The Secretary presented the report of the Labor Clerk for the quarter ending June 30, 1904. On motion, the same was ordered filed.

On motion, the Secretary was authorized to transmit to the Mayor the report of the Municipal Civil Service Commission for the quarter ending June 30, 1904.

A letter was presented from the Board of Coroners, Borough of Manhattan, requesting that the Commission approve the transfer of Dr. T. D. Lehané from the position of Medical Inspector, Department of Health, to that of Coroner's Physician, he having passed an examination for the position of Police Surgeon. On motion of Commissioner Bell, the matter was laid over and the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Corporation Counsel and request his opinion as to the legality of the proposed transfer.

A letter was presented from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, advising the Commission of the reinstatement of John Schneider in the position of Laborer, to take effect July 18, 1904, and stating that his absence had been caused by sickness. The Labor Clerk recommended that approval of the reinstatement be withheld, as the records of the office show that Mr. Schneider has not worked since November 15, 1902. On motion, the recommendation of the Labor Clerk was adopted.

A letter was presented from the Fire Department, requesting an eligible list from which to appoint two (2) Drivers "qualified to break and train green horses." On motion, the Secretary was instructed to certify persons possessing the desired qualifications.

A letter was presented from the Department of Docks and Ferries, requesting authority to reassign to duty Mr. Patrick Melville, Watchman, whose name has not appeared on the pay-roll since April 6, 1904, because of illness. On motion, the request was granted.

A letter was presented from the Department of Docks and Ferries, requesting authority to reassign to duty Mr. John Witt, Laborer, whose name has not appeared on the pay-roll since March 2, 1904, because of illness. On motion, the request was granted.

The Chief Engineer presented a letter from the Department of Docks and Ferries, relative to holding an examination for promotion of Messrs. Berthold Sommer and Francis J. Ryan from eighth to tenth grade Clerk. On motion, the Secretary was instructed to arrange for an examination for Messrs. Sommer and Ryan under the provisions of Clause 2, Rule XV.

A letter was presented from the Department of Health, requesting approval of a leave of absence granted Joseph Baum, M. D., Medical Inspector, from July 15 to September 19, 1904. On motion, the leave of absence was approved.

A letter was presented from the President of the Borough of Queens, requesting that non-competitive examinations be held for the positions of Topographical Draughtsman and Transitman and Computer, under the provisions of Civil Service Rule XII, paragraph 3, in order to qualify persons to fill a number of vacancies in his Department temporarily, pending the establishment of eligible lists for those positions. On motion, the request was granted and the Secretary was instructed to proceed with the examination.

A letter was presented from the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices, Borough of Brooklyn, requesting the Commission to attach its certificate to the pay-roll of Victor Corbett, Bath Attendant. It appearing that Mr. Corbett was appointed in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices on June 20, and served until June 28, when he resigned to accept a position in the Borough of Manhattan, on motion, the request was granted.

A letter was presented from the Department of Public Charities, requesting the Commission to attach its certificate to the pay-roll of William H. Paster, Pilot, who served in a temporary capacity for three days. On motion, the request was granted.

A letter was presented from the Department of Docks and Ferries, requesting authority to reassign to duty Mr. Francis McMahon, Laborer, whose name has not

appeared on the pay-roll since June, on account of illness. On motion, the request was granted.

A letter was presented from the State Civil Service Commission, stating that the following action had been taken by that body at its meeting held July 15:

Resolution of this Commission including the position of Chief of the Bureau of Weights and Measures, Mayor's Office, in the Exempt Class.

Resolution of this Commission including in the Exempt Class the position of Secretary of the Department, Tenement House Department.

Also stating that, in the opinion of the State Commission, the position of Commissioner of Licenses should be classified in the Exempt Class, and that there should also be included in the Exempt Class the position of Secretary to the Commissioner of Licenses, if such Commissioner is authorized by law to appoint a Secretary; that the positions of Chief Inspector and Assistant Chief Inspector in the office of the Commissioner of Licenses do not appear to be properly taken out of the Competitive Class, and that it does not appear to be necessary to include in the Competitive Class by name the position of Inspector of Licenses. On motion, the letter was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan, requesting authority to reinstate Mr. Edward Greene, Inspector of Plumbing, he having been dismissed by the former Superintendent of that Bureau. Mr. Greene was given a hearing, and, upon reading the testimony, the Superintendent states that he is satisfied that he (Mr. Greene) committed no intentional violation of the Rules and Regulations of the Bureau of Buildings, and that, in his opinion, the charges against him did not warrant a dismissal. On motion, the Secretary was instructed to notify the Superintendent of Buildings that it would be necessary to obtain authority for such reinstatement from the Corporation Counsel.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby instructed to hold an examination for promotion to eighth grade Clerk (Appointment Clerk), in the Department of Street Cleaning, it appearing that the office title, "Appointment Clerk," has been in common use for more than one year, and that the duties performed in such position are of a fixed and distinctive character.

A letter was presented from the Fire Commissioner, requesting a special examination for promotion to the rank of Assistant Foreman of Firemen first grade Henry J. Padden, in view of the fact that Mr. Padden was not in a position to file his application for promotion within the prescribed time—between April 21, 1903, and April 26, 1903—by reason of having been restrained from performing the duties of first grade Fireman between the date of his unlawful dismissal, March 19, 1898, and the date of his reinstatement, June 1, 1903. A letter was presented from the Police Department requesting that such action be taken as may be necessary to fill the position of Chief Lineman in that Department. Attached to letter was certified copy of chapter 732, Laws of 1904, creating the office of Chief Lineman in the Police Department.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby instructed to hold a special examination for the position of Chief Lineman in the Police Department, under the provisions of Rule VI., paragraph 6, it appearing that the duties required in such position are of a peculiar and unusual character, to which no classified title is applicable.



On motion, the report of Thomas W. O'Keefe, Esq., Expert, on the examination of applicants for the position of Machinist was approved.

On motion, the report of Mr. Fred. Sitter, the Expert who conducted the examination of applicants for the position of Painter, etc., was approved.

On motion, the request of Joseph Gattringer, non-citizen, that he be admitted to the examinations for the positions of Topographical Draughtsman and Transitman and Computer was denied.

The Secretary presented the case of Ellen M. Cronin, a candidate for the position of Police Matron. It appeared that Mrs. Cronin was admitted to the examination upon a conditional notice, it being necessary to present her application to the Commission for approval in view of the fact that she was not a citizen. She was successful in passing the examination.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to accept her application and to place her name upon the eligible list in accordance with her percentage.

A letter was presented from Willoughby Dobbs, Esq., attorney, requesting that the name of Samuel B. Hutchings be certified to the Police Commissioner for appointment to the position of Patrolman, he having taken the examination held in December, 1900, but attained the age of thirty years before the promulgation of the eligible list in May, 1901.

On motion, the request was denied for lack of power.

On motion, the request of John Clausnitzer that his name be restored to the eligible list for Topographical Draughtsman was granted.

On motion, the request of George H. Leslie that his name be restored to the eligible list for Leveler was denied, he having declined appointment at Katonah, New York and his address being Spuyten Duyvil.

On motion, the request of David J. Shaw that his name be restored to the eligible list for Inspector of Masonry Construction was granted, he having presented an affidavit to the effect that he declined appointment in the Department of Bridges on account of insufficiency of salary.

On motion, the request of Samuel H. Wilensky that his name be restored to the eligible list for Temporary Clerk was denied, Mr. Wilensky having been out of town during the months of April, May and June, and failed to respond to the notices of appointment sent him.

On motion, the request of James B. Julian that his name be placed on a preferred list of Temporary Clerks was denied.

On motion, the request of J. W. Langguth that his name be restored to the eligible list for Topographical Draughtsman was granted, he having presented an affidavit to the effect that he declined appointment in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens on account of insufficiency of salary.

A letter was presented from Abraham Rosenberg requesting that his application for the position of Inspector of Licenses be accepted, the same having been rejected by the Chief Examiner under Regulation 5, Mr. Rosenberg having answered "No" instead of "Yes" to the question "Were you ever examined for a position in the service of The City of New York?"

On motion, the request was denied.

On motion, the request of William G. Foy that his name be restored to the eligible list of Transitman and Computer was granted, he having presented a doctor's certificate to the effect that he was ill when certified to the Aqueduct Commission, and was therefore unable to respond.

On motion, the recommendation of the Secretary that the application of Miss Alice Grady for the position of Inspector of Licenses be rejected for the reason that it contained a misstatement in answer to question 10, was adopted.

On motion, the request of Walter J. Burke that his application for the position of Topographical Draughtsman be accepted, he having attained the age of twenty years on June 19, 1904, was granted.

A letter was presented from Harold B. Catlin requesting that his application for the position of Axeman be received. The Secretary stated that Mr. Catlin was but 19 years of age, while the advertisement of the examination fixed the minimum age of candidates at 21.

On motion, the request was granted, and it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby instructed to amend the advertisement of the examination for the position of Axeman by fixing the minimum age at 18 years instead of 21.

On motion, the request of Jeremiah Ryan that his name be restored to the eligible list for the position of Axeman was granted, he having presented an affidavit to the effect that he declined appointment in the Rapid Transit Commission on account of insufficient compensation.

On motion, the request of David J. Irish that the requirement of citizenship be waived in his case, and that he be permitted to take the examination for Topographical Draughtsman was denied.

On motion, the request of Nathaniel J. Feltman that his name be restored to the preferred eligible list of Mason's Helper was granted, he having presented a doctor's certificate to the effect that he was ill at the time appointment was offered him.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, Mr. H. de B. Parsons, Consulting Engineer, employed in the Fire Department of The City of New York, be and hereby is excepted from examination under the provisions of Civil Service Rule XII., paragraph 6, it appearing that Mr. Parsons is a person engaged in private business, and that the services to be rendered are professional, scientific, technical or expert, and of an occasional and exceptional character; provided, however, that his compensation shall not exceed the sum of thirteen hundred and fifty dollars.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the action of the Commission at its meeting held July 13, in instructing the Secretary to hold a public hearing in the matter of excepting from examination the position of Architect's Assistant in the College of The City of New York, be and the same is hereby rescinded; and

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, Mr. John H. Meyer, Architect's Assistant (employed in the College of The City of New York, be and hereby is excepted from examination, under the provisions of Municipal Civil Service Rule XII., paragraph 6, it appearing that Mr. Meyer is a person engaged in private business, and that the services to be rendered are professional, scientific, technical or expert, and of an occasional and exceptional character; provided, however, that his compensation shall not exceed the sum of eighteen hundred dollars per annum.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the following regulations be and are hereby adopted, under the provisions of Civil Service Rule III., paragraph 1:

#### MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

##### GENERAL REGULATIONS.

##### ADOPTING ORDER.

The Municipal Civil Service Commission, under the authority conferred by section 9 of the Civil Service Law, and Rule III. of the rules prescribed in pursuance thereof, promulgated on the 4th day of December, 1903, hereby makes the following regulations, reserving the right to modify the same from time to time as necessity may require:

#### Regulation I.

##### The Secretary.

1. The Secretary shall keep the minutes of the proceedings of the Commission, and shall keep records of all appointments, promotions, transfers, reinstatements, removals or other changes of status under these rules or other action thereunder. He shall have charge of all books, eligible lists, records and papers, and of the official seal and other property in the Commission's office.

2. He shall keep the official roster and have charge of the certification of all pay-rolls and estimates submitted in pursuance of Rule XXI.

3. He shall prepare, from time to time, for submission to the Commission, blank forms covering, so far as practicable, all applications, certificates, reports, records and returns required in connection with the work of his office.

4. Unless otherwise ordered, he shall, under the direction of the President, and after consultation with the Chief Examiner, set the dates for examinations and make all requisite public announcement of such examinations and other proposed changes.

5. He shall notify all candidates for examination, whose applications have been accepted, of the time and place fixed for such examination, and of the conditions thereof.

6. He shall make all certifications to appointing officers, upon their requisition, of candidates eligible to appointment, promotion or employment.

7. He shall, subject to the direction of the Commission, assign and direct the work of all subordinate employees except those subordinate to the Chief Examiner.

8. He shall audit and certify the accounts of the salaries and expenses of the Commission and of all its subordinates, conduct the official correspondence, and perform such other appropriate duties as the Commission may assign to him.

9. The Assistant Secretary shall act under the direction of the Secretary, as his assistant, and shall perform the duties of the Secretary in his absence.

#### Regulation II.

##### The Chief Examiner.

The Chief Examiner, subject to the direction of the Commission, shall have charge of all matters pertaining to the preparation for, and conduct of examinations, except as herein otherwise provided. He shall:

1. Prepare, for submission to the Commission, blank forms covering, so far as practicable, the details of the work of his office.

2. Determine, in the first instance, all questions relating to the eligibility of candidates for examination based upon their written application, except such as relate to particulars appearing on the face thereof, and also questions relating to the admissibility of candidates when they appear for examination.

3. Prepare and communicate to the Secretary forms for all advertisements of competitive examinations required under Rule VII., and of all schedules of examinations, and announcements of the conditions thereof, required to be published at the beginning of each year.

4. Direct the work of Examiners or other employees subordinate to him, and take care to secure accuracy, uniformity and justice in their proceedings.

5. Audit all accounts for compensation of examiners and monitors employed at a per diem rate, and for all other expenses arising in the Examining Department.

6. Perform such other appropriate duties as may be specified in the rules or in these regulations or assigned to him by the Commission.

#### Regulation III.

##### The Labor Clerk.

The Labor Clerk, subject to the direction of the Secretary, shall have charge of all matters relating to the registration of applicants for employment in positions in the Labor Class, and, subject to the direction of the Chief Examiner, of all examinations or other preliminary tests required therefor.

#### Regulation IV.

The Secretary, the Chief Examiner and the Labor Clerk shall take care that the rules and regulations are complied with, and shall bring to the attention of the Commission all instances within their respective offices in which it appears that any provision thereof has been violated or disregarded by any public officer or employee, or by any other person.

#### Regulation V.

##### Application.

1. Applicants for position in the competitive or the labor class shall specify in each case the position or positions for which they wish to apply.

2. No application will be accepted from any person:

(a) Who is not a citizen of the United States (except that this requirement may be waived by the resolution of the Commission in the case of positions requiring scientific, educational or professional qualifications of a high or unusual order.

(b) Who is not a resident of the State, or of the City, or of a particular borough, where such residence is required by law.

(c) Who is physically disqualified for or who is not within the age limits fixed for the position sought.

(d) Who is addicted to the excessive use of intoxicating beverages or drugs.

(e) Who, within two years preceding the date of application, has been dismissed from any position in the City service for delinquency or misconduct.

(f) Who, within nine months, has failed in or withdrawn from an examination for the same position, unless this requirement be waived by resolution of the Commission in accordance with Clause 12 of Rule VII.

(g) Who has knowingly made a false statement in his application, or who has been guilty of fraud or deceit in connection therewith; or

(h) Who is otherwise ineligible under any of the provisions of the Civil Service Law or Rules.

3. If the applicant claims rights of preference as a veteran, he must prove his claim by presenting for record (1) his original discharge, (2) certificate from the Adjutant-General or Records and Pension Bureau of the War Department or Secretary of the Navy, or (3) certificate from Adjutant-General of the State in which he served. If he served under other than his proper name, affidavits from two of his former company must accompany his discharge (or certificate); unless he is receiving a pension, in which case his pension certificate will be sufficient proof of identity. If the slightest doubt exists as to his identity, service or residence of the applicant, he may be required to produce further proof in support of his claim.

4. All applications presented for positions in the competitive class shall be indexed under the card system, and, before acceptance, shall be verified as to the applicant's eligibility for the examination sought.

5. Applications for examination for positions in the non-competitive class shall be addressed to the officer having the power of appointment to such positions, and shall not be received by the Commission.

#### Regulation VI.

##### Age Limitations.

1. The limits of age at the time of application for the following-named positions in the competitive class shall be as follows:

#### Regulation VII.

##### Physical Qualifications.

Candidates for the following positions in the competitive class will be required to pass a medical examination, testing their capacity physically for the discharge of



duties peculiar to the position sought, before admission to the competitive examination:

Positions in any grade of the Police, Fire, Street Cleaning or Prison services, whether filled by appointment or promotion; Police Doorman, Police Matron, Matron, Nurse, Attendant, Court Attendant, Messenger, Watchman, Bridge Keeper, Janitor, Janitor Engineman, Prison Orderly, Orderly, and such other positions as the Commission may, from time to time, designate.

#### Regulation VIII.

##### Qualifications for Special Positions.

1. Candidates for professional positions of any character will be required to present, among the preliminary evidences of their fitness, the certificates, diplomas or licenses required by law for the practice of their respective professions in the State of New York.

2. For positions requiring the practice of chemistry, candidates must present proof that they have received the degree of Bachelor of Science, or its equivalent, or present a certificate from some reputable institution showing that they have pursued for two years a course of study therein tending to qualify them for the position sought.

3. Candidates for the position of Inspector in the Bureaus of Buildings must show before appointment that they have had at least five years' practical experience as an architect, engineer, mason, carpenter or plumber, or, if the application be for the position of Chief Inspector of Buildings, that they have had at least ten years' practical experience as an architect, engineer or builder.

4. Candidates for the position of Assistant Engineer, in any bureau subject to a Borough President, or in the Departments of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Bridges, or Street Cleaning, must show before appointment that they have had at least ten years' practical experience as engineers.

5. Candidates for the position of Court Clerk, Stenographer or Attendant in the City Magistrates' Court, or in the Municipal Court, must be residents of the borough or other prescribed geographical division in which the court in which they are to be appointed is situated.

6. Candidates for the position of Deputy Tax Commissioner must show before appointment that for at least one year prior thereto they have been electors and freeholders in the borough in which they are to serve.

7. Stationary Enginemen whose names are placed upon the eligible list must secure the license required by law before certification for appointment.

#### Regulation IX.

##### Examinations.

1. Applicants must present themselves promptly at the examination rooms at the hour and place specified in the notification from the Secretary's office, and none will be admitted to an examination except upon the production of such notification.

2. Applicants, if required, must provide themselves with the pens, penholders, erasers, ink and blotters they are to use, but they shall not use in the examination room any writing paper but that furnished by the Commission or notes of any description.

Applicants for an examination for stenography and typewriting shall provide themselves with typewriting machines and appurtenances. Those to be examined for the position of Draughtsman, or for any other position requiring the use of instruments, must furnish the instruments.

3. Before the commencement of the examination the weight to be given to each subject included therein, the minimum percentage necessary to secure a passing mark and the time allowed for the completion of the examination shall be announced to the competitors orally or in a printed or written memorandum. No questions given to a competitor at any session of an examination may be answered at another session.

4. The name of the candidate must not be written on any of his examination papers, and specific announcement shall be made by a memorandum printed on each examination sheet that any paper bearing the name of the competitor, or any other identifying mark, will be rejected.

5. The following instructions shall be furnished to each competitor, in printed form, before the examination papers are distributed, and both competitors and examiners shall be bound thereby:

1. Candidates shall read carefully the printed instructions before beginning work. They will be bound by the following rules, as well as by the instructions given to each competitor at the beginning of an examination.

2. They must put their examination numbers on the notices to appear, fill out the preliminary sheet, including all blanks, sign their names thereon and inclose the preliminary sheet and notice in the envelope provided and seal the envelope and hand it to the examiner.

3. Each paper written by a candidate shall be marked with his or her examination number, but if the candidate's name or any other identifying mark is used the paper will not be rated.

4. Candidates must observe that each question sheet is received in proper order, and be sure that none of the sheets have been omitted. They are held responsible for all errors and omissions.

5. Candidates must not leave their desks with a sheet unfinished unless required to do so by nature of the examination. A candidate who leaves the room while engaged on a paper will not be allowed to finish that paper.

6. They are allowed to leave the examination room for luncheon at such time as may be announced at the examination. No additional time will be allowed on account of absence.

7. All necessary additional sheets of examination paper upon which to complete work may be had upon application to an examiner or monitor. Answers should not be written on the question sheets, but on the ruled sheets provided for that purpose.

8. In writing, pencil work will not be allowed, but in an examination where drawing is a test, sketches may be made in pencil.

9. Pencil and scratch paper may be used for preliminary work, except for spelling, which must be written with ink directly on the ruled sheets from the dictation of the examiner.

10. No scratch paper may be used except that furnished by the examiner in charge, and on finishing the answers all the scratch paper should be destroyed by the candidate and must not be taken from the room.

11. No help is allowed except what appears on the question sheet or in the instructions given candidates.

12. Candidates who may be detected in consulting any printed or written matter during an examination will be dismissed.

13. All conversation or communication between candidates during examination is strictly forbidden. Speaking to a neighbor on any pretense or replying to him if he speaks, will result in dismissal from the examination room.

14. It is forbidden to copy or to attempt to read from the work of any competitor, or to permit any competitor to copy from or to read the sheets of another. It is absolutely forbidden to make any signs or in any manner to seek to impart or to receive any information of any kind or description during an examination, under penalty of dismissal.

15. All necessary explanations will be made when practicable to the whole number of competitors.

16. All examination papers must be handed in with the answers and must not be taken from the room.

#### Regulation X.

##### Subjects and Weights.

1. The subjects of an examination, with the weights attaching thereto, shall be announced by the Examiner in charge at time and place of examination.

2. Except where otherwise specifically provided by either the rules or these regulations, questions in examination for original appointment shall relate to the general fitness and capacity of the candidates rather than to their knowledge of the rules or methods of the Department or Departments in which the position they are seeking exists.

#### Regulation XI.

##### Marking and Grading.

1. The Examiners assigned for the marking of papers shall complete such marking as soon as practicable after the completion of an examination. Such marking shall be under the direction of the Chief Examiner.

2. The marking of the papers of each competitor shall be made on the scale of 100, which shall represent the maximum possible attainment. The average of the marking of the several answers upon any one subject shall be the standing on that subject.

3. The general average standing of each competitor shall be made up in accordance with the weights attaching respectively to the several subjects substantially as follows:

As indicated, the standing on each subject shall be multiplied by the weight given such subject and the product placed in the third column, and the sum of these products divided by the sum of the weights will give the general average.

4. Where the weight attaching to any subject in any examination is not less than six out of ten, and candidates are required to obtain a general average percentage of 70 in such examination, the papers so weighted shall be rated first, and the papers of a candidate who fails to receive a mark of at least 50 thereon shall not be rated further. Where any examination includes a technical subject for which a rating of 75 is required, the papers relating to such subject shall be rated first, and the papers of a candidate who fails to receive a mark of at least 72 thereon shall not be rated, but this plan may not be adhered to where, in the opinion of the Chief Examiner, the work of marking is not facilitated thereby. The schedule sheet shall show the ratings on each subject of all candidates who receive a percentage of at least 50 on a paper bearing a weight of six out of ten, or of at least 72 on a technical paper, but in the case of candidates failing to receive such required averages shall contain the ratings received on such papers only.

5. Except as provided in the clause preceding, examination sheets containing statements of the previous training or experience of a candidate shall, so far as practicable, be rated last. Experience obtained during any period of temporary employment in the City service shall not be considered in such rating.

6. In any appeal from the markings of the Examiners, the candidates must refer to the particular paper which, for such reasons as he may state, he believes was not fairly marked.

7. Where an appeal is made, action upon which would involve a change of any rating, such appeal before such action is taken shall be referred for report to the Chief Examiner and the Examiners by whom the original markings were made.

8. Where an appeal has reference to any medical examination or test, it must be accompanied by a physician's certificate with reference to the facts upon which it is based.

#### Regulation XII.

##### Eligible Lists.

1. The Chief Examiner shall report to the Secretary the results of each examination, giving the names and ascertained average markings of all competitors who completed such examination, and the names of all who withdrew therefrom, together with such other information with reference thereto as may be necessary for the information of the Commission. The Secretary shall thereupon enter upon the appropriate eligible lists, in the manner required by Rule X., the names of all persons who have received the required minimum percentage.

2. Within five days after the establishment of a list, each candidate whose name appears thereon shall be advised by the Secretary by mail as to the percentage he has secured and his relative position on the list, and the Secretary shall inform such candidate as to changes in his relative position on the list due to the making of appointments therefrom or to other causes, whenever a request for such information is made.

3. Each eligible list shall be published, as soon as practicable after it is established, in the CITY RECORD. The lists shall be open to public inspection, but copies thereof shall be furnished to no one except to appointing officers having the right of selection therefrom, or except in accordance with section 1545 of the Charter. The names of persons who have received less than the minimum standing shall not be published under any circumstances.

#### Regulation XIII.

##### Certification and Appointment.

1. The Secretary shall make certification of eligibles upon the requisition of appointing officers in such form as the Commission shall prescribe. No appointments shall be made from any certification after the expiration of the term of the eligible list from which such certification is made.

2. Where certification is required to be made according to residence, the residence of any candidate shall be deemed to be the place stated by him in his application to be his legal residence, at the time such application was filed; but in case the candidate has removed from the borough or other prescribed geographical division in which he resided at the time of his application, he shall no longer be eligible to appointment for such borough or division, but shall, after three months, be eligible for the corresponding appointment in the borough or division to which he has moved.

3. On the request of an appointing officer, the Commission shall submit to his inspection at its office, the application and examination papers of any candidate certified for appointment, or shall furnish him in connection with such certification, with the names of the certifiers and of the employers during the five years immediately preceding the application of each such candidate, to permit the addressing of such inquiries to such certifiers or employers as such officer may wish to make.

4. When the name of an eligible is certified for appointment or employment, a notice shall be given him to that effect, specifying the Department to which the certification has been made, the title of the position and the compensation offered.

#### Regulation XIV.

##### The Labor Class.

1. Applications for employment in the labor class shall be received only for positions the titles of which are classified, and no person shall be registered under more than one such title.

2. Each applicant shall be given a receipt for his application, on which shall be noted his name, address, the position sought, the date and the application number and such number shall be furnished to the applicant on his request at any future time.

3. Applicants must report for the physical examination promptly at the time and place stated in the notice given thereof, and must present the notice of examination before they can be examined.

4. The results of the physical examination shall be entered on the application form of the applicant, and following the examination both the said form and the notice of examination be stamped with the date and the word "Examined." Should the applicant fail to pass, the form shall be stamped with the word "Rejected." The notice shall be returned to the applicant.

5. The candidate who is rejected in the physical examination or who fails to pass the trade examination where required, shall not be eligible to apply for a further examination within nine months from the date of such failure.

6. Certification of eligibles for employment as Laborers shall be made in the manner prescribed for positions in the competitive class, and the appointing officer, or his representative, shall forward to the Commission an identification sheet with such entries



as may be necessary to permit of their comparison with the statements and description of the applicant at the time of his application for registration.

The Commission then adjourned subject to the call of the President.

On motion, minutes approved as read.

Appeal 98—New Building 728 of 1904, west side Central Park, West, Seventy-third and Seventy-fourth streets, Borough of Manhattan; Messrs. Clinton & Russell, appellants.

No. 4. The building exceeds twelve stories and 150 feet in height; same should conform to all the provisions of Section 105, as to fireproofing all materials used in its construction.

The law does not apply to this case as the floor above the twelfth story should be regarded as a pent-house and it does not require that fireproof materials be used for floors, trim, etc., throughout the twelve lower floors.

Is it not lawful to build a pent-house above the 150 feet in height and have the lower stories built with the trim and floor surfaces of non-fireproof material?

Should not the pent-house be regarded as a pent-house and not as an additional story as it covers less than 50 per cent. of the area of the building?

The Tenement House Department has approved plan of this building covering larger area than shown on accompanying plan.

All the public halls and stairways on lower floors including doors, window sash, floors, trim, etc., are built of fireproof material throughout.

The bulkhead around building is for hiding unsightly objects when viewed from the park, such as skylights, vent ducts and the drying of clothes.

The walls of the pent-house will be of terra cotta and covered with copper.

Floor will be of cement and tile.

Wire glass will be used wherever glass is necessary.

Proper skylights will be provided.

All woodwork for the window frames, sash, doors, trim and base of the pent-house will be thoroughly fireproofed.

All woodwork entering into the construction of the pent-house will be fireproofed by a process which is fully accepted and approved by the Bureau of Buildings.

The entire pent-house will be constructed entirely fireproof.

A stand-pipe with hose connection and outlet in the hall of pent-house will be provided.

The pent-house will not cover more than 50 per cent. of the roof area.

Major Wells appeared before the Board.

On motion, laid over.

The Chairman read a communication from Messrs. Osborne & Hess, attorneys for the National Fireproofing Company, stating that an appeal will be filed by them in re New Building 196 of 1904; which was, on motion, ordered on file.

Appeal 98 (laid over by request of appellant for one week). Amendment filed November 7, 1904, as follows:

In addition to facts previously stated as to the building being built better than the law requires, both as to heavier construction of steel framework and heavier brick walls than required by the Code, we beg to state further details as follows:

1st. A large amount of the floor surface will have all wood eliminated and tile substituted.

2d. All trim in first-story main hall and corridor will be of Caen stone and marble.

3d. All trim in upper public halls will be of fireproof wood.

4th. Hardwood trim will be used throughout all the building.

5th. Elevators are solidly inclosed from cellar to roof with fireproof inclosures.

6th. All walls of kitchens are tiled 5 feet 0 inch high.

7th. All bath and toilet rooms are tiled 4 feet 6 inches high.

8th. The number of elevators enable the occupants to leave any floor without using the elevators which are in the public halls.

9th. The area of pent house is only 30 per cent. of the area of the roof, not including the inclosure for elevators, tank and stairs.

10th. Three pumps, one electric and two steam, are provided for fire purposes.

11th. All floors will be filled in with concrete up to floor surfaces, and not with dry steam ashes.

12th. The bull-eyes in roof will be filled in solid.

Col. J. H. Wells appeared before the Board.

On motion, laid over.

Appeal 99—Alteration 490 of 1904, southwest corner One Hundred and Forty-eighth street and Brook avenue, The Bronx, S. B. Ogden & Co., appellants.

No. 1. The space occupied by the present building and proposed extension exceeds the area specified for non-fireproof buildings. Section 32, Building Code.

Objections 3 and 4. The 16-inch portion of the party wall exceeds 50 feet in vertical measurement. Sections 32 and 39, Building Code.

Objections 9 and 10. The 12-inch portion of elevator shaft will exceed 50 feet in vertical height.

1. Provision specified in section 32 should not apply.

3, 4 and 9. Construction proposed is equally as good and more desirable.

1. To allow the proposed extension to be erected with non-fireproof construction.

3 and 4. To increase the height of the 16-inch party wall, in order to inclose the fifth and sixth stories of proposed extension.

9. To extend the elevator shaft up high enough to afford elevator service to the fifth and sixth stories of the new extension.

1. The buildings consist of a group of buildings separated by brick walls extending from cellar to roof. They are occupied by the owner, who finds it necessary to have internal communication on all floors. The doors between the different sections will be fireproof doors of such construction as will meet the approval of the Bureau of Buildings.

3 and 4. The party wall referred to is stone in cellar, 28 inches thick in first story, 20 inches brick in second, third and fourth stories 16 inches brick. The cellar wall is laid in cement mortar; the upper wall is laid in lime mortar.

The wall is reinforced at two points by brick buttresses 20 inches deep and 40 inches on the face; also by the cross walls of elevator shaft.

9. The wall of elevator shaft is 12 inches in thickness on the sides from first floor level up to roof. The wall forming back of elevator shaft corresponds in thickness to the party wall of which it forms a part.

The 12-inch portions are non-bearing on one side, and on the other support a floor load over a span of 10 feet 6 inches.

Mr. J. H. Tomlinson appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved.

Appeal 100—New Building 821 of 1904, north side Forty-sixth street, about 205 feet from Sixth avenue, Manhattan, Buchman & Fox, appellants.

3. Building must be constructed throughout of non-combustible.

The provision of the Building Code does not apply.

As to whether a pent house story may be erected on the roof.

The total height of the building, including pent house story, does not exceed 150 feet 0 inch. The pent house story will cover less than 50 per cent. of the roof area; will be constructed absolutely fireproof, floors cement, window frames and sash hollow metal, glazed with wire glass; the doors and their trim will be fireproofed wood, acceptable to the Bureau of Buildings. The walls to be carried up to their proper height, and standpipe with hose connection and outlet will be placed in hall.

On motion, approved, on condition that the construction be found of adequate strength by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Appeal 101—New Building 825 of 1904, premises southwest corner One Hundredth street and Madison avenue, Manhattan, Adolph Mertin, appellant.

1. Brick partition walls should be provided in upper stories, where distance between bearing walls exceeds 26 feet.

That an equally good or desirable form of construction can be applied.

To permit floor beams to be supported by iron cross girders at the rear and front portions of the building, in lieu of the customary interior brick partition wall for the support of wooden floor beams.

That the iron beams supporting part of the floor beams of each tier will be securely held in position, portion of wire lathed and all stud partitions separating apartments will be filled in with 4 inches of brickwork.

Mr. Adolph Mertin appeared before the Board.

Resolved, That section 54 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 54.—Any milk found to be adulterated which has been brought into The City of New York or is held or offered for sale in said City may be seized and destroyed by any Inspector or other officer of this Department authorized to inspect milk."
