City at large, and shall be apportioned to the several boroughs by the Board of Education, as hereinafter provided."

It now becomes necessary to consider the provisions of section 1064 of the Charter of 1897 as amended, as above stated, which are in part as follows:

"In the month of July in each year each School Board shall transmit to the Board of Education an estimate in detail of the moneys needed for the purposes of the General School Fund within the territory under its jurisdiction during the next succeeding calendar year. The Board of Education shall, thereupon restate, rearrange, revise and verify such estimates, and shall have power, in its discretion, to amend or reduce the same, and thereupon shall submit, together with a written memorandum of any such amendment or reduction so made by the said Board of Education and the reason for making the same, an estimate for the entire school system of the City to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its action. * * * The Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall appropriate for the General School Fund for the year 1901, and annually, for each year thereafter, an amount equivalent to not less than four mills on every dollar of assessed valuation of the real and personal estate in The City of New York liable to taxation, inclusive of so much of the State school moneys apportioned by the Superintendent of Public Instruction for the payment of teachers' wages as is actually paid into the said General School Fund."

Section 1065 of the Charter of 1897, as amended by the same act, provides for the apportionment of the General School Fund among the various School Boards, but is not very important to be here considered.

Section 1091 provides a complete scheme for salaries to be paid out of the General School Fund.

An examination of the sections mentioned as they were in force in 1901 shows a very vital distinction in the law existing in that year and the Charter provisions as included in the present Greater New York Charter.

In section 1064, as quoted, there is no provision made for the case of the existence of an excess of money in the General School Fund over the amounts payable therefrom.

In the present Charter, in section 1064, there is a clear and specific direction that such excess shall become part of the General School Fund for the next succeeding year.

The absence of such a provision in section 1064 of the Charter of 1897 would seem to indicate that there is no duty cast upon the City authorities to make this transfer of such excess from the General School Fund of one year to that of the year succeeding.

Therefore, I have to advise you that under the law as existing in 1901, and which was applicable to the School Fund raised for that year, there is no objection to making the transfer in question.

I respectfully ask to have the question of omitting the tierods from floor and roof beams (permission to do which was denied by your honorable Board on December 2d) reconsidered, on the ground that the framing is of a skeleton type, the floor beams being framed rigidly into the sides of the floor and wall girders, so that each floor forms a rigid frame in itself.

On the further ground, that the Metropolitan system of floor construction, which I propose to use, is essentially a suspension system exerting no thrust on the beams; if the concrete slab of this system were to exert a thrust against the beams it would tend to raise the suspension rods stretched from beam to beam, and with them the concrete slab itself, through which the rods pass. Such an occurrence would be obviously impossible. The tierods in this case are therefore not required for structural reasons, and it would mean unnecessary expense to be compelled to install them.

Mr. Frank Miller, Mr. W. I. Lyman and Mr. O. F. Semsch appeared before the Board.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
